



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

Determining Your Career Interests



• We just cleaned our ga-rage and found lots of plastic containers. Some are milk jugs and some are things like margarine containers. Most don't have the little recycling symbols on the bottom. If we know what they are, is it okay to recycle them even without the symbols?

A • We hate to discourage any recycling, but the risk of contamination from unknown materials is too great. You should ask your recycling center, but the general rule is that without a recycling number, the item can't be recycled. Much of the plastic recycling process depends on having a pure batch of raw materials. Even a small amount of the wrong plastic can ruin the

process. The plastics labeling laws are very strict, thus recyclers can be sure that the marked containers are what they claim to be.

• If I take my tires to be • recycled, how do I know

they're being put to good use? It seems like you're trying to clean up a lot of old tires.

You're right. The Texas
Water Commission is trying to clean up hundreds of thousands of old tire DUMPS. But we're working just as hard to assure that there is a market for the materials recycled from the tires. We'll mention as many of those products as space allows. By the way, you can help by asking for products made from recycled tires if you're in the market for anything on the list. Some products include: vehicle mud guards, pickup truck bed liners, carpet padding, shock-absorbent floor tiles, patio floor blocks, dock and trailer bumpers, rubber mats for animal stalls, door mats for homes, marine bumpers, soaker hoses, running track surfaces, guard-rail posts, highway lane reflectors, rubberized asphalt for roadways, landscape timbers, farm vehicle tires, roof sealing adhesive paint, tire-derived fuel, drainage bed material for septic systems, crash barriers for highways, playground surfaces, parking lot resurfacing paint, erosion control devices and artificial reefs for oyster produc-

Products Liability Reform

This 73rd session of the Texas Legislature is now well underway, and as expected, the budget and school finance are attracting most of the attention. However, there's another topic that will be addressed and probably resolved after more than 20

All 31 senators have signed on as cosponsors to a bill that will bring long-needed reform to the Texas product liability laws. The reform proposals will finally put into law a strong state policy and procedure spelling out the rights of consumers, sellers and manufacturers alike.

The reforms will help consumers by forcing manufacturers, especially foreign firms, to pay close attention to the safety of their products. One of the highlights of the proposal is an "innocent retailer" provision to protect retailers, wholesalers and others who are in the distribution system of a product but who bear no responsibility for the product's design or manufacture.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock says he's pleased with the strength of the bill, and that retailer protections are "an absolute must for independent and small businesses" which have historically been liable for heavy expenses in defending themselves when named even as innocent parties to products lawsuits.

Under the reform proposal, producers of inherently dangerous products such as firearms are not liable when the product performs as it was intended to. Also, well known health hazards like tobacco and alcohol are consumed at the individual's own risk, providing the product's purity is maintained by the producer.






