It's official: Governor Bush designates February 13 as Prayer Day in Texas

(AUSTIN)....February 13, 1997, has been officially designated as the Texas Day of Prayer in a proclamation by Texas Governor George Bush and a Concurrent Resolution passed by the Texas House and Senate.

Texas Governor George Bush, Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock, and House Speaker James E. "Pete" Laney, along with a number of legislators and other elected officials will be taking to celebrate the event in Austin. The event is being coordinated by the House Bible Study Group which is composed of legislators who meet weekly for Bible study and fellowship during each legislative session.

State Representative David Counts of Knox City, a member of the House Bible Study Group, noted that this will be the second State Day of Prayer held in Texas and that the event is growing. "For part in a morning prayer breakfast some time now, we have cel-

ebrated a National Day of Prayer. The members of the House Bible Study Group wanted to have our own Day of Prayer here in Texas," stated Counts.

"The purpose of the occasion is to bring Texans from all faiths together in their communities and church congregations to pray for this state and all of its national, state, and local officials," said Counts. "This is a worthy endeavor and we hope everyone will

Rep. David Counts named as Chairman of House Natural Resources Committee by House Speaker

(AUSTIN) State Representative David Counts (D-Knox City) was renamed as Chairman of the House Natural Resources Committee by House Speaker Pete Laney on Thursday. The Natural Resources Committee has oversight of the state's water resources, including water districts, river authorities, the Texas Natural Resources Commission, and the Water Development Board.

Laney also named Counts to serve on the powerful State Affairs Committee. Counts noted that the committee has purview on matters of state policy, the administration, organization and duties of state government, as well as, the operation and regulation of public lands. "My appointment to the State Affairs Committee will make it easier for me to ensure the views of folks here in West Texas are represented on the various issues before the Legislature."

The Knox City businessman returned to the State Capitol recently to take the oath of office and continue the work of representing the citizens of the 70th House District. According to Counts, a number of issues of importance to rural West Texas will likely dominate the upcoming session, including water rights, property tax reform, and nursing home reform.

Counts, who begins his third term as chairman of the House Natural Resources Committee, will oversee the legislation that will attempt to provide for a quality water supply for the state, while preserving the water and property rights of Texans, as the state moves into the twentifirst century. "With our state's recent economic growth and population increases we need to clearly define a plan that will provide our state with the water resources our future will demand. Just as importantly, though, we have to protect the water rights held by property owners," stated Counts.

According to Counts, reform of the state's property tax system will be another major item on the legislative agenda this session. "As a property owner, I understand first hand the burden our current system has placed upon local property owners. During the past interim, I have spent a significant amount of my time working with Governor Bush to look at ways to alleviate some of this burden, while continuing to provide the needed funding to our public schools."

Another major item on Counts' legislative agenda includes the effort to bring about a high quality of care in all state licensed nursing homes.

"During the last session, the legislature passed legislation that sought to streamline many of the contradictions between state and federal regulations of care homes, but ended up relaxing standards

too much," stated Counts, who went on to add, "My hope is to pass a measure that gets rid of the contradictions in state and federal law, while maintaining a high quality of care for nursing home residents." Counts also stated that many nursing homes are already providing a high quality of care for residents but insisted that all homes should live up to that same standard.

Counts stated that he appreciates hearing from voters around the district, and in order to make his office more accessible he can now receive e-mail at (http:// www.david.counts(~house.state.tx.us). Work is also being completed on a web page that will help keep individuals informed on the issues coming before the legislature. In addition, Counts can still be contacted by writing his office at P.O. Box 2910, Austin, Texas, 78768-2910, or by calling his office at (512) 463-0480 or 1-800-308-2769.

"The agenda before us will be of tremendous importance for years to come. I look forward to hearing from folks back home," said Counts, who is planning a series of town hall meetings throughout the district to provide information on the issues and seek input from citizens.

"This session will be filled with challenges, but I am confident that the results will be positive for all Texans," stated Rep. Counts.

The remaining income enables NorCenTex to provide programs for all members in the 11 county jurisdiction, to provide financial assistance for girls of modest means. Cookie proceeds support and maintain Twilight and Day Camps, the primitive campsite, Camp Stonewall Jackson; purchase equipment and provide training to volunteer Girl Scout Leaders and National Service projects such as "Be Your Best".

Falls areas.



Hospital's first surgical nurse dies in Haskell

Ramia Lee Frazier, 83, of Haskell, the Knox County Hospital's first surgical nurse beginning in 1938, died Wednesday, January 29, in a Haskell hospital.

Services for the longtime Bible class teacher, civic leader and businesswoman were held Saturday, February 1, at 1:30 p.m. in the Church of Christ in Haskell. Dale Huff, Bob Connell and Joel Fox conducted the service. Burial was in Willow Cemetery.

Born in Montague County, on February 19, 1913, she was the daughter of Arthur Meeds Moore and Nancy Lorado Hester. She moved to Knox County with her family at a young age, excelled in volleyball at Sunset School, and graduated there in 1931. She married Stallard Harris Bradford on August 8, 1933. He was killed in a truck accident in February 1936. After graduating from nursing school in Wichita Falls, she went to work as the first surgical nurse of the Knox County Hospital in 1938. She then moved to Haskell in early 1940 as the first surgical nurse when the new Haskell County Memorial Hospital opened. This is where she met and married Barney Frazier on October 24, 1941. He preceded her in death on December 11, 1983.

Ramia Lee had been a member of the Haskell Church of Christ since 1940 where she taught

classes for many years. She and Barney started their

own business in 1947. With her love for nursing, she was instrumental in the formation of the Haskell County Hospital Auxiliary Pink Ladies and served as its first president in 1983. She was a charter member of the Business and Professional Women's Club holding several offices.

Survivors include a son and daughter-in-law, Stallard Wayne Bradford and Britta Kay Bradford of Haskell; two granddaughters, Bronwyn Bradford of Wichita Falls and Tiffany Leslie of San Antonio; a grandson, Sterling Bradford of Jacksonville, North Carolina; four great-grandchildren, four sisters and a number of nieces and nephews.





Changed circumstances may make SSI payments possible by reapplying

Many people don't realize that they may qualify for Supplemental Security Income payments even if they have been turned down before, if their circumstances have changed. For example, you may have too much money in the bank at the time you applied but have since spent the money. In addition, the SSI income and resource limits have increased over the years. This means that people who were found ineligible in the past because they had too much income or resources may now be eligible and should reapply.

With one of the world's largest computer systems, the Social Security Administration faces the awesome task of checking some 30 million pieces of software individually to see if it will be affected by the century change. Fortunately, the agency is on top of the problem and plans to have the necessary changes made by December 31, 1998. The century change poses a problem for all computers, which store only the last two digits of the year and assumes the first two digits are 19. Computer logic works as long as dates are in the same century, but problems arise when it is necessary to use dates in two different centuries.

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

- Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.(3) Unauthorized activation of service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.



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
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
