Appraisal Board Cuts \$20,000 From Budget

Dickson indicated that the board underspent the approved budgeted amount in all categories except maintenance. Maintenance was over spent by approximately \$12,000.00 due to the cost

The members of the Fisher County Appraisal Board set their proposed 1982 budget at \$125,500 which is approximately \$13,500 less than the proposed 1981 budget but represents an increase of \$7,500 over the anticipated actual 1981 budget.

According to Fisher County Appraisal District Chief Appraiser Billie Lou Holcomb the proposed 1981 budget of \$138,000. is expected to be reduced to \$118,000. with the payment of 4th quarter installments by members of the district. "We usually take in approximately \$35,000. a quarter from the district members but that figure for the fourth quarter is going to be reduced to \$15,000. because our financial condition is in good shape,' said Mrs. Holcomb.

In commenting about the 1982 proposed budget Mrs. Holcomb said that beginning with 1982 Fisher County will be paying their pro-rata share thus increasing the units part from eight to nine. The

total proposed budget for 1982 amounts to \$125,500. Of the nine units participating in the district, Fisher

Governor Designates Young Farmer Week

September 20-26 has been officially designated as Young Farmer Week in Texas by proclamation of Governor W.P. Clements,

The proclamation signed recently gives additional recognition to this rapidly growing farm group. The Young Farmer Association is sponsored under the auspices of vocational agriculture departments in high schools across Texas and the Texas Education



PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. ment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

SPECIAL ELECTION resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. constitutionally Funds dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor. Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds.'

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality en-hancement, and flood hancement, and control purposes or any combination of these pur-

The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows ".nounts to be establis' ed to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%. The proposed amend-

ment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would livestock and exempt poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

Three Attend Washington Citizenship 4-H Tour

Harkey and Jill Posey, all representing Fisher County, returned home recently from Washington, D.C., after attending Citizenship-Washington Focus- a week long experience in citizenship and leadership training at the National 4-H Center. They were three of 117 4-H members from Texas and 8 other states participating. The program is designed to help young people understand the structure and function of our system of government, study the heritage of our country's development and prepare plans for active citizen involvement when they return home.

Using the nation's capital as "a classroom", the program included a day on Capitol Hill to meet with members of Congress and see government in action. The three representatives from Fisher county met with Congressman Stenholm in his office during this time. Field trips to historical and cultural sites as well as to federal agencies and community organizations were among the most informative and exciting parts of the week. In workshop sessions at the National 4-H Center, young people discussed contemporary issues and concerns, and ways in which skills and knowledge during the week could be applied to the 4-H program here. One of the best parts of the experience was being able to share ideas with 4-H members across the coun-

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market residence value homestead. The portion exempted may much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general prescribes monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,-000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,-000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the hallot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."




