Tower For Rotan Cable Being Erected, New Channels Close

Rotan cable subscribers can expect the addition of three new channels in the next few weeks that will mark the beginning of a much broader and more informative cable system, according to Wayne Jamar, United Cable Television manager of Sweet-

Jamar, contacted last Monday in Sweetwater, indicated that workers are in the process of erecting a new tower in Rotan that should be completed next week. The tower plus the addition of a new earth station receiving unit will permit United Cable to provide three new stations in addition to the seven already available to Rotan subscribers.

The three new stations, expected to be available to home viewers by April 15th, will be WTBS-Independent, Atlanta, 24 hour movie and sports channel; WGN-Independent, Chicago, 24 hour movies and sports and USA-C-SPAN a station offering congress in action, and Madison Square Garden sports.

The three new stations will be part of the basic package of channels offered Rotan subscribers for the current monthly charge of \$7.95. However, in speaking with Jamar last Tuesday, he indicated that he had approached the Rotan City Council on granting him a \$1.00 per month increase that will hike basic Rotan subscriptions to \$8.95 a month when officially approved by the Rotan City Council in April.

The new hike in cable subscriptions is expected to take place on May 1st when approved by the Rotan City Council.

"We are hoping to have all the equipment in place by May 15th in order to begin offering Rotan subscribers the Home Box

said Jamar. This new channel will offer first run movies with no commercials, special sporting events and live concerts. The channel is on the air from 4:00 p.m. each afternoon until 1:00 a.m.

Office (HBO) channel," offering G to R rated movies. The cost of the HBO channel will be \$10.95 per month.


County Law Officers Make Marijuana Bust

Uniform Cotton Planting dates have been set in Fisher County for May 18th and 25th. These dates were set by the Fisher-Jones Pest Management Association and the Extension Crops Committee. The planting dates have been proven to work and everyone is urged to follow the dates.

Based on actual surveys, over fifty percent of the home gardens in Texas are infested with root knot nematodes. This makes root knot nematodes one of the major problems encountered in the garden. A great amount of information has been devoted to the control of these pests. Before a control program can be completely effective, however, a gardner should understand the damage done by the different types of nematodes and how to recognize that damage.

The first symptom most often recognized by the gardner is poor plant growth. Infected plants are stunted, and in areas of severe infestation, premature death may occur. Nematode damaged plants often show signs of nitrogen deficiency. The presence of root knot on the root system often results in a deficiency of Zinc on the foliage.

The below ground symptoms show up as a reduced root system, galls, swellings, or decayed areas along the roots. Root knot is the nematode most commonly recognized by the gardner. The root knot larvae enter the root and begin to ferret near the center of the root. If the plant is susceptible, large cells will be formed around the nematode head, and these serve as a source of food for the nematode. In resistant plants such as tomatoes (varieties Big Set, Bonus, Better Boy, Small Fry and Jackpot); sweet corn (all varieties); onions (all varieties); garlic (all varieties); and Southern peas (Mississippi Silver), these feeding areas are not formed in the roots. The larvae die soon after their initial entry.



AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED SALES FOR NATURAL GAS TO RES-IDENTIAL AND COM-MERCIAL CONSUMERS IN THE CITY OF ROTAN, FISHER COUNTY, TEX-AS; PROVIDING FOR MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED, AND AMENDED; AND PRO-VIDING FOR A SCHED-ULE OF SERVICE CHAR-GES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with gas bills rendered after meter reading dats in May, 1981, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Rotan, Texas, by Lone Star Gas Company, a division of ENSERCH CORPOR-ATION, a Texas Corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as set forth in Item A, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 2. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward or downward from a base of \$2.1174 per Mcf by a Gas Cost Adjustment Factor expressed as an amount per thousand cubic feet (Mcf) of natural gas for changes in the intracompany city gate rate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to the Rotan distribution system, according to Item B, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 3. Company shall also receive tax adjustments according to Item C, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 4. The rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers for cunsumption for air conditioning purposes is hereby fixed and determined as set forth in Item D, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 5. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect, as set forth in Item E, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 6. The rates set forth in this ordinance may be changed and amended by either the City or Company in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's

Office. SECTION 7. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance was passed was open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given.

SECTION 8. The \$.05 per Mcf surcharge as author- June 30, 1980.

ized by the Railroad Commission of Texas in GUD-2087 is not included in the calculation of proposed rates. However, it is the intention of Lone Star Gas Company to collect this surcharge in accordance with the Commission order until such time as the authorized amount has been recovered thereby and such surcharge shall be added to the rate set out herein. Monthly status reports to the Commission and City will be provided to account for these collections.

Item B. Gas Cost Adjust-

Each monthly bill at the above rate shall be adjusted for gas cost as follows:

(1) The city gate rate increase or decrease applicable to current billing month residential and commercial sales shall be estimated to the nearest \$0.0001 per Mcf based upon: (a) A volume factor of 1.0671 determined for the distribution system as the ratio of Mcf purchased divided by the Mcf sold for the 12 month period ended

(b) The city gate rate estimated to be applicable volumes purchased during the current calendar month, expressed to the nearest \$0.0001 per Mcf (shown below as "Re").

(c) The base city gate rate of \$2.1174 per Mcf.

(2) Correction of the estimated adjustment determined by Item B (1) above shall be included as part of the adjustment for the second following billing month. The correcting factor (shown below as "C") shall be expressed to the nearest \$0.0001 per Mcf based upon:

(a) The corrected adjustment amount based upon the actual city gate rate,

(b) The estimated adjustment amount billed under Item B (1) above, divided

(c) Distribution system residential and commercial sales Mcf recorded on the Company's books during the prior year for the month that the correction is included as part of the adjustment.

(3) The adjustment determined by Item B (1) and Item B (2) above shall be multiplied by a tax factor of 1.02498 to include street and alley rental and state occupation tax due to increasing Company revenues under this gas cost adjustment provision.

In summary, the gas cost adjustment (GCA) shall be determined to the nearest \$0.0001 per Mcf by Item B (1), Item B (2) and Item B (3) as follows:


