Gold In County

There is gold in Fisher County. It's located on the Don Parks farm, 7 miles southwest of Rotan and according to Parks, "It's as fine as flour."

"They don't know if they can do anything with it," said Parks. He has known about the possibility of gold on his 160 acres for the past two years.

Parks is working with Dick Woods of Albany, Texas. Woods is gathering samples and having them assayed. Recently, on "hot spot", according to Parks, was assayed and came back as containing 2 ounces of gold per ton of dirt. Asked whey they would begin trying to extract the gold dust from the dirt, Parks said, "Could be next summer before we bring anything in and attempt to remove the gold from the soil."

Parks said that Woods would be the person to call the shots on removing the gold from his farm. "It's Woods' to do with what he wants, " said Parks.

The 160 acre farm is on the Alkali Creek and Parks says, "I can hold a handful of soil in the sunlight and see the gold sparkle." Parks owns the mineral rights to the 160 acres and seemed just as thrilled at hitting water at 8 feet for his new pecan trees as he did over the possibility of financial gain from the gold dust.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office Monday reminded Texans that a Texas \$700. new state inheritance tax law took effect this month and will apply to estates of those who died on or after

September 1,1981. The Comprtoller's office save Texas taxpayers at least \$20 million in death taxes the first year.

The new law did away with the state's basic inheritance tax schedule and statutes, replacing them with a law that ties Texas inheritance tax collections to a part of the federal estate taxes owed. 

The recommendation is to apply a fertilizer high in nitrogen and potassium and low in phosphorus. Both nitrogen and Potassium are important to leaf growth and color and root growth. Potassium is also important to winter survival, disease resistance and drouth tolerance. While phosphorus is essential, it is required in much lesser amounts than the other nutrients.

Use fertilizer with a 15-5-10, 12-4-8 or similar analysis for the fall application.

Base the rate of application on the nitrogen content, the first number in the fertilizer analysis. Apply 1 to 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn. So, with a 12-4-8 fertilizer, use 10 to 15 pounds per 1,000 square feet, depending on when the last fertilizer application was made. If the lawn has been fertilized for the past six






