DIVERSIFIED FARMING PAYS BEST

We recently ran across a doctor's diagnosis of the farmer's financial troubles which is worth passing along He was a general practicioner in an average small town who carried the accounts of many farm families on his books, usually making collections yearly when crops were marketed, as is the custom of many.

On January 1 he checked up his delinquent accounts and found that in nearly every case those who failed to pay were one-crop farmers who made no attempt to raise a variety of products. Then he looked over his paid-up list which disclosed conditions somewhat like this:

One had a flock of pure-bred chickens, another a flock of sheep, a third had brood sows, others had dairy cows, orchards, vegetables, hay and other food and stock feed, or had been able to market poultry and dairy products, had also been able to pay their doctor's bills. And by the same token had been able to pay other bills, without doubt.

Spring will soon be here. The decisions the farmer makes regarding what he will raise next season will materially aid his condition next fall. Will he profit by the experience of those who have succeeded through diversification, or will he stick to the old poverty-breeding onecrop plan?

His doctor and other creditors will be interested in this question, and the farmer should take an interest in it himself.

THE GO-GETTERS

Much of the literature addressed to youth is surcharged with advice as to how to become successful in life. And by "successful" is generally meant "prominent", or "wealthy," or both. Mere comfort or happiness appears to have little place in the popular idea of success.

Particularly in picturing the glories of the business career do our success authorities, and efficiency experts stress the virtues of aggressiveness, enterprise and other qualities generally comprehended by the word "push." One ideal held up to the young man is the high-powered salesman, who if he has nothing else to sell must "sell himself" to some eager employer at a princely salary. made possible by a short correspondence course to develop "personality.

However, a few thoughtful persons here and there have begun to rebel against this everlasting preaching and practice of "push." They are getting weary of the ballyhoo of the boosters, and the eternal striving to get ahead of one's neighbors. It is a good sign that a few writers have sensed the futility of it all and have begun to tell us how ridiculous if is.





FATHER OF RURAL MAIL

Rural free delivery of mail is now so generally established throughout the country that the farm boy and girl of today take it for granted, and few of them know that its first beginnings were only 36 years ago.

Perry Sandford Heath, a newspaper man who died in 1928 at the age of 69 was the father of the rural free delivery. Through his activity in behalf of McKinley's election in 1896, Heath became First Assistant Postmaster General in 1897. With only \$30,000 of an unexpended appropriation for experimental purposes to begin with he established a few rural routes. The farmers liked the idea and through Heath's persistence Congress was induced to appropriate more and more funds for the extension of the service.

As a direct result of his vision and real, the system of rural free delivery, which now serves more than \$0,000,000 persons, has become one of the greatest benefits which the government confers upon the public.

Every rural mail box in the land is a modest monument to Perry Heath






