Milogard or both have been made in the field at rates ranging from 0.1 to 2.0 pounds per acre. Test crops, either wheat or soybeans were planted 1 to 13 days after application of NoTox. Under the conditions of these studies NoTox was not effective in reducing the effect of

CPR Training

Our family drove over to Snyder last week to watch Ira and Roby play for the district championship. Roby was leading in the game up until 3:33 left in the second quarter. At that point Ira took over the lead and though the Lion's came back to within one point of capturing the lead, Ira won 53-43.

The big story was not that Roby lost the district championship, Ira had the size and experience while by seemed cold in their shooting after the first quarter. The big story was the fact that most Roby and fans witnessed a remarkable attempt to save a human at that game.

Cecil Huddleston, a man with a history of heart trouble drove to Snyder from Ira to see his grandson play for the district title. Just prior to the end of the first half of play, Huddleston fell limp from his bleacher seat—an apparent heart attack.

It was amazing to see the stadium rally together in an attempt to save Huddleston's life. Several men took turns breathing into his mouth and applying pressure to his chest in an attempt to revive the fallen Ira player's grandfather.

I noticed Roby native Randy King doing his part. He is member of the Nolan County Sheriff's Department and has had training in CPR emergencies.

A half of dozen other men assisted in trying to revive Huddleston. It was apparent that that they also had training in CPR.

Janece made the statement on the way home from the game that we should enroll in the next CPR course taught by Tommy and Bob Harbin. She's right, the time could come when the training will save someone's life. Huddleston died, it wasn't because there wasn't anyone around that didn't have the CPR knowledge and desire to attempt to save him.

Darrell Dyer Injured As Patrol Car Crashes

Fisher County Deputy Sheriff Darrell Dyer was involved in an accident last Thursday afternoon while returning from Abilene after conducting a theft investigation, according to Sheriff Mickey Counts.

The accident took place just south of Anson when Dyer hit a truck that was parked on the paved shoulder, rolled his Fisher County vehicle, and escaped with only minor injuries.

The 1979 Chevrolet was

listed as a total wreck by insurance investigators. Fisher County Commissioners met in emergency session last Friday and accepted a bid from F&M Chevrolet for a new vehicle to replace the one that was wrecked.

Dyer was taken to Anson Hospital where he was treated for cuts and bruises and released.

Sheriff Counts said that "the cage and roll bar in the vehicle could have saved Dyer's life."

Tuesday Fire Sweeps Through Hay Storage

Fire swept through the hay and storage facility at the Ezell-Key Feed and Seed building early last Tuesday morning, destroying approximately 200 to 225 bales of hay and coming within minutes of completely destroying the main building, according to Ivin Martin, manager.

The fire alarm was turned in by the Rotan Nightwatchman at approximately 3:00 a.m. last Tuesday morning. Some 12 volunteer firemen con-

tained the blaze and cleaned out the burning hay for 2½ hours.

Most of the damage was to the hay storage shed, according to Martin. "We lost all of the hay, had some 100 sacks of feed damaged, but we don't anticipate any interruption of normal business," said Martin.

"I think that the quick work of the firemen saved the entire building from burning, they sure did a good job", said Martin.

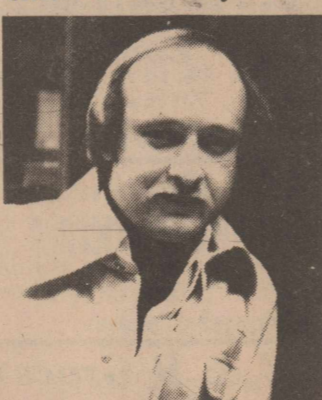
New Juvenile Officer Plans Tutor Program

Meeting Has EMT Discussion

The Rotan Extension Club met Thursday with Misses Louada and Mary Posey. Mr. Tommy Harbin, one of the Paramedics (Emergency Medical Service) of Fisher County Hospital and serving all of Fisher County, spoke to the fourteen members. He was introduced by Mrs. Florine Young who was in charge of the program. Mr. Harbin is educated and qualified for the job in the Emergency Medical Service. He takes a refresher course every two years. He is on call twenty-four hours.

Mr. Harbin told of his work. He gave information on first aid care given to a person who had been injured or is suddenly taken ill until professional medical services can be obtained. The major objective to save life is to maintain breathing and circulation, and to prevent loss of blood. A person giving aid must avoid panic, inspire confidence, and also call for emergency medical service immediately. He also discussed what aid to give a person for a snake bite, burns, nose bleed, fainting, shock, poison, spiders, head injury, and many other emergencies that may occur. He demonstrated what to do if a person was choking and also if you were alone and choking. All the members enjoyed hearing Mr. Harbin and expressed a desire to hear him again at a future date.

The next club meeting will be March 6, in the home of Mrs. Dolly Curry. The program will be "Microwave Cooking" and Mrs. Curry will demonstrate with the microwave oven.

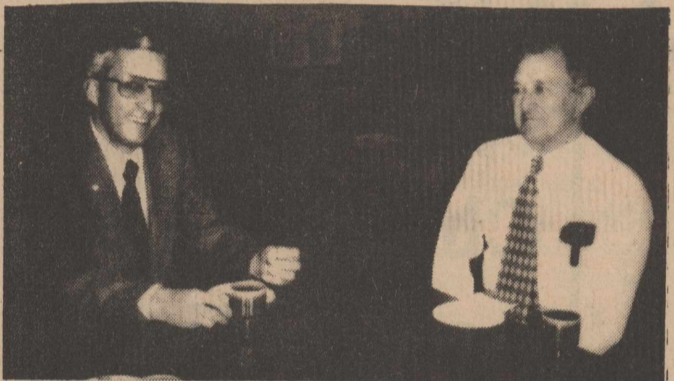
The program, titled, "Freedoms Colors" was researched and prepared by Mr. McCathren as a bicentennial project. The

Lt. G. Powell Given Army Award Badge

Lt. Gary C. Powell recently was presented the Expert Infantryman Badge at Fort Campbell, Ky.

The badge, the Army's highest non-combat proficiency award for infantrymen, is awarded upon successful completion of a week-long period of training. The tests are administered only to volunteers who have scored highly on the physical training test and are expert marksmen with the M-16 rifle.

Seventeen specific infantry skills are covered in the testing, including rifle marksmanship, hand grenades, the Claymore mine, anti-tank weapons, first aid, military intelligence and signal communications. A 12-mile road march with full combat gear completes the testing.

860 Thousand Cotton Samples Are Classed

B.B. Manly, Jr. Area Director of the USDA Cotton Marketing Services Office reported that 22,500 cottons samples were classed in Abilene during the week ending Friday, February 22. This brought the seasonal total to about 860,000 samples classed. An additional 180,000 samples were classed at Munday, bringing the combined total to 1,040,000 samples classed.

Local cotton prices dropped by one to five cents per pound this week. Cotton miking 3.5 to 4.9 sold mostly at 18 to 22 cents per pound over CCC loan values. Grade 32, staple 32 cotton miking 3.5 to 4.9 sold at physical prices ranging from 65 1/2 to 69 1/2 cents per pound. The supply of cotton was light, and the market was weak. Demand was light for base mike cotton and low mike cotton. Trading was slow. Cottonseed prices paid producers ranged from 95 to 120 dollars per ton.

The quality of cotton classed in Abilene showed little change from the

previous week. Grades were 6 percent white, 67 percent light spotted, and 24 percent spotted. Grades 32 and 42 were predominant at 31 and 30 percent. Grades 33 and 43 comprised 12 and 10 percent. Fiber length was 59 percent staple 32, 32 percent staple 32, and 5 percent staple 33. Microaire readings were 32 percent with the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Eighteen percent miked from 3.3 to 3.4, 37 percent miked from 3.0 to 3.2, and 12 percent miked 2.9 or lower. About 13 percent of the samples classed were reduced in grade because of bark or grass content.

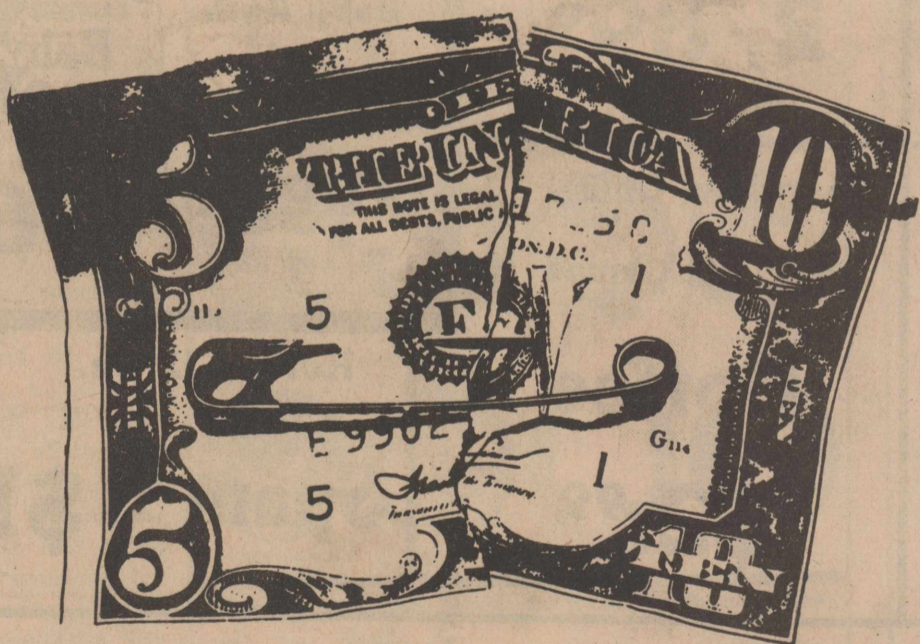

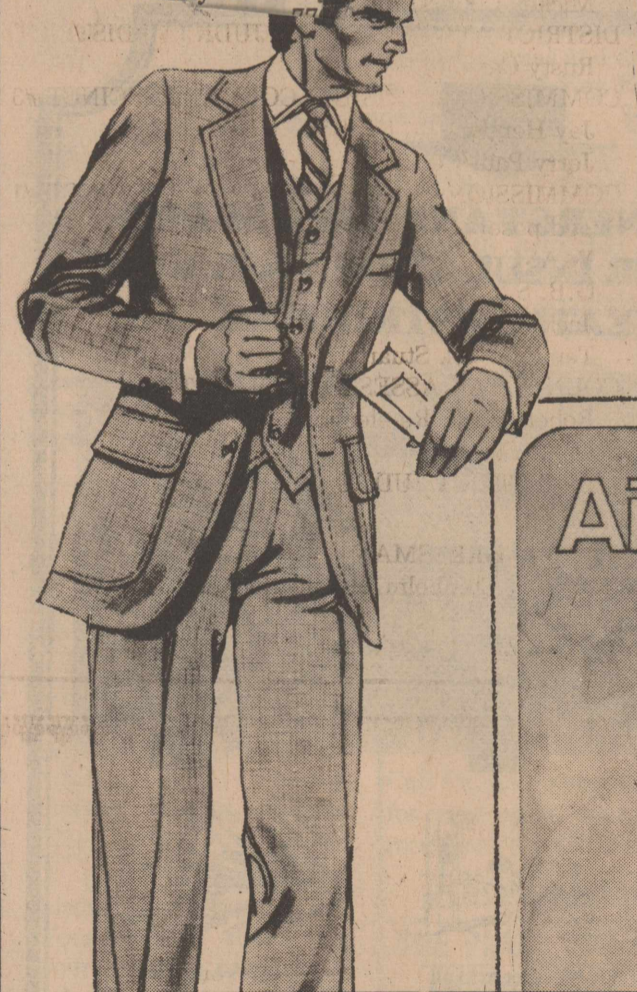

The short-eared owl hunts on cloudy days instead of at night only, like most owls.

With spring arriving, it will soon be picnic time. Keeping picnic foods safe to eat is a cinch if the right foods are selected and stored properly.

The main point to remember is that cold foods should be kept cold, hot foods, hot.

Several layers of newspaper serve as an excellent insulator for both hot and cold foods. Leakproof containers wrapped in several thickness of newspaper and tied or taped to secure the ends and prevent heat or cold from escaping will keep well for three or four hours.

Without an insulated bag or wide-mouth vacuum jar, it is probably best to take along foods that do not need to be kept hot. Hot main dishes prepared with meat, fish, eggs or mayonnaise must be kept hot to prevent spoilage and food poisoning.

Sandwiches can be prepared in advance and individually wrapped or the "makings" carried in plastic containers to make the sandwiches just before eating.

Butter might be substi-

tuted for mayonnaise as a picnic sandwich spread in insure safety of the sandwiches for a longer period of time.

Ingredients for vegetable salads can also be carried in separate containers and made just before eating.

Baked goods such as cakes, cookies and brownies travel and keep well, posing few storage problems.

An Ordinance establishing retail water rates for the City of Rotan, Texas, and all other retail water uses connected to Rotan Water Mains or Transmission Lines; repealing all ordinances in conflict with this ordinance; declaring an emergency; and providing an effective date.

- (a) Minimum charge per month inside the Corporate City Limits for 3,000 gallons or less, \$6.00
- (b) Minimum charge per month outside the Corporate City Limits for 3,000 gallons or less, \$6.00
- (c) Excess over 3,000 gallons per month for both "a" and "b" per 1,000 gallons, \$1.40
- (d) Users being served through a meter of larger size than the standard 3/4" meter the Minimum charge per month for 3,000 gallons or less, \$7.00.

Section 2: All ordinances, resolutions, or other actions of the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas, in conflict with the rates, fees, charges, or other provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Section 3: An emergency is declared by the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas, due to a water rate increase retroactive to November, 1978, as per terms of the City's water contract.

Section 4: This ordinance shall become effective immediately and applied to the first bill following passage on first reading.

There has been tremendous interest in rope wick applicators for the application of herbicides over the crop canopy. Monsanto Agriculture Products Company will soon have an approved EPA label for the use of Roundup in wick-on Applicators in cotton and soy beans. This label should be made available in the next few weeks.

NoTox, a product marketed to neutralize residues of herbicides such as atrazine and propazine (Milogard), has been evaluated in Texas Agricultural Experiment Station College Station. Applications of atrazine or Milogard or both have been made in the field at rates ranging from 0.1 to 2.0 pounds per acre. NoTox, was applied at rates ranging from 0.2 to 20 pounds per acre from 0 to 10 days after the herbicide application. NoTox was incorporated into the soil 2 to 5 inches with a disk or power tiller. Test crops, either wheat or soybeans were planted 1 to 13 days after application of NoTox. Under the conditions of these studies NoTox was not effective in reducing the effect of

atrazine or propazine on wheat or soybeans. ***
