



#### **Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted**

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by drought, high winds, lightning and grass fires which occurred from January 1, 1995 through May 25, 1996, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Knox City, FSA - Ag Credit Manager Bobby G. Cude said.

Knox County is one of seven in Texas recently named by Secretaryof Agriculture Dan Glickman as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought, high winds, lightning, and grass

Cude said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Cude said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure

'Trooper Joe', as Knox City school kids know DPS Trooper Clement, added that private parties have become a tradition. But for many others, Halloween is an opportunity to visit our neighborhood door to door.

Trooper Clement went on to recommend that children wear light colored clothing or reflective tape, so they can be easily seen. Make sure their costume fits well. Use face makeup, but if you wear a mask, Make sure that you can see through it. Trick or Treat with friends. It's fun, and safer too. Carry a flashlight. It helps others to see you. Trick or Treat in a familiar neighborhood and only visit homes with the porch light on.

# Looking For Something In The NEWS, And Can't Find It .....Read On, This May Be Of Interest To You

Every once in a while we run into a problem here at The Knox County News. Whenever faced with an unusual set of circumstances, we have always felt that it is always best to explain it and be 'up front' with our readers and subscribers. With that in mind, let me tell you of a problem currently facing this newspaper.

Each and every week, we try as hard as we can to include all the news, photographs and features that we feel will be of interest to our readers. While most of the stories are written by us and most of the photographs are taken by us, we have always felt fortunate to have some of our story ideas, stories, and photographs supplied by our readers.

In other words, we are never at a loss for material to put into print each week. The problem that we have is the SPACE needed to put all the stories and photographs

into publication.

I know I have explained this in the past, but a lot of things have happened recently that make me realize it is necessary to explain it again. The space - or amount of pages each week, is determined completely by how much advertising we have for each paper. An easy way to remember this is that advertising equals space, and space is determined solely by advertising.

Each week, we determine how much advertising we have and figure out how many pages we will run based on the total advertising inches. Advertising is what we sell, and that's what pays the

Our printing cost each week is determined by how many pages we set up and take to the printers. Pages always have to be added or subtracted in pairs of two. Pages can't be added just to handle extra stories and photographs when there is not the percentage of advertising needed to support extra pages and pay a higher printing bill.

Without advertising to allow extra pages, we are faced with having to edit stories down to a smaller size, or leaving stories and photographs out altogether with the hope we can hold them for a week that has more advertising. I agree that it doesn't always seem fair, but that's life in the small newspaper business.

A difficulty that we are faced with every week is a declining advertising base here in our community. That has happened for various reasons. Busineesses have closed, others have sold out to someone else. Some business owners or managers don't feel a need to advertise in a local newspaper, they choose mail circulars

# **Enserch Seeks First RRC** Rate Increase In 14 Years AUSTIN - For the first time in 14 years, Lone Star Pipeline Company asked the Texas Railroad

Commission Friday to increase the rate it charges to transport gas to the 550 Texas cities it serves.

The new combined rate, for purchasing, storing, and transporting gas to cities, would increase about 18 cents per thousand cubic feet (Mcf) or about 90 cents per month for the typical residential customer. This represents about a 3% increase for the typical customer. It is proposed to be effective November 29, 1996. The average monthly cost to a typical residential customer over a 12month period ending June 1996 is \$2.20 lower than the same period the year before because of a decline in the purchase cost of gas.

As part of a program to hold down costs, improve reliability and maintain safety, \$420 million has been invested in the Lone Star Pipeline system since the last such increase. The pipeline company has added two large underground salt dome storage caverns, which doubled withdrawal capacity. The company has also added three major compressor stations and has constructed interconnects with other pipelines to give Lone Star Gas greater supply options to lower gas costs and enhance supply reliability.

"We cannot predict what will happen to natural gas costs but we will continue aggressive action to reduce those costs to the lowest prudent level. The storage capacity we added assists in meeting Lone Star's peak winter demands from its residential and commercial customers and in lowering gas costs. Lone Star is able to buy gas for storage at seasonal prices that are much lower than market prices prevailing in the middle of the winder," Mike Hunter, president of Lone Star Pipeline, said.

Lone Star Pipeline Company is operationally separated from Lone

Star Gas Company. The Railroad Commission regulates what Lone Star Pipeline Company charges to transport gas to cities. Individual cities regulate what Lone Star Gas Company charges to distribute gas to customers. Natural gas costs are determined contractually and in the market and are adjusted monthly.

Dick Williams, president of Lone Star Gas, which acquires gas in the field and distributes it, said the company is determined to make natural gas costs as affordable as possible for its customers.

"Lone Star rates for storing, transporting and distributing gas are very competitive and we are working hard to lower our natural gas costs. We still have some highpriced contracts, dating back to the energy shortages of the late 1970s, but we are wringing virtually all those out of our system within the next three years," Williams said.

"According to a recent survey of 25 cities around the country, rates in Dallas, our largest service area, were lower than in 17 of those cities, which is good but leaves room for improvement. Our increase in storage capability and then end of an era of high-priced gas purchase contracts should continue to improve Lone Star's ranking, Williams said.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, inflation has driven up the cost-of-living 60% since 1982, the last time Lone Star sought a rate increase from the Railroad Commission. A GMC pickup that cost \$8,651 in 1982 is priced at \$22,500 today and the cost of a pound of ground chuck at Tom Thumb has increased from \$1.28 to \$1.99.

"We believe our request for a rate increase is fully justified by the substantial increases in the cost of doing business over the past 14 years and by the substantial investment we have made to control costs, improve reliability and maintain the safety of our system," Hunter said.





## **Rolling Plains Rural Leaders Learn Communication Skills**

Rolling Plains Rural Leadership participants recently learned some lessons about communication during the October training session held at Rochester. Rod Townsend, Rochester mayor and school principal, welcome those attending.

"No undertaking succeeds without effective communication," Gary Schur of Munday said. Schur and others conducted an interesting training for community leaders from Jones, Haskell and Knox Counties who met at The Branding Iron restaurant.

Schur also spoke about the importance of visuals, body language and the art of listening. Ken Lane, a leadership participant from Haskell and owner of radio station KVRP, talked about the use of the media in promoting newsworthy events and activities in the communities.

Following lunch, leadership members toured the Lone Star Peanut Company and learned how a group of local farmers workedtogether to form a corporation and obtain funding to build the plant.

Before the plant was built, farmers had to haul their peanuts over 130 miles to the nearest peanut facility. The Lone Star plant employs 30 to 40 people during the harvest season and has a big impact on the economy of the

### METER TAMPERING NOW A FELO

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to: (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.


(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.

(3) Unauthorized activation of service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee. All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without

special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.



#### **Fall Webworms**

First generation fall webworms were apparent in trees in the eastern part of the Rolling Plains during the summer. Pecan, mulberry, and elm are prominent host. The fall webworm has been found to attack over 120 trees and shrubs, but evergreens are not infested. The larval stage is the damaging stage and larvae complete their development in four to six weeks. The second generation larvae are now active.

The fall webworm overwinters in the pupal stage under debris or in loose soil. Moths which are white with black dots on the front wings, emerge in May or June. The eggs are deposited in clusters of 400 to 500 on the leaves. The larvae upon emergence from the egg begin to enclose the leaves in a web. The hairy, light tan larvae when full grown are about 1 inch long. The first generation often goes unnoticed. However, that was not the case this year. In parts of the area, first generation fall webworms stripped most of the foliage from pecan trees. Usually the second generation is much larger than the first. Fall webworms cause some defoliation, but at this point, it is not that long until the trees will begin dropping their

Insecticidal applications must be applied with considerable pressure to penetrate the web and provide effective control. The insecticides that are suggested for fall webworm control are Diazinon, Malathion, Dursban, Orthene, Sevin and several Bacillus thuringiensis products such as Javelin, Biotrol, Dipel, and Bactur. Make sure that the insecticide that you select is labeled for fall webworm control on the plant that you plan to treat. Read the label and apply the insecticide according to the label directions.

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


