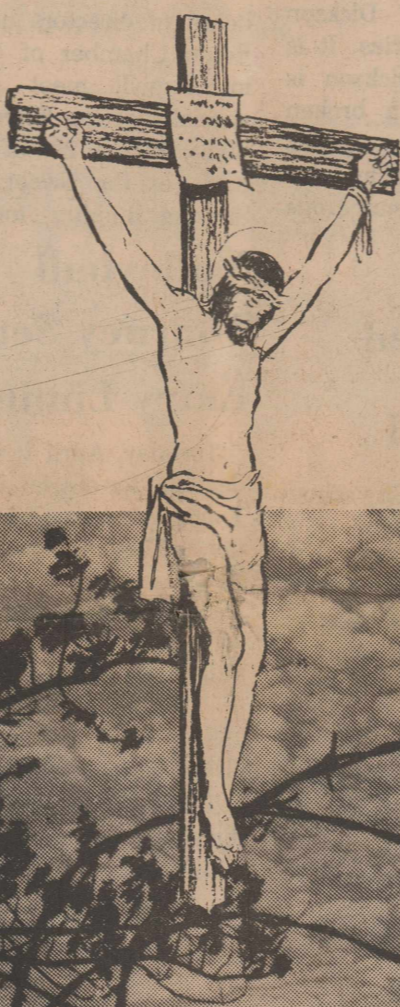

Tax Refunds Back Faster If Addressed

Taxpayers can help speed up the processing of their Federal income tax return and receive their refund much faster by using the pre-addressed, peel off label on their return, the Internal Revenue Service said. The label, which is located on the cover of the tax return package, lists the taxpayer's name, address, and social security number. If any of the information is incorrect, the taxpayer should make needed changes directly on the label.

Married taxpayers filing joint returns should be sure that both social security numbers appear on the label. If only one spouse's number is shown the other number should be placed on the label, according to the IRS.

IRS encourages taxpayers to send their return in the coded envelope provided with the tax package and to make sure they have attached all required schedules and forms.

Taxpayers Complete Records

Taxpayers who keep accurate financial records have an easier time completing their income tax.

Although taxpayers are not required to use a specific recordkeeping system, receipts, cancelled checks, bills, old returns, and other written documents are essential in proving their expenses, the IRS said. By law, records must be kept 3 years after the return was due or filed or 2 years after the tax was paid, whichever was later. A major exception to the retention rule involves records on property transactions. These records should be maintained for as long as they are helpful in determining the basis of original or replacement property.

IRS Publication 552, "Recordkeeping Requirements and a Guide to Tax Publications" gives more information and can be obtained by ordering a copy using the coupon found in the tax package or by contacting IRS.

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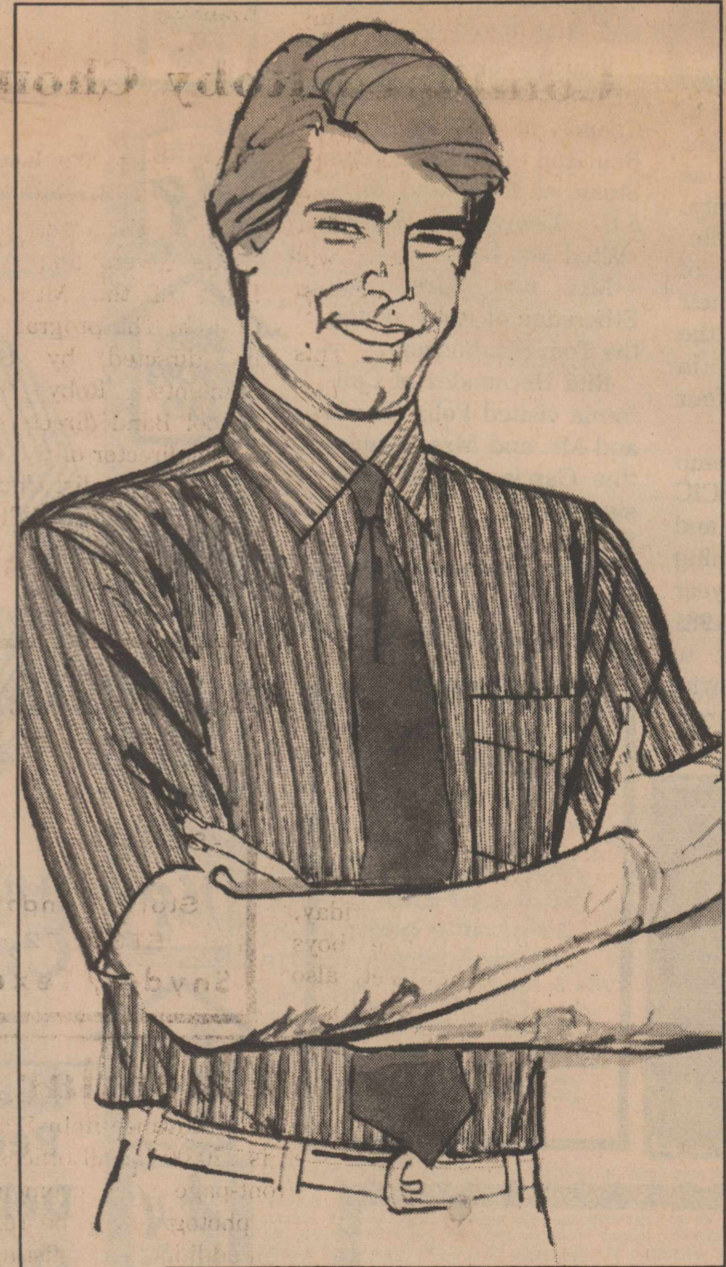

Rotan Little League Sets New Two Day Registration Program

A meeting of the Rotan Little League was held last Monday. Formalization of the new thirty game schedule was completed and presented to representatives of the major league teams. The schedule was adopted and will be available upon completion of the upcoming draft.

A change in the registration and tryout periods was approved by those in attendance. Registration will now be held on Monday, April 7, from 7:00 until 8:30 p.m. and on Saturday, April 12, from 7:00 until 4:00 p.m. at the Sweetwater Savings and Loan Assn. Community Room. By holding two separate registration periods, it is hoped that all eligible children will have an opportunity to pre-register, since early registration will be mandatory. In order to register, an eligible child must present his/her proof of age and be accompanied by at least one parent during one of the pre-registration periods. Any child who will attain the age of 8 before August 1, and who will not attain the age of 13 before August 1, will be eligible to register.

The major league teams will be composed of those children in the 10 to 12 year old bracket. Children in this age bracket will be

required to be present at the major league tryouts. Boys in the 8 and 9 year age bracket will be assigned to minor league teams.

Tryouts for the major league teams will be held on Monday, April 14,

Tuesday, April 15, Thursday, April 17, and Friday, April 18. At the conclusion of practice on April 18, a meeting of the team managers will be held and a draft will be held to fill vacancies on the major league teams. In order for a child to be eligible for the draft it will be mandatory to attend all four tryout sessions. Tryout sessions will begin at

5:30 p.m.

Team practice will begin the following Monday, April 21, with the season opener scheduled for Monday, May 12.

Also discussed at the meeting was the need to attract additional sponsors and advertisers in order to improve the league's financial position. Linda Morrow, league secretary, will be contacting, by

letter, local merchants and businesses in an effort to gain additional financial support for the league.

"In an effort to be of service to the voters of the Rotan Independent School District, we have prepared a questionnaire for all announced candidates. Hopefully, the answers to some of the questions will give some voters a basis for making a more intelligent decision on naming the three new school board members. Please keep your answers as short as possible. We must have the answers back to us no later than Monday noon, March 24th.

1. What is your purpose for seeking election to the Rotan Independent School Board?

2. What are your most important qualifications?

3. Are you satisfied with the academic program at Rotan?

4. Are you in favor of placing more or less emphasis on the athletic program?

5. Would you be in favor of paying classroom teachers a local bonus above state scale for academic excellence in the classroom?

Thank you for your interest in this year's election and in filling out this questionnaire." Copies were mailed to: Donald Gruben, Bob West, Joe Dickson, Ruple Weems, Gene Pack, Robert Wall, Sr., Nathan Kelley, Roger Blackwelder, Bill Cade, James Carter and Monte Morrow. All candidates responded to the questionnaire with the exception of James Carter and Roger Blackwelder. The candidates' responses to the questions are listed in the order that the questionnaires were returned to The Newspaper Office.

CANDIDATE QUESTIONS

1. What is your purpose for seeking election to the Rotan Independent School Board?

Pack--My purpose in seeking election to the School Board, is to be able to take an active part in our school system and its operation. I wish also to try to do something about the 13 and 14 year-old drop outs.

Cade--Promote a more complete academic program.

Dickson--My purpose for seeking election to the Rotan Independent School Board is to help provide a school system that the school administration, teachers, students, and all other citizens of Rotan can be proud of and satisfied with, as the present and past board members have so admirably done.

West--My purpose for seeking election to the School Board is to fulfill a duty to my community. I feel it is everyone's duty to help make our school system the best possible.

Wall--To strive for a higher quality of education for all students.

Gruben--I have an interest in the Rotan School System as I have two children in primary. I feel as a taxpayer that I would represent the taxpayers

wisely and use their tax money appropriately. I feel serving on the school board is a responsibility as a citizen of this community.

Morrow--My purpose for seeking election is to help make the Rotan Independent School District a better school district.

Kelley--My purpose is to get all the people, both young and old, involved in what goes on in our school district.

Weems--First let me say that I think the present board has done a good job. Second, I am not after any of the present teachers' jobs. Finally, the main reason I am running is to try and assure my children and other children the best education available in the Rotan area.

What are your most important qualifications?

Pack--My only qualifications are that I have three daughters in the Rotan schools at this time and I have a genuine desire to help all children achieve the quality education that they deserve and need.

Cade--Educated, business experience, honest.

Dickson--My qualifications are my experience in business management and my association with people. I feel I can hear different points of view with an open mind and judge fairly what would be best for the school system and the community. I have had several years of insight of what faces administration, teachers and students.

May I mention here that according to state and local laws, I am legally qualified to serve on the school board even though my wife, Linda, teaches in Rotan High School this year and hopefully in the years to come.

West--My most important qualification is a desire to make the system better. Also, the best way to make the school better is a constant flow of new ideas.

Wall--Taxpayer R.I.S.D. Businessman.

Gruben--I am a taxpayer in this community and am a permanent resident.

Some decisions that the school board has to make have a long lasting effect on the residents of the community. I am a farmer and run it as a business and feel the school should be managed the same way. I feel I am responsible and level headed enough to work with the administration and the public.

Morrow--My most important qualifications are, that graduating in 1976, I feel that I can relate with any type of problem in the school system. Being raised in Rotan, I feel that I can discuss problems and new ideas with anyone. Also, fairness to everyone is an important virtue.

Kelley--I feel that being fresh out of school I know what goes on in our schools. I also feel that having lived here all my life that most people can relate to me about their opinions on different problems that might arise.

Weems--My qualifications I believe are my interest in my children's education and school projects. I also believe someone with children in school can be more aware of the goings on in the school system.

Are you satisfied with the academic program at Rotan?

Pack--Not entirely. It's good but can be better.

Cade--No.

Dickson--At this time, yes, I am satisfied with the academic program at Rotan, but as in any school system there is room for improvement. We must keep abreast of new technology and teaching skills so our children will be well prepared for what faces them when they graduate from Rotan High School.

West--We cannot ever be satisfied with the academic program because there is always room for improvement in any program.

Wall--"Could use some improvement".

Gruben--Yes, but there is always room for improvement. I think one improvement would be for more vocational classes for the students of Rotan that

are not planning to go to college. If we had some classes for these students they could go out and find a job when they graduate.

Morrow--I feel that the academic program has many good qualities, but there is always room for improvement.

Kelley--Yes, I am satisfied with the academic program in our schools although there are a few minor things I feel could be improved.

Weems--I think that the academic program at Rotan, like all such programs, could stand some improvement. However, I am not presently in a position to know where the improvements are needed. I would say though to my present knowledge things are fairly adequate.

Are you in favor of placing more or less emphasis on the athletic program?

Pack--I believe that academic achievement is much more important in the long run than athletic achievement. Our children will have to compete in the business world, not on a pro football team, however, I am an avid supporter of athletic programs and believe that the young people need a healthy body as well as a healthy mind.

Cade--A loaded question, Mr. Pease. Each student should have access to a well balanced athletic program.

Dickson--I believe that Rotan has a well balanced athletic program that blends well with the academic. We have a good variety of sports offered to male and female students. We also have an excellent coaching staff that represents Rotan well in or out of competition.

West--I am in favor of more emphasis on the athletic program. I feel the building of strong bodies is just as important as building strong minds.

Wall--I am in favor of a balanced Academic Program, which includes the Athletic Program.

Gruben--I think athletics have a place in the school but I would like to see more emphasis put on the

educational aspects.

Morrow--I feel that we have a good athletic program, in which less emphasis should not be placed. More emphasis should be placed on other programs.

Kelley--I have an open mind about our athletic program. I feel that it should be treated on the same basis as Vo-Ag and all of the other programs in our school.

Weems--I believe that not only should you educate the mind, but you should provide organized sports for both boys and girls. Therefore, I do not foresee my voting to cut the athletic budget.

Would you be in favor of paying classroom teachers a local bonus above state scale for academic excellence in the classroom?

Pack--Yes, I do support a fair wage for any of our teachers (who are usually known to be underpaid) and an extra bonus for those that excel.

Cade--Yes, school teachers are the poorest paid professionals in our society. If we are not willing to pay for our children's education it's time to

re-evaluate our priorities.

Dickson--I am not in favor of paying teachers a local bonus above state scale for excellence in the classroom. Judging of such excellence would be very difficult and "favoritism" could evolve. Also, conflict among teachers could arise. I just do not feel this is a good idea at all.

West--I am in favor of paying teachers a bonus on an incentive basis. That way we keep the best teachers here in Rotan rather than losing them to other schools. We need this kind of interest in every election year. Nothing can get done if we wait for someone else to do it.

Wall--Yes, Based on Merit and Warrant.

Gruben--I think that teachers should be paid according to what effort that they put into their work. Some think of it as a profession and excel and should be paid more than those that think of it as just a job. I think that this would give all teachers an incentive to do their best for the children's education. Having a diploma does not make a teacher, what the teacher can and will do in the classroom should determine their pay. When being paid on the state scale some of our teachers are being under paid, some may also be getting overpaid for the

work and effort they do.

Morrow--Yes, I would be in favor of paying classroom teachers a local bonus above the state scale for academic excellence in the classroom. Extra time and patience should be rewarded.

Kelley--Yes, I am in favor of paying our teachers a local bonus. I feel that most of our teachers are underpaid for the good jobs that they do. I also feel that our teachers will appreciate our support and they will work harder

to teach our children what they need to know.

Weems--I think that if a teacher does a good job they should be recognized in some way. However, the question of raises should be considered with attention being paid to school finances. If the money is available the raises should be given. However, if the money is not available you can't spend it.

Cross Roads Baptist Dedicates New Facility Sunday Afternoon

Members of Cross Roads Baptist Church have completed construction of a new educational facility and fellowship activity building and will be holding a Dedication Service on Sunday, March 30, during a fellowship meal following the morning Worship Service.

The new facility is a 40' x 45' welded steel framework covered by colored sheet metal outside and vinyl covered wall board inside. Housed inside are three 15'x20' classrooms, a 40'x45' assembly room, and a 15'x17' kitchen in addition to bathroom facilities and mechanical-storage area. Four areas of work have been contracted with the remainder being completed by volunteer labor from the church's membership. installation of an acoustical ceiling with insulation. The people of the church prepared the foundation forms, built the framework and installed the sheet metal walls and roof, installed 4 inches of styrofoam insulation in all outside walls and many of the inner walls, completely plumbed the building and installed the electrical

wiring, installed the inner wallboard, doors and trim-work as well as building and installing all cabinets and woodwork.

The dedication service, presented in conjunction with the fellowship meal, as a part of Wednesday through Sunday Revival. Rev. Mike Hicks, pastor, will serve as Master of Ceremonies and bring the

dedication charge and acknowledgements of the various committees and workers will be acknowledged.

Bro. Hicks commented, "We are extremely blessed to have the people willing to take on the responsibility of building a facility such as this in the manner of volunteer labor. The craftsmanship throughout the facility is excellent as the people have given the very best of their talents and time. Not only have the people provided the labor, they have also contributed in a generous manner financially with approximately \$3500 of the building and furnishings costs remaining at this time." When asked about the cost

of the building, Bro. Hicks commented, "Contractors tell me that a similarly built and equipped building, totally done by them, would have cost in excess of three times the amount this building has cost, done in the way we have done it, and most of the contractors commented that the quality of workmanship may have not been completed so carefully as it now is."

Bro. Hicks added, "We would like to thank the many merchants who have assisted us in the project, especially M&C Lumber, Central Lumber, Western Auto, Landes Furniture, First National Bank of Rotan, Hicks Drywall of Snyder, Muheller Supply of Ballinger, Wadleigh

Construction of Snyder, Harris Acoustics and Diversified Contractors of Abilene, and M&M Construction of Rotan. These people have provided materials, advice and support throughout the building project. The job would have been much more difficult without the supportive efforts of these people."

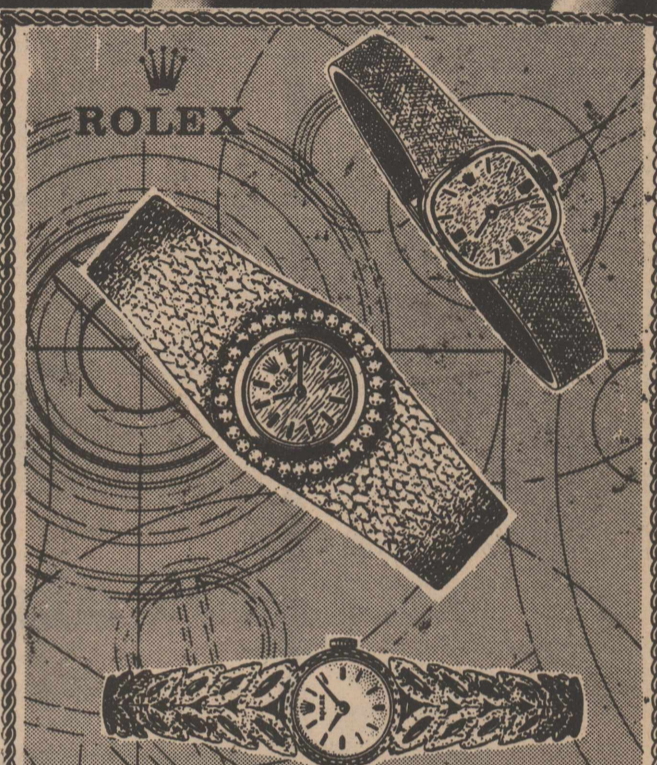
