

WTU Requesting Rate Hike

West Texas Utilities Company has filed application for a general rate increase, Garvis Hinson, local manager announced. The official ruling was made Tuesday, Sept. 30,

with incorporated towns for retail customers within their jurisdiction and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for an increase to customers outside incorporated

towns. The proposed rates would produce an increase in total revenue of \$12,729,619. This amounts to 8.27 per cent based on revenues of \$153,914,156

for the test period ending this past June 30. The company requested that the new rates become effective November 4. One of the basic reasons for the increase was cited

as inflation. "The cost of providing electric service continues to increase more rapidly than revenue", the manager said.

This rate adjustment would be only the second general retail rate increase in the company's entire history, which goes back more than 50 years. The other increase was in 1973 and amounted to about six per cent across the board.

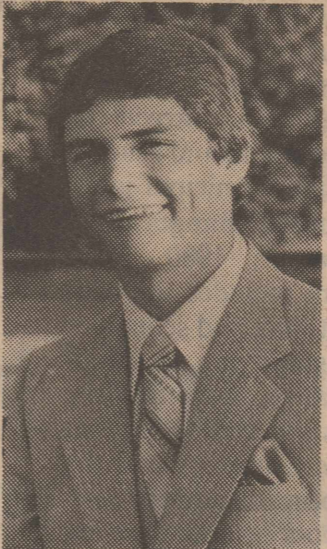
Gary Harkey Will Receive Fair Honors

over 125 rates for many types and classes, would be reduced to less than 30 rates. The effect of the increase on the different customer classes would vary according to present relative rates of return from each class.

For example, the typical residential electric bill would increase by about 10 per cent.

Although customer bills have risen substantially in the past few years, the increases have been the result of more usage and higher fuel costs. The average residential customer's electric usage in the WTU system increased from 6,363 kilowatt-hours in 1972 to 8,270 kilowatt-hours this past year.

The cost of fuel has

risen from 23 cents per million BTU in 1972 to \$1.96 this past summer. Generally, this fuel cost is the only increased expense that has been shared by the customer under WTU's recent rate schedule.

The city has several options in responding to WTU's rate request. It may approve the increase, deny the increase, or suspend the rates for a certain period of time. The city also has the option of denying the request and ceding future jurisdiction to the Public Utility Commission.

I resent being considered a carpet bagger. I grew up in Hobbs and my family has paid taxes to Hobbs since 1942. I am not trying to do anything by myself. I would like to see the people vote on this issue.

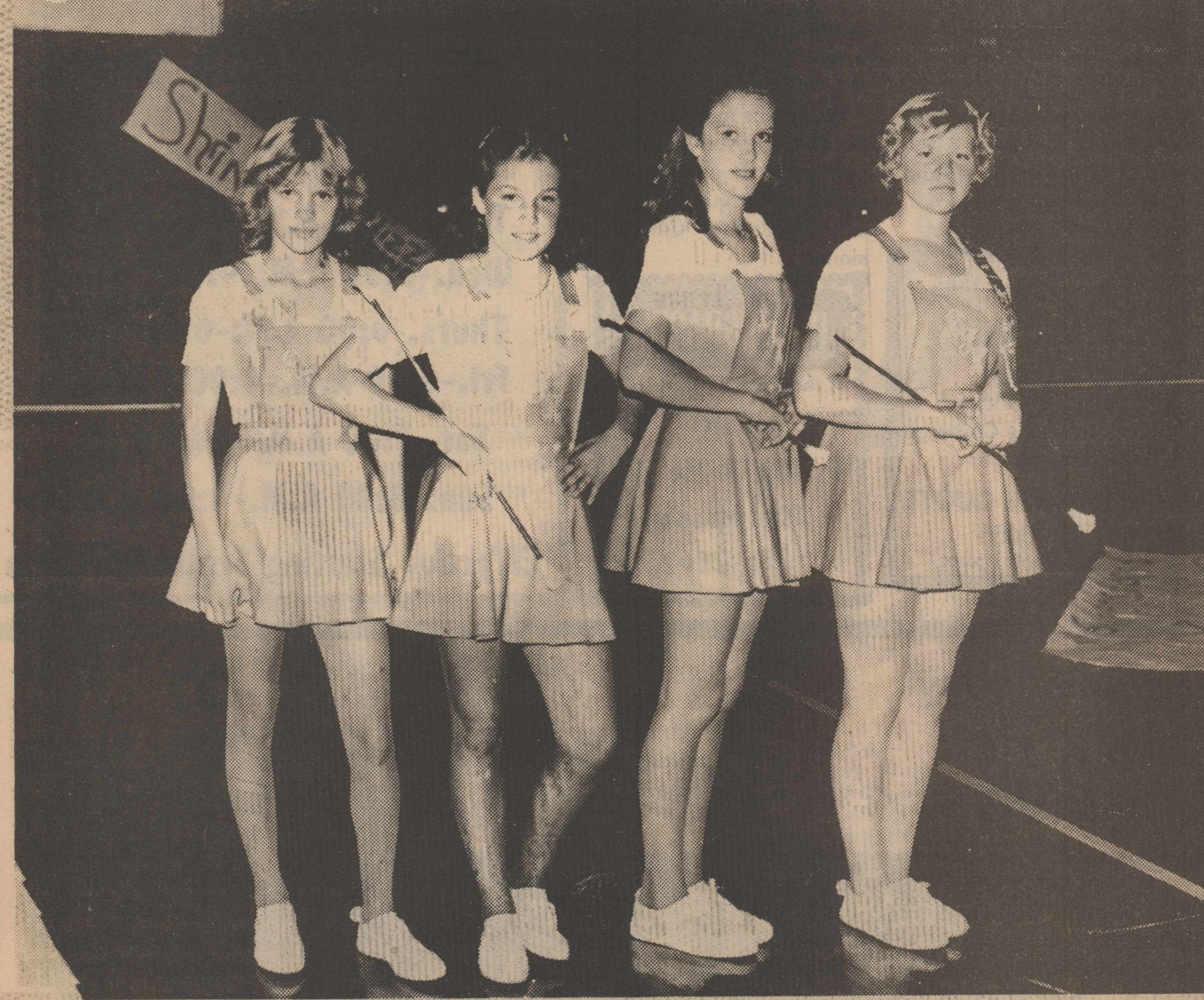

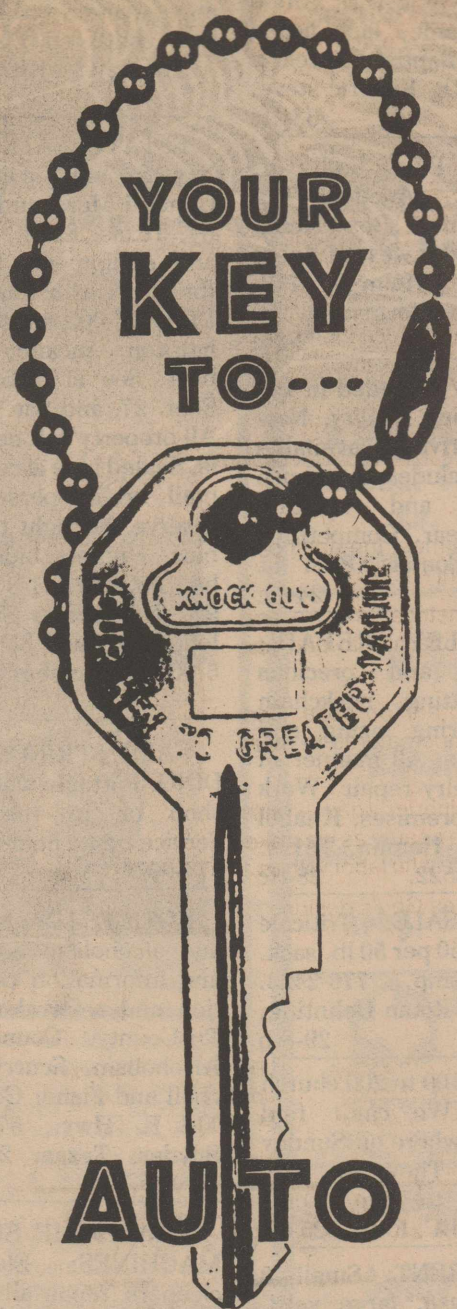

Roby Board Hears Report On Statewide TABS Comparison

At the September meeting of the Roby I.S.D. School Board, Mr. Jimmie Laurie, superintendent, compared the statewide TABS results with the Roby TABS results.

Roby fifth graders surpassed the statewide results in all eleven reading objectives, all six writing objectives, and nine of the eleven mathematics objectives. On the writing sample, 78 per cent used acceptable handwriting and 22 per cent had hard-to-read handwriting. In the Organization of Ideas category of the writing sample, 70 per cent of the Roby fifth graders scored a 4 or 3 (the highest possible rating) and 30 per cent scored a 2.

None scored a 1 or 0.

Long, Slow Rains Sa County, 11 To 12 Inc ent

After a long seige of hot, dry weather, the rains finally came last week scattering from 11 to 12 inches in Fisher County with one area west of Roby reporting as much as 14 inches of moisture from Monday, September 22, to Sunday, September 28th.

The rains were of a relatively general nature, most fell all over the county and were the soaking type that filled stock tanks and penetrated deep into cotton land.

Richard Posey, 8 miles north of Rotan on Highway 610, reported that he had a total rain fall of 11.5 inches with no damage. Posey said that all of his terraces were washed out with the rains in June.

Bernice Hargrove, 5 miles southwest of Rotan, indicated that he received about 11 inches of rain and that the rising Clear Fork Creek came within about 4 or 5 inches of his home. As of last Monday morning the Clear Fork was running swiftly and water was still in his back yard.

Pete Wishert, said that he had received about 11.9 inches at the Criswell Ranch, 18 miles northwest of Rotan. Wishert said that he hadn't found any extensive damage caused by the rains, some fences were washed out and some water gaps damaged. All

the tanks on the Criswell Ranch were full of water.

Mrs. F.B. Houghton, 3 miles southeast of Sylvester, said her rain gauge indicated that some 12.8 inches had fallen in the week long period. She said the two tanks on her place were both full after being nearly dry before the rainy spell.

Wayne Helms at Rough Creek reported 12.9 inches near Cotton Wood Flat Cemetery some 25 miles northwest of Rotan. After the last big rain at Rough Creek in May, his tanks were about half full. After last Sunday's final shower all the tanks in the Rough Creek area were full. Helms didn't report any damage caused by the rains.

Derwayne Rasco said he has 12.7 inches of rain at his home 3 1/2 miles south of Roby. Some of the land he farms west of Roby had

More than 600 farmer-rancher members and guests are expected to attend from 15 Texas counties.

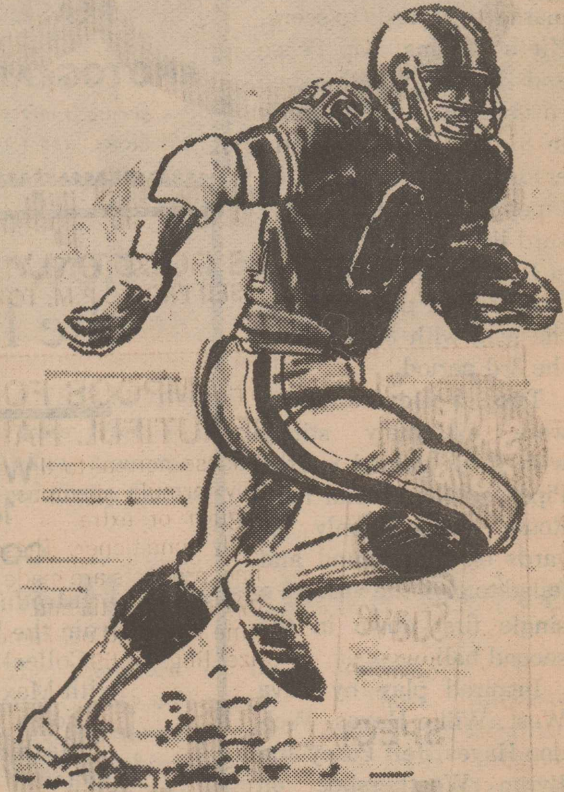

Army Worms Attacking County Wheat Crop

Wheat: Beet armyworms are attacking wheat in Fisher and Jones Counties. These olive green larva have a small black dot on both sides of the body directly behind the head. When 4-5 larva per square foot cause a reduction in seedling stand and foliage loss on older plants, treatment

may be needed. Lannate insecticide is labeled for use on wheat, barley, oats and rye in the state of Texas. Apply Lannate at one-fourth pound per acre or in the liquid form at one pint to two pints. Use sufficient water (2 to 5 gallons per acre by air) to obtain uniform coverage.

A repeat application may be needed in 5 to 7 days. Do not graze or feed treated forage or hay to livestock within 10 days of the last application. Do not harvet within 7 days of last application. A 24 (c) Lannate label must be in the possession of the user at the time of pesticide

application. This information comes from a supplemental label distributed in Texas by Du Pont, the manufacturers of Lannate. Cotton: Treatment, if needed, for bollworms or beet armyworms should be limited to the later cotton fields that are still lush and have more than five

1/3 grown squares per row foot. A lower percentage of bollworm eggs hatch this late in the season, so base treatment on damaged squares, bolls and the number of bollworms found. In almost all instances though, treatment this late in the season won't pay.

This will probably be the last cotton insect newsletter of the season. I have enjoyed it and hope that it has been helpful and informative to you, the producer. I will be starting a "home, garden and farm" insect newsletter which will be out shortly. Besides covering harmful

insects of the home and garden, I will be following the fall planted crops, such as wheat and report on the insect situation. If you or your neighbor would like to receive this newsletter, and have not gotten either a homeowner or cotton insect newsletter before, let us know and we'll put

Applications for emergency loans should be filed in the Farmers Home Administration County Office. Applications for physical and production losses will be accepted for 9 months from the effective date of September 16, 1980.

FmHA emergency loans are made to qualifying farmers who lack other sources of credit for loans to cover qualifying dam-

ages and/or losses to crops, property, machinery and equipment, etc., caused by the natural disaster.

58 Attend 4-H Meet On 1980 Organization

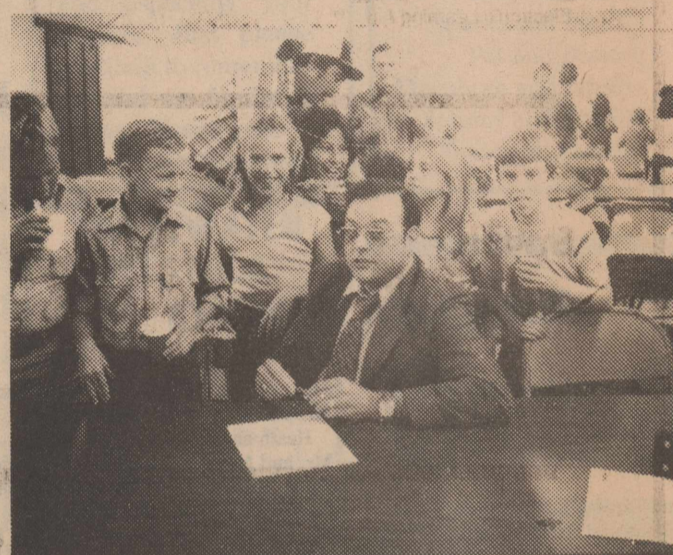

The James Cave ranch has an abundance of grass growing on it. Side Oats and KR Bluestem are three ft. in height. This the county has received good rainfall during September.

Fertilizing lawns now will boost fall growth and get them in shape for next spring. A fall application of fertilizer not only prolongs green color in lawns but also stimulates root growth, reduces winter injury and promotes early spring recovery. Fall fertilization also increases turf density and reduces weeds. Warm fall days and cool nights provide conditions favorable for grass to accumulate carbohydrates that promote root growth and help the grass survive winter months. Leaf growth is also less during the shorter fall days. Use a fertilizer high

in nitrogen and potassium and low in phosphorus. Both nitrogen and potassium are important to leaf growth and color and root

growth. Potassium is also important to winter survival, disease resistance and drought tolerance. While phosphorus is essential, it

is required in much lesser amounts than the other nutrients. 1-2# of nitrogen per 1000 square feet is recommended.

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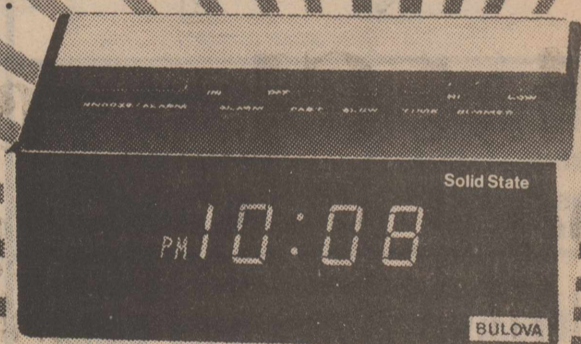
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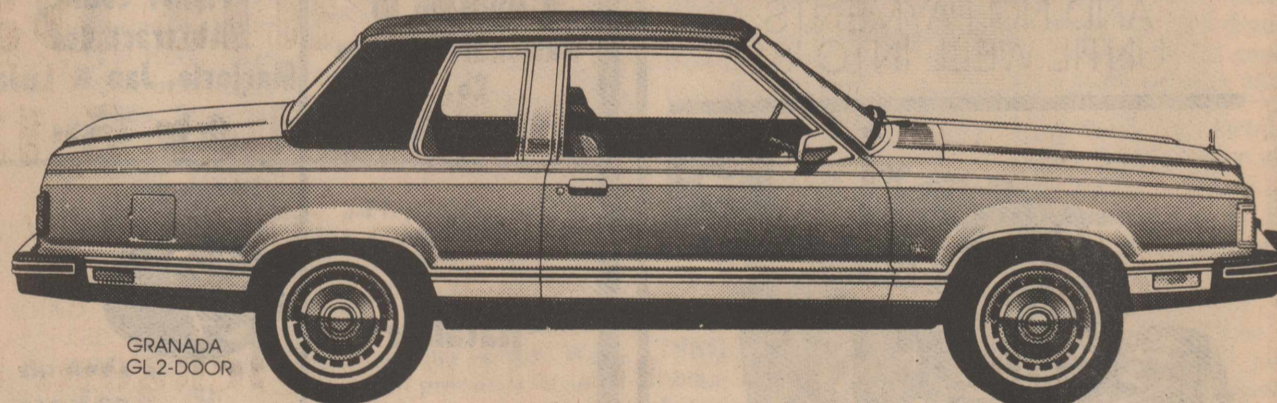
