### Fisher County Hospital Board Approved \$1.4 Million Budget

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board approved the Fisher County Hospital budget for 1982 at their regular monthly meeting last Monday night. The budget approved amounted to \$1,401,347.00 and represents an increase of approximately \$100,000 over the 1981 budget of \$1,302,000.00, according to Jerry Weatherly, Hospital Administrator.

"The increase in the 1982 budget over 1981 is primarily attributed to inflationary factors. Insurance coverage is up, utilities are expected to be up approximately \$10,000 in 1982 and salaries are up," said Weatherly.

In other board action last Monday night, they set the tax-exemption for homesteads for persons 65 and over at \$10,000 and made the decision to tax automobiles in the same manner as Fisher County for 1982.

The board discussed hospitalization insurance for employees. Blue Cross

rates are expected to take a 46% increase on March 15th. The board discussed changing insurance companies or re-writing the coverage at a lesser cost. Additional information will be discussed at a special

board meeting or at the regular March meeting of the board, according to Weatherly.

The board and Administrator Jerry Weatherly discussed the Registered Nurse shortage at the

Fisher County Hospital. Weatherly informed the board that he hired Grace Dasari, formerly of Seymour, Texas, and originally from India, as a Registered Nurse on the 11-7 shift.

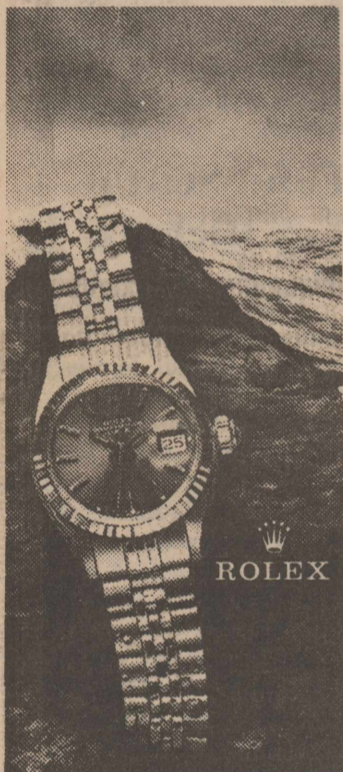

## Rotan Boys Beat Jim Ned

The Rotan boys varsity basketball team, winless in district play during the 1980-81 season and winless until last week in the 1981-82 district season,

defeated Jim Ned by the score of 62-56 to record their first district win in two seasons. The boys played their final game of the 1981-82 season last

Tuesday night against Albany. Results of that game will be carried in next week's paper.

A total of 3 Rotan players scored in double figures and set the scoring pace in the district win. Sammy Turner had 14 points; Kip Pease had 14; and Marcus Conner 12 to lead scorers for the night. Others scoring included: Greg Gruben 2; Henry Williams 8; Eli Turner 5; Jeff Posey 2; Darrin Leverton 2; Keith Copeland 3.

Rotan led at the end of the first quarter 11-10; the score was tied at halftime 25-25; Rotan outscored Jim Ned 22-6 in the third quarter taking a 47-31 lead into the final quarter and held on to defeat Jim Ned 56-62 at the final buzzer.

## Selective Service Lists Are Available

The Selective Service System is continuing to make available for public inspection lists of registrants and their tentative local board assignments. This is in keeping with the intent of Selective Service that its procedures be open to the public.

The list may be viewed at the County Courthouse.

The lists cover registrations processed through September 30, 1981, and include men born in 1960, 1961, 1962, and 1963.

Local board assignments are arranged by ZIP code bases upon the registrant's permanent address.

The requirement to register applies to U.S. citizens, and to aliens residing in the United States, born on or after January 1, 1960. Men born in 1960 and 1961 were scheduled to register during July 1980; men born in 1962 were scheduled to register in January 1981; those born in 1963 were scheduled to register during July 1981. Men born in 1964 are required to register within 30 days of their 18th birthday. They may do so at any U.S. Post Office.

On January 7, 1982, President Reagan announced his decision to continue peacetime Select-

ive Service Registration. In announcing his decision, the President declared a grace period during which late registration would be accepted without penalty. That grace period extends through February 1982.

Anyone who was scheduled to register previously but has not yet done so is encouraged to register immediately at any U.S. Post Office in order to avoid any possible penalty.

## WTU Rates Increase In County

A settlement agreement allowing West Texas Utilities Company to increase its rates to retail customers in Rotan and Roby has been approved by the Texas Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The new rates, which will average about 8.3 per cent above the old rates, were placed in effect on Friday, February 12. This action is in accordance with a stipulated agreement with all intervenors, including

cities represented by the Texas Municipal League, WTU and the PUC staff.

The increase is designed to increase the Company's annual retail revenues by \$11.8 million. A wholesale rate increase of \$5.5 million, also settled by agreement and expected to be approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, would bring WTU's total annual revenue increase to \$17.3

million. The Company had applied for a total increase of \$32.2.

The effect on a residential bill for 600 kilowatt-hours of electricity per month would be slightly over 10 per cent. This would include the fuel cost adjustment. For 600 kilowatts at a residence, the bill would be \$37.89 under the new rates and \$34.39 under the old rates.

## County Agent Report

By Richard Spencer

Important changes in the Texas brucellosis program have been proposed and should have an important impact on the control of the disease. Public comments are now being sought by the Texas

Animal Health Commission on regulation proposals to require calfhood vaccination of heifer calves for brucellosis control under certain conditions. Amendments to

the Texas program now proposed would require calfhood vaccination of all heifers born after Jan. 1, 1982, for movement into the state or when changing ownership. Exceptions would be heifers consigned to a quarantined feedlot or pasture, those consigned to slaughter, or those branded and consigned to a special regulated pasture.

Reduced dosage of Strain 19 vaccine, which has been available for the past year, is almost as effective as the higher dosage used in the past. With the old

strength, Strain 19 was sometimes blamed for causing female animals to be diagnosed as having brucellosis, when, in fact, it was a reaction of the vaccine itself.

Reduced dosage is expected to help eliminate confusion over levels of antibodies in the blood of vaccinated heifers. Some females in the past developed persisting residual blood titers after vaccination with the old strength of the vaccine. The titers are measurements of antibodies resulting from vaccination or

brucellosis infection.

Titers induced by the vaccination using the reduced dose are lower and recede rapidly although the degree of immunity is practically equal to that

produced by higher dosage.

Vaccination ages for eligible heifer calves are now four to 12 months for all breeds. Being able to vaccinate animals up to 12

months of age with less worry about false reaction to blood tests is another advantage.

The vaccine must be administered by certified veterinarians or personnel

approved by the Texas Animal Health Commission, since the vaccine is fragile and must be handled under controlled conditions to establish good immunity.
