WTC Course Offered For Nurse Aides

A 120-clock hour course to prepare students for positions as nurses aides in a hospital or nursing home will be offered by Western Texas College at Stonewall Memorial Hospital in Aspermont.

Registration will be held from 5-7 p.m. on June 12 at the hospital. Students will attend classes on Friday nights and Saturdays from June 20 through July 26 (with the exception of the July 4th weekend) for a total of 60 hours of training and will spend the remaining 60 hours on the floor at a hospital or nursing home.

Fees will be \$85 per person, which includes the required book.

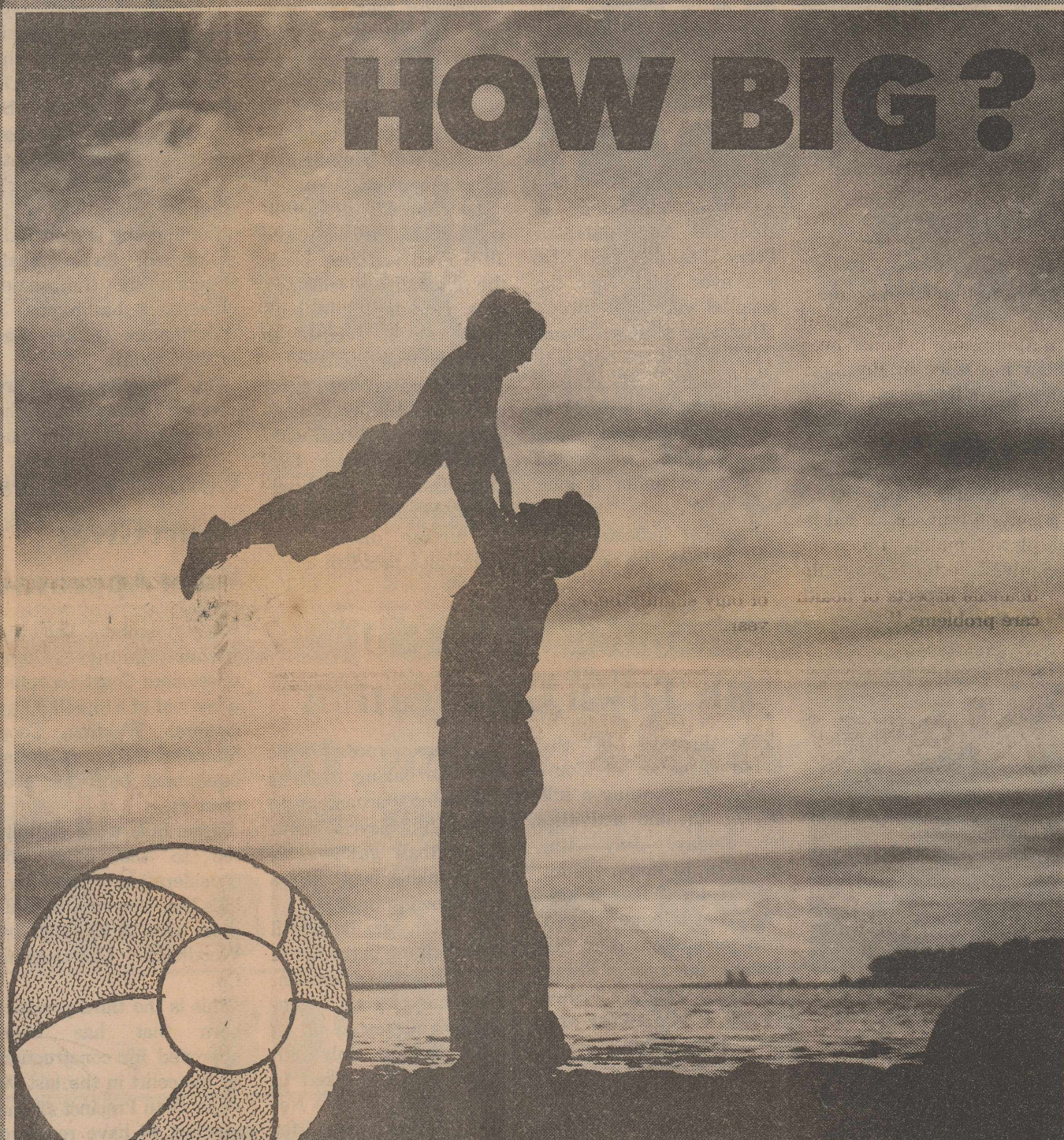
Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, be able to read, write and comprehend English, furnish references, be interviewed by the course instructor, and must have had a tuberculin skin test and stool culture within the past 12 months. They must be free from contagious disease and in suitable physical and emotional health to perform their duties correctly.

Equipment to be furnished by the student is a watch with a sweep second hand and a ball point pen with blue or black ink.

The student who successfully completes this course will perform the skills required in caring for patients in a hospital or nursing home. The aide will be under the direct supervision of an RN or LVN.

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Oil Production Increases

Fisher County, which has had recorded production since 1928, last year produced 4,184,150 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 11,463 barrels per day. Production in 1979 boosted Fisher County's production total through the end of the year to 195,468,168 barrels.

In 1979, 22 counties

produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil, a decrease of two counties from 1978; a decrease of four from 1977, and five from 1976.

The following chart shows 1979 production figures for the state's five top producing counties, all with production in excess of 48-million barrels. Yoakum retained its spot as

the state's top producing county. Gaines retained second place, while Ector remained in third place for the fifth consecutive year.

Rotan Head Football Coach Don Mullins made his first appearance before the Rotan School Board last Monday night since

the controversial vote was taken on renewing his contract last January. At that time the board voted 5-2 that they would not grant Mullins a contract extension in February. In February, the board officially voted 4-3 to re-hire Mullins as Head Coach. He was not re-hired in the capacity of athletic director.

hired 5 years ago he had a two year contract, was the athletic director as well as head coach and had the board behind him. "I've lost all of those things". If I don't see some positive things - I'd be a fool to stay, said Mullins.

Mullins said "The board never told me anything I needed to do." He said that he felt communications was the major factor in his relations with the school board.

"If I knew the board was behind me, I wouldn't have any problem (functioning as the Athletic Director)", said Mullins.

There were some problem areas spelled out to Mullins concerning his relationship, or fall from grace with the board - most centered around his performance as Athletic

Director. The problem areas were in his relationship with the girl's athletic program and in the overall scope of directing personnel (coaches) in his performance as Athletic Director.

Mullins said that "If

things go positive - I want to meet again with the board and let the new people know my philosophy".

National Cotton Council Expanding

National Cotton Council President Herman Propst sees the 1980's as a tremendous growth period for cotton.

Pointing to the expansion that has occurred in cotton's markets this season, he told the National Cottonseed Products Association at its annual meeting here today that he believes it's "only the beginning" of a brighter outlook for cotton as both a fiber and food product.

"We've already seen the impact of favorable economic development on our fiber consumption in the Far East," Propst said, "and as world food needs grow, we're confident that demands are going to increase, too, for cottonseed oil and meal."

Even with prospects for a recession in the season ahead, the Council president said cotton still has a favorable outlook.

On the domestic scene, he noted that mill inventories are lean, and it's possible that mill fiber consumption could hold up better than the general economy in a recession.

Even if the total fiber market declines somewhat, Propst said it is entirely possible that cotton's domestic consumption in 1980-81 will be near or only slightly below this year.

On the foreign market side, the Council president said the world carryover is expected to be at a relatively low level when the new season begins, and cotton's export prospects appear excellent.

"In looking at the industry's record of success over the past season, I think there's no question but that a big factor has been the growth climate provided by the market-oriented farm programs of the 1970's," the Anson, Tex., cotton producer said. "Under the strict acreage allotment programs of the past, we never could have achieved the growth we've experienced this season."

Regarding new farm policies that must be written next year, the Council president warned that attempts may be made to apply the same legislative remedies for grain and soybeans to cotton "even though cotton isn't experiencing the same problems and may not need or want the same remedies."

Propst asked the crusher segment's leadership in formulating and building support for a sound government cotton program tailored specifically to cotton's needs.

Farm Bureau Calls For NHI Defeat

The Texas Farm Bureau is urging Congress to defeat a proposed compulsory national health insurance program, according to Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart, president.

A number of health insurance bills are under consideration, including Senator Edward Kennedy's "Health Care For All Americans Act - S. 1720," said Chaloupka. Projected costs to taxpayers for these proposals, he said, run from the \$28.6 billion needed to begin Senator Kennedy's proposal, down to about \$7 billion for the Republicans' "Medical Expense Protection Act."

"Costs would, of course, increase rapidly each year of operation," he said.

In a letter to Farm Bureau county leaders, Ed McKay, TFB national affairs director, asked members to write their Congressmen and urge defeat of all compulsory national health insurance legislation.

"National health insurance proposals differ pri-

marily in the amount of coverage offered to individuals, and in the amount of federal control involvement," McKay said. "Senator Kennedy's proposal simply directs the federal government to take over the private insurance industry and provide comprehensive benefits to all without any consideration of the ability of the individual to pay."

The Republicans' "Medical Expense Protection Act" concentrates on filling in the gaps in existing coverage provided by the private insurance industry to assure unlimited catastrophic protection for all Americans, he said.

Farm Bureau policy reads in part: "We oppose compulsory national health insurance in any form. Nationally implemented and administered health insurance... would be one more step in the socialization of this country. We believe reliance should be placed mainly upon the private sector to solve the financial aspects of health care problems."

Texas Papers To Honor Earl

Texas newspapers will present Houston Oiler famed running back, Earl Campbell, with its highest honor during the Centennial Convention of Texas Press Association June 21 in Houston.

Campbell, who has broken all NFL records in yards gained in rushing during his two years on the Oiler team, will be the eleventh Texan to be named "Texan of the Year" by the century-old association, composed of 575 Texas weeklies and

dailies.

Presenting the award will be TPA President Bill Dozier, publisher of the Kerrville Daily Times.

The Texan of the Year Award is not an annual award, said Dozier. It is given when the Association wants to honor a native-born son or daughter who has brought fame to the state while bringing prominence to themselves in their respective fields of endeavor.

In the past, Texan of the Year has been given to

only 10 persons, among them the late Dan Blocker, Dale Evans, C.B. (Tex) Thornton, Al Ludden, Ray Berry, Alan Bean, Phyllis George.

Campbell is considered to be the "most awarded" Texas football player and applauded as the greatest running back in football history. He began his career as a member of the Longhorn team at the University of Texas, Austin, receiving the famed Heisman Trophy.

When he went into pro football, Campbell was named Rookie of the Year in the NFL League and the two years he has played pro ball has been named NFL Most Valuable Player.

The celebrated pro will attend TPA's concluding luncheon to receive his award. Invited to attend are his mother, Ann Campbell, of Tyler, and his wife (he is to be married in early June). Guest speaker for the

luncheon will be Governor Bill Clements.

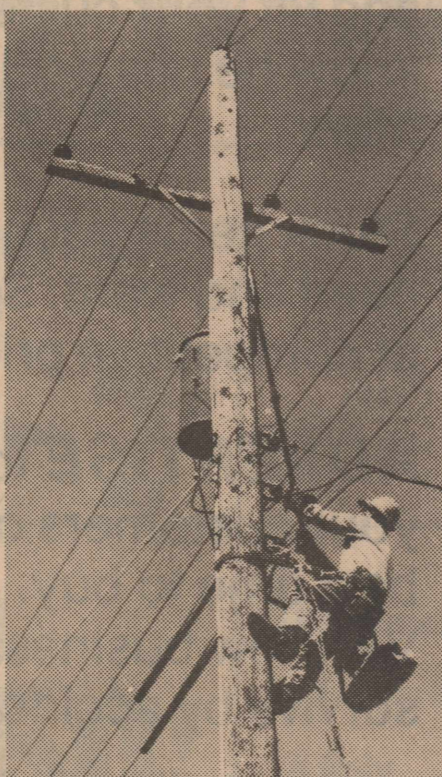

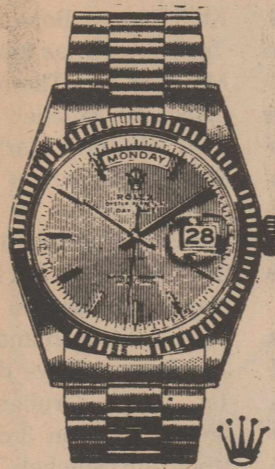
