

With so many fans remaining loyal until the end, the 'Hounds on the field knew without a doubt that their community was solidly behind them!


'Greyhound Pride' Debuts

Gifted & Talented Students Publish School Newspaper. Featured On Pages 7-8 Inside This Edition

A first! The Gifted & Talented students from our schools are proud to announce that the first edition of their very own school newspaper, the Greyhound Pride, has been published and appears inside this edition of The Knox County News.

Entering into the sometimes hectic and often stressful world of journalism, the students have done themselves proud with their first edition. Featured inside on pages 7-8 as a pull out section, Greyhound Pride contains news of student activities that have been reported, photographed, edited, put together and published entirely by the Gifted & Talented newspaper staff.

The idea behind this project has been in the works for some time. Greyhound Pride is an effort by students to show their community the pride they feel in their many undertakings and accomplishments. Managed by Gifted & Talented teacher Greta Waldrip with overall supervision by principal Mack Lowe, the project is proudly sponsored by Citizens Bank of Knox City and Abilene. To cut down on publication and distribution expenses, the format was designed to be printed inside The Knox County News as a pullout feature for students and parents to save and include in scrapbooks. The only cost involved in the project is that of printing two extra pages in The Knox County News once every nine weeks. That actual printing expense was picked up by Citi-



zens Bank as another means of supporting the students of Knox City and O'Brien. Other supplies and material needed for the project are provided by The Knox County News at no cost to the school or students. Future plans call for the feature to be a four page pullout section. The high school students also receive a half credit for their participation.

Greyhound Pride is a total 'in house' student project. After coming up with the idea and receiving approval from school officials, students involved in the project went to work quickly on this first edition. From receiving approval to publication, the student staff had only two weeks to put this first issue together. That short time frame included traveling to the NEWS office for a crash course in learning the basics, then on to taking pictures, interviews and writing stories. The staff was careful to include featured news items from elementary school, mid-school and high school. With story ideas ranging from student council to FFA and sports, the staff came up with ideas, assigned stories to reporters and took on the seemingly impossible task of putting a newspaper together.

Determined to make the project a success, the students quickly realized that they had more stories and ideas than space since the goal for a first edition was two pages in a pullout section. One story not included because of room and time was one about the staff themselves! Hopefully, the next edition of Greyhound Pride will include information and a photograph of the students involved in the project. The student editor is senior Diana Estrada, and as is true in a newspaper of any type, comments or ideas about Greyhound Pride should be addressed

We here at The Knox County News strongly support these students in their efforts. We feel that Greyhound Pride will give the students a chance to be heard and give the community a chance to listen to what students have to say. The views and efforts of our young people are too important to take for granted, for they represent the future.




The Houndettes set a goal at the beginning of volleyball season. That goal was to "leave our mark" on the school, the community, and the town. Every day, they have worked toward that goal.






