

County Switching To 100% Of Value For Tax Purposes

Most Fisher County residents have been informed through personal letters from the office of Fisher County Clerk Geneva Perkins of the Board of Equalization meeting set for 5:00 p.m. July 9th at the Fisher County Court House.

The purpose of the meeting according to the letter is to give commissioners, sitting as a Board of Equalization, the opportunity to "raise and/or lower the value of the property described on your rendition."

Fisher County residents desiring to appear before the Equalization Board will be given the opportunity to present "evidence you may elect to submit as to the value of said property for taxable purposes. The Board on said date, will from the evidence now before it and such additional evidence as may then be before it, finally fix, determine and equalize the value of your property for taxable purposes for the current taxable year," according to the letter.

Fisher County Judge Marshal Bennett, in a phone conversation last Tuesday morning, indicated

that the Board of Equalization intended to change the basic method of figuring taxes. He said, in all probability, that Fisher County would be changing to taxing on

100% of market value instead of the current 26% of market value figure now being used. This, according to Bennett, would mean lowering the rate of assessment

from the current 93 cents per 100.00 valuation to some figure between 27 cents and 31 cents.

Fisher County Commissioners will finally set the rate of assessment figure

after all information is submitted to them concerning oil property valuations as submitted by Pritchett and Abbott. This is expected to be in the next two weeks.

Rotan Needing Seven Teachers For 1981-82

Dickson indicated that attempts are being made to hire personnel for the following teaching posts. Elementary school-1st grade teacher. Junior High-- 5th-6th grade reading and math teacher and a combination social studies - coach.

In high school-- a science teacher, homemaking teacher, english teacher and a combination English & Spanish teacher is needed to fill vacancies.

In addition to attempting to fill teaching vacancies, Dickson is working on the 1981-82 budget for the school; taking quotations on health insurance for school personnel and is having summer workers

"clean up" at the football field. They are painting, mowing and fixing at the field and performing other summer maintenance jobs around the school area.

Medicare Premium Increases To \$11.00 For County Residents

The monthly premium for the medical insurance part of Medicare increases to \$11 for the 12-month period starting this month (July), Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

In spite of this increase, people should know that they are paying less than a third of the cost of this insurance. More than two-thirds is paid by the U.S. Government from

general revenues, not from social security taxes, Hammons said.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services, no matter where they are received in the United States, in an office, home, hospital, or elsewhere; for outpatient hospital services; for home health care

in a person's home; and for other medical services and supplies not covered by Medicare hospital insurance.

For most covered services, medical insurance pays 80 percent of the approved charges after the patient has incurred \$60 in approved charges--the an-

nual deductible--for the year. Because of the way approved charges are figured and because of the rates of inflation in medical care prices, however, approved charges are often less than doctors' or suppliers' actual charges.

Medicare is available to

nearly anyone 65 or older, people of any age with permanent kidney failure, and to people who have been getting social security disability checks for 24 months or longer.

People who are not otherwise eligible for hospital insurance at 65 can buy this protection. The

premium is \$89 a month for the 12-month period starting this month. A person buying hospital insurance must also have medical insurance coverage.

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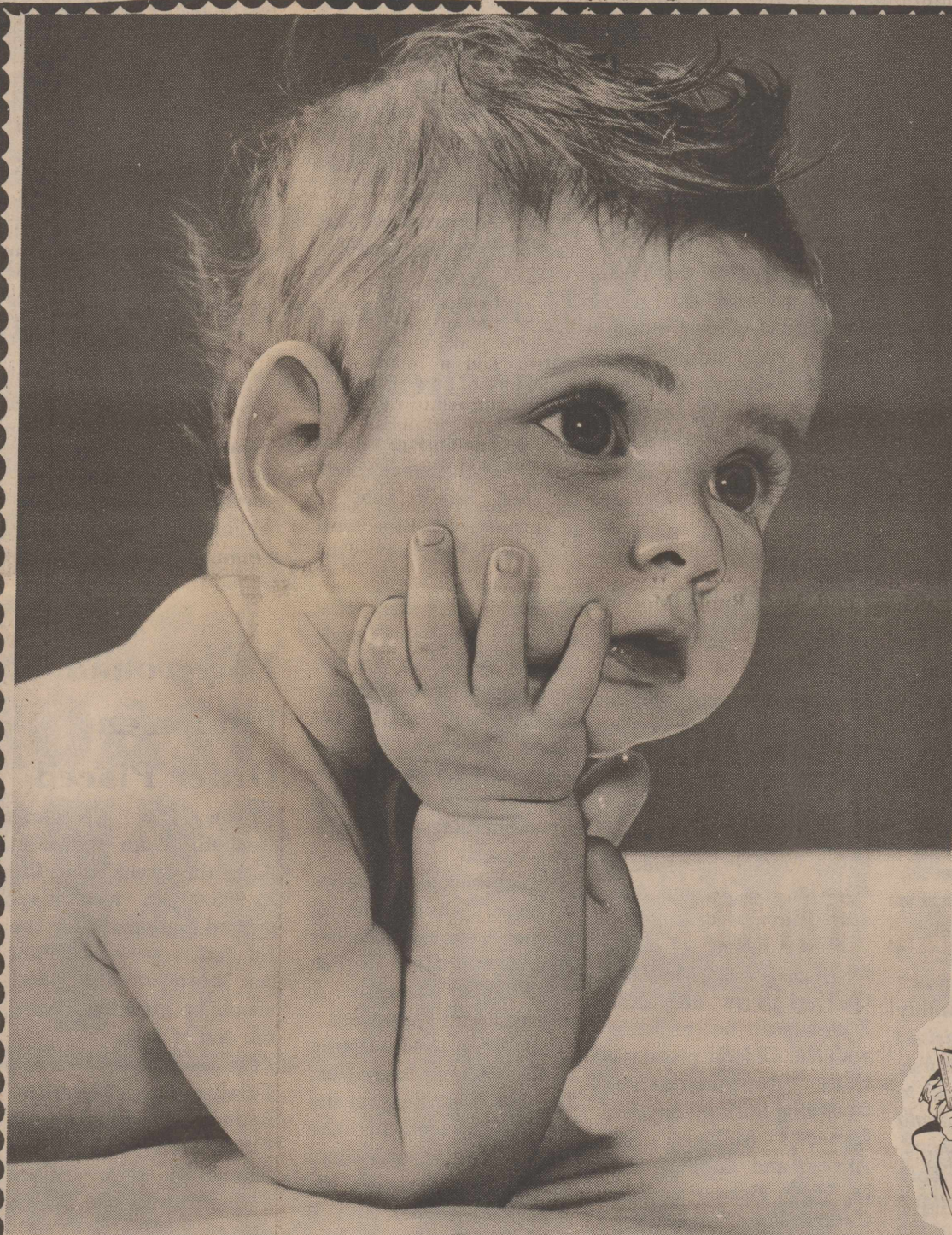

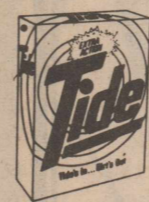

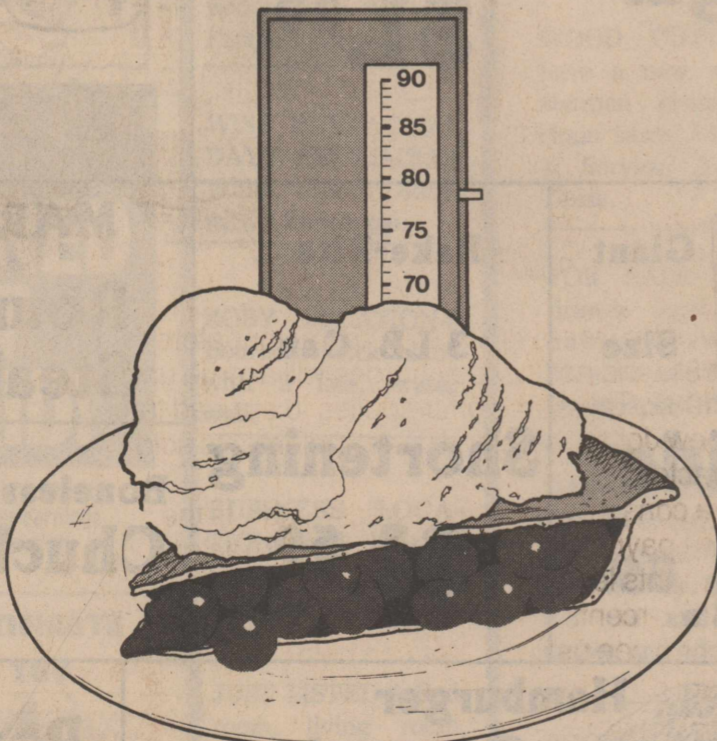

Roby Methodist Church Sanctuary Is Completed

The members of the First United Methodist Church in Roby will be spending their last Sunday in the "old" sanctuary this coming Sunday and making plans for the first service in the new \$146,285.00 sanctuary complex set for Sunday, July 19th.

For all practical purposes the building is complete. General contractor Larry Dennis of Dennis Construction Company in Rule should finish all the minor work by the end of the week. They still lacked hanging mirrors, charging air conditioner units and a small amount of trim finishing early this week. Church members will be assisting with some landscaping and asphalt work before the first services on July 19th.

One of the focal points of the new sanctuary is a large eight foot stained glass window in the foyer of the new building. The stained glass art was the property of Rev. E.L. Yeats and was donated to the First Methodist Church in Roby by his daughter Dr. Helen Yeats. The glasswork came from the First Methodist Church in Memphis, Tx when that church was remodeled. Citizens Glass Company in Abilene took the original work, which measured 12 feet tall, and re-worked the art to fit the current eight foot opening. It was then re-leaded, sandwiched between two

tempered glass pieces and placed in a bronzed aluminum frame. It now will be a permanent remembrance in memory of former Methodist minister E.L. Yeats.

A second unusual piece of stained glass will decorate the door of the new Pastor's study located in the new sanctuary complex. The stained glass, in the form of a 5 ft. cross, was the original door of the Chaplain's Office in the old Sweet-

water Hospital. When the hospital was sold, Dr. Helen Yeats purchased the door and donated it to the Roby Methodist Church.

The new building contains a sanctuary, choir room, pastor's study, two restrooms and two large rooms housing the heating and air units and electrical equipment. The building contains a total of 4,295 square feet.

The contractor's basic bid of \$146,285.00 did not

include some \$10,000.00 for pews and re-working the stained glass; \$500.00 for concrete work; \$1,000.00 for a new organ speaker and some \$3,000.00 for cathedral lights. The total cost of the construction approaches \$161,000.00 with over \$80,000.00 already paid for by church members. The remaining \$80,000.00 will be borrowed from the Citizen's State Bank in Roby and re-paid through 5 and 10 year pledges made by members.

Volunteer labor from church members has helped keep construction costs below the 161,000 mark according to Rev. Loren Gardner, Church Pastor.

"Three members have donated labor on electrical work that has amounted to approximately \$6,500.00," said Rev. Gardner. The three included: Murray

Simmons, Wendell McWhirter and Loyce Sutton. Others have donated labor in doing dirt work, helping with the foundation and assisting with backfill work.

On August 9th, church members are planning an Open House. All former pastors are being invited

back for the Open House, a covered dish luncheon is being planned with a service scheduled for mid-afternoon.

Area Methodist Bishop, W. Showengerdt of Albuquerque, New Mexico is scheduled to be in Roby on September 13th for a Consecration Service.

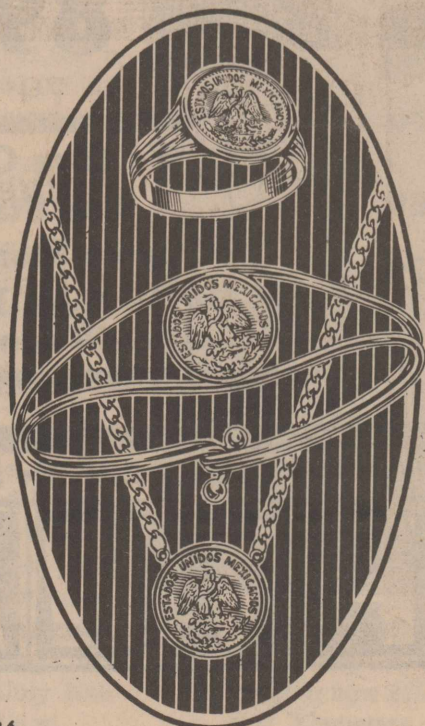

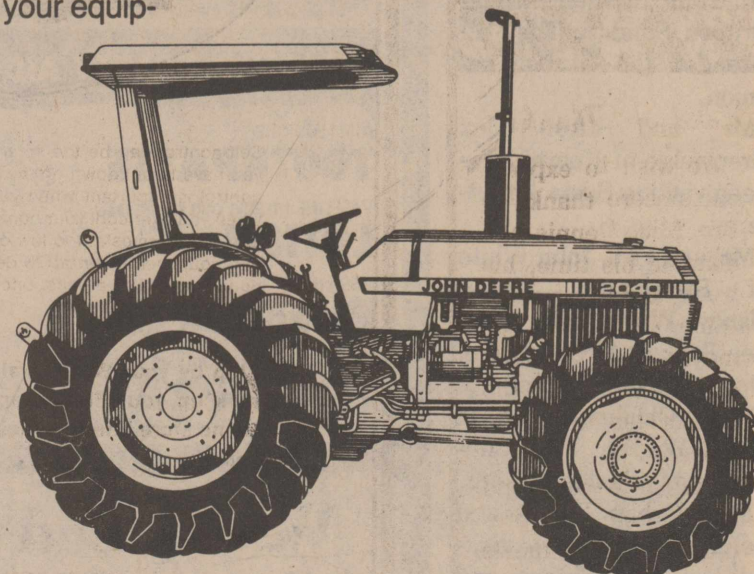

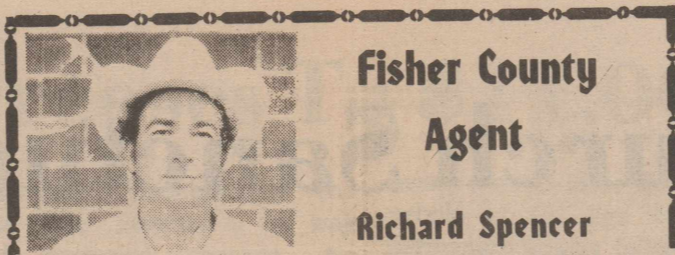

Homeowners in Fisher County are having heavy tick infestations.

Tick population increase dramatically with warm humid weather, causing inconvenience and health hazards for homeowners and pets.

Ticks are biting, blood-sucking parasites, and their bites may become inflamed and infected due to toxic secretions. Tick paralysis, tularemia and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever may be transmitted through tick bites.

Brown dog, American dog and Lone Star Ticks are the most common in Texas home landscapes. Brown dog ticks are reddish-brown while American dog ticks are yellowish-brown when unfed and slate gray when engorged. The brown dog tick rarely occurs in rural areas; instead, it hides in crevices around buildings.

American dog ticks are most often found along roads and trails. The brown Lone Star tick has a characteristic white spot on its back.

A female tick may lay several thousand eggs, beginning a two-to four-

month life cycle. Remaining stages—six legged larva (seed tick) and eight-legged nymph and adult—generally develop on separate host animals. After each feeding, the tick drops off the host and temporarily hides until the

next developmental stage. Regardless of the species, control is basically the same for all ticks. Heavy infestations in the home may require treatment by professionals. Household sprays containing 0.5 percent diazinon or

ronnel will control light infestations. Outside the home where vegetation is thin, use 5 percent carbaryl (Sevin) dust at 20-25 pounds per acre. Increase the rate as vegetation thickens. If using a spray, mix 5

tablespoons of 25 percent diazinon emulsifiable concentrate (EC) in one gallon of water. Apply one gallon of spray per 1,000 square feet.

Chlorpyrifos (Dursban) is also suggested for tick control. Apply 1.5 ounces of material per 1,000 square feet of treated area. When spraying, pay particular attention to roadsides, animal trails, paths and pet resting areas. Always read the label on the pesticide container for application instructions.

Most species of ticks can't survive in cleared areas where they are exposed to excessive sunlight and predators. Keeping areas clear of debris is important in tick control.
