

# Rotan Getting 14 New Television Channels

United Cable Television of Abilene made a presentation to the Rotan City Council last week and gained permission to erect a 120 ft. tower on the vacant lot south of the water tower in front of Callan Clinic that will ultimately give Rotan cable subscribers access to some 21 channels including the ever popular Home Box Office (HBO), according to Wayne Jamar, cable system assistant manager.

The move will involve the cable company constructing a tower, office building and equipment room for the cable equip-

ment on the lot south of the water tower.

In addition to the 7 channels now available that include Channel 2, local weather; KTXS Sweetwater Channel 4; KRBC Abilene Channel 5; KXTX Dallas Indep. Channel 8; KTAB Abilene Channel 10; KTVT Fort Worth Channel 11; and KERA (Public) Dallas Channel 13, local subscribers will have access to 14 other television channels.

Wayne Jamar indicated over the phone last Tuesday morning that 5 of the anticipated 14 new channels may be added in February of 1981. Those

could include the HBO station which will be a premium service that will carry an additional charge to subscribers. Jamar didn't have an estimate on the cost of the HBO, but did say that Sweetwater

subscribers pay \$10.95 a month for their service on HBO.

In addition to HBO, the offer will include WTBS of Atlanta, an independent station with movies and sports; WGN of Chicago,

an independent station; C-STAN, a legislative report station of Washington, D.C.; and USA, an independent sports station.

United Cable plans to offer additional "premium services" in March or

April that could include a 24-hour movie channel; Show Time, a movie, sports channel; BRAVO, an "R" rated movie channel; and Home Theatre Network, a movie channel. According to Jamar, these stations

would cost the subscriber additional money.

Jamar explained that whenever the new system is implemented each home will be equipped with a "Home Converter Box" that will hook up to the television with the second

part mobil, so television stations could be switched from an easy chair or coffee table. The new converter box would be kept on channel 3 allowing customers to push buttons from 2 to 22 for the new 21 channel selections.

## Hospital Skids To \$84,000 Loss, Clinic Gets Blame

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board were given a lesson in credit and balance figures last Monday night-one that won't be soon forgotten. At last month's meeting (September) the summary of operations sheet given directors each month reflected a year to date profit for the hospital of approximately \$12,000.00.

Last Monday night that figure went from \$12,000 in the black to \$87,000.00 in the red. Reason--new Fisher County Hospital Administrator Jerry Weatherly is determined to keep the board informed. He was of the opinion that the clinic operation expenses should be included in

the operating expenses of the hospital.

The doctors' expense (Dr. Simpao and Dr. Carandang) in the past has been kept in a separate set of books. Weatherly felt that the guarantee paid the doctors was an expense of the hospital and district and wanted it reflected accordingly.

Dr. Virgilio Carandang is guaranteed \$5,000 a month by the Fisher County Hospital District after expenses. During the month of September Dr. Carandang fell \$900.00 shy of having the \$5,000.00 so the Fisher County Hospital District paid the \$900.00, giving the doctor his guarantee of \$5,000.00. Year to date, since January 1, 1980, Dr. Carandang has been paid \$15,300 by the district to

make up his guaranteed \$5,000.00.

Dr. Vidal Simpao is guaranteed \$4,000 a month by the Fisher County Hospital District after expenses. During the month of September Dr. Simpao fell \$4,600.00 shy of having his guarantee and being able to pay his expenses. Year to date the Fisher County Hospital District has paid Dr. Simpao (since Jan. 1, 1980) a total of \$38,000.00.

In months past, these figures (the guarantee paid to the doctors) has not been appearing on the "Summary of Operations" sheet given board members. Weatherly, in his effort to keep the directors abreast of the financial operation of the district, felt the information should be a part of the monthly report.

The combined expenses for the two doctors have amounted to \$53,000.00 since January 1, 1980.

The actual loss from operations of the Fisher County Hospital for the

month of September amounted to \$31,567.96. The percent of occupancy for September was 44.6 compared to the year to date average of 55.5 percent and the average patients per day was down to 13.4 in September versus the year to date figure of 16.6 percent.

One reason for the \$31,567.96 loss from operations was the fact that three pay periods fell within September for hospital employees, according to Weatherly.

In other action the hospital board directors passed the following resolution concerning Dr. Simpao and Dr. Carandang alternating weeks serving

# Blood Is Needed

Fisher County residents have used a total of 157 units of blood since January 1, 1980 but have only donated 75 units of blood to the Red River Chapter of the American Red Cross for repayment.

The Fisher County Hospital entered into an agreement with the Red River Chapter of the American Red Cross in January calling for the chapter to supply Fisher County residents with blood when needed and calling for the residents of

Fisher County to donate blood as replacement.

According to Jerry Weatherly, Fisher County Hospital Administrator, the Red Cross Chapter has lived up to their contract. When blood is needed in Fisher County it is sent from Wichita Falls and usually arrives within two hours of the call for help. However, more donors are needed to repay blood used by Fisher County residents.

The Red River Chapter

of the American Red Cross does not charge any Fisher County resident for blood. The only cost involved, if blood is needed, is for the processing.

Fisher County residents will have an opportunity to donate blood to the Red River Chapter of the American Red Cross on Monday, October 27, between the hours of 11:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. at the Fisher County Hospital.

Giving blood is easy, according to information distributed by the Red

Cross. When blood is donated, less than a pint, it is replaced by the body quickly. It is easy to donate, the entire process usually takes less than an hour, less than 10 minutes for the actual donation.

You are eligible to give blood if you are age 17 through 65. If additional information is needed on donating blood, representatives of the Red Cross will be happy to answer questions on Monday, October 27.

a clinic in Jayton. The motion by Glen Copeland and seconded by Rudy Martinez read, "I move we send the Doctor on October 21st, then discontinue service to Jayton unless the commissioners are willing to pay the Fisher County Hospital District \$1,200.00 a month to help defray our costs". The motion passed 4-0.

The directors discussed the possibility of purchasing an underground gas tank and pump to attempt to cut the cost of gasoline for the ambulance. Gas for the ambulance during September amounted to \$517.00. Board member Kirit Terry is going to check into the cost of purchasing an underground tank and report back to the board during November.

The board approved the appointment of Dr. Paul LeRoux and Dr. Tom Aguilon to the staff of the Fisher County Hospital after a recommendation by the medical staff.

The board discussed signing the letter from the Fisher County Tax Appraisal District asking confirmation on participation in the taxing district. Last month the board balked on signing the letter.

Last Monday night Kirit Terry made a motion saying, "I move we sign the form and confirm participating in the district". His motion died for lack of a second.

A few moments later Raford Hargrove made a motion, seconded by Glen Copeland, as follows, "The board of directors of the Fisher County Hospital District confirms participation in the Fisher County Appraisal District and feels it would be in the best financial interest of all taxpayers if the re-appraisal is done through the present tax collector office, using existing county facilities and staff and existing county and hospital valuations as a basis for the re-evaluation". The motion passed 3-0 with Board member Kirit Terry abstaining.

In final action the board discussed five items that will be discussed at the November board meeting. They include (a) Contract renewals for Simpao and Dr. Carandang, (b) heating and cooling, (c) insurance-hospitalization, (d) ambulance gas expense, and (d) electing directors by precincts vs. at large.

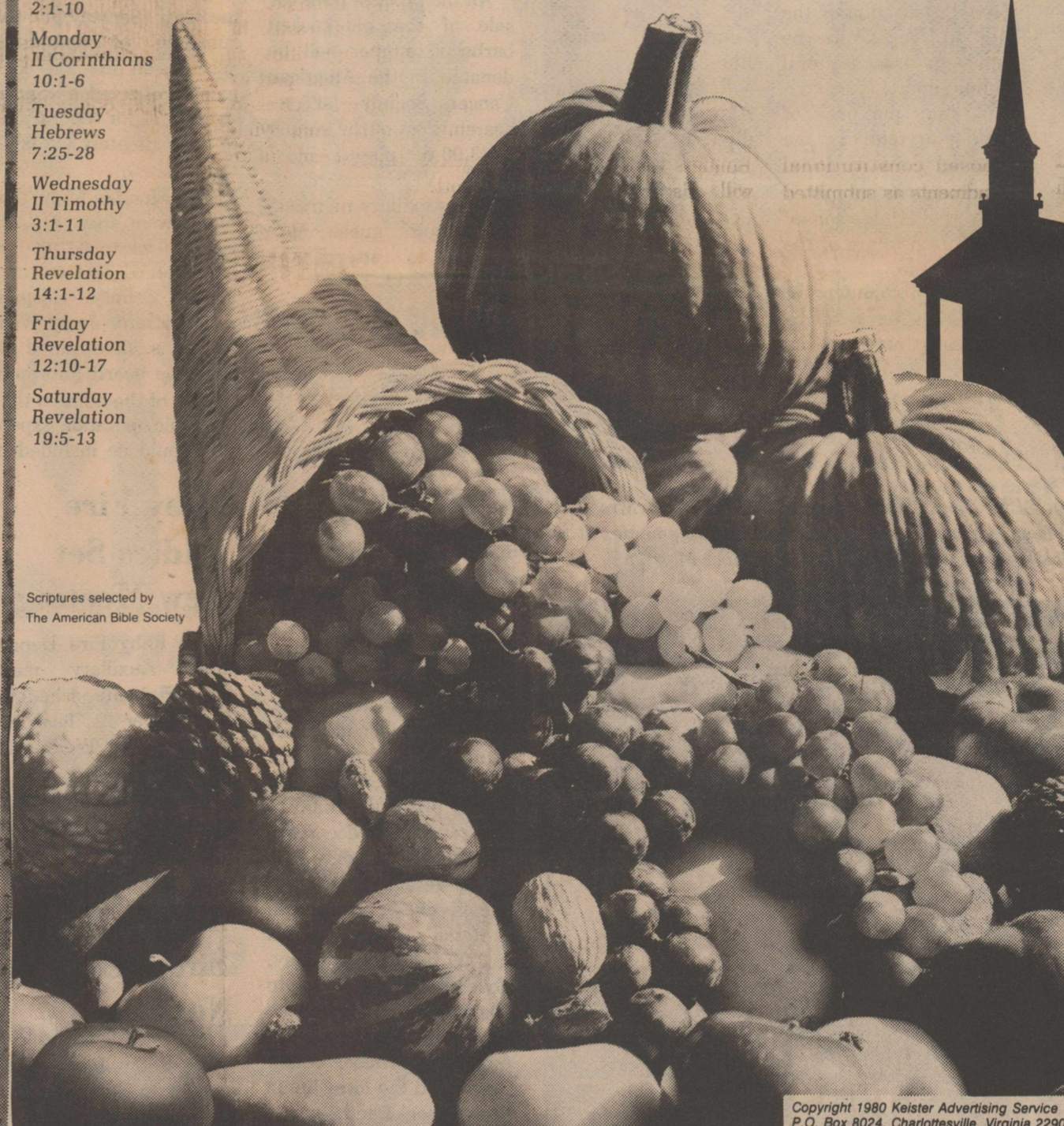

Pack told the council that the department has been swamped with calls on livestock, especially hogs, running loose within the city limits. The council

has informed Pack to comply with the written ordinance (re-printed in another part of this paper) that calls for a personal inspection of the pens, livestock permits and fines for people in non-compliance of the ordinance.

City Secretary Vann reported to the council that some new sewer lines had been installed on Roby Ave. area to serve two families and that two additional families were to be given sewer service next month. Vann also indicated that the city had to repair a large section of sewer pipe in the area of South Lincoln that was damaged during the hot weather.

The City Secretary reported that two new employees had been hired, Jackie Gentry and Jeremiah Williams in the garbage department and that Ru-

ben Martinez and Santos Almanza had both returned to work after being injured.

In final action the council heard a report by Mayor Lester Secil on the financial condition of the

Rotan Community Center. According to the report, the Community Center had an income of \$287.15 for September with expenses of \$731.02 for an operating deficit of \$443.87.

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# Rotan Livestock Ordinance

An Ordinance Making it Unlawful to Keep Livestock or Poultry Within The City of Rotan, Texas, Without a License; Providing Regulations for Keeping Livestock or Poultry; Prescribing Procedures for Granting and Revoking Licenses; Providing for Inspections; Defining the Term Livestock and Poultry; Prescribing Penalties; Providing Separability of Sections; and Providing That Such Ordinance Shall Become Effective Thirty Days After Its Passage.

Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City Of Rotan, Texas:

Section 1. The term "livestock" as used herein shall be construed to mean any horse, mule, jack, jenny, cow, cattle, hog, sheep, goat, rabbit, or guinea pig; and the term "poultry" shall be construed to mean chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, and guineas.

Section 1 A. That the term "person", as used herein shall be construed to include both singular and plural and shall mean and embrace an individual, corporation, association, partnership, or society, and their agents, servants and employees.

Section 2. No person shall keep livestock or poultry within the city limits of the City of Rotan, Texas, without first obtaining and thereafter keeping in force a license permitting him to do so.

Section 3. License shall be granted or allowed to remain in force a license permitting him to do so.

Section 3. License shall be granted or allowed to remain in force only when regulations as follows are observed:

A. The Livestock or poultry shall be kept within structures or enclosures and not be permitted to run at large.

B. To prevent the same from serving as breeding places for insects and from emitting noxious odors, the manure or dung incident to the maintenance and care of the livestock or poultry shall be removed from structure in a reasonable time not to cause a health menace. The manure or dung, so collected shall either be placed in containers or disposed of so as not to cause unnecessary odors or flies.

C. The structure or enclosure within which any such livestock or poultry are confined shall not be less than 75 feet from any dwelling house.

Section 4. The procedure and requirements for the granting and keeping in force of licenses shall be as follows:

A. Any person desiring a license permitting him to keep livestock or poultry within the city limits shall file an application with the City Clerk on a form provided by him for that purpose. Said application shall among other things call for the name and address of the applicant, the estimated average number and types of livestock or poultry to be kept, and description of the structures and facilities to be used for the enclosure of the livestock or poultry and for the disposal of the manure and debris incident to their maintenance and care and the distance to the adjacent residence from the outside boundaries of the structure or fence in which the livestock or poultry are to be enclosed.

B. The application shall be accompanied by a fee of the amount of (\$1.00) one dollar. The funds derived from such application fees shall be used by the City to defray the cost of inspections and

other expenses incident to the enforcement of this ordinance.

C. When an application has been filed in due form, the City shall turn the same over to the City Health Officer who shall inspect the facilities wherein the livestock or poultry is to be kept and prepare an opinion as to whether the same are in compliance with the regulations herein before provided.

D. The application with the opinion of the City Health Officer attached shall be submitted to the City Council, which shall then pass on the application.

E. The City Health Officer may periodically on his own initiative and shall upon complaint of the City Marshal or any resident of the City make an inspection to ascertain whether the regulations as hereinbefore provided are being observed. If he finds that aforesaid regulations are violated, he shall prepare and file a statement to that effect with the City Clerk. The City Council shall then give ten (10) days notice by publication of hearing. If after a hearing the City Council finds the aforesaid regulations have been violated, it shall then order the permit cancelled.

Section 5. Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars. Each day that such violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6. If any section of this ordinance is found to be unenforceable, the same shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections.

Section 7. The City Clerk is hereby directed to make publication of the

caption of this ordinance together the penalty provision hereof as required by law; and it is hereby further ordained that this ordinance shall become effective thirty days after its passage.

## WTC Offering Class In Cycle Repair

A 200-hour Motorcycle Mechanics Course began Oct. 20 at Western Texas College.

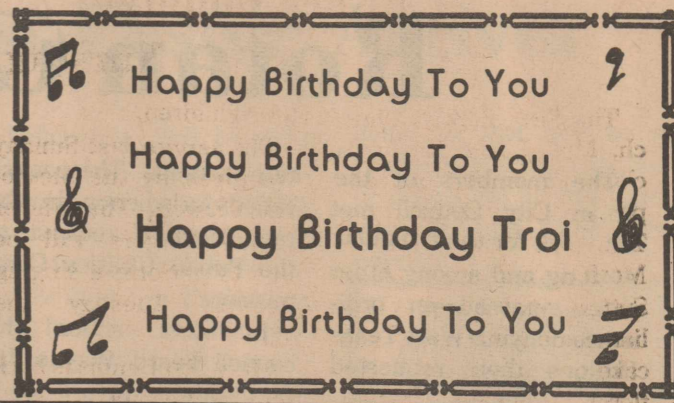

# Yellowhammers Out-Muscle Hawley, Six Players Score Points

The Rotan Yellowhammers, before a capacity crowd for Homecoming, increased their season record to 5-1 as they defeated the winless Hawley Bearcats by a score of 48-0 last Friday night.

A total of 6 Yellowhammers worked their way into the "points scored" column with Byron Weathersbee and Kieth Mullins scoring 2 touchdowns. Eli Turner and Keith Blair each had single scores while Greg Hayes and a touchdown pass and 4 extra points. Ruben Cabrera picked up two points

in the extra point category. The Yellowhammers dominated the statistics with 402 yards rushing to 22 for Hawley and 102 yards passing to only 44 for the Bearcats. Weathersbee was 6 of 12 passing while the Hawley signal caller was 4 of 18. Rotan had 29 first downs to only 7 for Hawley.

Rotan took the opening kick off from Hawley, rolled up two quick first downs then a fumble in the backfield ended the drive at the Hawley 21 yard line.

Jeff Posey, Willie Hayes and David Underhill team-

ed up to stop Hawley after three runs at the line of scrimmage forcing a 4th down punt.

Rotan took over at their own 30 yard line with Kieth Mullins picking up 9 yards and Mark Harris picking up 6 yards before the Hammers were forced to punt. Greg Hayes boomed a punt deep to Hawley that was fumbled and consequently recovered by Mullins, but an illegal procedure forced a second punt by Hayes.

The Yellowhammers drove 78 yards for their first score of the night with Mullins, Harris and Weathersbee picking up ground yardage and David Thornton and Kieth Mullins snagging passes. Weathersbee scored from 5 yards out with 35 seconds left in the first

quarter. Greg Hayes kicked the extra point.

Rotan drove 88 yard for their second score that was a 16 yard pass from Weathersbee to Greg Hayes. Hayes came back to kick the extra point, giving Rotan a 14-0 lead.







The person that said this did not play Thursday or Friday. Our JV played one of the hardest hitting games Thursday you would ever want to witness and our varsity continued the effort Friday night. Coach Reeves said after the game he was glad that they didn't have any more games with Rotan this year.

We didn't get anyone hurt on the varsity, but lost Junior Miranda on the JV with a cracked ankle. He will be out 2 or 3 weeks. Defensive standouts for the Hammers were Dion Sepeda, Nick Saucedo, Herman Lopez and Paul Zambrano.

Sew with stretch woven fabrics to make active sportswear—as well as tailored garments.

They're durable and flexible—and easy to sew. Just follow a few guidelines.

When laying out the pattern, make sure the fabric is flat with no part

hanging off the cutting surface. Place the pattern pieces so that the stretch is going in the right direction.

Avoid stretching the fabric during cutting to prevent distorting the garment.

When stitching, use a polyester thread, because

it has the stretchability and strength needed. A sharp needle or ballpoint needle in size 14 is recommended with 12-13 stitches per inch.

Use a slightly loose tension and light pressure on the presser foot. Use a straight stitch, stretch stitch, tiny zig-zag or an

overcast stitch that stitches seam and overcasts at the same time.

To finish the seam with a straight stitch machine, stitch one-eighth inch from the seam through both seam allowances and trim close to stitching. With a zig-zag machine, double stitch with zig-zag stitch.

Use an interfacing that has built-in stretch where the stretch of the fabric is to be maintained. Use conventional interfacing where stability is needed.

Machine-made buttonholes will function better if they are placed in the opposite direction of the stretch of fabric.

Topstitching is an excellent trim to get the seam allowances to lie flat. Try a longer stitch for topstitching—about nine stitches per inch.

When pressing, use brown paper strips under seam allowances and darts to prevent impressions from showing on the right side.

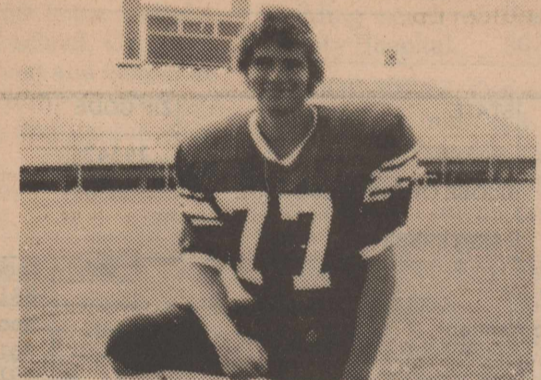

Dying to color a fabric? Hot-water dyes produce the richest colors and have the best colorfastness, says a clothing specialist on the staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. On the other hand, cold-water dyes produce delicate colors, but they aren't as resistant to fading, she says.

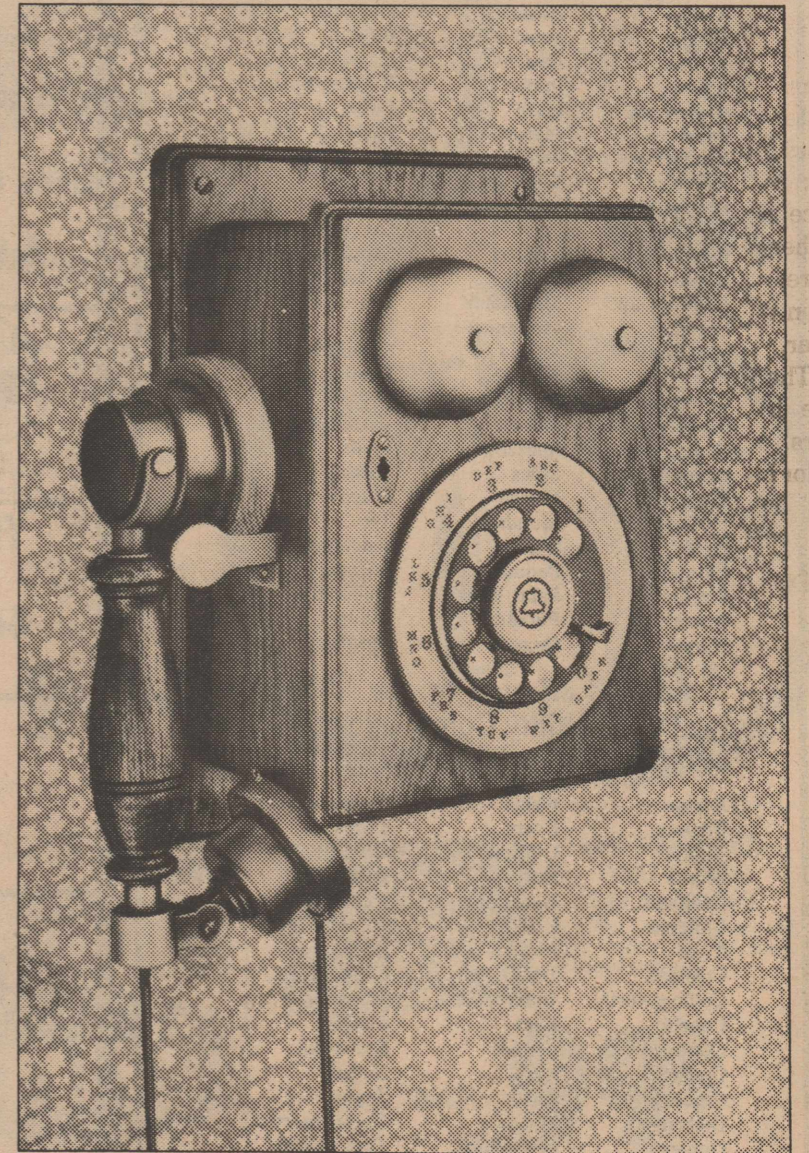

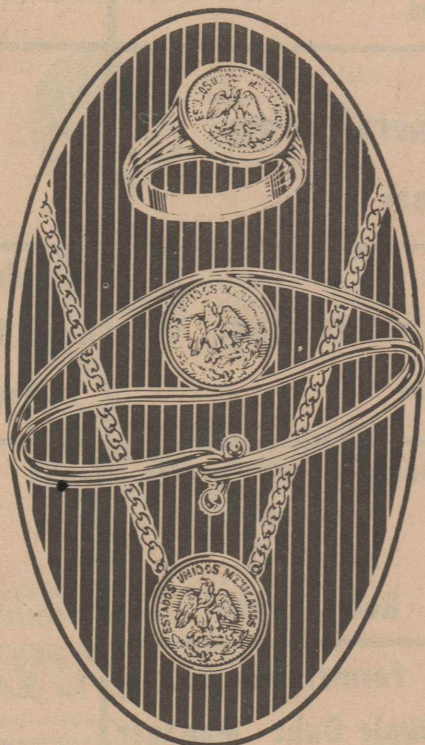

# Roby Students Involved In Job Study

Students in the senior class at Roby High School are involved this week in activities designed to assist them in job seeking and job retention. The program is especially designed to assist students as they enter the job market skills for securing the very best job they can get with what they have to offer an employer. The program, known as Building Employability Skills in Teenagers (BEST), is conducted two hours a day for five days, and emphasizes the concept of learning by doing. Activities are developed to make the experience as realistic as

possible and as close to the real working world as can be done in the classroom. On the first day of the program, students are organized into working crews with foremen selected to "boss" each crew. To increase realism, students punch a time clock

each day and those clocking the full ten hours will be awarded a certificate of achievement on Friday. The second day is devoted to leading the students to take a closer look at themselves and their interests and goals. The third day covers

communicating with others and "selling" themselves to the employer on the day of the interview. The fourth day is devoted to developing skills in decision making, especially those employed in career selection. The final activity on the fifth day is a

"role played" interview with a real employer from the community, with each working crew entering an applicant contestant for the job. The employer then selects the best applicant based on his completed application form and personal interview. These

interviews are video taped and played back to the students. At the end of the 10 hour block, Certificates of Achievement will be presented to successful students by Jimmie Laurie, superintendent of schools. This program is sponsored jointly by the

Vocational Agriculture and Homemaking departments in the school with the assistance of the school counselor. People sponsoring the program at Roby High School are Gary Daniel, vocational agriculture teacher, Barbara Martin homemaking teacher and Patsy Hamric, school counselor.

The program was developed by Larry Dooley of Region 14 Education Service Center. Mr. Dooley and personnel from the ESC, assisted by the local school people, make the daily presentation.

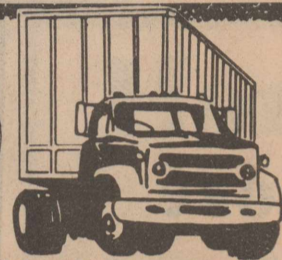
