Myriad formulas have been offered to insure rmatient national recovery, but now comes a lew York dergyman with a solution that seems to sive been overlooked. The key to the "more abunthant life" is just this, says the Rev. Minot Simons of New York City-a return to men of honor. For out Mr. Simons, there has been an underside of the world's life where standards of honor seem to have disappeared. Now it is clear, he contends, that honor, the basic virtue of dependability and progress, must be restored among men and nations if civilization is to go onward and upward. If honor goes, everything goes with it-business, character, social relationships, civilization itself. 

Ed-nor Hoover, head of the Bureau of Investigation of Department of Justice. The figures are so threatening, he says, because America's law entrangled by the blood-caked hand of crime-affiliated politics." Think it over.

The importance of chemistry in the current war on unemployment becomes daily more evident. Its contribution in the form of new products, which in turn mean new jobs, cannot be overestimated. Take, for instance, the latest development- a synthetic fiber, one-third thinner than the finest natural silk. A ball of this gossamer textile weighing only one pound, would, if unrolled, stretch across the United States. A similar ball of older type rayon would stretch only 1000 miles. Now consider what this new discovery may do for society. The manufacturer of rayon gave employment to 60,000 people who, in one year, received \$60,000,000 in wages. In oddition, almost \$60,000,000 was spent on raw and other materials for the textile. One might name many more products developed in the last 10 years that produced similar results. Here is a promising advance in the war against unemployment. In this battle, the laboratory is our first line of attack.
