

Mr. Bellinghausen, 65, died Wednesday, February 28, at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital from injuries sustained in a February 12 two vehicle accident near Plainview that claimed the life of his brother, Wilfred.

Born May 3, 1930, in Rhineland, he moved from Rhineland to Knox City where he as a resident for 38 years. Mr. Bellinghausen was a rancher and farmer and a member of Saint Joseph's Catholic Church. 


