The Fisher County Junior Livestock Show and Sale was held January 9-10 at the Fairgrounds in Roby, according to Richard Spencer County Agent.

The Grand Champion Barrow was a 245 pound Crossbred owned by Mike Walker of Longworth. The barrow sold for \$500 to Longworth Gin. The breeder of the champion

was Mike's father, Thomas E. Walker. The Reserve Champion, the 2nd place heavyweight barrow was another Crossbred owned by Kip Pease of Rotan. The barrow was bred by

Garland Marth of Roscoe and sold for \$400 to the Farmers Union Coop Gin of Roby. Both Mike and Kip are Fisher County 4-H members. In the Lamb Show, Tisa

Lovett of Roby showed both the Champion Finewool and Mediumwool Lambs, both lambs were heavyweights. The Champion Finewool Crossbred was shown by Ricky Spencer of Roby, the lamb was bred by Wayne Harris of Rotan. The Champion Southdown was shown by Russell Smith of Rotan. Ricky and Tisa are 4-H members while Russell shows for the Rotan FFA. Farmers Gin Co. of Rotan purchased the Champion Crossbred for \$375. The other 3 champions brought \$350 and were purchased by Sylvester Coop Gin, First National Bank of

Rotan, and Rotan Gin Co. Kerrie Upshaw of Roby exhibited the Grand Champion Heifer. The Senior Yearling Angus heifer was purchased from the Heyser Heifer Sale in Ciscoe as was the Reserve Champion. Shad Rasco, also of Roby, showed the Reserve Champion Heifer, also an Angus. Both Kerrie and Shad are Fisher County 4-H members.

The Grand Champion Steer was shown by Shauna Bell of McCaulley. The steer, a 1055 pound Chiniana-Angus Cross, was bred by DeRusha and Carter of Abilene. Todd Etheredge of the Hobbs


community showed the Reserve Champion Steer. The steer, a Main Anjou-Chiniana Cross weighed 1120 pounds and was purchased from Peyton Scott of Rising Star. Shauna and Todd showed for Fisher County 4-H. The Grand Champion steer sold for \$1550 to Jim Wilburn of Roby. The Reserve sold for \$1100 to Citizens State Bank of Roby.

Only one pen of 3 small animals were sold at the sale. That was the Pen of 3 Fryer Rabbits owned by 4-H Member John Everett of Roby. They sold for \$375 to T.C. Jenkins, Kyle Moore and Bob

Moore, all of Roby. The rabbits were sold again at the conclusion of the sale for the Rehab Center and netted over \$800 for crippled children.

The two high buyers at the sale were Jim Wilburn of Roby and National Gypsum of Rotan. Other large volume buyers included First National Bank of Rotan, Farm Tractor and Service of Rotan, Nowlin Farm Supply and Stan Nowlin of Rotan, Terry Gin of Roby, Pied Piper Mills of Hamlin, McCaulley Exploration & Development Co., and DeRusha and Carter of Abilene.

Roby School Board Discusses New Gym

The members of the Roby School Board extended Superintendent Jimmie Laurie's contract, voted to install the National Honor Society program, and appointed the election judges and clerks for the April 4th school board election at their meeting last Monday night.

One of the main items discussed by the board last Monday was the possible construction of a new gymnasium at Roby. Superintendent Laurie indicated that the board is going to look into the

possibility of constructing a new gym. "We're going to see what it will cost, etc.," said Laurie. Additional information is expected to be brought before the board in February.

Board members issued Laurie a contract through the 1983-84 year, giving him three full years remaining on his contract with the school as superintendent.

The board voted to appoint Rose Moore as the election judge for the April 4th school board election. Juanita Gaona, Grace

Doyle and Glenna Gene Moore were named as clerks. Fisher County Judge Marshal Bennett was named as the absentee judge. Roy and Helen Noles were appointed by the board to head a committee to secure candidates to run for school board positions. The board terms of John Matthies and Judy Mauldin expire this year. Jerry Hoodenpyle is currently filling the unexpired term of Leonard Mitchell and June Wright is filling the unexpired term of Latham Burk. They will both have to file

for full terms to be voted on by the district residents in April if they wish to remain on the board.

The board voted to install the National Honor Society into the Roby School system, using honor society guidelines. Students qualifying for recognition in the honor society will be notified at the end of the fall semester, according to Laurie.

In final action the board approved sending Coach Jerry Hahn to a two day sports symposium on athletic injuries in San Antonio on March 5 and 6.

Rotan Board Passes Teacher Bonus Plan

The members of the Rotan School Board took a giant step toward quality education for local students last Monday night when they voted to install a Teacher Compensation Plan (bonus) for all teachers. Tied into the bonus plan package that was approved, was a provision calling for the school to pay all high school and junior high math and science teachers a \$500.00 yearly bonus above state scale.

The employee compensation plan approved by the Rotan School Board, by a vote of 6-1, and recommended by Superintendent Tom Harkey, contains two phases. Phase one, is to compensate employees only (not families) for insurance premiums that they have been paying in previous years. The 55 or so employees currently on the payroll that take part in the insurance program pay \$29.62 a month or \$355.44 a year for their coverage. Effective at the beginning of the 1981-82 school year, employees will have their insurance paid for by the school district. Phase two of the new plan calls for all high school and junior high math and science teachers to receive a \$500.00 a year bonus above state scale.

This package compensation plan was passed by the Rotan School Board

last Monday night by a vote of 6-1. Voting in favor of the plan were: Allan Houston, Leo Long, Wayne Harris, Ernest Ragan, Roger Blackwelder and James. Carter. Voting against the plan was Donald Gruben.

In other action, the board approved (7-0) a new plan to reimburse Superintendent Tom Harkey for travel allowances. In the past, the board has approved a plan to pay Harkey a flat monthly

Commissioners Approve 1981 Holiday Schedule

The members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court established the county employee holiday schedule last Monday morning and appointed a three member grievance committee during the regular monthly meeting.

The Commissioners approved a holiday schedule calling for 11 non-working days over a holiday period of 8 days. The holidays include (1981) New Year's Day and Jan. 2; Good Friday on April 17; Memorial Day on May 25; Independence Day on July 3; Labor Day on November 11; Thanksgiving, Nov. 26 and 27; and Christmas, Dec. 24 and 25.

The Commissioners named the following three

people to a grievance committee: Gary Finley, Mrs. Foy Mitchell and Mrs. E.M. O'Donnell. The two alternates named include H.T. Neves and John Edmondson.

The members of the court discussed the construction of the Fisher County Senior Citizen's Center. In the meeting it was decided that all Commissioners would spend Friday, January 16, putting a 3 to 4 inch gravel top over dirt that surrounds the center. The commissioners also discussed water to the center, a septic tank, butane and discussed the floor.

Jay Hendon made a motion, seconded by Billy Henderson, to keep all

Fisher County officials on a salary basis for 1981. This motion was in compliance with a request from Austin.

The Commissioners voted to leave the Fisher County Airport Hangar rent at \$30.00 a month. "We're way out of line—we're cheap", said Commissioner Henderson, but after some discussion all members voted to leave the 1981 rent at \$30.00 a month. It is expected that the court will review area hangars and compare charges for 1982.

In final action Commissioner W.A. Cross received permission to use revenue sharing funds to construct a porch on the Longworth Community

Center building. The approximate cost is \$1,200.00.

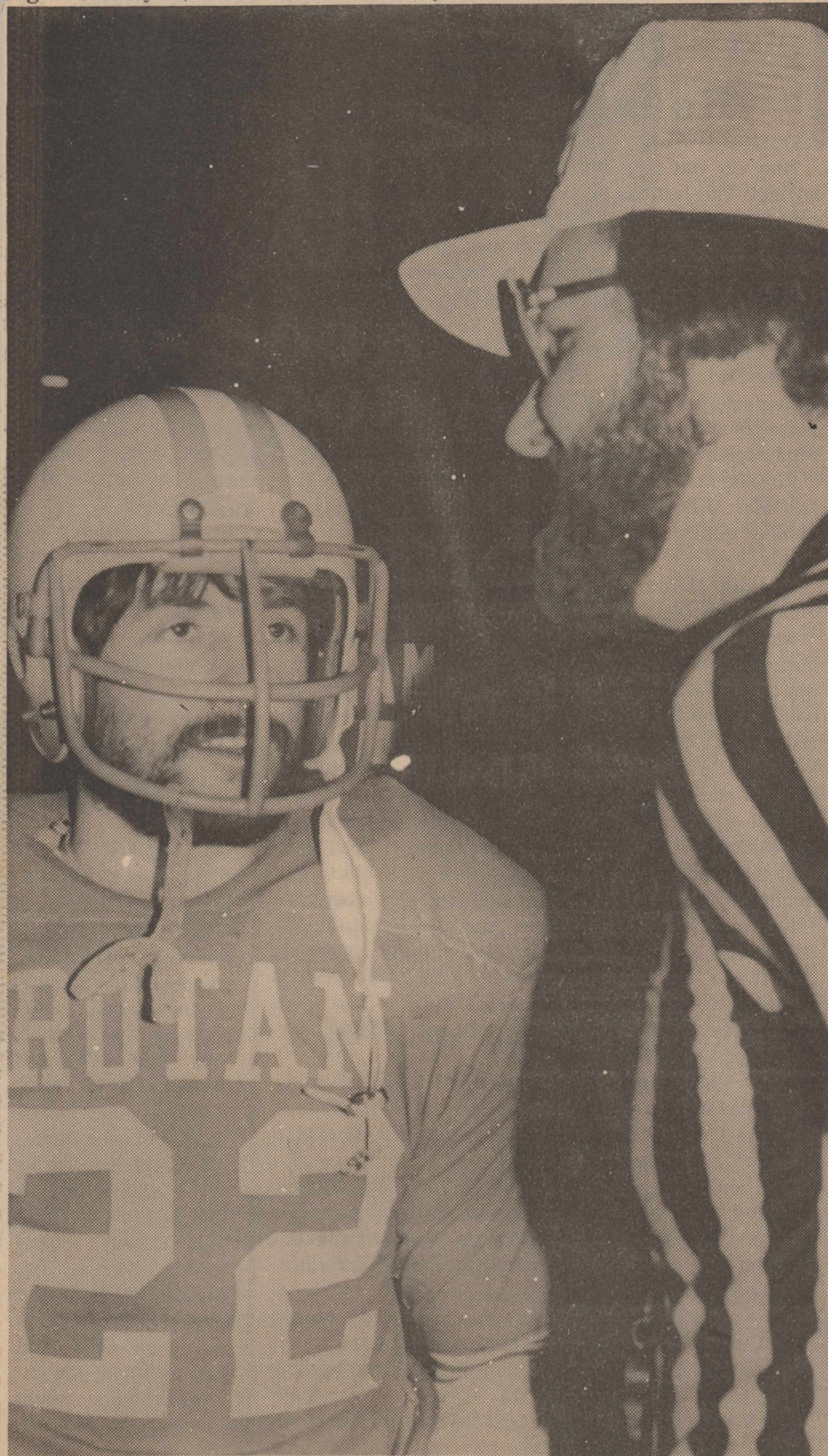

McCaulley Kids Prepare For Life Employment

Students in junior and senior classes at McCaulley High School are involved this week in activities designed to assist them in job seeking and job retention. The program is especially designed to assist students as they enter the job market skills for securing the very best job they can get with

what they have to offer an employer. The program, known as Building Employability Skills in Teenagers (BEST), is conducted two hours a day for five days, and emphasizes the concept of learning by doing. Activities are developed to make the experience as realistic as possible and as close to the

real working world as can be done in the classroom. On the first day of the program, students are organized into working crews with foremen selected to "boss" each crew. To increase realism, students punch a time clock each day and those clocking the full ten hours will be awarded a certifi-

cate of achievement on Friday. The second day is devoted to leading the students to take a closer look at themselves and their interests and goals. The third day covers communicating with others and "selling" themselves to the employer on the day of the interview. The fourth day is devoted to developing skills in decision making, especially those employed in career selection.

The final activity on the fifth day is a "role played" interview with a real

employer from the community, with each working crew entering an applicant contestant for the job. The employer then selects the best applicant based on his completed application form and personal interview. These interviews are video taped and played back to the students. At the end of the 10 hour block, Certificates of Achievement will be presented to successful students by J.D. Hargrove, Superintendent of Schools. This program is sponsored jointly by the Vocational

Agriculture and Homemaking departments in the school with the assistance of the school counselor. People sponsoring the program at McCaulley High School are Norman Pond, vocational agriculture teacher, Edna Hines Thompson, homemaking teacher, and Patsy Hamric, school counselor.

The program was developed by Larry Doole of Region 14 education Service Center. Mr. Dooley and personnel from ESC, assisted by the local school people, make the daily presentations.

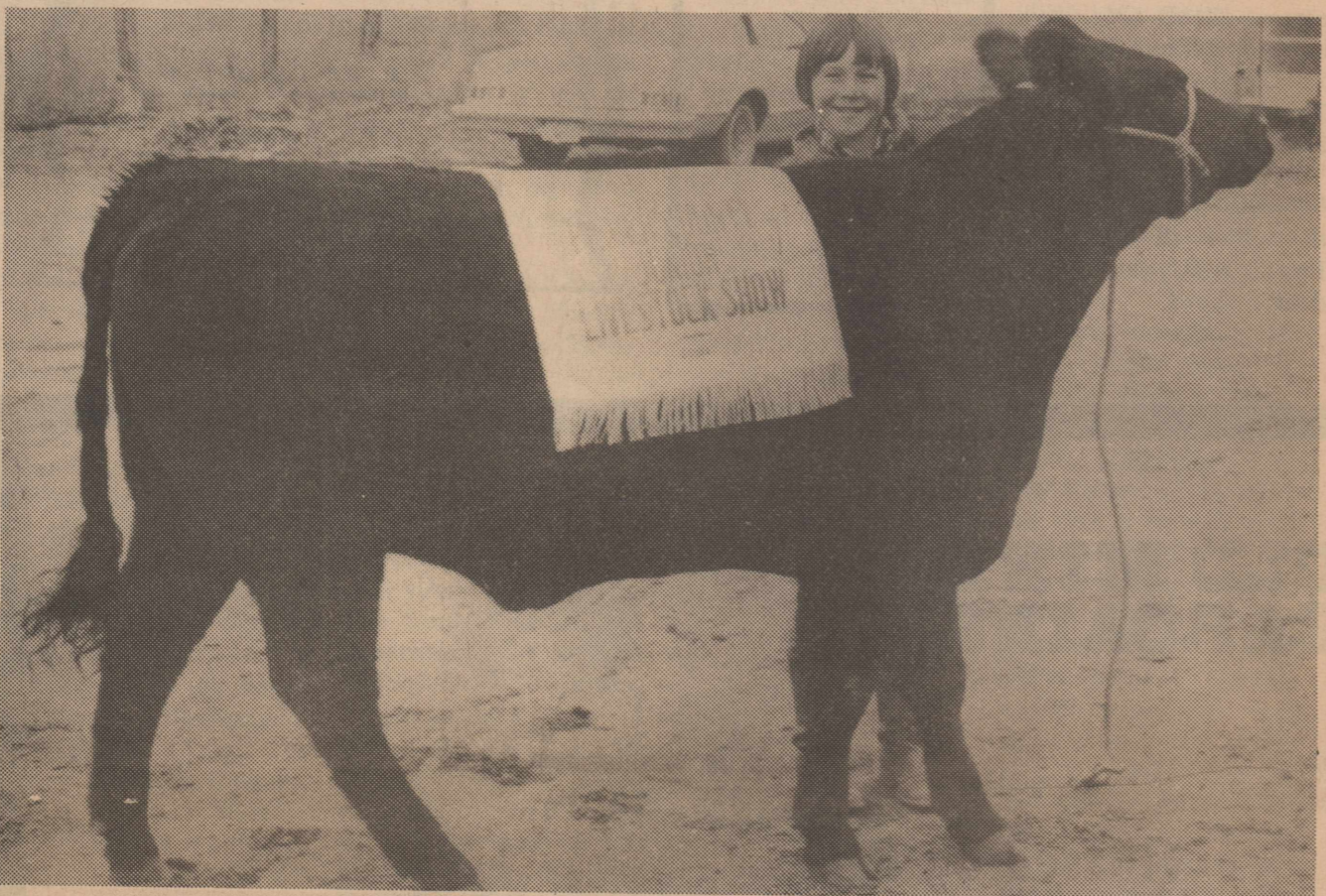

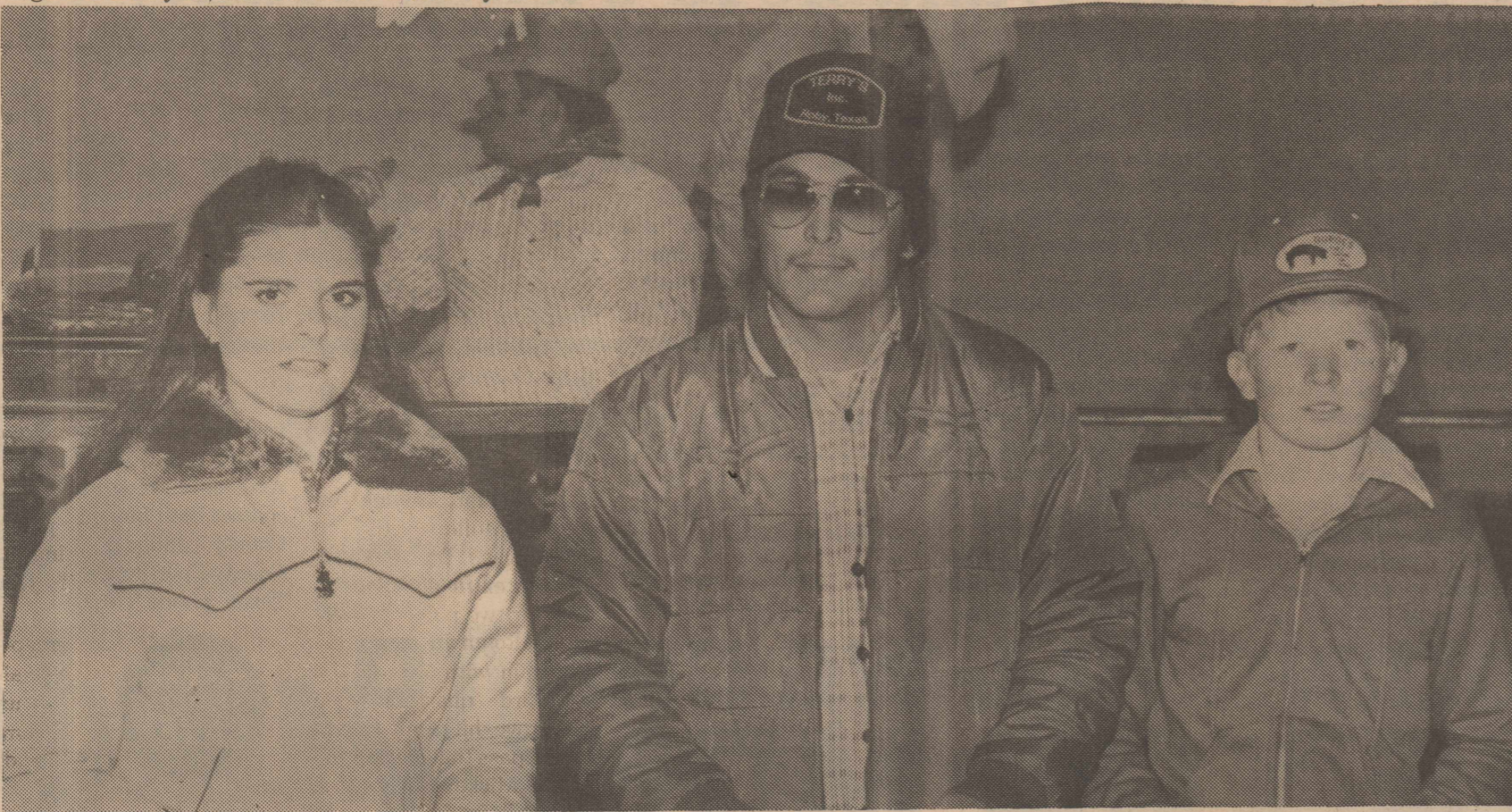

Energy Assistance Program (HEAP). The program is designed to assist low income households in meeting the increased cost of energy for heating and cooling their homes. It is federally funded through the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). In Texas, the program is administered by the Department of Human Resources (TDHR).

There are two primary eligibility requirements for the heating assistance element of the program:

1. the household must

have energy costs that are subject to increases; and 2. the household must have both low income and low resources (an income chart is attached).

In Texas, several hundred thousand households meet these requirements. The Department expects to make payments to approximately 600,000 households.

Payments will begin in January and continue through March, 1981. Most households which receive January benefits from the Aid to Families with Dependent Children

Program (AFDC), the Supplemental Security Insurance Program (SSI) or the Food Stamp Program will also receive a check in January from the Home Energy Assistance Program. These households have already had their incomes verified, and their addresses are on a TDHR computer file. Payments to these households will number roughly 400,000.

Each county in Texas will have a location from which applications may be picked up and delivered. The eligibility process will be handled, in many

counties, by county governments, community action agencies (CAA) and councils of government (COG). All other counties will be handled directly by TDHR local staff.

Public information efforts will be focused primarily on community service agencies, church groups, schools, and organizations which serve the elderly, handicapped, migrant and young children.

Once an applicant household has been certified for a HEAP payment,

the local eligibility determination office will notify TDHR in Austin, where the household will be checked to assure that no duplicate payments are made. If the certified household has not received an earlier HEAP payment, a state warrant will be prepared and mailed directly to the certified household. The household should receive its payments within 20-30 days from the date of certification.

All applicants have the right to a timely determi-

nation of eligibility (within 30 days of application); courteous service; reasonable assistance in completing the application; a review of any decision and, if necessary, a formal hearing; and confidential treatment of all information required for eligibility determination.
