The Rotan Veterinary Hospital was broken into and burglarized last Thursday evening, November 5th, according to Sheriff Mickey Counts. A person or persons gained entry to the Rotan Veterinary Hospital by prying open the rear door sometime around 11:15 p.m., Thursday, Novem-

ber 5th. After entry was gained, the burglars pruned the safe, removed approximately \$200.00 in cash, an undetermined amount of checks and also removed 4 pair of hemostatic forceps. Counts said that he has three suspects in the case but that no one was in custody.

Rotan School Board Members Set Higher Graduation Requirements

The members of the Rotan School Board voted to change the requirements for graduation at their regular board meeting last Monday night. The board passed a motion, to be implemented over a two year period, to increase graduation credit requirements from the current 19 to 21 by the 1983-84 school year.

Beginning next year, seniors expecting to graduate will be required to have four years of high school English. Students are now only required to have the state minimum of three years high school English. Effective with the 1983-84 year, all students expecting to graduate will

be required to have: 4 years English; 2 years high school science; 2 years high school math; 2 years high school history and 2 years of either high school band or physical education. In addition, students will be required

to have a half year of civics and a half year of health. Seniors graduating in 1983-84 will be required to have a total of 13 required units with 8 units of electives giving a total of 21 units for graduation. In other action the board

passed motions concerning the recent changes in teacher contracts and postponed a vote until Friday, November 13th at noon on the candidate for the Fisher County Appraisal Board.

Fisher County Jury Sentences Templin, 99 Years For Murder

A Fisher County jury deliberated 25 minutes Monday afternoon before sentencing Bobby Templin to 99 years in prison for the murder by electrocution of his wife.

Defense Attorney Charles Scarborough of Abilene said he will appeal Templin's conviction, which was handed down Friday. Templin's trial began last week in 32nd District

Court, more than five years after his wife, 20-year-old Rhonda, was electrocuted. Months after Mrs. Templin's death, a Fisher County grand jury no-billed the case, citing a

lack of incriminating evidence. Earlier this year, a grand jury in the same county indicted Templin for his wife's death. The case never died, in part, because the parents of the deceased woman, Mr. and Mrs. Norbert Schlegel of Shamrock, filed a \$10,000 civil lawsuit against Templin, who they claimed was responsible for their daughter's death.

Templin is currently in the Fisher County Jail and will be transported to the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville by Sheriff Mickey Counts in the near future to begin serving his 99 year sentence.

The members of the Roby School Board met in regular session last Monday night approving the members of the Text Book Committee for 1982-83. In other action the board

approved the 1981 audit by Riggs, Day and Ewton and approved several service policies with reference to Senate Bill 341 concerning teacher contracts. The board approved policies relating to the non-renewal of all term contracts, adopted reasons, adopted rules for hearing, adopted recommendations for administrative hearings and adopted regulations for job descriptions and evaluations for teachers.

In final action the board voted to accept bids on the

sale of 13 manual typewriters with bids to be opened up at the December board meeting.

Board members voted to postpone voting on a member to the Fisher County Appraisal Board until Friday, November 13th.

8,326 Bales Ginned In Fisher County

The Fisher County Gins are just beginning the season, with a total of 8,326 bales ginned to date. Rotan Gin reported 2,472 bales, Farmers Gin Company 648, Hobbs Co-op Gin 1,700, Farmers Union Co-op Gin in Roby reported 705, Terry's Gin, Inc. in Roby 1,047, Longworth Gin 190, and Sylvester Co-op Gin 220. The gin managers reported the cotton is just beginning to come in and the season should be in full swing before too long, with the weather permitting.

Sterling City Squad Blanks Roby Lions In Season Finale 26-0

The Roby Lions traveled to Sterling City Friday to close their football season. The Lions lost the game 26-0. The Lions played a good game but could not overcome the Eagles size and well-balanced offense. The Lions took the opening kickoff and, un-

able to move the ball, punted to the Eagles. They started the drive on their 33 yard line and moved for the touchdown in 8 plays. The last play was a 1 yard run. The PAT kick was no good. With 8 minutes left in the first quarter, the Eagles led 6-0. The Lions began their

next possession on their 20 yard line. After being thrown for a 12 yard loss, the Lions began to move the ball. In 10 plays Roby had moved the ball from their 8 yard line to the Eagles' 49 when, on a 4th down and 5, the Eagles picked off a Lion pass to stop the drive. The Eagles began this possession on their own 38 yard line, but were unable to make a 1st down and punted back to the Lions. Roby got the ball on their 39 yard line and ran 3 plays before the 1st quarter ended.

The 2nd quarter started with the Lions on the Eagle 43 yard line with a 1st and 10. After 2 incompletes passes, Roby suffered its 2nd interception of the night to stop the drive. With the interception the Eagles started on their own 48 yard line. After being unable to move the ball and two penalties, the Eagles had a 4th down and 17 on their 39 yard line. On the punt the Lions were called for roughing the kicker and the Eagles kept the ball and had a 1st down on the 49 yard line. Again the Eagles were moved backwards. On a 4th down and 14 from their 44 the Eagles' punter passed to his teammate for a 16 yard gain. Three plays later the Eagles scored their second touchdown of the night. The PAT was no good. With 6:50 to go till the half the Eagles then led 12-0.

The Lions began their next possession on their 17 yard line and had moved the ball out to the 47 in four plays when, on the fifth play of the drive, the Lions fumbled the ball over to the Eagles. The Eagles ran 3 plays and fumbled back to the Lions. Roby's Terry Coker got the loose ball for the Lions. The Lions

kept the ball for 3 plays then fumbled again to the Eagles. The Eagles were unable to sustain a drive and punted to the Lions, who ran 3 plays to end the first half.

The second half began with the Eagles taking the ball on their 25 yard line and keeping the ball for 12 plays, the last being a 38 yard pass play for a touchdown with 6:30 to go in the 3rd quarter. The 2 point conversion was good. The Eagles then led 20-0. The Lions began their next drive on their own 12 yard line. Sophomore John Etheredge was now the Lions quarterback, replacing the injured Robby King. On the first play of the drive the Lions suffered another interception and after a penalty the Eagles had the ball 1st and goal on the 6 yard line. The Eagles scored in 2 plays. The PAT was no good with 5:11 to go in the 3rd quarter. The Eagles now led 26-0. The Lions began their next possession on the 21 yard line and after making 2 first downs, lost the ball again on an interception. Then the Eagles ran 3 plays and fumbled the ball-Roby's Reggie Parks grabbing this one for the Lions. The Lions had the ball for 2 plays when the quarter ended.

The Lions started the 4th quarter with a 3rd and 7 at the Eagles 35 yard line, when the Eagles picked off another Lion pass, their 4th of the night. The Eagles, taking over on their 10 yard line, had moved the ball out to the Lions 30 yard line where their drive was stopped by a fumble, this one recovered for the Lions by Michael Porter.

The Lions moved the ball from the 20 yard line to the 45 where, on 4th down,

they punted. After the good punt by Michael Porter, the Eagles started on their 11 yard line and in 7 plays had moved the ball to the Lions 45 yard line. Here Roby's John Etheredge intercepted an Eagle pass to stop another drive. The Lions had the ball for 3 plays when the clock ran out.

Statistics were: First Downs-Roby had 10, Sterling City had 17; Rushing Yardage-Roby 86, Sterling City 236; Passing-Roby 28,

Sterling City 55; Passing-Roby was 2 of 15 with 4 interceptions, Sterling City was 3 of 13 with 1 interception. Both teams lost the ball twice on fumbles. Penalties-Roby was 5 for 55, Sterling City was 10 for 120; Punts-Roby was 2 for 36, Sterling City was 2 for 35.

Leading rusher for the Lions was Putnam with 43 yards on 11 carries; for the Eagles No. 40 had 90 yards on 12 carries and No. 30 had 91 yards on 14 carries.



Well, not too much news this week; everyone is really busy in the fields, and we hope that it will stay dry so folks can get their cotton out. See you next Thursday.

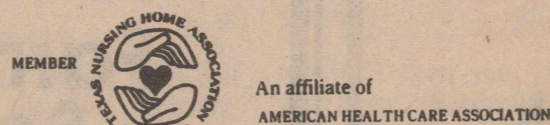

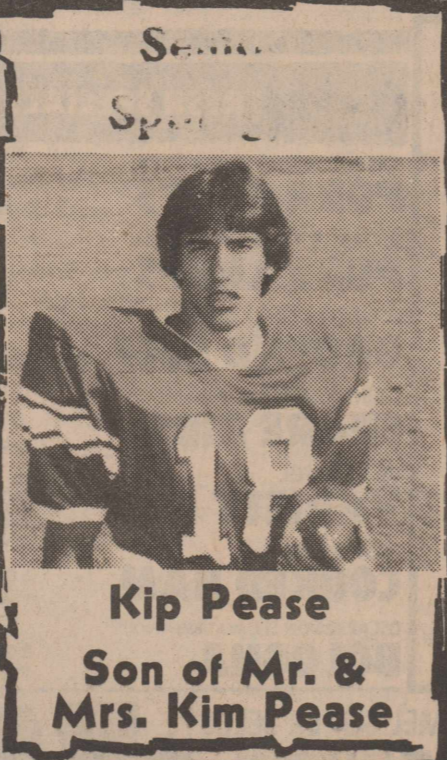

The Indians scored twice more before the game ended.

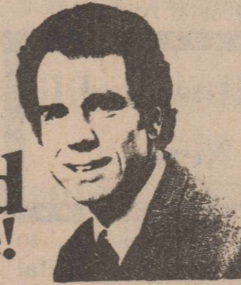
