Imagine being lost in the breaks located in the northern part of Knox County. Add being wet, near frozen and very afraid as darkness falls. Then factor in the time of year and temperature: December 11, with a temperature of 30 degrees and falling fast after nightfall. If you are able to imagine yourself in this terrifying predicament, then you might, just might, begin to know how a thirteen year old from Wichita Falls

felt when he was separated from his family and became hopelessly lost on a hog hunting trip last December just south of Gilliland.

Cory Hitchcock had been having a great time hunting wild hogs with his family until he "took a wrong turn" about 10:00 a.m. on Sunday, December 11, 1994. While becoming further disoriented during the next eleven hours, he fell into a creek, then ripped off most of his pant legs on barbed wire as he stumbled around in

harsh country with temperatures falling below the freezing mark.

After finding his son missing, Cory's father, Bill Hitchcock, quickly notified law enforcement authorities, who in turn organized and began a widespread manhunt for the youth. With law enforcement officers and volunteers coming in from all parts of the county, searchers began to get frustrated as the long day wore on with still no sign of Cory. A high tech DPS helicopter with searchlights and

heat sensors was brought in to aid in the search, but there was still no sign of Cory.

As darkness began to fall, some of the searchers started leaving as work and other responsibilities began to pull them away one by one. Some of the more determined searchers pressed on, ignoring the high tech equipment and pressing on as only they knew how: on the back of a horse, spending long hours in the saddle de-

- Thow everything you can about your children's activities and friends. Monitor children's activities and participate with them. Don't allow children to play alone in fields, on playgrounds, or in other dangerous or isolated
- ♣ Teach your children about strangers.
- Teach your children to refuse anything from strangers, including money, gifts, or rides. Know where new items come from.
- Teach your children how to safely enter home alone. Teach them how to pretend you are home and how to answer the phone if they are alone.



Infant Immunization Week

Now Through Saturday

try are too low, posing a threat to the health of our children everyday. For the health of our children and our communities we need to work together to increase the number of children who are immunized.

The good news is that National Infant Immuization Week is here, April 22-29, 1995. The fact is that everyone has a role to play in raising infant immunization rates across the country. With all this in mind, NIIW has adopted the slogan: "At least 11 shots by 2: How sure are you?" for the week's outreach efforts. The goal is to raise awareness of immunization issues and hope to reach the goal of 90% immunization rate across the country by 1996.

As of 1994, only about 60% of our children nationwide were properly immunized by age two, and although many children are immunized when they enter schools, getting shots later than age two exposes tens of thousand of children to deadly diseases every year. And every year many of our nation's children are stricken with diseases commonly wiped out, such as polio, diptheria and whooping cough.

Presently, the greatest challenges facing infant immunization revolve around the public perception that we do not have a childhood immunization problem in this country. Other issues such

as violence, drug abuse, education and other health problems tend to garner the most media attention and public interest, and as a result immunization holds limited importance in the public

Moorhouse Tells Of Being Stationed In Guantanamo

(Editor's Note: Jed Moorhouse, son of Tom and Becky Moorhouse and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Togo Moorhouse, recently wrote a letter telling of where he is stationed in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. We are using the letter in its entirety.)

Tom and Becky,

So much to tell you about this place and what's going on. #1. Location. All the migrant camps and where we live are within 500 yards of the ocean. Our cap is at the base of 3 cactus-covered hills. But, there are a lot of palm trees around. #2 Weather here is hot -85 to 95 degrees F. I've got a heck of a tan. It has rained hard upon several occasions, but "rainy season" isn't until June or July. #3 Guantanamo is roughly 50 square acres with a fence separating it from Communist Cuba. Big airport on one side of the Bay and everything else on the other side. The place has a commissary and store. I like the post library best. Go for new books about once a week. Not a lot of Marines stationed here though. #4 Our job is external guard for Camps A & B. We mantowers overlooking both camps and also post two two-man walking teams (rovers). We prevent or try to prevent Cubans from going over the fence, whether trying to go in or out of the camp.

With three platoons pulling guard our schedule goes: 0700-1900 one day, 24 hours off, then 1900-0700, 12 hours on/224 hours off. My time off is spent fishing, exploring. Sometimes I just lay around and do laundry and read. Sean and I have been going to the gym and lifting weights every other day. On occasion we go to the beach or the pool. Beside being away from Tara and Lauren, this is by far an easy deployment. McDonald's is getting old though. A Burger King or Taco Bell would be good! Seriously, we do have a McDonald's here.

The migrant camps are enclosed by a 18 ft. fence. They get the food delivered and everything. They have two shower houses. They live in wooden frame house built of 2x4s and plywood with a medium army tent to cover it up. The majority of these people are common people, but some are doctors, lawyers, or educated people. But, they live like pigs. Throw trash everywhere. They have nothing to do except sit around, smoke and joke, and wait to go either back to Cuba or to "Miami". Nine camps total, some family camps and some single male camps. Our camps A&B that we guard, A is single male, B is a

family camp. We get to see the kids playing and talk to them which is fun. Everything has been pretty uneventful so far. No fencejumpers yet. But, when they do jump, we "arrest" them, put them in handcuffs and have them taken to X-Ray, the camp which serves as jail for the Cubans. X-Ray is a feared place. Por Que? Quien Sabe. See - I'm picking up quite a bit of Espanol down here. Well, I better let you go for now. Write me back. Tell everyone Hello

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
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Three Men Honored For Heroism In Dec. 11 Rescue

spite punishing weather conditions for both men and horses.

With the arrival of nightfall, the searchers hoped for the best, but secretly began to fear the worst as the mid-winter temperatures began to fall and conditions worsened. Even Cory began to have his doubts as he stumbled around the unfamiliar country in the pitch black of the cold winter night.

Just as things began to look the worst, 13 year old Cory Hitchcock was given another chance at life when the dimming beams of three flashlights seemed to fall on him all at once, signifying the arrival of three cowboys on horseback. As he viewed these angels in the dark, Cory's first thought was "I'm outta here!"

With Cory, now a healthy 14 year old, and his father, Bill in attendance, the three cowboys who pressed on and found him were honored at a special awards ceremony at the Knox County Courthouse in Benjamin early Tuesday morning.

With their families, friends and a host of law enforcement officials looking on with pride, Royce Miller, Ronnie Simmons and Jake Propps were recognized for their heroism by Major Lamar Beckworth, Commander of the Department of Public Safety's Region 5, headquartered in Lubbock.

Cited for heroism and presented the Director's Award by Major Beckworth, all three men received the highest award for heroism by a civilian authorized by the Department of Public Safety.

During his presentation remarks, Major Beckworth praised the trio for their unselfish efforts as they kept on looking for Cory, despite the elements, harsh terrain and darkness.

Major Beckworth also praised the efforts of all the ranchers and cowboys who "came out in droves and were willing to help in any way they could."

Humbled by all the attention surrounding the award, Jake Propps summed up the feeling of all three cowboys as he admitted that he felt like "a fish out of

"He received presents like a compass, flashlight, and water-proof matches," stated Bill Hitchcock, who went on to say, "The experience is one I never want to go through again." Major Beckworth concluded the awards ceremony with this phrase that came from the paperwork sub-

mitted to DPS Headquarters in Austin recommending the award for Royce Miller, Ronnie Simmons and Jake Propps: "It is my opinion that these three men should be recognized for their unselfish efforts. As stated before, this is not the first time that they and many others like them have assisted. It is an obvious fact, that with all the high tech equipment in the world today, there is still a need and a place in rural societies, such as ours, where just a man and a horse can accomplish a life saving task."
