Hospital District Pays Big Share Of Appraisal Budget

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board met with the members of the Fisher County Appraisal Board last Monday night in an attempt to get some answers to questions that have irritated hospital board members for several months.

The hospital board makes it a point to let appraisal district board members know that they are the second largest financial supporting entity of the 8 members to the appraisal district. They also have a difficult time finding justification in the fact that they are not represented with membership on the board.

Of the eight members of the appraisal district, the Fisher County Hospital Board is responsible for paying 23.30% of the total budget of the Appraisal District. This amounts to \$32,154.00. The Rotan School is the largest

financial supporter of the Appraisal District. It pays 25.09% of the total budget of \$141,367.00 and is represented on the board by Dick Edwards.

The Hobbs School is in 4th position with 11.73% of the budget and is represented by Dennis Dooley. The McCaulley School is responsible for 10.99% of the budget and is represented on the appraisal board by Jerry Jeffrey.

The Rotan Water District, like the hospital district, is without representation but it's financial obligation to the district is only 2.79% of the budget. The smallest contributor is the City of Roby, responsible for 1.67% of the budget. The City of Roby and Roby School are represented on the board by Kyle Moore. The City of Rotan is ranked 6th with a responsibility of 6.86% of the budget and is represented by Robert

Doyle.

One hospital board member indicated that he felt the hospital district was spending \$32,000.00 to help establish an appraisal office but could not see any benefit from the expenditure.

Appraisal District Chairman Kyle Moore explained

Rotan Board Re-Hires All Coaches

The members of the Rotan School Board extended a contract to all five Rotan coaches last week at their regular board meeting.

Head Football Coach Don Mullins was offered a contract for the 1981-82 school year at a salary of \$3,500 above state scale. This figure represents an increase of \$500.00 over what he drew as head coach for the 1980-81 year. All board members voted in favor of offering Mullins a contract with the exception of Board President Allan Houston.

Head girls basketball coach John Blair was offered a contract for the 1981-82 year at an above state payment of \$3,300 which represents an increase of \$300.00 over this year. All board members voted in favor of extending the contract.

Head boys basketball coach R.L. Coates was offered a contract by the board at \$3,000 above state scale. This represents the same above base payment that was received in 1980-81. All board members voted in favor of the contract.

Head track coach Ted Posey was offered a contract by the board at \$3,000 above state scale. This represents the same above base payment that was received in 1980-81. All board members voted in favor of the contract.

Junior High Coach Doyle Walker was offered a contract by the board at \$2,000 above state scale. This represented the same above base payment that was received in 1980-81. All board members voted in favor of the contract.

ed that his committee was just attempting to do the job they were appointed to perform. They were not attempting to "set up a big bank account" further explaining that the \$141,000 budget for the initial year included funds for Pritchett and Abbott (appraisal service) \$40,000.00; funds for a computer and approximately \$12,000.00 in one time office supply expenditures.

The appraisal board members also gave an audience to Rotan Mayor Les Sescil at last Monday's meeting. Sescil was interested in attempting to ascertain if the appraisal district was going to set valuations for 1982 or if it planned to set values as well as collect taxes.

Moore indicated that the appraisal district would like to collect as well as assess, in fact "all schools" wanted the appraisal district to collect taxes", according to Moore.

Hospital Board member Raford Hargrove wanted to know if the appraisal district intended to use the farm and ranch valuations established recently by the re-evaluation of county property by the county and hospital board. He was assured that the figures were going to be the basis for establishing those specific values.

Later in the meeting Hargrove asked the appraisal district if they would be willing to give some financial credit to the hospital district for the figures since they were paid for by the hospital district and county.

March 31 Set As Deadline For Program

A March 31 deadline has been set for area farmers planning to participate in the Federal Crop Insurance program sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

According to FCIC district director Larry Hollar, the deadline will apply to cotton producers in Andrews, Borden, Dawson, Fisher, Gaines, Howard, Martin, Mitchell, Nolan and Scurry counties. And to cotton and grain sorghum producers in Jones and Taylor counties.

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is a voluntary participation program designed to protect a producer's annual crop investment. Coverage is provided against such risks as hail, drought, insects and disease.

Information about the program can be obtained from any private insurance agent handling the program or the FCIC office in Lubbock.

Young tomato and pepper plants usually wilt to some degree soon after being transplanted into the garden. Imagine the shock to a tender tomato plant that began life in a warm humid greenhouse, when it is suddenly uprooted from a pleasant environment, planted in a cold soil, buffeted by strong, dry, west wind all afternoon and "treated" to 12 hours of temperatures ranging from 40 to 50 degrees.

It is no wonder that its stem turns purple, its leaves droop and it gets that ragged look. This plant may take weeks to recover and begin to grow again.

Next to a spring frost, wind is the worst enemy of young vegetables, especially tomatoes and peppers. Contrary to popular belief, the tomato plant cannot be hardened to cold or to wind desiccation. So, it makes sense to give it all the protection that you can until the weather calms down.

There are many ways to protect transplants and seedlings from the wind and cold. Hot caps are reinforced waxed paper domes which are set over young plants or newly seeded crops like squash and melons and anchored down with soil around the edges. You must cut a little hole in the side of the hotcap away from the prevailing wind to keep the temperature from rising too high inside the hotcap.

A cage can be constructed from concrete reinforcing wire and wrapped in plastic film, then placed over the tomato plant to shelter it from wind, cold, and hail while letting in most of the sunlight.

Placing tin cans (with the top and bottom cut out) over the plants is not recommended because the sides of the can shade the plant. Only the upper leaves get enough light. The plant stretches toward the light coming through the top of the can. Soon, the leaves reach the rim and are whipped about by

the wind. Empty plastic bottles (the transparent kind used for milk and distilled water) make good plant covers. Be sure to cut the top off just above the handle to allow ventilation during the day.

Just breaking the force of the wind will be very helpful to the survival and early growth of newly set vegetable plants or seedlings that have just recently emerged. Shakes (the kind used on roofs) or shingles stuck upright in the soil about six inches to the southwest of a newly set plant will shelter it from the hot, dry afternoon wind. Rows of temporary windbreaks can be set up on small gardens using shakes, snow fence or scrap lumber.

The idea is to stop only about half of the wind volume and let half pass through the windbreak. Each successive rank of windbreak material will further slow down the wind speed until the air around your tender young vegetable plants will be relatively calm.

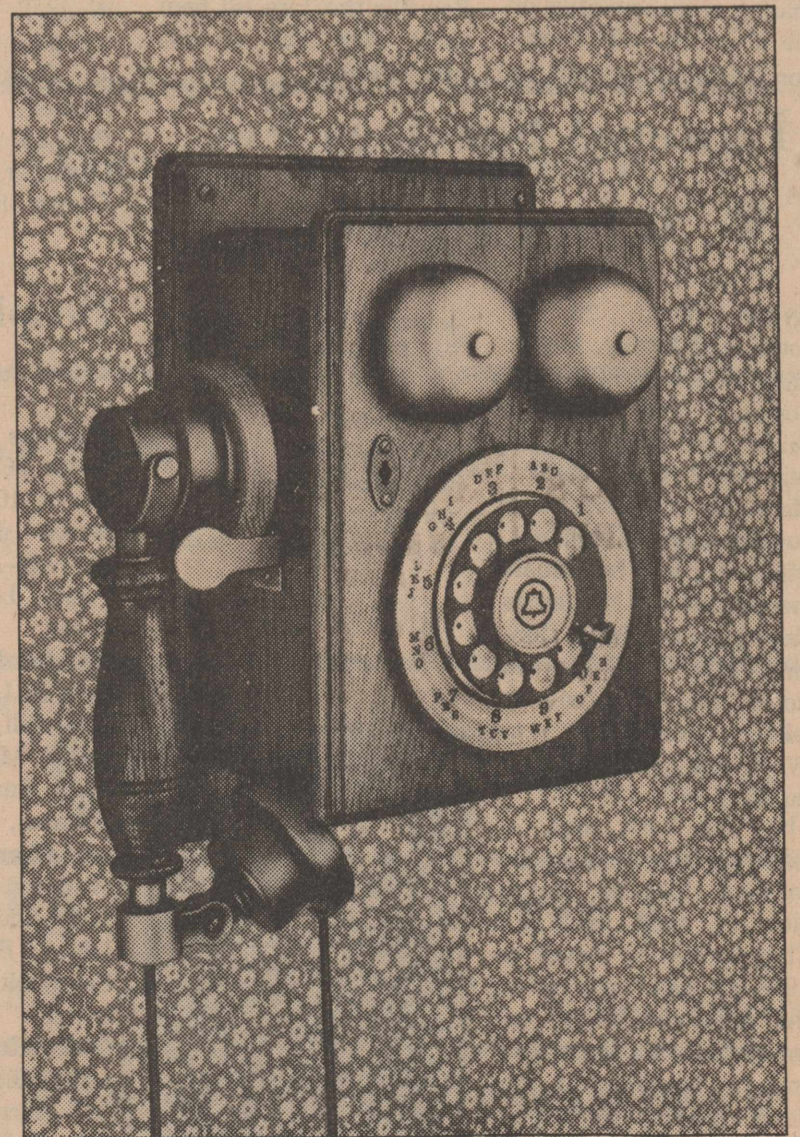

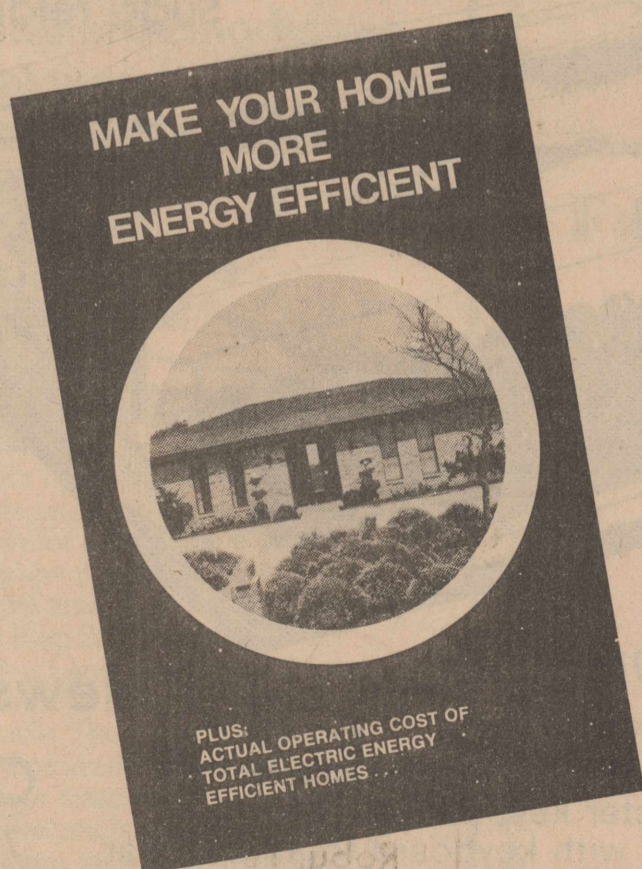

Tom Ramby Rites Are Conducted In Rotan

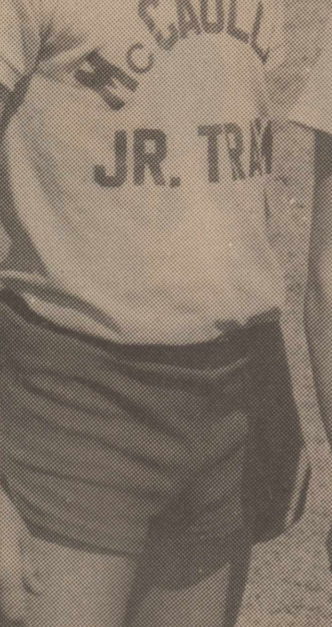

Texas Agricultural Day Celebration Set For Thursday

4-H and Agriculture have strong ties:

A natural partnership exists between the agricul-

tural industry of Texas and the State's 4-H Clubs says Gary Mark Clevenger, County Extension Agent, Agriculture, Fisher Co.

Ties between young people enrolled in 4-H Clubs and agricultural production and marketing segments have been strong since the start of 4-H work shortly after the turn of the century. In fact, the enabling legislation which created 4-H as a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service specifically mentions agriculture as a

relevant part of the program.

When Tom Marks founded the Boys Corn Clubs—the forerunner of today's 4-H—he stressed the teaching of proven techniques of increasing agricultural production and the application of these techniques to growing corn. The result demonstrations begun by Marks and his

group of 25 boys near Jacksboro, Texas, proved to be successful in out-producing other corn crops grown in the area, according to early production records.

Later, in 1912, girls became part of the program with the forming of Girls Tomato Clubs in Milam County, near Cameron. Other agricultural

projects followed with the Pig Clubs and Baby Beef Clubs formed in the next few years. Thus, the foundation was established for a partnership which exists to this day.

Modern 4-H Clubs, although changed in many ways, continue to stress some of the foundation principles taught by Tom Marks, principles such as

self-discipline, responsibility and good citizenship. Today's 4-H members, whether living on a farm or in the central city, learn and practice the life-skills necessary for happy and productive living.

Boys and girls presently participate in a variety of learning experiences designed to meet the specific needs of youth. Among

popular projects for learning today are foods and nutrition, electricity, safety, clothing, horse and pony, gardening, creative crafts, swine, beef and sheep.

The influence of agriculture is evident in all these projects as most stress the production, marketing or utilization of agricultural products.

The Roby Independent School District hereby announces that all persons are entitled to receive an exemption of \$5,000.00 from the market value of their residence homestead for the purpose of school taxes. In addition, all persons who are 65 or older or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance are also entitled to an additional exemption of 10,000.00 from the market value of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

To qualify for these exemptions, an application must be filed with the school district tax office by April 1, 1981. Application forms have been mailed to everyone who qualified last year, and are also available at the school tax office located at 801 West Highway 180 or at Room 107 in the Fisher County Courthouse.

The McCaulley Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"Disabled," in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exists in the national economy, or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to be drawing benefits from Social Security.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year. Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 915-962-5281.

Application forms may also be picked up at the tax office at McCaulley I.S.D.
