



Mrs. Tutt called the roll, each answered with What I Use For Ground Cover. She also read the minutes and gave the treasurer's





Mexican Customs Study Set For McMurry Soon

A thorough orientation in the history and customs of Mexico, and what to do and not to do there, is planned for Dr. Eugene Hastings' "Study Adventure in Mexico'' May Term course at McMurry Col-

The orientation will be held May 11-12 on the McMurry campus in Abilene. Then the students and professor will embark for their May visit to Cuernavaca, Mexico.

Once in Mexico, students will be working on scholarly projects in either art, history, education or the Spanish language.
