All of the equipment went toward the Knox County Hospital emergency room, in its attempt to gain Trauma IV designation from the Texas State Department of Health. All necessary equipment to attain this award has been purchased with only administrative paperwork left to be done.

Mrs. Beasley, 71, was born October 20, 1925, in Graham.



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
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From 'Parents Still Make A Difference' ... A quiz for parents to take

A score above 20 means you are doing a great job of supporting your child as he or she prepares for an important test. A score of 15 to 19 is average, you are doing a pretty good job, but there is room for improvement. A score below 15 indicates that your child could use a little more support preparing for
