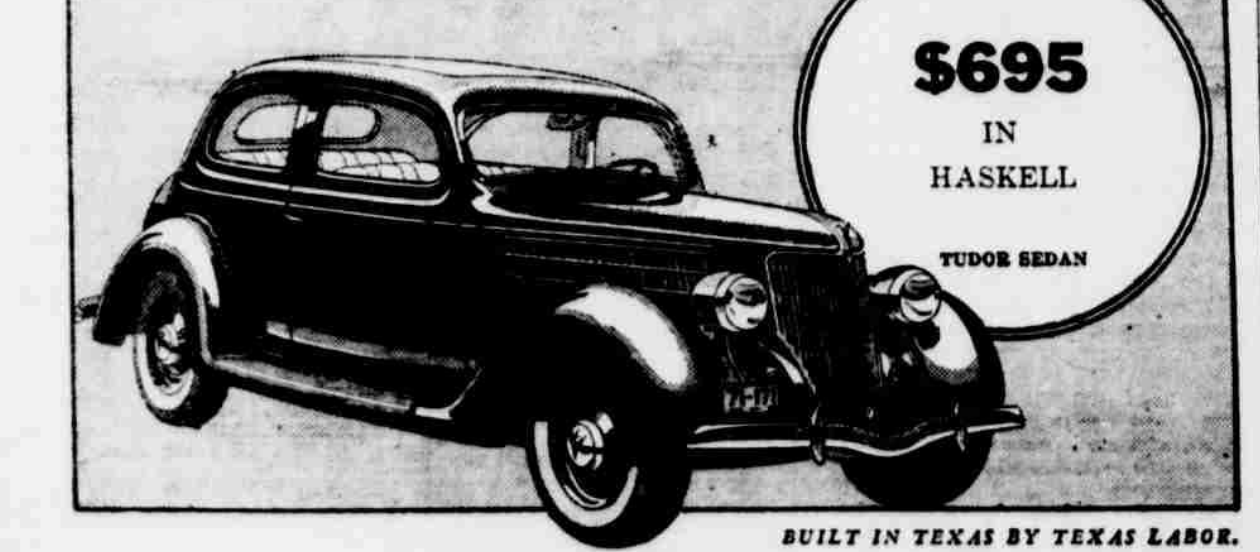
As rural school teacher, high school teacher, high school principal, city superintendent, and State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Mr. Woods has had with credit and distinction. He holds the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, and Doctor of Laws from Baylor University. Mr. Woods is an untiring worker. He has given generously of his time for the social, religious, and educational betterment of the commonwealth.

HIS RECORD

- 1. Kept promise not to reduce per capita apportionment. 2. Kept promise to equalize educational opportunities. 3. Kept promise to close chasm between urban and rural schools. 4. Kept promise to emphasize vocational training. 5. Kept promise to provide more supervision and less inspection. 6. Kept promise to administer school affairs with economy and efficiency. 7. Kept promise to provide a more practical course of study. 8. Kept promise to provide more school for the money.

OTHER ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- 1. A deficit of more than twelve and one-half million dollars has been paid for the school apportionment plan on a cash basis. Mr. Woods has been instrumental in securing a per capita apportionment of \$17.50, the maximum permitted by the statutes, though at the same time the state school aid value was lowered from thirty-five cents to twenty cents on the \$100 valuation. 2. Under the present plan of distribution, State Aid is being administered economically as under the former plan and with a great deal more economy the cost of distribution being 1.7%. 3. The length of school term has been increased by ten days. Equalizing the length of school term for rural elementary children and transporting 30,000 rural high school students to accredited schools by county-wide systems of transportation with economy and efficiency. 4. Taking advantage of the provisions of the Federal Emergency Relief Act, Mr. Woods established a Federal Emergency Relief Adult Education program thereby giving employment to many unemployed teachers and offering educational advantages to thousands of adults. 5. Economy in handling textbooks has been practiced in such manner that a year has been saved to the taxpayers. 6. Teaching standards have been raised by special training of teachers in specific work through co-operation of teacher-training institutions. 7. A state-wide program of public school music has been formulated and is in operation. 8. Texas' greatest humanitarian program has been provided by the passage of the Crippled Children's Act and through expansion of Vocational Rehabilitation. 9. The School Plant Division has been established as an integral part of the Department of Education to assist school officials in working out their school problems. 10. An efficient system of child and financial accounting, through uniform reports of children and money, has been installed through the first state-wide program for a Division of Information and Statistics.
