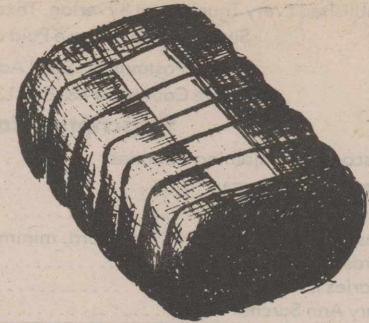

Social Security Services Are Free

Do you know that all Social Security services are free? Do you know that there are organizations that attempt to charge individuals for Social Security-related services? Social Security headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland receives hundreds of letters weekly from individuals across the country expressing confusion over such mailings.

If you are a senior citizen, you may be a target for special interest groups who ask for money because they claim the Social Security system is in serious financial trouble or that Social Security's trust funds are being mishandled. These groups are entitled to their opinions and can solicit contributions in order to pay lobbyists to voice those opinions to congress. But you do not have to respond if you find their requests for donations misleading and troublesome.

If you have recently been married, you may be the target of another deceptive mailing practice. There are direct mail advertisers who offer to

change your name on Social Security records for a fee. If you ask us to change your name on your Social Security records, we will do it for free.

If you are the parent of a newborn, there are businesses that offer to get a Social Security number for your child for a fee, when all they generally do is send you the form and ask you to return it to Social Security. If you get the form directly from us, the services are free.

Should a direct mail advertiser imply that they are in any way connected with or working for the government or the Social Security Administration, that organization is breaking the law and you should refer the advertiser to the authorities.

If you think you are being harassed by direct mail solicitations, or if you receive an offer from a private organization that implies a connection to the government, you should refer the complete mailing, including the envelope to Social Security Administration, Office of Public Affairs, Misleading Information, P. O. Box 17740, Baltimore, MD 21235.

If it's more convenient, you can take the entire package to your local postmaster, or send a complaint that includes the package to the Chief Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 L'Enfant Plaza SW, Washington, D. C. 20260-2100.

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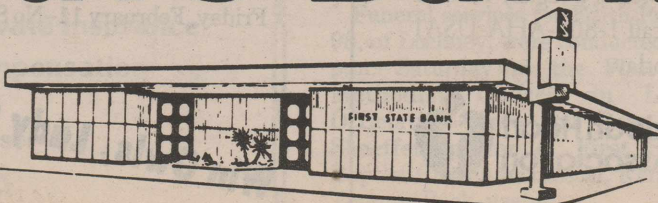


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Owls, Lady Owls Earn Big District Victories

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Local Exhibitors to Take Prize Livestock to 1994 Houston Show

Seventeen 4-H members from Briscoe County and eight members of the Silverton chapter of Future Farmers of America will join other 4-H and FFA members from throughout Texas for showing competition at the upcoming Houston Livestock Show February 19 through March 6, at the Astrohall.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show—the junior show division. The other division, the open show, draws its exhibitors from all over the world. These exhibitors are primarily professional breeders and ranchers.

The 4-H exhibitors include Jeremiah Brooks, one beef heifer; Molly Brooks, one market steer; Brandi Brunson, one market steer; Lacy Brunson, one market steer; Donny Burson, one beef heifer; Kenzie Burson, one beef heifer; Tessa Kelley, one market barrow; Jarret Pigg, one beef heifer; Scarlett Sperry, one market barrow; Will Sperry, one market steer and one beef heifer; Christina Stephens, one market barrow; Julie Weaver, one market barrow; Shannon Weaver, one market barrow; Kenda Wood, one market steer and one beef heifer; Leland Wood, one market steer; Monty Wood, one market steer and one beef heifer; Ashleigh Wyatt, one market barrow.

In addition, Leland Wood, a 14-year-old Briscoe County 4-H member from Silverton, will compete in the 1994 Houston Rodeo calf scramble on February 26 in the Astrodome. Son of Ken and Nancy Wood, he will compete for one of 252 calves to be awarded at the 1994 show.

George Pigg, a 14-year-old Briscoe County 4-H member from Quitaque, also will be competing in the calf scramble. He is the son of Roye and Mary Pigg.

Jarret Pigg and Will Sperry are scheduled to take part in the beef scramble during the show.

The actual calf scramble event involves 28 energetic youngsters pitted against 14 vigorous calves. Each youngster is committed to capturing and bringing a calf to the finish line—but only the successful ones receive \$1,000 calf purchase certificates.

The certificates, donated by generous companies or individuals, are used to purchase purebred beef or dairy heifers.

The calves are raised by the winners for special showing competition in the Astrohall at the following year's show. The year-long project is closely supervised by the appropriate County Extension Agent or Agricultural Science Teachers.

"The most significant part of our livestock show is the junior show," said Steve Woodley, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo manager. "It represents Texas youth and their commitment to education, discipline and agricultural development."

All net proceeds from the Houston Show provide funds for scholarships and research projects throughout the state. Since the show's first scholarship was granted in 1957, the show has presented more than 11,000 awards to Texas youth at a cost exceeding \$32 million.

Understanding Your Child

Being a parent is probably the most important job the majority of us will ever have. This is due to the responsibility involved with being a parent.

There are a variety of ways one can learn about being a parent, such as reading books, learning from your own parents or taking a "parenting class". Many people, though, have a phobia about attending a "parenting class". They are afraid of being told that they have done something wrong and have messed up their children's lives forever or that they are admitting publicly that they are bad parents.

If we could train ourselves to think of parenting as learning how to "understand your child," people would be much more comfortable with the idea of "parenting classes". None of us were born knowing exactly how to be the perfect parent. We all have to learn through some sort of educational process and usually by trial and error. One of the most important things that you, as a parent, can do is to learn about the normal development of children. By knowing the characteristic behaviors and physical development of each age group, you can then better understand your own child's development and what is normal for their age. You can then adjust yourself to allow for the individual differences in children. Learning how to understand your child can be very beneficial to both you and your child!

This will be through KAIROS, a Christian ministry whose goal it is to Christianize the prison environment. Joe Luckenbach of Silverton United

Methodist Church has been selected to be one of these men, and is currently undergoing extensive training in preparation for a year's commitment to the team and to a pair of "Men in White" who will learn to love and accept being loved by God and by one another, a fact that most people go through their entire lives after the age of five or six.

Carolyn Luckenbach of Silverton UMC will be on the kitchen team. This

food ministry is designed to draw leaders to the short course. Most "leaders" in prison have little or no regard for what KAIROS is about. One of the primary reasons these "Men in White" agree to come to the short course is because of the possibility of being fed food not prepared in the mess hall. A super menu of "home-cooked" food will be served to the "residents in attendance," as well as to the team members.

New Year Resolutions From Social Security

I guess a new year wouldn't be a new year without resolutions. There's something about a fresh start that brings out the urge to change or improve some facet of our lives. I realize that "lose weight" or "get more exercise" or "start writing or reading that novel" are more important personal resolutions than anything I

can offer, but here are some helpful tips that should improve the way you deal with Social Security now or in the future.

- If you're still working
 - ★ Resolve to check your name and Social Security number on your pay stub to make sure it matches the information on your Social Security card. This will ensure that you're getting proper credit for your work and earnings in Social Security's records—and one day will lead to the payment of your correct Social Security benefit.
 - ★ Resolve to get an earnings and benefit statement from Social Security

to make sure your earnings are properly recorded in our records and to get an idea of the Social Security retirement and disability benefits that might be payable to you and any survivors benefits that would be due your family if you were to die.

- ★ Resolve to get a Social Security number for any newborn children you have because once they're a year old, you'll need to report that number in order to claim them as a dependent on your tax return.
- ★ Resolve to read the booklet, "Understanding Social Security," available from any Social Security office, which provides an overview of

what you need to know about Social Security while you're still working and answers the question, "Will it be there when I need it?"

- If you're nearing retirement
 - ★ Resolve to check with Social Security ahead of time to make sure you choose the best date to start your Social Security benefits. You may be able to get some Social Security checks even though you're still working.
 - ★ Resolve to make sure you have the records you'll need to file for your Social Security benefits. Generally, you'll need an original or certified copy (not a photocopy) of your birth certificate and proof of your earnings (W-2s or tax returns) for the last year or two.

★ Resolve to read the booklet, "Retirement," available from any Social Security office, which answers most of the questions you'll have as you near your own retirement date.

If you're already receiving Social Security benefits

- ★ Resolve to report your 1993 earnings to Social Security by April 15, 1994 if you worked last year and earned more than \$10,560 (if you were 65-69 in 1993) or \$7,680 (if you were under 65 in 1993).
- ★ Resolve to tell Social Security if you think you'll earn more than \$11,160 in 1994 (if you're 65-69) or \$8,040 (if you're under 65).
- ★ Resolve to report any changes to us that might affect your Social Security benefits, such as a change of address, a marriage, a divorce, etc.
- ★ Resolve to read, or re-read, the booklet, "When You Get Social Security Retirement or Survivors Benefits . . . What You Need To Know." We sent you this booklet with the official notification of benefits you received after you signed up for Social Security. If you misplaced yours, ask your local Social Security office for another copy.

When you file a claim for Social Security benefits, we're going to ask you for documents to help us decide whether you're eligible, and if you are, when your benefits will begin. For example, if you are retiring, we'll ask to see your birth certificate. If your spouse is filing too, we generally need his or her birth certificate and we also need birth certificates for any children who are eligible for benefits. If you're filing for survivor's benefits, we'll need to see the deceased's death certificate.

Regardless of the documents we need, it's important that they are the originals or certified copies. We can't accept a photocopy unless the official custodian of the original document certifies that it is an exact copy of the original.

If you don't have the document we need, there are other kinds of records that may be acceptable. If you don't have a birth certificate, for example, you may have a religious record of your birth. The general rule is that the sooner in life your document was recorded, the more accurate it is. For example, we would consider a school record to be better evidence of your age than a voter's registration.

Since many people file their claims by telephone, we ask them to mail the documents to us. We certify and return the documents soon after we receive them. While most people don't mind mailing their birth certificate or marriage certificate, a claimant may be reluctant to mail a personal record such as a family Bible or a document he or she has had for many years. In that case, the claimant can file the claim by telephone and then take the document to the Social Security office where someone on the staff will certify that the evidence is acceptable.

If you have questions concerning what evidence we will need to complete your claim, call or visit your local Social Security office.
