PCCA Announces \$12 Million Distribution

Cooperative Cotton Association (PCCA) has announced a cash distribution to members totaling almost \$12 million for retirement of 1987 per-unit capital retains and a progress payment on the 1992 West oma marketing pool

"The retirement of capital retains totaling \$4.2 million is an important milestone for PCCA," says PCCA President Van May. "When we initiated this program in conjunction with our purchase of the denim mill at Littlefield in 1987, there were some skeptics and critics," May adds. "This payment is on schedule and in line with the projections we made back in 1987, and it reinforces the decisions made by our board of directors and members at that

The annual \$5-per-bale capital retain is required for PCCA members who wish to share in the denim mill's earnings and is withheld from their cotton sales proceeds. The retains are revolved back to the members after five years, and members have an opportunity to sign in or out of the mill option each year. South Texas PCCA members may sign into the program in February, while West Texas and Oklahoma members may sign in during

"The mill option has been a great investment for participating PCCA members," May explains. "Since 1987, the mill's annual earnings have totaled \$47.3 million, for an average annual dividend of \$10.65 per bale in cash and stock." Based on figures through seven months of the current fiscal year, the mill's earnings are expected to approach record levels this year.

The balance of the current cash distribution, \$7.4 million, is a progress payment on PCCA's 1992 West Texas/Oklahoma marketing pool. Progress payments, including the premium-for-strength payment, now total \$16.2 million for the 1992-crop

"The boll weevil am a little black bug come from Mexico they say, come all the way to Texas just looking for a place to stay. Just looking for a home.

So goes the century-old boll weevil

But the boll weevil has never found a home in High Plains cotton because of the efforts of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. through its 30year containment program. This highly successful, 8,500 square mile boll weevil control operation monitors a half million cotton acres along the edge of the Caprock preventing the pest from migrating out of the infested Rolling Plains and into the 25 counties around

Lubbock, the world's largest cotton patch.

Now cotton producers across the rest of Texas are being given the opportunity to develop their own program to rid their cotton of this pesky critter. The Boll Weevil Eradication Bill was passed out of the Texas House of Representatives last week with no dissenting votes and is now headed for Governor Ann Richards' desk, to be signed into law.

Similar legislation was passed in 1991 but the version that reached Governor Richards' desk was considered unworkable. The Governor vetoed the bill in June 1991, really

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doing the Texas cotton industry a big favor. She immediately started working closely with cotton leaders to ensure that the 1993 bill would be as clear and as practical as possible.

Governor Richards listened carefully to the comments of hundreds of cotton growers across Texas. Representatives from grower organizations, including PCG, met many times with politicians and environmental groups to reach agreement on the bill's wording. Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry

strongly supported the legislation.

What will this bill mean to cotton growers in PCG's 25 county area?

A plan will be drawn up for eradication of the boll weevil as an economic pest in the Rolling Plains, Southern Rolling Plains, Blacklands, Central Texas, South Texas and Lower Rio Grande Valley. A Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation for Texas will be formed. A referendum of cotton growers in each of these areas will be conducted. Growers will decide whether to participate and pay for the program. A two-thirds majority vote in each area will commit all cotton

growers in the area to participation.

Will producers in PCG's area be expected to contribute toward the cost of eradication in other areas?

Absolutely not. The bill is very specific that cotton growers in any eradication zone pay for their own eradication programs. However, a contribution to the foundation's

operating costs may be expected from the High Plains area.

Eradication of the boll weevil as an economic pest in cotton has been successfully accomplished in California, Arizona, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina. The rest of the Cotton Belt is working toward that goal. Passage of this "enabling" legislation in Texas gives growers here the opportunity to see this pest beaten back to Brownsville and beyond where it came into the United States 100 years


