

Hospital Board Will Discuss Room Rate Hike In September

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board plan to discuss the possibility of increasing room rates on private and semi-private facilities at the next regular board meeting in September. The subject was discussed last Monday night when board members were talking of nursing salaries after being presented a comparison of salaries and room rates of eight area hospitals by Administrator Jerry Weatherly.

According to Weatherly's report, private room rates at Haskell are \$90.00 with semi-private facilities costing \$85.00; Aspermont \$83.00 and \$78.00; Hamlin \$90.00 all rooms; Stamford-\$87.00 and \$82.00; Snyder-\$98.00 and \$85.00; Anson-\$80.00 and \$75.00 and Sweetwater \$112.00 and \$103.00.

The rates at the Fisher County Hospital are \$80.00 for private rooms and \$75.00 for semi-private rooms. Board members are expected to discuss the possibility of increasing the rates at the September meeting.

The board discussed purchasing an "errors and omission" insurance policy covering board members and Administrator Jerry Weatherly after taking two bids on the coverage. Coverage through Floyd West with a \$1,000 deductible amounted to \$1,628.00 a year for the coverage while St. Paul, with no deductible, was \$1,850.00 a year. No action was taken on insurance. Weatherly is to check on additional coverage for the September meeting.

Board members voted to purchase an "emergency telephone" for the nurses station in order to take incoming emergency telephone calls. After the phone is installed the board plans to list the number in phone directories in hopes to convert all emergency calls in the future to the new number.

Additional items discussed last Monday included: nursing personnel salaries; insurance policies and the purchase of additional surgical equipment.

Items to be discussed in September are: air conditioning; room rates; nursing salaries; and a telephone system.

Roby City Increases Water, Sewer Rates

The members of the Roby City Commission voted to increase the water and sanitation charges at their last monthly meeting to take effect with the October billing, according to Jimmy Price, Roby City Manager.

The minimum water billing is going to be

increased by \$1.00 to all customers with the October billing.

Sanitation charges for residences will increase from \$3.50 to \$5.00 with commercial sanitation charges scheduled to take a similar hike in proportion to residential increases, according to Price.

Members of the Roby City Commission also set the tax rate for the 1981 year at \$62 cents per \$100.00 valuation based on 100% of value. This rate represents a hike of \$.02 per \$100.00 valuation over last year's tax figure. Last year the rate was \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation on 40% of value.

City Commission members were forced to make the financial adjustments in order to offset increasing costs to the City of Roby and attempted to make the adjustments broad-based in order that all residents shared, not just taxpayers or water users.

Early Week Showers Mean Bright Crop Prospects

Most locations throughout Fisher County recorded at least an inch of rain from Sunday night, August 16th through last Tuesday morning, August 18th with some locations around Roby recording as much as 3 to 4 inches.

The rains seemed to be the lightest north and east

of Rotan. Al Finch, 6 miles east of Rotan, only recorded .60 inches while Herbert Kennedy, 10 miles northeast, showed 1.20 inches for the two days. "It was sure scattered out in this area," said Kennedy. Sam Baugh, at the base of the Double Mountain, recorded 2.3

inches when he checked his guage last Monday and had received some more Monday night.

Richard Posey had a total of 2.5 inches over the two day rain at his home 9 miles north of Rotan. C.V. Counts missed the Sunday night rain but recorded 1.0 inches on Monday. His place is 1 1/2 miles northeast of Rotan.

Out at Hobbs, Jimmy Don Hale recorded 2.3 inches from Sunday through Tuesday morning. Jackie Wayne Etheredge, 10 miles east of Roby recorded 2.2 inches for the two days.

Derwayne Rasco, south of Roby, had 2.0 inches on Monday when he checked his guage. Jimmy Price, Roby City manager, indicated that the official rainfall for Roby for the two days amounted to 2.51 inches. He recorded 4.0 at his house in town.

The average monthly circulation of books this summer amount to 736 (402 Adult books and 334 children's books). The storytime attendance average for the three summer months has amounted to 76 students.

The library has hosted 117 visitors and shown 7 films to 175 people since last May.

Rotan Board Grants Teachers Pay Raise, Talks Field House

The members of the Rotan School Board voted to increase teacher salaries to all teachers not paid an "above state bonus" in the amount of \$500.00 a year at their board meeting last Monday night.

"The pay raises will primarily effect primary, elementary and a few high school teachers," according to Superintendent Jerry Dickson. The three school principals also come under the \$500.00 a year pay hike.

The new move by Rotan School Board members will cost taxpayers approximately \$16,000.00 a year and received unanimous approval by all school board members present. The only board member not attending the meeting last Monday night was Ernest Ragan.

The \$500.00 a year pay increase granted last Monday night to teachers not paid an above base bonus gives Rotan School personnel approximately \$860.00 above base counting their school paid insurance program. The yearly insurance program amounts to \$360.00 and can be paid to

teachers in cash or used to make insurance payments.

In other action last Monday night the board gave an audience to Phil Springer and Joe Dickson, representing the Rotan

Jaycess, and heard a request that the board give consideration to constructing a new football field house.

Springer and Dickson wanted the board to give

thought to calling a bond election to give the people of the district the opportunity to vote on the construction of a new football field house. The board did not take any action on the request but took the issue under advisement.

In other action the board approved the 1981-82 budget and approved a hike in hourly wages for cafeteria and custodial personnel. Cafeteria personnel will receive an increase in pay from \$3.16 to \$3.40 an hour while custodians jumped from \$3.70 to \$4.00 an hour.

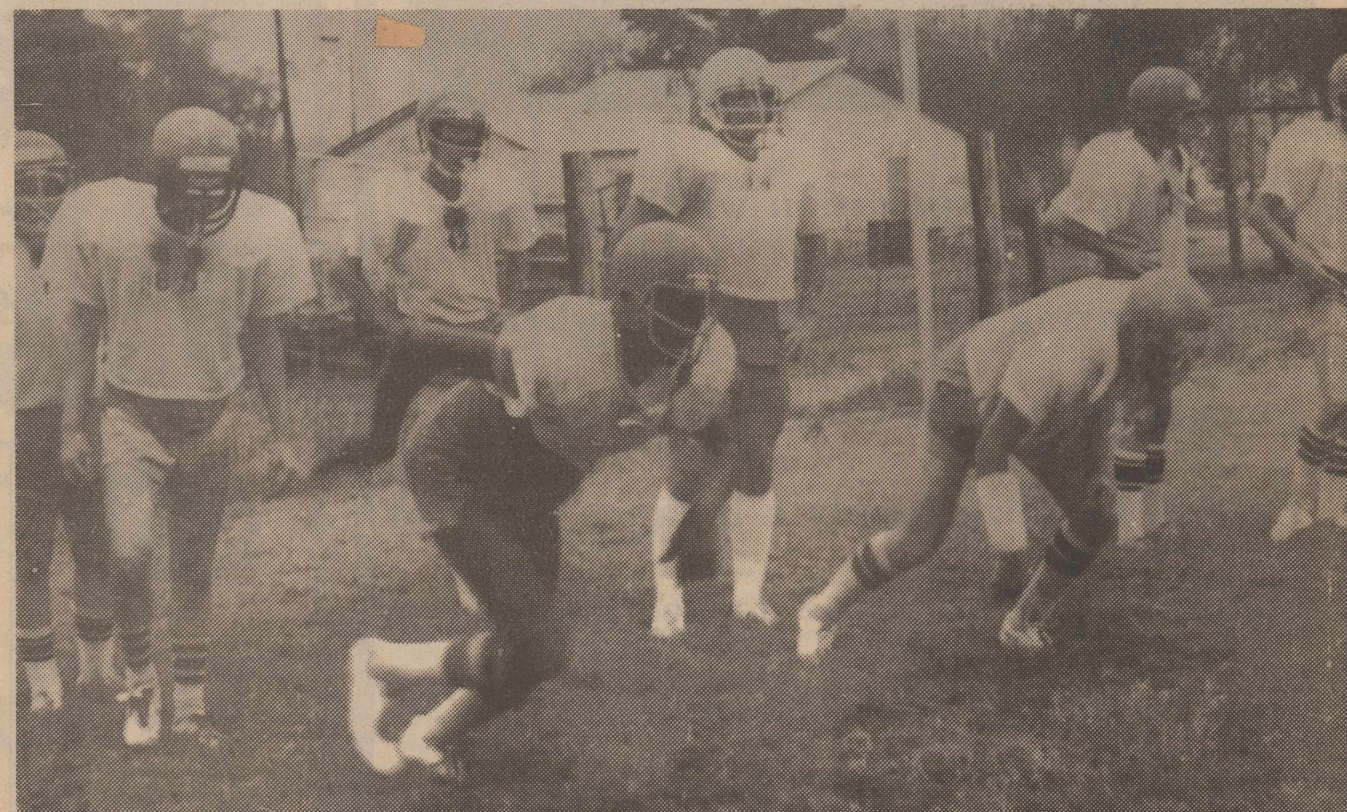
Kim Pease was elected vice president and James Carter was named secretary treasurer of the organization.

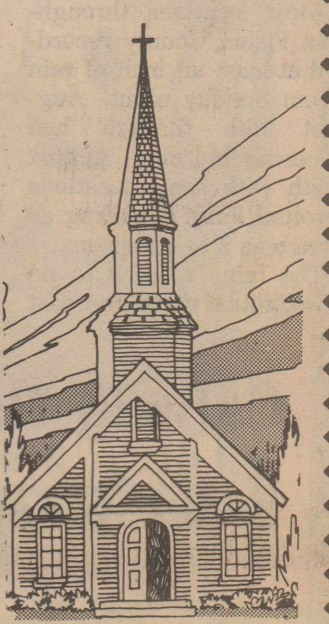

Yellowhammers Face Munday In Scrimmage August 21st

The Rotan Yellowhammers will travel to Munday to take part in the first of two pre-season scrimmages this Friday, according to Head Coach Robert Damron. The scrimmage will involve three Rotan units and will get underway at 6:00 p.m. with the junior varsity teams. At approximately 6:45 the first varsity unit will begin the first of two controlled scrimmage sessions. They are scheduled to run 20 offensive and 20 defensive plays. Following the first varsity session the second varsity team will run 15

offensive and 15 defensive plays. The scrimmage session will wind up with the first varsity team running 20 offensive and 20 defensive plays. The junior varsity team will run 10 offensive and 10 defensive plays.

The Munday Moguls are coached by Rogers Lankford, former Rotan Assistant Coach, in his first year as head coach at Munday. Munday is coming off a 6-3-1 1980 season and have good speed and are picked by the Harris Poll to finish 3rd in their

district. They have 4 offensive and 5 defensive players returning. Offensively Munday will be running the Veer Offense and on defensive will revert to the "Split 6".

"Our players are working real hard and as coaches we can't ask them to give much more than they are giving right now," said Damron. The Rotan team conducted an inter-squad scrimmage last Saturday morning and during the workout lost the services of freshman Rudy Garza. "Garza suffered a knee separation and will be in a partial cast for about 6 weeks. He was caught in a

pile-up and got his knee twisted under him and some player fell on him causing the injury," said Damron.

"Overall we were pleased with the scrimmage, we started out slow, but came back on the second go-around and did a good job," commented the Head Coach. The teams were divided and each ran controlled plays on offense and defense.
