Judy Perdue attended the Girl Scout National Council and 47th Convention, "Girl Scouts, Partners for Tomorrow", held in Fort Worth, October 11-14. As third vice-president of the NorCenTex Girl Scout Council, Mrs. Perdue attended as the national voting delegate for the Council.

Over 9,400 people attended the national triennial event held at the Fort Worth Convention Center. During the five day event, the delegates heard addresses from such prestigious speakers as Marion Wright Edelman, President of the Children's Defense Fund; Dr. Sandra Thomas, President, Converse College; Bonnie Blair, Olympic gold medal winner; Wilhelmina C. Holladay, Chairman of the Board and Founder of the National Museum of Women in the Arts; and Regina Montoya, National President of Girls Incorporated.

Nine national proposals were presented to the delegates for approval, including changing the wording of the Girl Scout Law. After long debate, the delegation voted to pass the proposal to

change the Law. Although much of the wording remains the same, the new Law brings the message of what Girl Scouts is all about into the 90s, teaching young girls that they are to respect authority, respect themselves and others and make the world a better place.

Girl Scouting is a world-wide organization, whose purpose is to inspire girls with the highest ideals of character, conduct, patriotism and service, that they may become happy and resourceful citizens. There are over 3,500,000 Girl Scouts worldwide.

Annie was ahead of her time and a remarkable woman of her generation. Second to her love for her family, was Annie's passion for education and teaching school. She began her teaching career in the Red Top community near Munday.

Annie went on to teach in the Sunset, Munday, Knox City and O'Brien school districts. She affected many lives, as many as three generations, during her 40year teaching career in the Knox and Haskell County schools. She retired in 1972.

In 1979, Annie moved to Dallas to be near her daughter. She lived there until 1987 when she moved to Waco to be near her son.

During her retirement and up until age 95, Annie continued her hobby of quilting. She was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include a son, Jimmy Morgan of Waco; a daughter, Carlene Gribble of Dallas; four grandchildren, Teresa Danforth of Dripping Springs; Greg Morgan of Tijeras, New Mexico; Jerry Gribble II of Arlington; and Capt. 

The family requests that memorials be made to Hospice of Abilene.

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
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
