Rotan Jr. Hi. Track Team Schedule


The members of the Rotan Junior High track team will participate in three track meets this season prior to the district meet in Hamlin.

Farmer Held Cotton Reserve Program Is Outlined To Block

Editors Note: C.D. (Monk) Herron attended a meeting recently in Lubbock concerning a new program that is underway called "Farmer Held Cotton Reserve". The program is designed to get the loan price of cotton up and involves the Rolling Plains and High Plains cotton growers. The below information is presented by Herron. Those needing additional information can contact Herron at 735-2875. There is a move underway to attempt to get letters to Secretary of Agriculture John Block outlining the need for him to put the outlined program in effect. Those desiring to write need to do so immediately. We understand that he will make a decision in the next 10 days. Letters need to be sent to: Secretary of Agriculture - John Block, U.S.D.A. Independence & 14th Street S-W, Washington, DC 20250.

Establishment of Program
We propose that the Secretary use the discretionary authority presently available to him to immediately establish a farmer-held reserve for the eligible 1981 upland cotton production.

Form and Level of Loans
Secretary shall make original, extended, or supplemental price support loans for reserve. Entry level shall be at 150 percent of each individual

producer's 1981 average CCC loan level, payment not to exceed 150 percent of SLM 1-1/16 premium mic - CCC loan level (52.50).

1981 cotton presently in the CCC loan will be eligible for a supplemental price support loan total of which shall not exceed the 150 percent level.

1981 cotton production not in CCC loan will be eligible for an original

price support loan at the full 150 percent level.

Repayment Terms
Repayment in not less than 18 months or more than 3 years.

Storage Payments
Payments sufficient to cover cost of storage.

Interest Rate
Rate of interest based upon rate charged CCC by Treasury. Secretary may waive or adjust.

Release Level
No provisions for minimum and maximum quantities.

When the market price is between 160 and 165 percent of each producer's 1981 CCC loan average, storage payments may be discontinued to encourage producers to redeem loans and market their cotton.

Call Level
No call level, but Secretary may require producer to repay loans prior to maturity if emergency condition exist.

Reserve Size
No provisions for minimum and maximum quantities.

Restriction on CCC Sales
Whenever a reserve program is in effect for upland cotton CCC may not sell stocks of cotton at less than 115 percent of release level.

Eligible Production for Reserve
75 percent of all available 1981 upland cotton production of each farm shall be eligible for entry into the upland cotton reserve.

Provision for "Free Cotton"
Free cotton shall move into market channels at the discretion of the owner.

Release Level [omitted from previous paragraph]
But if a producer redeems his loan before the market price for cotton reaches 150 percent of his 1981 CCC loan average, he will be subject to penalty: the Secretary shall recover storage payments and assess penalty interest or other charges.

General Provisions
The plan would be voluntary in nature. Secretary is to use CCC to carry out the program.

All producers of upland cotton would be eligible to participate in this proposal.

This proposal encompasses the unsold 1981 upland cotton production. Part 2 of 2 parts

Establishment of Program
We propose that the Secretary use the discretionary authority presently available to him to establish a farmer-held reserve/paid land diversion combination for the 1982 upland cotton crop production.

Form and Level of Loans
Secretary shall make original, extended, or supplemental price support loans for reserve.

Entry level shall be at 150 percent of each individual producer's 1982 average CCC loan level, payment not to exceed 150 percent of SLM 1-1/16 premium mic CCC loan level 57.08.

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But if a producer redeems his loan before the market price for cotton reaches 150 percent of his 1981 CCC loan average, he will be subject to penalty: the Secretary shall recover storage payments and assess penalty interest or other charges.

Cotton producers that voluntarily increase their reduction of planted acres to 25 percent (instead of just 15 percent as announced by the Secretary) shall be eligible for entering 75 percent of their 1982 cotton production into a cotton reserve.

Entry into the reserve shall constitute a "payment in kind" in lieu of diversion payments to the producer.

Repayment Terms
Repayment is not less than 18 months nor more than 3 years.

Storage Payments
Payments sufficient to cover cost of storage.

Interest Rate
Rate of interest based upon rate charged CCC by Treasury. Secretary may waive or adjust.

Release Level
When the market price is between 160 and 165 percent of each producer's 1982 CCC loan average, storage payments may be discontinued to encourage producers to redeem loans and market their cotton.

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Call Level
No call level, but Secretary may require producer to repay loans prior to maturity if emergency condition exists.

Reserve Size
No provisions for minimum and maximum quantities.

Restrictions on CCC Sales
Whenever a reserve program is in effect for upland cotton CCC may not sell stocks of cotton at less than 115 percent of release level. Restriction does not apply to sales of deteriorating stocks.

Provisions for "Free Cotton"
Free cotton shall move into market channels at the discretion of the owner.

Base for Acreage Limitations
Base year may be the preceding year or the average of the two preceding years whichever is larger.

General Provisions
The plan would be voluntary in nature. The Secretary is to use CCC to carry out the program.


All producers of upland cotton would be eligible to participate in the proposal. This proposal encompasses the 1982 production of upland cotton.



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


