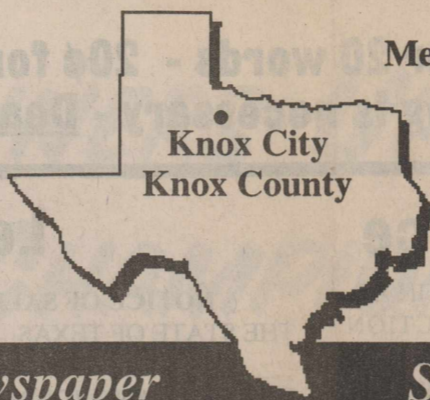

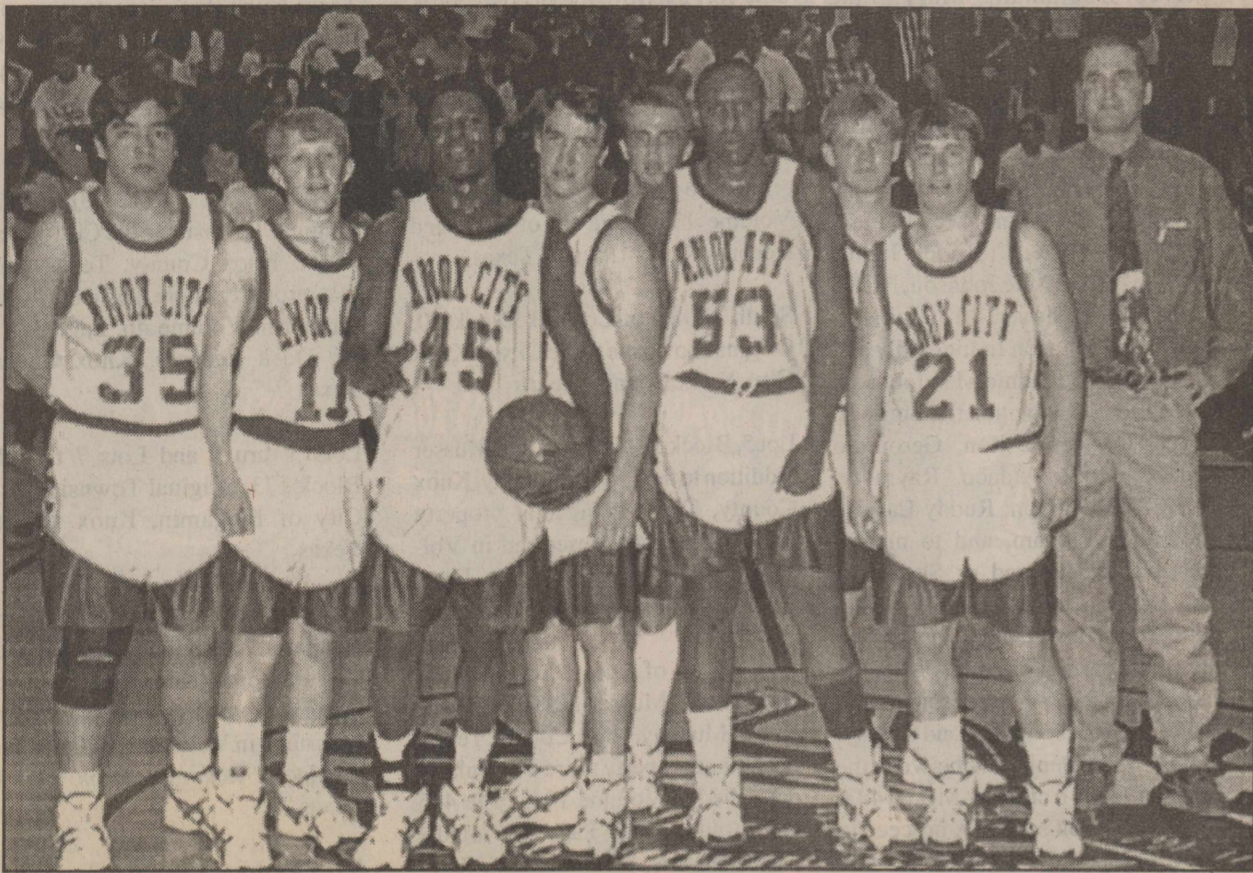

Mr. Bellinghausen, 65, died Wednesday, February 28, at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital from injuries sustained in a February 12 two vehicle accident near Plainview that claimed the life of his brother, Wilfred.

Golf Course To Close Sat. For Green Repairs

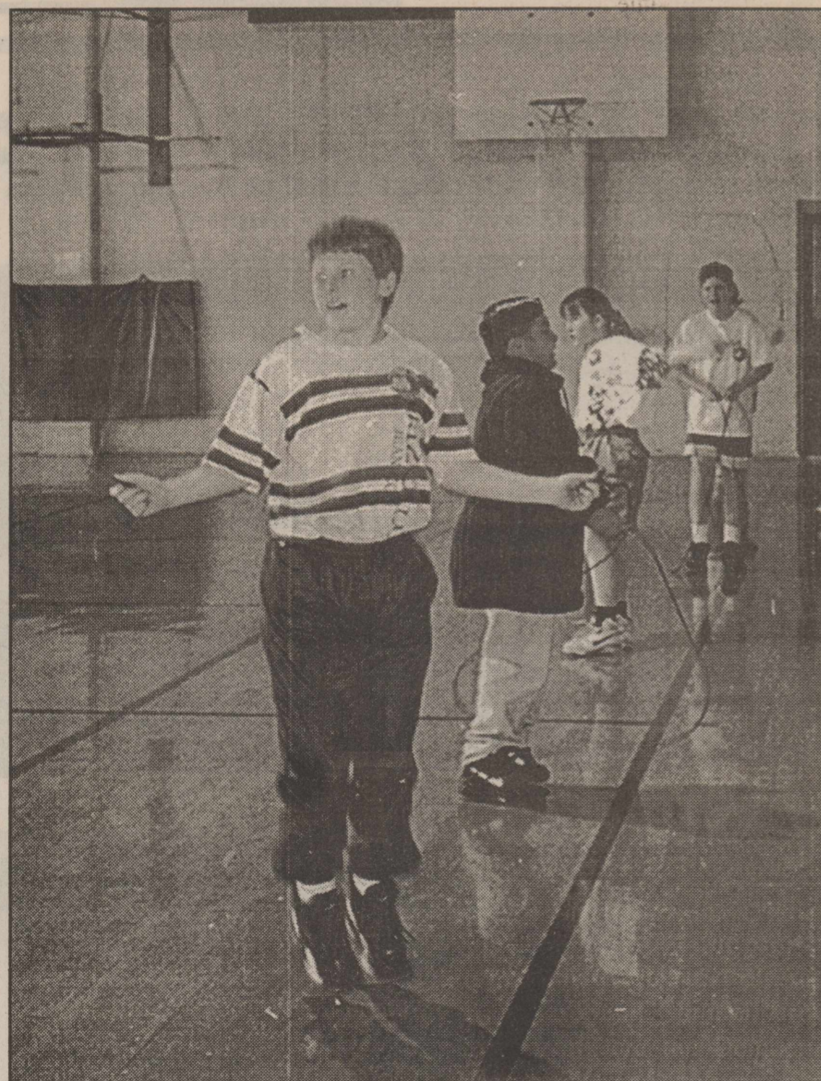
The Knox City Country Club has announced that the golf course will be closed all day on Saturday, March 9. The closing is taking place to allow time for green repairs. All members and





Mrs. Myers, 96, died Tuesday, February 27, in an Abilene nursing center.

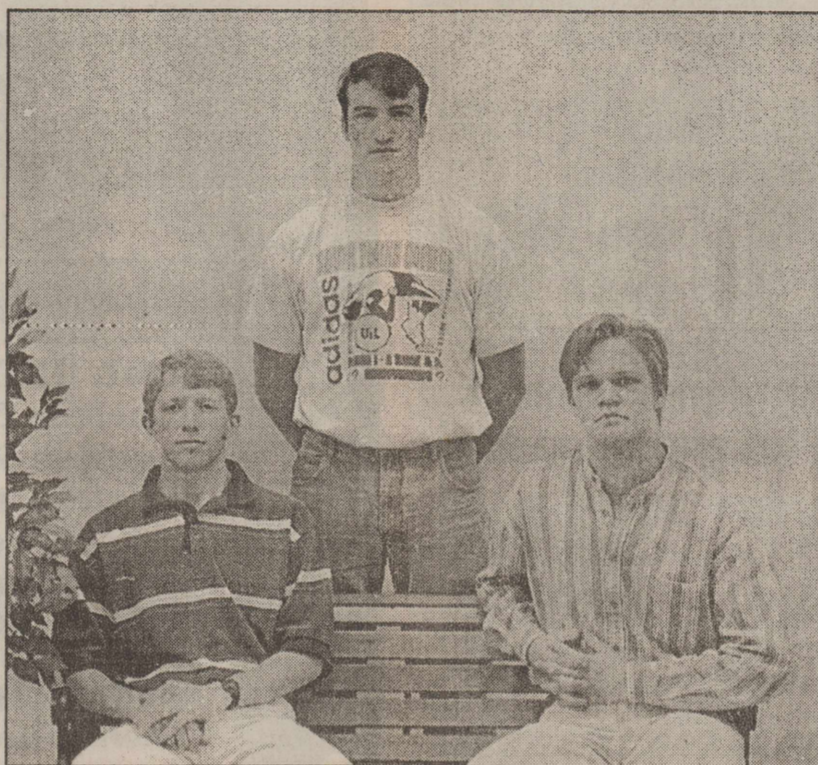
