We feel that the elderly and/or low income people of Fisher County may not be fully aware that the Energy Assistance Program can help with winter utility bills.

The maximum amount allocated per household is \$400. The program started in November, so those who feel they may be eligible should contact Gary Spaulding, Community Services, Ward Elementary School, Sweetwater, Texas, immediately.

Quite frankly, we have been trying to sign up one lady for 3 weeks, and are feeling somewhat frustrated. However, we know she is eligible, so we shan't give up. We have found that it is now easy to get straight answers. It is our feeling that any program should be run with strict efficiency, complete knowledge of the program, and the ability of those in

charge to give ready answers. So far, we have not found this to be the case.

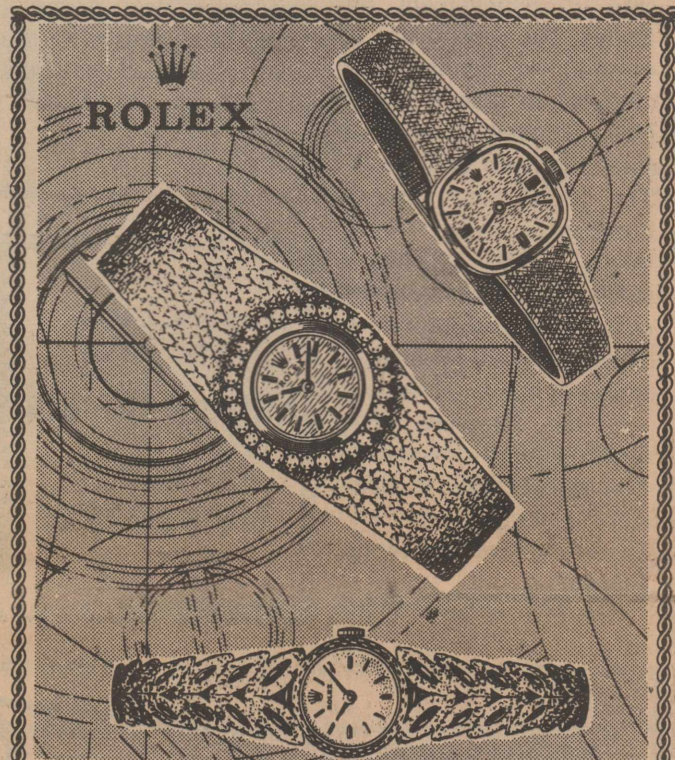
We urge that others who may have been given a similar run-around not give up, but continue to bombard the Community Services Office until they get through the red tape.

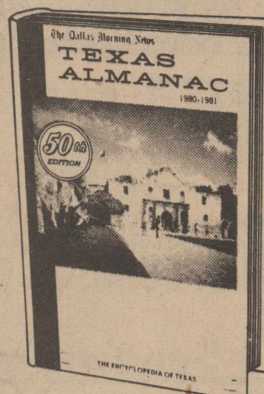

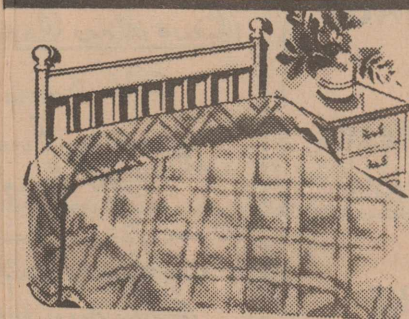

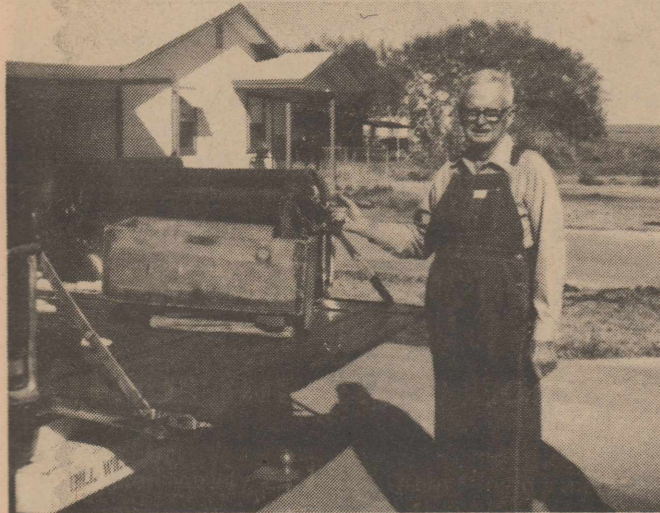

Grist Mill Still In Use

A very interesting as well as educational morning can be spent at the farm of Mr. and Mrs. F.E. (Floyd) Weems of the Hobbs community. There,

Mr. Weems will give you the history of his grist mill. He will explain and show you his method of operation and you can see how your grandparents had their corn meal made for those delicious dishes grandmother used to make.

This mill was shipped to Rotan from Georgia to a Mr. Lambert in 1936. Mr. Weems bought it in 1939 and has been operating it since that time. The mill is over one hundred years old, but is still operating. Mr. Weems uses a 1959 Ford tractor to operate the mill.

Mr. Weems also has a very old corn sheller which

was once operated by hand, but he has added a motor and uses Midwest Electric power to operate it. He shells all of his corn with this sheller.

Mr. Weems checks his corn meal regularly to see if the bran is separated correctly from the finished product. When he is satisfied, he puts the meal in twenty pound sacks and seals it; now it is ready to take home and use.

Mr. Walter (Bunk) Cleveland has a manually operated corn sheller. It not only shells the corn but discards the cob. This machine was brought from North Carolina when Mr. Cleveland's great-grandparents came to Texas.

The machine has been handed down from father to son. It is still being used in the fall to shell corn for several families which is later taken to Mr. Weems' grist mill.

Time has passed, but some things and memories are still with senior citizens. Many senior gentlemen remember their fathers balancing a sack of shelled corn across the back of the favorite mule, lifting them up and away they would go to the grist mill. Later that afternoon they would return with a sack of corn meal. Many senior ladies remember their mothers making "pone" cornbread. Oh, how delicious it was, a pat

of home churned butter and a glass of buttermilk cooled at the spring below the house made a meal. Thank goodness for beautiful memories.

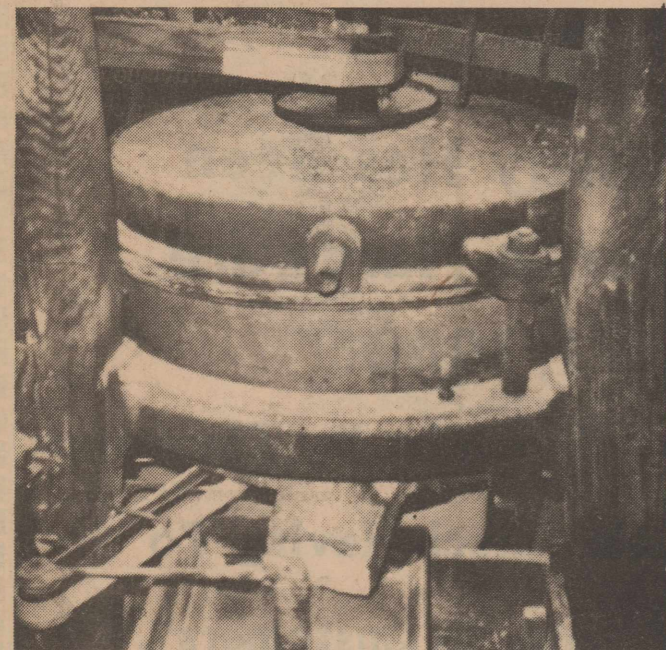

The Rotan varsity girls, after trailing for three quarters of play against the Jim Ned girls, pulled to within 7 points of a win last Monday night in Jim Ned.

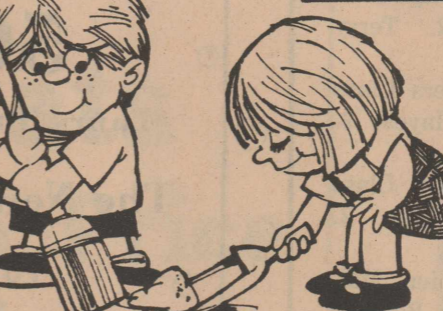
