Silverton High Places **Third at District Meet**

Silverton High School placed third at the District UIL Meet held at Clarendon College last week. Following the presentations of the One-Act Plays, it was determined that Hedley had scored 276 points, followed by Groom with 244. Silverton earned 218 points, followed by Lefors, 178; McLean, 106; Valley, 102; Samnorwood, 95; Patton Springs, 36; Kelton, 6, and Lakeview.

This qualified a number of Silverton High School students for Regional competition which will be in Levelland on Friday, April 22.

Briscoe County cotton producers and agribusiness representatives will elect a Business Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at a 7:00 p.m. meeting tonight (Thursday, March 31) at the Showbarn in Silverton.

Announcement of the election comes from George Reed of Silverton, Briscoe County Producer Director to the 25county cotton organization, and Rex Johnson, also of Silverton, current Business Director.

New Loan Program To Help Disadvantaged Groups Into Farming

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has a new loan program designed to help members of sociallydisadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming in Deaf Smith and Oldham Counties.

Under the new program, FmHA will try to find persons in those categories who are interested in farming and can qualify for FmHA farm ownership loans. The agency is prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market.

Socially-disadvantaged population groups include Hispanics, native Americans, Blacks, Asians and Pacific islanders. Persons who think they may be eligible and who are in farming or have farming experience should contact the FmHA office at 219 NW 2nd Street, Tulia, 806-995-2319.


