

Roby Lions Clinch Zone Championship

The Roby Lions played in the toughest football game of the season, up to this point, and defeated the Roscoe Plowboys 14-12. Even the students and fans of the Roby Lions have been heard to say they worked as hard cheering as the players did playing.

Both the offense and defense teams did an excellent job in maintaining ball control. The Roscoe Plowboys had the football for more first downs, and rushing yardage, but the Roby Lions had more yardage passing and that is the story of the game. The Lions' aerial attack was more than the Plowboys could handle.

The first scoring of the night came when the Plowboys' junior quarterback, Mark Denman, scored on a running play of 6

yds. up the middle. The PAT was no good, as the Plowboys tried for the 2 point conversion. The score with 1:29 in the first quarter was Lions 0, Plowboys 6.

The first scoring of the night for the Roby Lions was setup by a fumble recovery by Carlos Rivas, senior tackle, on the Plowboys' 41 yd. line. Two plays later a pass play from quarterback Robbie King to tailback Walter Cave was good for 39½ yards and the TD. The PAT by Kenny Martin was good, making the score Lions 7, Plowboys 6, with 10:16 left in the 2nd quarter.

The second scoring drive developed with a pass play from Robbie King to Walter Cave for 25½ yards into the end zone, which after the catch was

fumbled and the fumble recovered by senior tight-end Dan Etheredge. The PAT by Kenny Martin was, making the score Lions 14, Plowboys 6 with 1:17 left in the 3rd quarter.

The last scoring of the night came as the Plowboy junior half back, Zhan Aljoe, scored on a running play of 3½ yards on a right end sweep. The 2 point PAT was no good, making the score, Lions 14-Plowboys 12 with 6:58 left in the 4th quarter.

The final threat of the night for the Plowboys was stopped on a fine play by senior tackle John Morgeson on the Plowboy quarterback who was caught 15 yards behind the line of scrimmage. This caused a fumble which was recovered by Leonard Hernandez. From this point the Lions were

content to let the clock run out.

Roby had 7 first downs to 18 for Roscoe and the Lions had 194 passing yards to 22 for Roscoe. Roscoe rushed for 273 yards compared to 32 for Roby.
