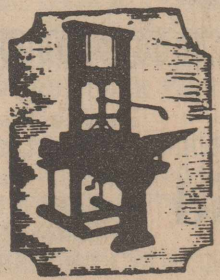

Steve Carriker Announces For State Representative

Steven A. Carriker, 31, of Roby, announced his intentions to run for the Democratic nomination for State Representative in the newly-created 78th district of Texas. The sprawling 78th district covers 12 counties of West

Central and Northwestern Texas. Those counties are Cottle, King, Knox, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Scurry, Jones, Nolan, and rural Taylor, as well as Carriker's home county of Fisher.

A farmer and livestock

producer, Carriker said in his announcement statement at a press conference in the Fisher County Courthouse on Thursday morning that people of the small towns and rural areas "need one of their own to stand up for them in the halls of government". He went on to say that although the state house is dominated by the large urban interests, that rural and small town people have an opportunity, due to the configuration of the new district, to elect their own candidate

to the legislature.

Carriker called attention to the special problems faced by the schools, the agricultural and business communities, and the elderly of the 78th district and emphasized his desire to work for the often overlooked interests of those groups in Austin. Carriker and his wife Kathy live on the family farm in eastern Fisher County. They have a six year-old son and are expecting their second child in May.

Rotan L.L. Purchases New Uniforms

The Rotan Little League recently voted to purchase new uniforms for the four major league teams at an approximate cost of \$1,000 according to Linda Morrow, Rotan Little League Secretary.

The Vets uniforms will cost \$18.29 each for the 13 uniforms and will be royal blue pants and silver gray shirts. The Rebels will have silver gray pants and scarlet shirts at a cost of \$19.77 each. Pirate uniforms will cost \$20.10 each and will include white pants and navy shirts. The Yankee uniforms will cost \$20.23 each and will be white pants with gold shirts trimmed in kelly green.

In addition to purchasing the new uniforms the Little League organization ordered all-star shirts at a cost of \$17.26 each and purchased new caps for all four major league teams at a cost of \$2.75 each.

Subscribers of the Roby Star Record-Rotan Advance will notice a new mailing label on their newspaper this week-one done by our computer on a sticky back pressure sensitive label.

The computerized mailing label is being done weekly at The Newspaper Office as part of a new computer implementation system for various facets of the business. "The mailing list for the Rotan Advance & Roby Star Record is the initial phase that will eventually include accounts payable (statements); accounts receivable (checks) and a general ledger implementation over the course of the next 6 months," said Editor Kim Pease.

"We want to emphasize to each subscriber, that they pay particular attention to the mailing label this week," said Pease.

The top line contains a code for postal purposes that categorizes subscribers into delivery sequence and places subscribers in zip code categories. The information on the end of the first line (code line) has reference to the expiration date of each subscriber. In each case, the expiration date follows "Exp-" and reads "01/83 or 05/84" meaning that the subscription expires in January of 1983 or May of 1984. Please take some time to be sure that the expiration date printed on your label corresponds to the information in your records concerning the expiration of your newspaper. In all cases, the paper expires on the first day of the month-for example, if your expiration date reads "01/83", your paper expires on January 1, 1983.

We have made an all-out effort to attempt to be as accurate as possible when entering the information into the computer concerning names, correct addresses and correctly spelled towns, states and zip codes. If we have made an error we would appreciate immediate notification in order to correct the mistake.

Since we have programmed the computer to print each subscribers paper expiration date on the mailing label each week, we are going to discontinue the past practice of mailing renewal notifications. It is extremely important to realize that the expiration date is the absolute final date to

receive a paper. If renewals are not received prior to the expiration date the paper will not be mailed. This is also a deviation from past practices. Since most of the subscriptions to the paper expire on January 1st of each year, we have traditionally not mailed notices or notified subscribers until sometime in January. With the new system in effect it will be necessary to renew papers

prior to the expiration date. Most subscribers need to renew papers in December of 1982 this year. The computer is very efficient and very accurate, but if the paper is not renewed-it won't print out a mailing label. If errors in typing, on our part, are detected please call 735-2562 or 735-2278 during normal business hours and we'll correct the error on mailing labels. We want to have our

mailing list as accurate as possible. We realize that some subscribers, especially those living outside Fisher County, have from time to time missed papers because the postal people have had trouble reading the old mailing information.

The new labels are a 100% improvement and should eliminate undeliverable papers on the part of the post offices. If you should have the need to correspond regarding your subscription, be it for change of address or subscription renewal please include the mailing label "code" (top line) in all correspondence. This top line identifies each subscriber according to delivery sequence, zip code category, and allows us easy access to all information concerning each subscriber on the computer.

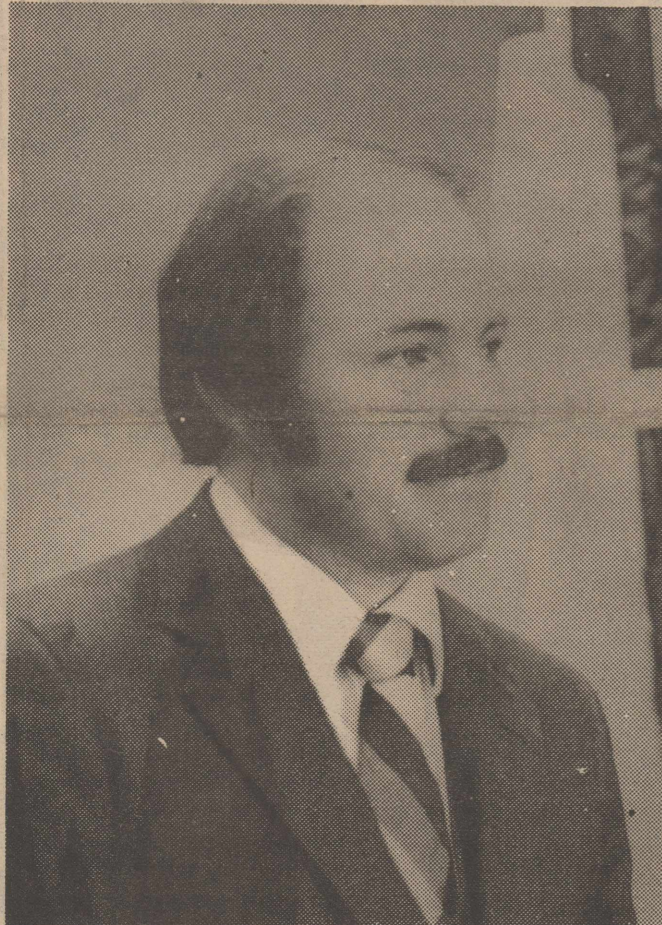

Rotan School Board Re-Hires All Teachers

The members of the Rotan School Board voted during regular session last Monday night to renew the teaching contracts on all teachers within the system, according to Superintendent Jerry Dickson.

In addition to the hiring of teachers, the school board members hired the

following aides under the Title I program, subject to funding. Those hired included: Angel Valez, Chris Gaspar, Pat Boone, D.L. Goodwin, Sharon Overby, Dorothy Soliz and America Yanez.

Secretaries hired last Monday night included: Betty Wilfong, Helen

Heathington and Nell Crawford.

In hiring teachers, the board members extended the "above base pay allowance to teachers" to include those that have teaching and coaching responsibilities. Last year, all teachers were given a \$500.00 above base pay

allowance. At that time it only applied to teachers, not coaches, since coaches were already paid above base for coaching duties.

At last Monday's meeting, the board extended the \$500.00 above base teaching bonus to include coaches.

Other personnel receiving "above base" for duties include: Mrs. Pat Hamric, \$1,000 above state base for counselor, librarian, teacher duties; Kay Kennedy, \$3,000 above for

band director duties; Robert Damron, \$4,000 above state base for head football coach and athletic director duties; Jo Damron, Ted Posey and Dick Lepard, \$3,000 above for head coaching duties and Jon Curry, \$2,500 above base for junior high coaching duties.

In other action the Rotan School Board voted to adopt the 1982-83 school calendar; approved a resolution calling for the taxation of personal pro-

perty automobiles; accepted the text book committee recommendations and adopted a statement of property values for insur-

ance purposes for all buildings on campus.

The board authorized Superintendent Jerry Dickson to purchase a 53

passenger school bus and set a meeting for 7:00 p.m., Monday, April 5th, to canvass the election results.

Rotan Girls Take 5th At Aspermont Meet

Although they only managed a 2nd place finish, for the best of the day, Rotan's girls still amassed 43 points and a 5th place finish at the Double Mountain Relays in Asper-

mont last Saturday in a field of 25 girls teams from around the area.

The 1600 meter relay team made up of Elisa Carrillo, Kellie Pease, Pat Martinez and Rocky Garza finished 2nd with a time of 4:27.00 which was a full 10 seconds faster than last week's time.

The 800 meter relay team was 3rd with a time of 1:54.36. That team is composed of Dilana Long,

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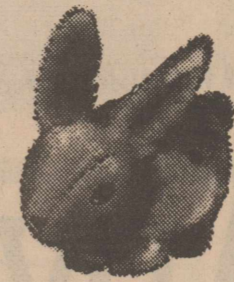

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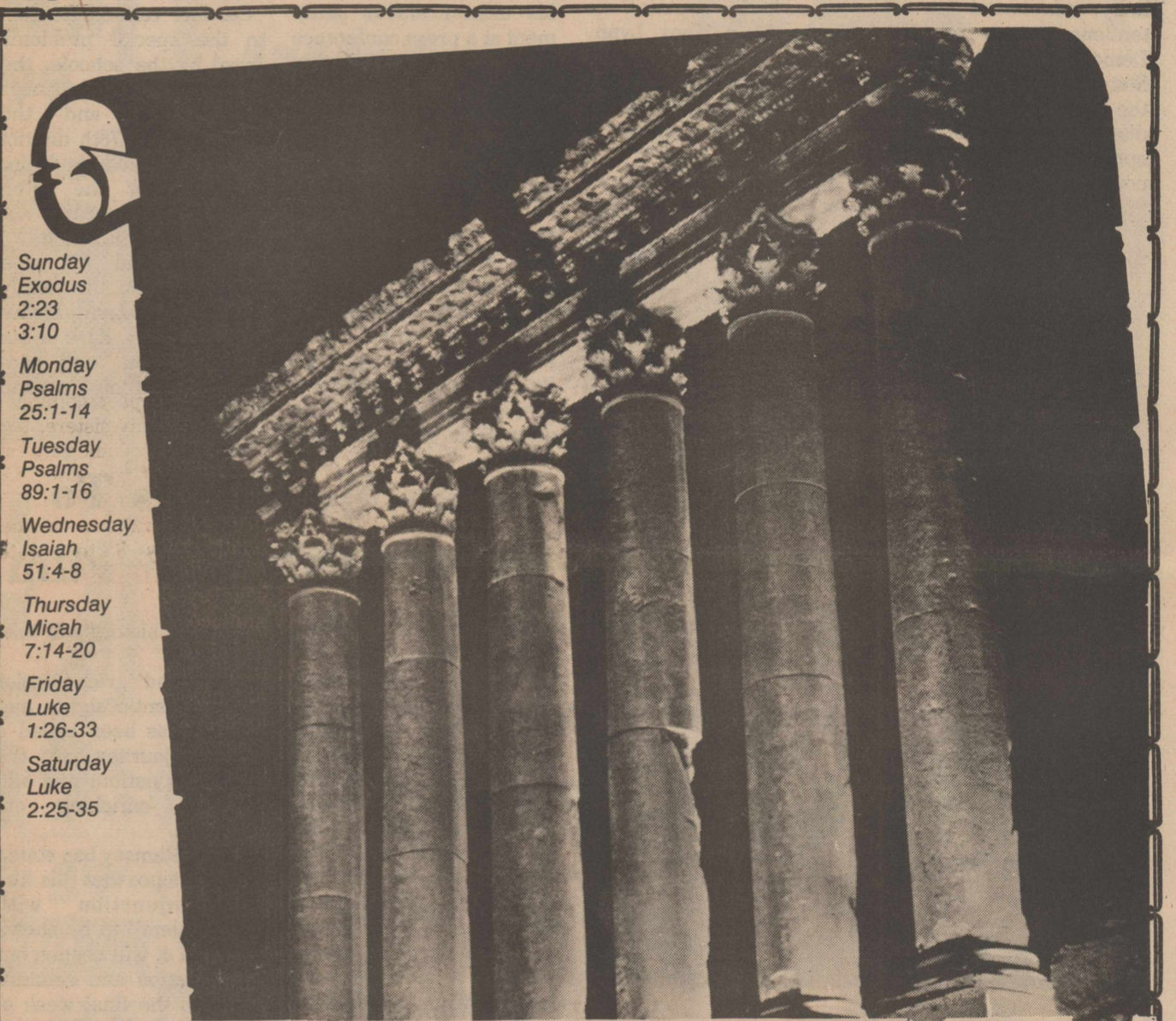

Dear Sir:

As one having a long family background in Roby and Fisher County, I write to ask that you publish this letter in the hope that it will attract support for the Roby Cemetery Association.

My grandfather, David Thomas Bullock, was a resident of Roby at the time Fisher County was officially separated from Nolan County and became the county seat of Fisher County in 1886. He served as a member of the Commissioners Court of Fisher County until 1982 when he became District and County Clerk, a position he held until his death in 1907. He owned and was editor of the Roby

Banner, the predecessor of your paper. The Bullock homestead included the land where the water tower now stands and from other land he donated that upon which the town of Rotan is built.

My grandmother was Margaret Ann Coulter Bullock. Only five of their ten children survived infancy. My mother, Ruth Bullock, was one of the surviving children. At an early age she attended Kidd-Key College in Sherman where she finished high school and college. She remained there to teach French until her marriage in 1913 to my father. He was the son of Judge H.O. Head of Sherman and the first of four of us to bear the name Hayden Wilson Head.

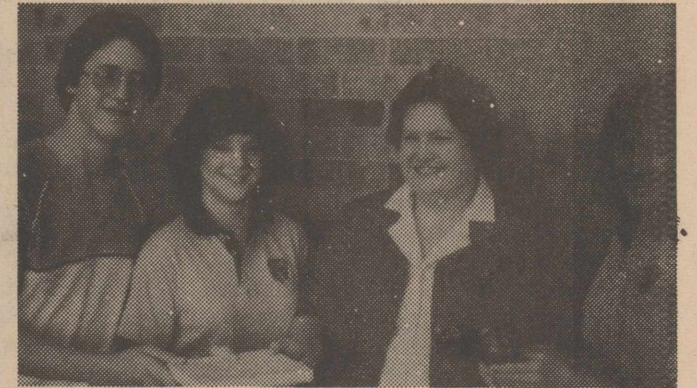
My grandparents, their infant children who died in Roby and my grandmother's brother, R.A. Coulter, are all buried in the Bullock family lot in the Roby Cemetery. During her lifetime my mother took an active interest in seeing that the cemetery was maintained and in doing all that she could to contribute to the efforts of Miss Dudley Hambright to see that the Bullock family lot as well as the entire cemetery were kept properly.

After my mother's death she is buried in Sherman in a crypt adjoining my father's-my sisters, brother and I became very much aware of the Roby Cemetery Association and the fine work that is being done by it to create a perpetual care fund for the

cemetery. Its goal of \$75,000 to establish the fund has been almost reached, with \$60,000 having been given to this date. The other \$15,000 is badly needed, however, to effect the endowment with a rate of return on its investment that will allow the cemetery to be kept permanently as it should be.

Although there are fewer than 1,000 people in Roby, there are approximately 3,500 graves in the Roby Cemetery and its mainten-

ance is a matter of concern to the entire county as well as those of us whose ancestors are buried there. I urge, therefore, that this letter be considered an appeal for contributions to the Roby Cemetery Association. These contributions should be sent to Miss Dudley Hambright, Roby, Texas 79543. Givers to the fund can be assured that their contributions will be put to good use in creating a lasting memorial.

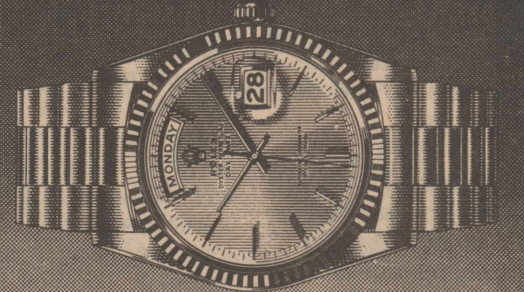
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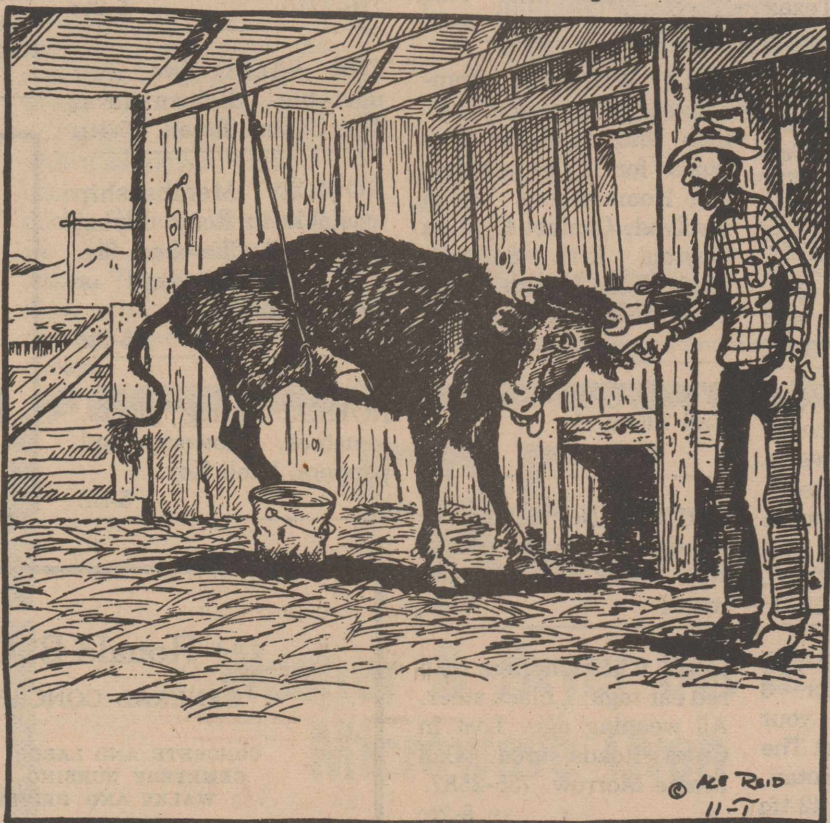

Wilburn Drilling Sets Wildcat Site West Of Roby

A 6,600-ft. Fisher County wildcat for oil or gas is scheduled for drilling 10 miles west of Roby. The explorer well will be known as the No. 1 W.S. Etheredge Jr. Drillsite is in a nine-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey. J.A. Wilburn of Sweetwater is the operator.

seven miles southeast of Sylvester in Fisher County's Miles Survey. It will be known as the No. 2 Bob Gartman, with Hopehill Petroleum Co. of Fort Worth as the operator. Hopehill has 232 acres leased.

160-acre unit in Stonewall County's H&TCRR Survey.

Getty Oil, operating out of Sweetwater has staked locations for three developmental wells in Stonewall County's Flowers Field. Locations range between four and six miles southeast of Aspermont. Getty has 5,876 acres blocked up in leases. Projected total depth for all three wells is 4,550 feet, all drillsites being in the H&TCRR Survey. The wells are designated as the Nos. 218, 219 and 222 Flowers Unit.

Terrell Operating of Hamlin has driven stake for a 6,500-ft. oil wildcat located one mile south of the Hamlin townsite. The

explorer well will be known as the No. 1 T.J. Routh Estate. It will be spudded in a 295-acre lease in the Austin & Williams League 354.

Also planning a Stonewall County wildcat is Olympia Oil Corp. of San Antonio. The operator has staked drillsite for the No. 1 Graham, a 4,000-ft. explorer located 15 miles northwest of Aspermont. It will be located in a 333-acre lease, H&TCRR Survey.

James P. Dunigan Inc. of Abilene has completed the No. 3 K. Duncan, pumping 21 barrels of oil per day in Nolan County's Hale Field 3.5 miles southwest of Trent. The location is in a 160-acre unit in the

T&PRR Survey. The operator took the hole to 2,985-ft. bottom and perforated for production 2,876 to 2,881 feet into the hole.

The No. 1 Mary S. Cook, a developmental well in Nolan County's Group W. Field, has been brought on line by Leger Production Inc. of Hampshire. It showed potential to make 14 barrels of oil and 280,000 CF casinghead gas per day, open choke. Location is in a 640-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, about three miles south of Maryneal. Bottomed at 7,298 feet, the well was plugged back to 6,186 and will produce from Strawn Formation perforations, 6,158 to 6,173 feet into the hole.

Stonewall County's North Peacock Field saw a new producer go on line when Clear Fork Inc. of Abilene finished the No. 1 Mc-

Donald. It pumped at the rate of 63 barrels of oil per day.

The production interval will be 3,392 to 3,399 feet

into the hole. Total depth was 3,490 feet. The well is located in a 320-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, 15 miles northwest of Aspermont.

Pumping 55 barrels of oil per day, open choke, the No. 2 Adcock "B" has been brought on line in Fisher County's Square Field, four miles southeast of McCaulley. Square Exploration of Richardson is the operator.

Bottomed at 3,225 feet, the well was perforated to produce from an interval in the Noodle Creek Formation, 2,892 to 2,898 feet into the wellbore. The well was located in a 40-acre unit in the Sally English Survey.

Hamlin-based Terrell Operating Co. has filed for permit to drill the No. 3 Revis Robertson (North), a developmental well in the Keeler-Wimberly Field in Fisher County's BBB&CRR Survey. Location will be in an acre lease, four miles northwest of Hamlin. Projected total depth is 4,999 feet.

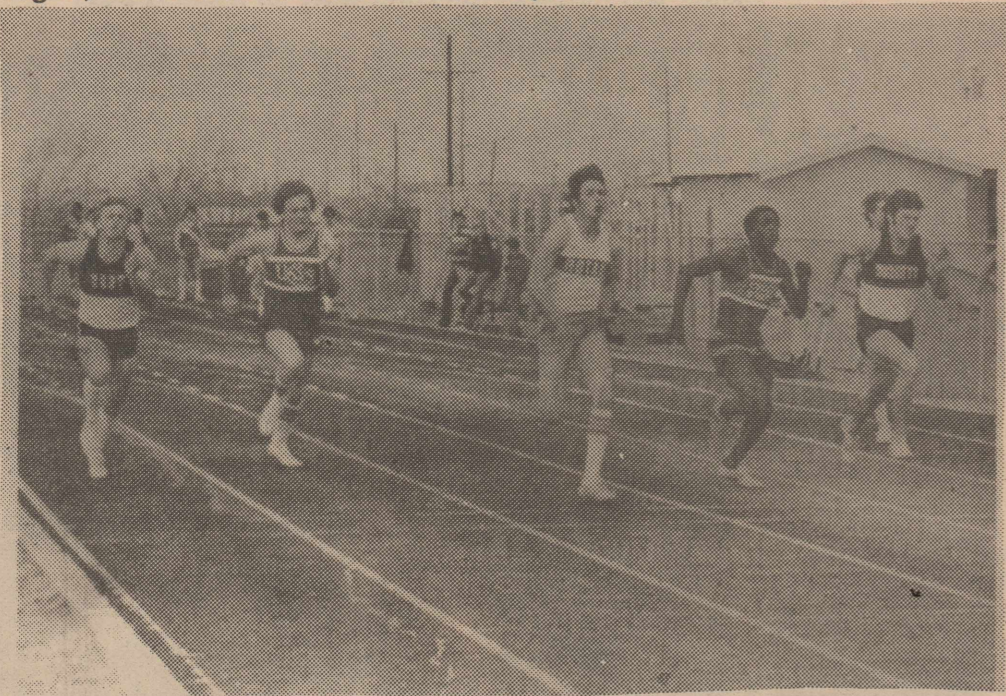

How can you know this system will work for you? Start by investigating

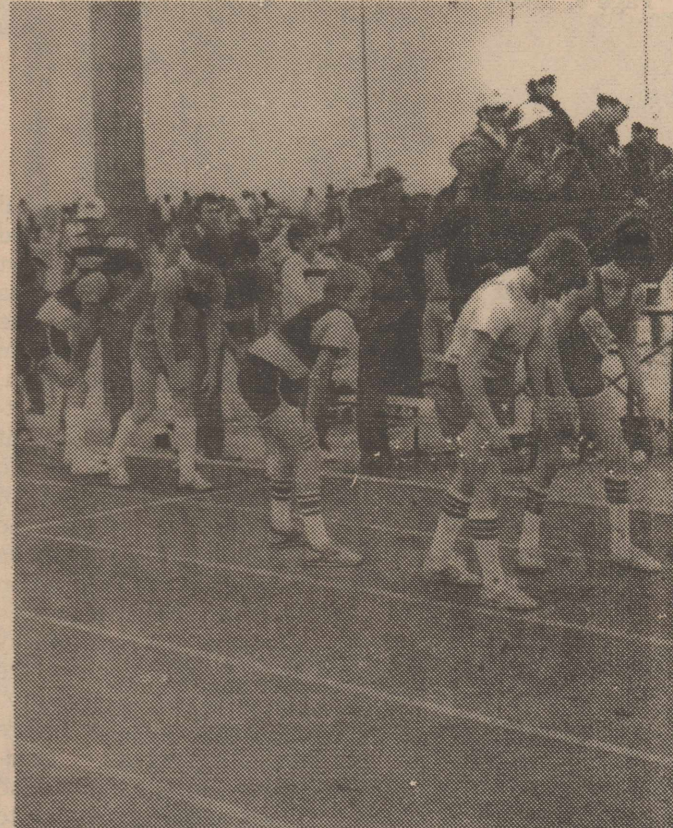
second hand stores in your local area. Find out store reputation and policies.

Baptist Show Large Gains In All Areas

Texas Baptists recorded gains last year in total membership and increased their number of churches and missions from 4,512 to 4,582.

All church organizations recorded membership gains, but baptisms dropped from a 1980 total of 87,138, third highest in the denomination's history, to 61,024 in 1981.

Undaunted by the decline in baptisms, Carlos McLeod, recently-elected director of evangelism for Texas Baptists, noted the denomination has set a goal to baptize a record 75,000 new converts in 1982.

More than 4,500 Southern Baptist churches and missions in the state surpassed the half billion dollar mark in giving for the first time as the 2,254,461 members gave \$504,940,893 in church offerings.

Missions gifts set an all-time record too as the churches contributed \$82.6 million. More than \$40.8 million of the total was through the Cooperative Program, Southern Baptists regular lifeline of support for state mission causes and for more than 5,000 missionaries in the United States and almost 100 nations.

One of the largest increases was in Sunday School enrollment, up 17,714 over the previous year's total of 1,159,418.

Membership of all major church organizations increased with church training and church music leading in percentage gains of 3.1 percent over last year. Church training enrollment increased 7,047 over the 1980 total, and church music increased by 6,501 to a total of 213,316.

Woman's Missionary Union increased statewide by 1,012 members, and Texas Baptist Men raised its total membership to 64,901, a gain of 1,841.

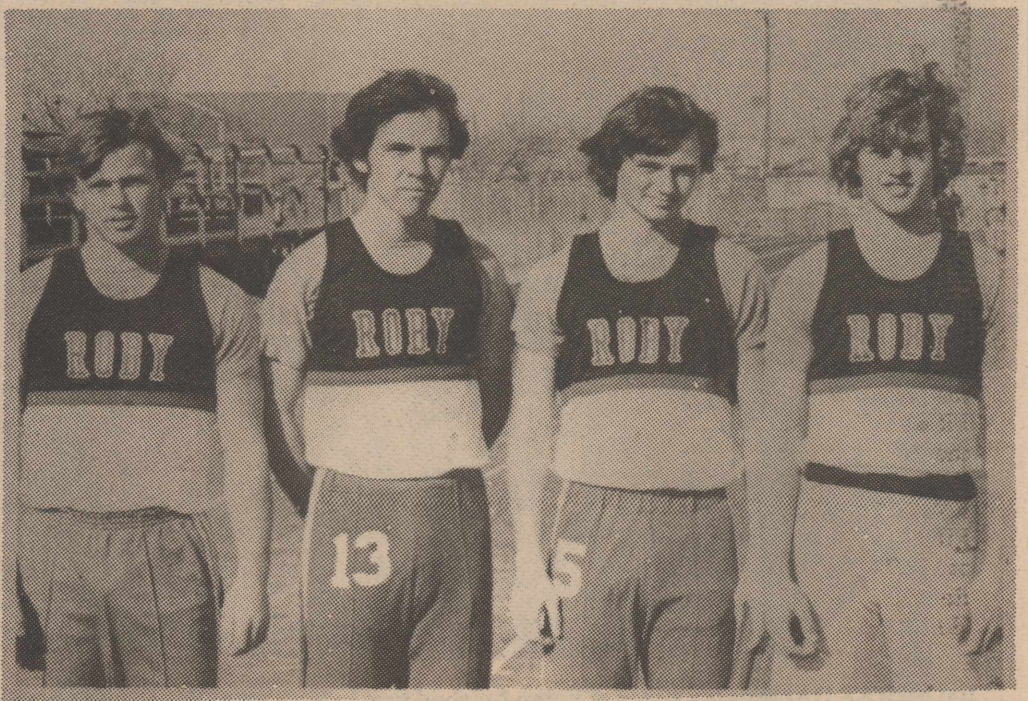

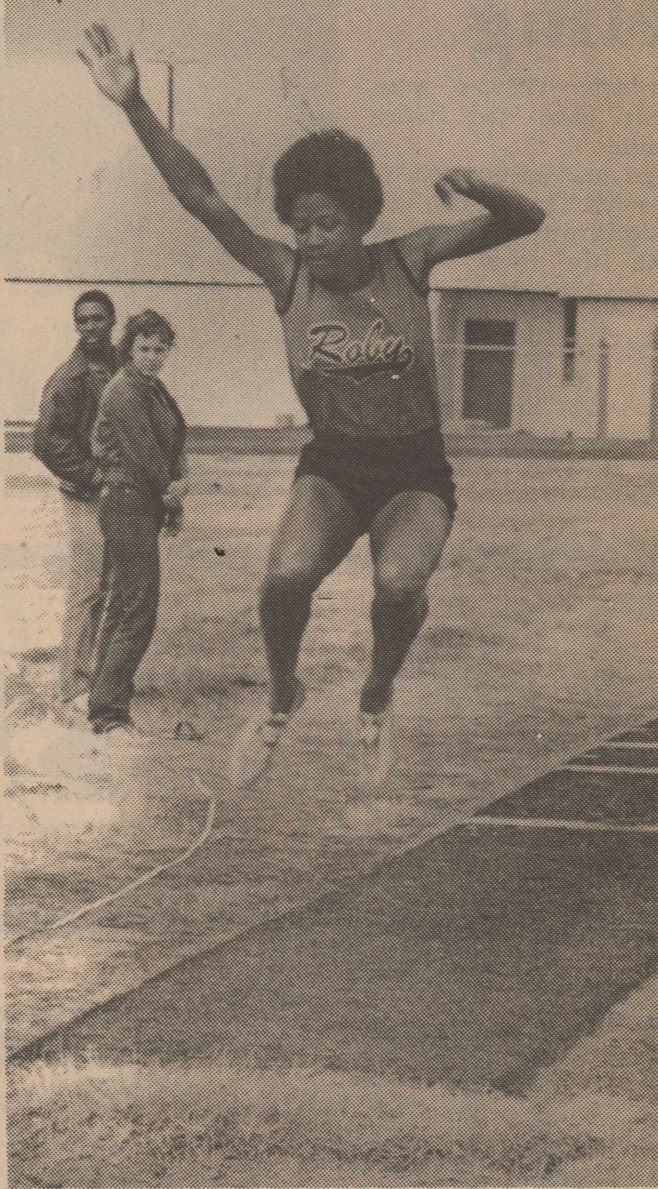

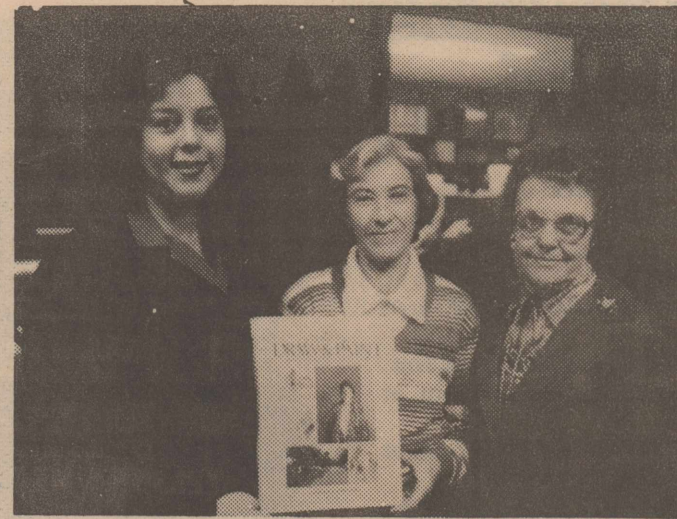
