Earnest Kiker Named For County Agent Top Award

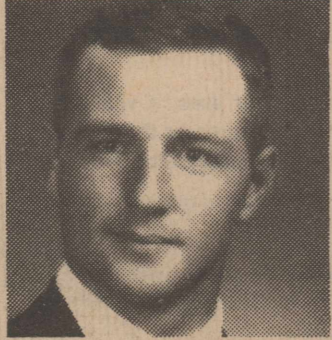
Earnest C. Kiker, Briscoe County Extension Agent for the past three and one-half years, has been named to receive the Achievement Award from the National Association of County Agricultural Agents.

The award is presented annually to the top county agent in each of the 50 states with less than 10 years of service, according to Atascosa County Extension Agent Hollis Duke, president of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association. It is based on outstanding contributions to agriculture and rural living.

Kiker will be recognized at the state association's annual meeting in Orange, Aug. 3-5. Actual presentation of the award will be the national association meeting at Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y., Aug.

16-20. Kiker began his career with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System in 1972 in Swisher County. Two years later he transferred to Borden County where he served until assuming his present position in December 1977.

In Briscoe County, Kiker has been responsible for planning and implementing a diverse, well coordinated integrated pest management program. This program has keyed in on

the control of grasshoppers on rangeland, greenbugs in wheat, and bollworms, boll weevils and fleahoppers in cotton. This program has significantly lowered production costs of farmers and ranchers while at the same time reducing hazards to beneficial insects and the environment and conserving energy.

By involving members of the Briscoe County Program Building Committee and crop and livestock subcommittees, Kiker was able to gain broad support for the integrated pest management. Agencies such as the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Department of Agricultural Soil Conservation Service and the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture also were involved in the effort.

Kiker is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Kiker of Rotan.

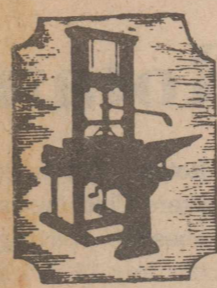

Two Rotan Shooting Incidents Leave Two Arrested, One Hurt

An incident involving gunfire at two Rotan locations last Sunday has resulted in the arrest of two Rotan individuals and the hospitalization of another, according to Rotan Police Chief Gene Pack.

The incident began at approximately 4:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon with a call to Rotan Police concerning a disturbance between two groups of people in the area of the 300 block of East 8th Street in Rotan. Rotan Police Chief Gene Pack and Patrolman John Walker answered the disturbance call.

At approximately 10:45 p.m., Patrolman John Walker and Dave Scobey reported hearing gunshots in the main business section of Rotan. Upon investigating the incident the two patrolmen learned that Keri Pederson of Rotan driving a 1974

Camaro with John Flores of Rotan as an occupant reported that two blasts from a 12 gauge shotgun had been fired at her vehicle. One hit the door with the other hitting the door-fender.

Santana Yanez, age 24, of Rotan was arrested by Walker and Scobey in connection with the shooting a charged with attempted murder.

Approximately 10 minutes later, at 10:55 p.m., a second shooting took place at the Thomas Yanez home on West Beauregard. In this incident, investigated by Walker and Scobey, John Flores of Rotan was arrested and charged with allegedly firing a large caliber weapon and hitting Alejandro Gaspar of Rotan in the lower back. The shooting took place in front of the Yanez home.

Both John Flores and Santana Yanez were transported to the Fisher county Jail.

Alejandro Gaspar was transported to the Fisher County Hospital, remain-

ed there Sunday night and was released Monday morning.

The incident is to be brought before the Fisher County Grand Jury, according to Gene Pack.

L.H. Hicks Named As New Deputy Sheriff

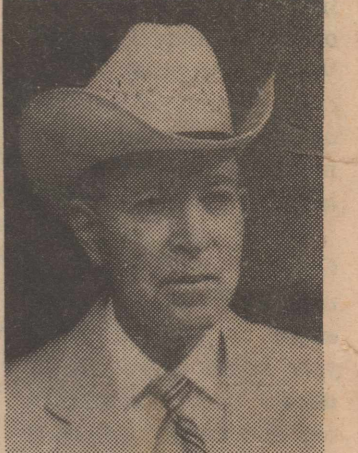
Fisher County Sheriff Mickey Counts announced the employment of L.H. Hicks as a Fisher County Deputy Sheriff effective Saturday, July 25th.

years spent in Wichita Falls and a tour with the United States Navy during WW II. While in the military he was stationed in China, Japan and the Philippines as a motor machinists mate.

Hobbs Election For Abolishment Aug. 8th

The election to determine if the Hobbs Independent School District will be abolished will take place on Saturday, August 8th, 1981.

Fisher County Judge Marshal Bennett, in answer to a petition signed by 39 residents of the Hobbs School District, called the election to give residents the opportunity to express their vote on whether to abolish the district or have it remain in existence.

Voting at the Hobbs School will take place between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 8th, with Dave Williams serving as the election officer.

Voters will have the opportunity to check one of two blocks in response to the following statement on the ballot. "The abolishment of the Hobbs Independent School District effective at the end of the 1980-81 school year", for or against.

Pat Porter, absentee election judge at the Hobbs School, reported that a total of 8 absentee votes had been cast through last Monday afternoon. Absentee voting closes on August 4th. Residents living within the Hobbs School District in Scurry County are casting votes at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sim Groves.

Kim's Korner

I am of the opinion that Congressman Charles Stenholm is doing an admirable job in Washington, D.C. and I experience a sense of pride at news stories concerning the "Boll Weevil" bunch. Stenholm has come under a lot of pressure from leaders in the Democratic party because he insists on voting his convictions. The below weekly column explains some of the problems he has encountered. If the sampling of people I have talked with is any indication of Stenholm's respect and popularity, I don't think he'll have any problems with his political future.

Stenholm's Report

WASHINGTON, D.C. — When one embarks on an attempt to effect change in government, there are no guarantees that the trip will be a smooth or easy one.

During the past year, since I became convinced that the political current of the Democratic Party, with its obvious strong drift toward "spend, spend, spend and tax, tax, tax," philosophical objectives, needed change, I have weathered some strong opposition to my convictions.

On November 4, 1980, the American voting public confirmed what I had come to believe, that that philosophy had brought this nation to the brink of economic disaster. The decision that voters made last November was not so much a "turning out" of some politicians as it was a turn away from current economic policy. It was not a mandate to follow any man or political party blindly, but to open our eyes to the dangers such an economic policy had pressed upon us and to change course before it was too late.

I remain committed to changing that course and doing so in the fairest and most equitable manner that I think is possible. The first steps toward that change, sharply cutting the level of government spending, were relatively easy votes to cast. There was a clear-cut difference in approaches presented to the Congress during the budget considerations. I have voted my convictions and my conscience, even though those votes have been politically difficult and have

estranged me somewhat from some of the leadership of the Democratic Party. While there is talk of "punishing" conservative Democrats for their support of that austere budget, I would cast the same votes today or any day, regardless of the cost to my political future.

One of the first things that members of my Democratic leadership told me when I came to the Congress was that at no time would they ever ask me to vote against my convictions or my conscience. I have every right to expect them to honor that commitment.

Leadership, in its truest sense, is a very lonely business. It is more a matter of following the dictates of one's conscience, rather than necessarily marching in rank with one's party or blindly following the dictates of any one person or giving in to political expediency.

At this writing, I have not decided what course I will take on the tax cut, as I have yet to examine final versions of the two proposals and make a personal assessment of the issues included in each. I realize that whatever my decision may be, there will be those who will criticize my actions and I will honestly and sincerely respect those differing opinions.

As I told my colleagues on the House Floor during debate on the budget reconciliation, the beauty of the American system of government is that reasonable men may disagree. I might also suggest the wisdom in agreeable men being able to reason, as well.

Bullock Speaks Out On Oil And Gas Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday released figures showing that Attorney General Mark White's proposal to increase severance taxes on oil and gas would heap millions of dollars in new taxes on Texans.

"What the Attorney General is suggesting makes about as much sense as burning down your house to get rid of mice. Texas consumers will end up being burned and burned bad," Bullock said.

Bullock said an analysis of a 30 percent severance tax on oil and gas will increase the taxes the average Texas motorist pays in severance taxes each year for the purchase of gasoline from \$26.56 to \$80.10.

Bullock said Texas refineries consume 64 percent of the crude oil produced in the state.

Bullock also said that because the cost of natural gas in Texas is higher than the cost for out-of-state customers, Texans wind up paying 73 percent of the natural gas severance tax.

Texas crude oil is taxed at 4.6 percent of value, while the natural gas rate is 7.5 percent.

Overall, a 30 percent severance tax would mean about \$2.6 billion in additional taxes on oil and \$1.6 billion on natural gas.

"Basically, White's proposal will quadruple the taxes that Texans pay on energy products and if he's successful in having a severance tax places on coal or lignite he'll end up jacking up our electric rates because all the

lignite produced is consumed in Texas," Bullock said.

"Those who advised the Attorney General on this were ill-advised. I'll be glad to show him my figures, I just hope he's got someone smart enough to explain them to him."

Bullock said White's retaliatory severance tax proposal won't work in Texas because it will not only cost Texas consumers more but it's also a kick in the teeth to the state's 650,000 royalty owners.

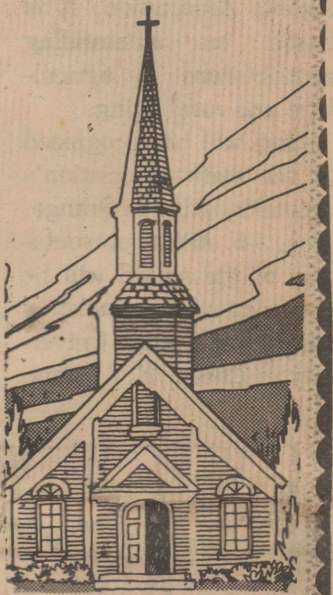

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...ation. Nematodes can be best treated by applying a nematode killer prior to setting out tomato transplants. Disease and virus also cause curling of leaves. If you plant several transplants and only one or two develop a curled leaf, weird appearance while others grow normally, you have virus. Pull-up the sick plants and dispose of them before they give the virus to the other plants. Leaf spot and yellowing can sometimes be controlled with fungicides. Bloom drop is associated with the environment. Tomatoes generally don't hold blooms in cool cloudy weather or when the temperature is over 90 degrees.

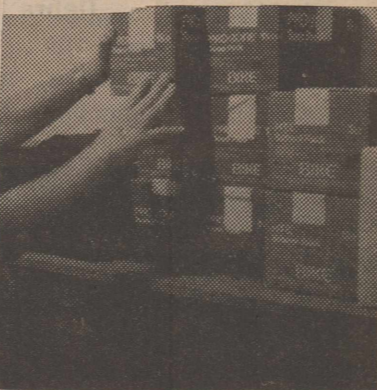

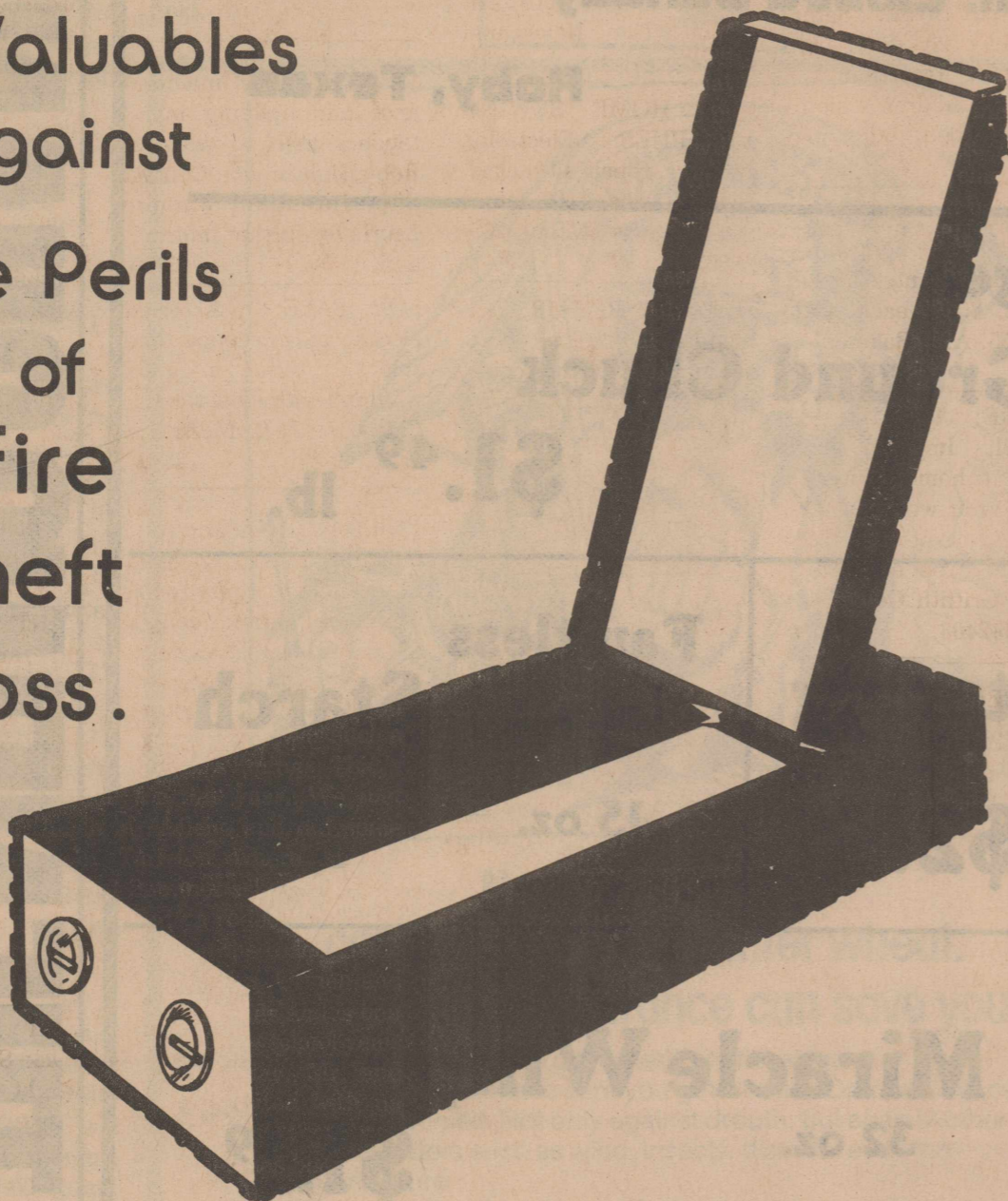

Monday, August 10.

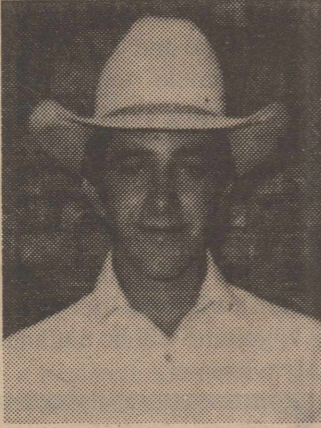
"It's an expensive and tough sport but is like any other sport...it gets in your blood and I hope this is a success at Roby so it will become annual," Mark stated.

Monday, August 10th at the football practice field. Afternoon workouts will be scheduled and times announced at a later date.

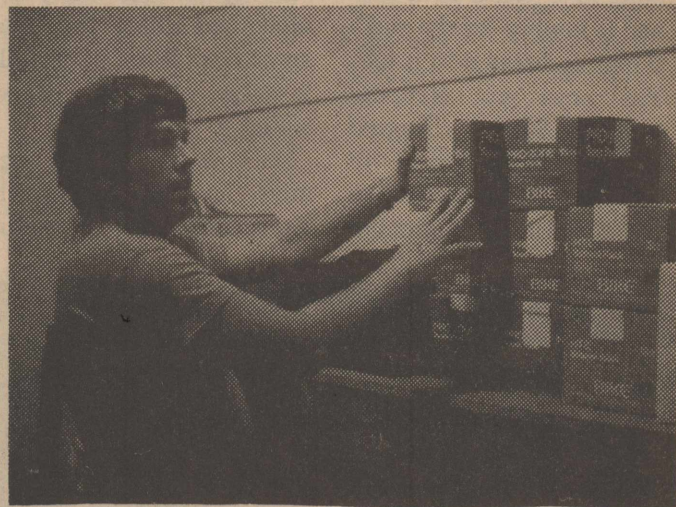
On Friday, August 14th, the high school players will begin workouts in full pads. The first season scrimmage is set for
