



Buy frozen or refrigerated foods, then take them directly home to the freezer. Home freezer temperature should be kept at 0 degrees F.

Labels on many frozen foods tell whether the product can be refrozen. It's not a good idea to refreeze unless the label says this won't harm the

When using frozen foods, plan ahead so they can be defrosted in the refrigerator. Thawing foods at room temperature for long periods can permit bacteria to grow, producing

But when food is thawed the refrigerator, the warmth necessary for acteria growth is lacking.


