### "WE ARE ON OUR WAY"

Every editor of a trade paper, every manufacturer, and every president of large mercantile companies interviewed by three different business agencies, which conducted national surveys, reported substantial gains in industry and commerce for the latter part of 1933 and were highly optimistic for 1934.

Retail sales for the first three weeks of December are estimated at more than 50 per cent above all of December, 1932. Dun & Bradstreet's December summary says: "Business in all divisions appears to be reacting favorably to the stimulus of the National recovery program. The definite upward trend was bolstered by Christmas trade of nearly record proportions. It now is generally recognized that the groundwork for advancement is more secure than at any time in the last four years."

Careful observers note substantial improvement in car loadings, earnings of transportation companies, and signs of revival in the capital industries, including con-

Residential building permits for November were 66 per cent over October and 138 per cent over November, 1932, according to Department of Commerce. F. H. Dodge Corporation reports contracts let for construction projects in states east of the Mississippi during the first two weeks of December totaled \$11,877,200, or 52 per cent over the entire month of December, 1932, and 70 per cent over the first half of November, 1933.

However. ### **BUYING INCREASES**

The New York Times reports that the influx of buyers to the wholesale markets of that city in the week ended January 9 set a four-year record, the number being 35 per cent more than in the same period last year. "Based upon the expectation of a substantial gain in retail sales this spring, buying of practically all types of merchandise is active.'

In connection with the four-day convention of the National Shoe Retailers' Association in St. Louis the past week the placing of orders for approximately \$50,000,000 worth of shoes was announced.

The best feature of all these reports is the statement that the present activity does not resemble a buying splurge, but rather "a flow of orders." This is the esessence of business improvement. When the department and other stores start increasing their orders it is obvious that the purchasing power of the people is improving, reflecting an expansion of employment. It is buying that makes the wheels go around.

### IT IS UP TO CONGRESS

Whether or not the CWA program is brought to a close at the end of the time originally planned or is to continue till the end of May, will depend on the action of Congress on the President's request for extension of time and appropriation of additional funds.

Shutting down now, as announced by Administrator Hopkins last week, would throw millions out of employment in the middle of the winter, and the announcement has aroused a storm of protest from all sections of the

While criticism of CWA operation has been general, it must be remembered that Administrator Hopkins was called upon to do a tremendous job overnight.

The CWA has been of great value and should be continued throughout the winter.



## Blue Eagle Taken

WASHINGTON.-Failure to live up to their obligations under the Blue Eagle caused NRA to direct the immediate withdrawal of the insignia from four restaurants and a coal company, as just announced at NRA headquarters They are as follows: Southern Cafeteria, Miami Fla.; Rainbow Restaurant, Valparaiso, Ind.; Piccadilly Cafe, Kansas City, Mr.; Spencer's Cafe, Green-ville, S. C.; and Wall Coal Co., Savannah, Ga. The Miami Compliance Board added to their recommendation: "Our investigation developed that the Southern Cafeteria, a large institution employing a number of people, has refused to comply in any way, our repeated demands to the contrary notwithstanding. Not only do they work their help unconscionably long hours at starvation rates, but in many instances they refuse to pay their help at all." Five employees signed a complaint to the effect that one worker who asked for his wages was beaten up unmercifully. Complains approved by local compliance boards charged the other four concerns with refusing to comply with the labor provisions which entitled them to display the Blue Eagle.

### FRENCH DOCTORS PROVE WINE KILLS TYPHOID GERM

PARIS. (UP)-Drink wine and avoid typhoid fever, is the verdict of the Paris municipal laboratory, after numerous experiments.

Dr. Andre Kling, director of the laboratory, and M. D. Florentin, his chief assistant, used bacteria which they had caught in the wild state, rather than artificial typhoid cul-

A "wild" typhoid bacillus, they say, is worth three or four times as much as a "sissy" laboratory specimen. They lifted a bucketful of polluted water from the Seine. then permitted several tumblers of average good vin ordinaire to "drink" several of the best typhoid germs found in the water. In ten minutes the wine had completely annihilated the microbes.


