Tick population increase dramtically with warm humid weather, causing inconvenience and health hazards for homeowners and pets.

Ticks are biting, bloodsucking parasites, and their bites may become inflamed and infected due to toxic secretions. Tick paralysis, tularemia and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever may be transmitted through tick bites.

Brown dog, American dog and Lone Star Ticks are the most common in Texas home landscapes. Brown dog ticks are reddish-brown while American dog ticks are vellowish-brown when unfed and slate gray when engorged. The brown dog tick rarely occurs in rural areas; instead, it hides in crevices around buildings.

Chloryprifos (Dursban) is also suggested for tick of material per 1,000 square feet of treated area. When spraying, pay particlar attention to roadsides, animal trails, paths and pet resting areas. Always read the label on the secticide container for application instructions.

Most species of ticks can't survive in cleared areas where they are exposed to excessive sunlight and predators. Keeping areas clear of debris is important in tick control.
