

Goree Baptist Revival Set For September 8 - 12

Revival Services will be held at the First Baptist Church of Goree, September 8 through 12.

Evangelist will be Bob Elliott with Tom, Patty and Justin Estes being the music evangelists.

Rev. Elliott has preached in some 700 evangelist crusades and Bible conferences across Texas and in a number of other states. He and his wife, La Verne, live in Baytown where he is staff evangelist of the First Baptist Church in Baytown.

He is in his 22nd year as a full-time vocational evangelist. He pastored Baptist churches for 23 years. A graduate of the University of Corpus Christi where he received his bachelor of divinity, he received his master of arts from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and his doctorate from Luther Rice Seminary.

Tom and Patty Estes and their son Justin have traveled extensively across Texas and the United States sharing a ministry of music in full-time evangelism since 1979. They have sung in revival meetings, Bible conferences, concerts, encampments, banquets, nursing homes, hospitals and other places where the ministry of the local church is found. They pull a forty-foot fifth-wheel travel trailer, which serves as office, classroom, rehearsal studio, storage room and motel wherever they might be serving.

Home base for the Estes family is Bishop, Texas, in Nueces County. They are active members of Yorktown Baptist Church in Corpus Christi, where Dr. Sam Douglass pastors.

Tom and Patty are both graduates of Texas A&I University in Kingsville with degrees in music education. Patty taught public school for five years and Tim has experience as a police officer, insurance agent, and 18-wheeler driver.

Tom has been leading music in revival meetings since the mid-1960's when he was music director for his home church, First Baptist, Bishop. In the summer of 1969, he served in youth-led revivals scheduled through the Student Division of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. At A&I University, he was choir president and active in the concert and marching bands.

Patty began playing piano for her church in Kingsville, College View Baptist (now University Baptist), when she was in junior high school. She is an accomplished soprano soloist, pianist and organist, and performed in Europe with the A&I Singers as part of a USO tour of military installations in 1970.

Justin, age 16, has been singing publicly in churches since he was four years old. He is homeschooled by his parents and will be a junior in high school.

Tom, Patty and Justin love to sing about what Jesus Christ has done in their lives. Thousands of people have been ministered to by the Lord through their music.

Special activities for the week include a program at the Goree School Monday morning, a hot dog supper Tuesday evening for grades 1-6, a pizza party for grades 7-12 Wednesday evening, a prayer-time around the clock (12 hours of continuous prayer) Saturday night before the Revival, along with other special activities.

Emergency Loans Are Being Accepted By FSA

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by extreme fire hazards which occurred on February 23, 1996 and continuing, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Knox City, FSA - Ag Credit Manager Bobby G. Cude said today.

Knox County is 1 of 135 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the extreme fire hazards.

Cude said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Cude said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 14, 1997, but farmers should apply as

soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Cude said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. IT is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Knox City is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.



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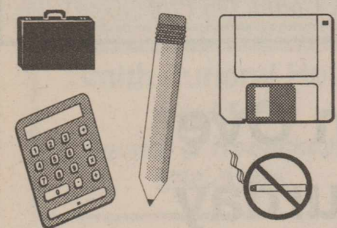
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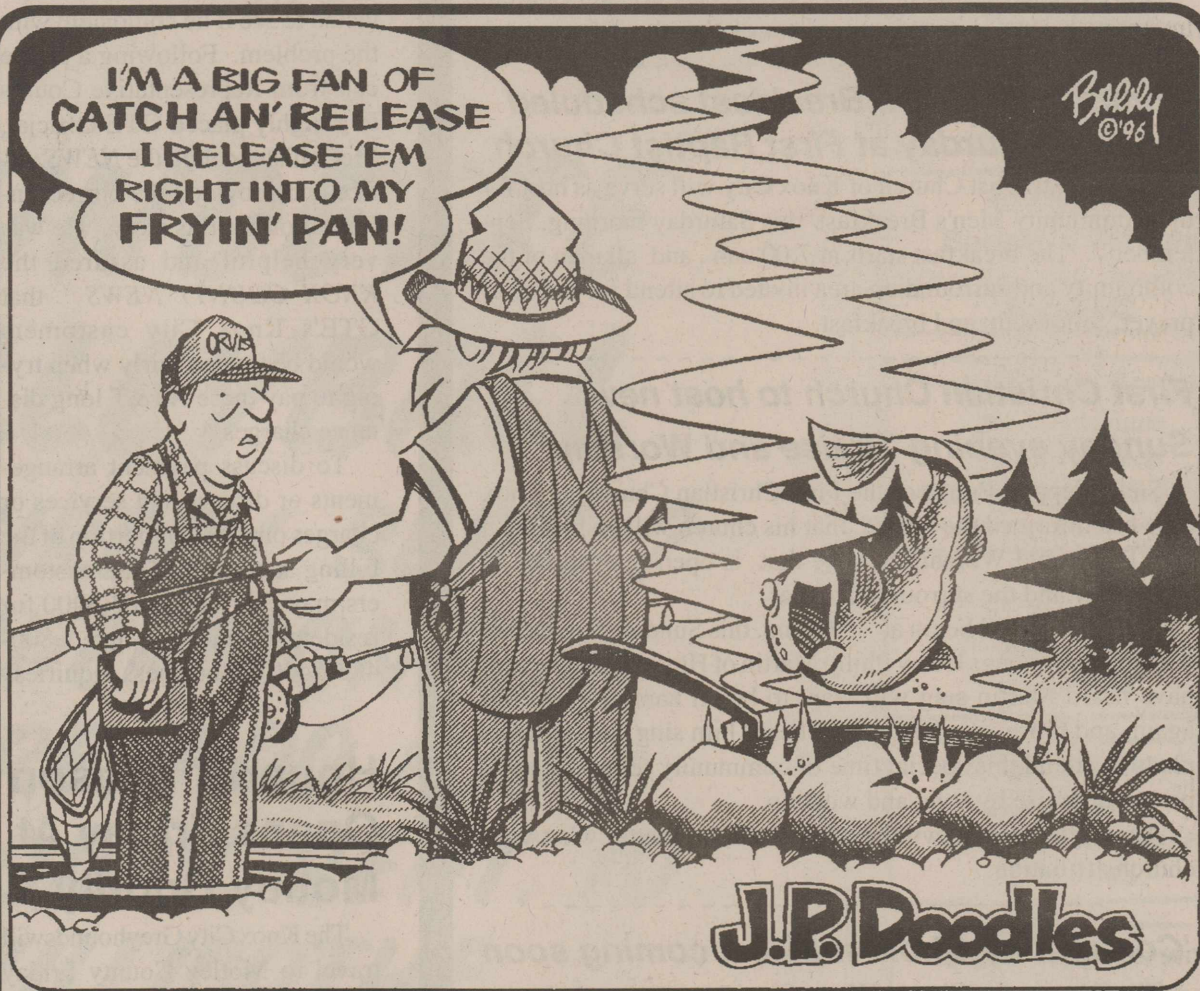

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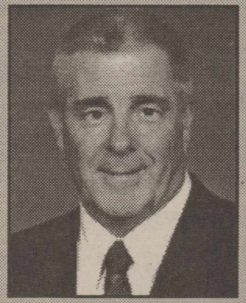
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Straight Talk.....

In this space last week I talked about the condition of our town, and the way that it might be viewed by those who visit, or are just passing through. This week I would like to make a few points about that article:

First of all, let me say thanks to those of you who responded so favorably to the column. It was gratifying to know that so many feel the same way.

Second, it is only fair to say that early Wednesday morning, while the paper was at press, city employees were seen in the downtown area emptying trash cans, picking up trash and digging up weeds. One downtown business owner was having his employees clean up their business location, and a different business owner went to another unsightly lot and started cleaning it up himself.

Actions like this speak highly for the caliber of business men and women we have in our community. Willingness to tackle the problem is a big step, but certainly not the only step needed to correct the problems that seem to plague our community.

What we need here is more action by our elected officials. A strong determination to clean up the community needs to be loudly stated by those in our city government. The ordinances and laws for forcing cleanup action are in place and Knox City's police officers

are more than willing to act on them. In order to accomplish more than just a cosmetic cleanup, offenders must look to the good of the entire community and work with city officials. At the same time, the police officers responsible for enforcing the ordinances need to be fully and totally supported by the city council - no matter who the offenders are!!

We are not the only community newspaper looking at these issues. In last week's STAMFORD AMERICAN newspaper from Stamford, the lead story on the front page concerned the very same issue. In that story, representatives from the Chamber of Commerce had formally requested

the city government to clean up the city because of concern that visitors to the town were not leaving with a very good impression.

Locally, there has been praise for interim City Administrator Steven White as he put city employees to work on the downtown cleanup that took place last Wednesday and Thursday. But, now White has resigned to accept a job in Lubbock. In their search for a replacement, it is my hope that the City Council will put an emphasis on hiring an administrator who can and will focus on cleaning up the community.

Also in the last column of STRAIGHT TALK, I talked about the 'revenge theory of shopping'

that seems to be evident locally. In reflecting back on that, I know that some will be upset with me or with the newspaper for bringing this issue to print. Some do not like to be reminded of their obligation to the community they live and work in. Others will be offended because they'll think I am trying to tell them what to do, or trying to meddle in their business. Not so. What I am trying to accomplish is carrying out the basic responsibility of a community newspaper: that of supporting the community. While not always popular, sometimes we have to focus on what is wrong with things in order to effect a change for the better. The possibility of writing a column like this and offending citizens, business owners, or elected officials is not unique to the KNOX COUNTY NEWS, or even to Knox City. In a reprinted article recently published in the TPA MESSENGER, the official publication of the Texas Press Association, a newspaper editor named James Irving Crabbe wrote a code of rules for newspaperfolk that included this statement: "Don't slop over, don't make mountains out of molehills. Be independent, courteous, manly

and good men will help you. Live merchants will advertise in your columns, but oh my, how the sneaks, humbugs and criminals will hate you, backbite and malign you and patronize the other fellow - not because they like him, but because they think they're hurting you!"

While reading the above quote, I found myself wondering if James Irving Crabbe had ever lived in Knox City or worked in the newspaper business here. As I continued to read the story, I discovered that he was a newspaper publisher in Florida, and the original article was first published in June of 1893.

Imagine that.

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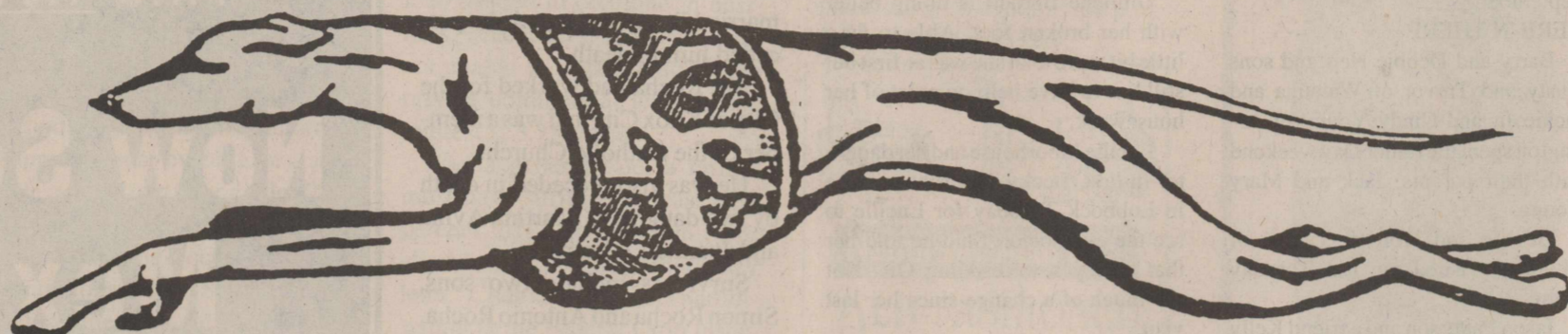
