

Clayton To Play In Coaches All-Star Game In Houston

Mary Nell Clayton has been selected to play in the Texas High School Girls Coaches Association All-Star Game. The game will be played on the University of Houston campus, Houston, Texas, July 10, 1982. Miss Clayton will be playing for

the North All-Stars at an outside position. Miss Clayton helped lead her team to two consecutive trips to the regional basketball tournament in Levelland. She averaged 21 points per game, 10.2 rebounds and 8 assists, while being selected as an

all-district basketball player for three consecutive years and Honorable mention her freshman year. This year she was elected on the 3rd team all-state team.

Mary Nell is also an excellent track performer, appearing at the state track meet and winning at least one event and competing in at least three events her freshman, sophomore and junior years. She is expected to return to the state track meet this year as a participant in the 400 meter run, triple jump and the long jump.

She has been a twirler for four years with the Roby School Band. Mary Nell received a Superior Rating at Regional in 1980-81 and advanced to State U.I.L.

Twirling Division I, Class A contest in June 1981 where she received a superior rating and the trio of Roby twirlers of which she is a member won the State Sweepstakes trophy of Class A twirlers. Mary Nell has again received a superior rating at Regional U.I.L. contest this year and will go to State U.I.L. contest in Austin in June 1982.


Mary Nell is also a regional qualifier in tennis.

This girl is being actively recruited by some twenty colleges in Texas as a basketball prospect.

Bingo Decision Due County Will Name New Hospital Board Saturday

Fisher County voters will take to the various election locations this Saturday to name new school board members, hospital board members and to decide on legalizing bingo in a Fisher County JP Precinct for charitable purposes. In the various races for positions on the school boards in Fisher County, it appears that the Rotan race will get a lot of attention from local voters. In the race for the Rotan School Board, three individuals are running for two open spots. Incumbent Leo

Long is seeking re-election and newcomers Larry McClain and Pete Fowler are both seeking a seat on the board.

At McCaulley, three individuals are attempting to get elected to two posts on the board. Those running are Marion Reed, Cecil Williams and Virginia (Ginger) Green.

In school board races at Hobbs and Roby, voters will just be going through the motions, since all candidates will be elected to board posts.

At Hobbs George Price and Gary Finley are running for the two open spots and at Roby, Scott Feagan, Jerry Upshaw and Calvin Elkins are running for a three year term while Mike Terry is running for an unexpired one year term.

In the race for three vacant Fisher County Hospital Board spots - a total of four Fisher County residents will have their names on ballots on Saturday.

Those seeking election are: Dave Williams, Raf-

ord Hargrove, Frank Mitchell and Tommie Jack Stuart.

In the Rotan City Election, Constance McQueen, Jim Nowlin and J.A. McClain are seeking re-election to three vacant council posts.

Bobby Gruben and Bartlett Strayhorn are seeking two vacancies on the Rotan Municipal Water Authority while Cecil King and Zanna Anderson are seeking two open spots on the Fisher County Water Authority.

Rotan Jaycees Schedule Tourney

The Rotan Jaycees and Rotan Young Farmers will be sponsoring a basketball tournament beginning on April 1 and continuing through April 3rd with the proceeds of the tournament going directly to the

Richard Posey Family. Reid Cave, a spokesman for the two organizations, indicated last Monday that the tournament will feature approximately 8 teams made up of young

men from the Fisher County area. Cave said that teams from Roby, Colorado City, Snyder, Jayton, Houston and two from Rotan have already committed to play.

The tournament will begin at 6:30 p.m., Thursday, April 1st, at the Rotan School gymnasium. Admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Editorial Comment By Kim Pease

Blood

"Kim Pease, we want you to write an editorial about the Red Cross Blood Drive and put it on the front page of next week's paper. In fact, we (the Fisher County Hospital Ladies Auxiliary) told the Red Cross people that you'd do it," she said.

"Well, I don't have much choice, what do you want me to say in this editorial that I write," I said. "Oh, you know, we want everyone to give blood, you know how to do it where the people will read it," she said.

I'm proud that the Ladies Auxiliary knows me well enough to tell the Red Cross that I'll put an editorial on the front page of the paper. This newspaper wants to be of service to this community and one way we do this is through public service information.

Some hard cold facts involving Fisher County with respect to the Red River Blood Bank is as follows. We're not holding up our end. We're not giving back what we've taken out.

During the period February 1981 through February 1982, Fisher County residents were given 253 units of blood but Fisher County residents only returned 91 units of that blood.

The Red River Red Cross Blood Center has replaced all the blood used by Arthur Montez while he was in Temple. They will replace the 14 units of blood used by Richard Posey and the 98 units already used by Lupe Cabrera.

Twice a year the Red River Unit of the American Red Cross in Wichita Falls asks Fisher County residents to give blood. In return for that asking, they provide all the people of Fisher County with the assurance that any blood needed by any resident will be provided - at no cost.

The Red Cross has been coming up on the short end of the stick in Fisher County. They are not getting enough donations to cover what they are giving back to people in Fisher County. The Red Cross is not the government - an arrangement like that can't go on much longer.

We ask the people of Fisher County to seriously give thought to donating a pint of blood on Wednesday, April 7th between 11:15 and 4:00 p.m. I fear that if we don't begin increasing our donations, we're going to lose the Red Cross service.

The Red Cross is going to repay the blood used by Posey and Cabrera and they have already repaid what was used by Montez, but we need to donate so this type of repayment can continue and that family members don't have to ask donors to drive to Abilene for blood repayment plans.

I've never known of an instance where Fisher County hasn't carried their weight proudly - let's not let this simple task of giving blood for a good cause be the first.

Roby did the play Pinocchio.

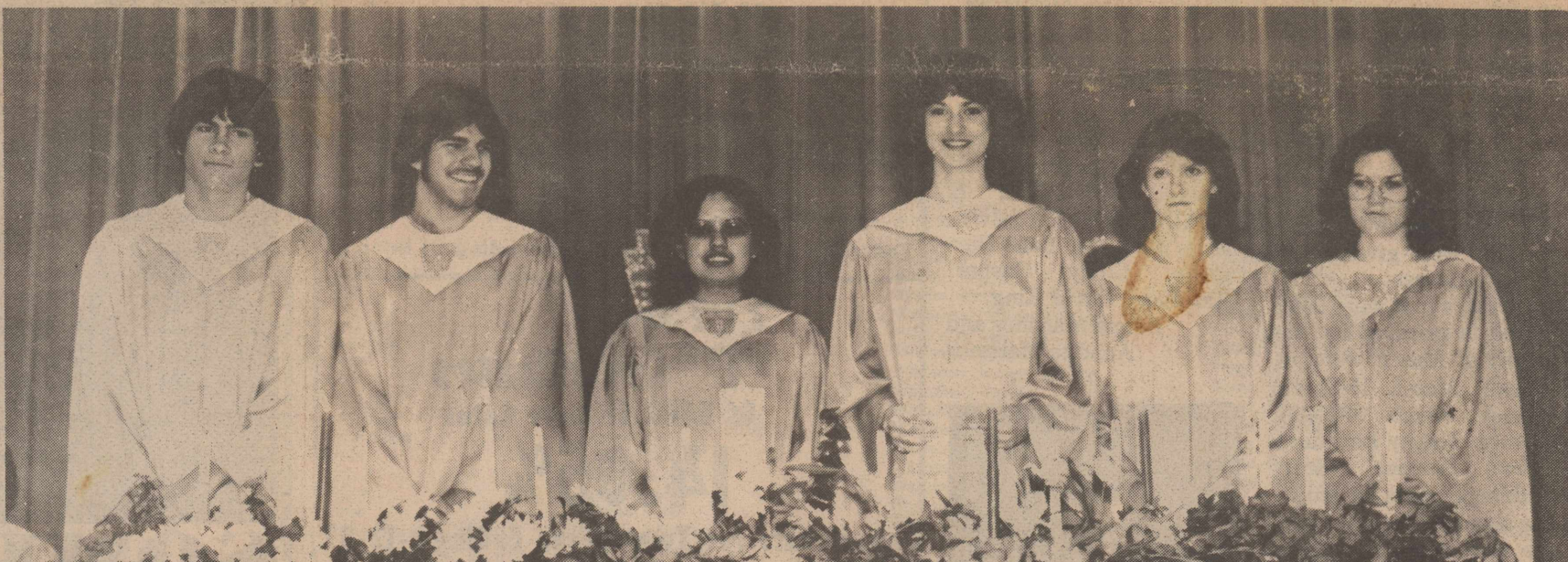
Hermleigh and Jayton were the two winning plays and Aspermont was alternate.

The third and fourth graders went to a Jr. High Band Concert on Tuesday, March 23.

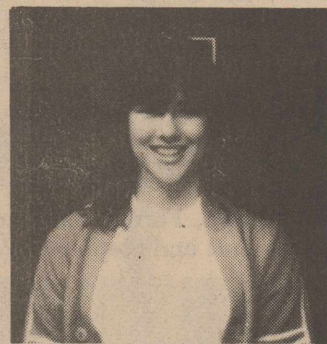

Jordan Represents Land Bank

Elmer Jordan of Blackwell, Texas, has just returned from Houston where he represented the

Federal Land Bank Association of Roby at the 37th Annual Stockholders' Meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Texas. The meeting, held at the Westin Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of the 56 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were approximately 700 persons in attendance at the March 19 meeting.

In his report to the stockholders, Thomas H. Benson, Land Bank president, said that the demand for loans made in 1981 the largest year in the Bank's history, with 3,638 loans closed for a total of \$408.2 million. This compares to the 1980 figures of 3,774 loans closed for a total of \$322.3 million.

"While we see some real

problems in extending credit, we do not see the demand lessening, and anticipate that our growth will continue," Benson said.

"In many sections of the

state we are the only active long-term lender," he continued. "This we view as an opportunity as well as an awesome responsibility."

Keynote speaker for the

meeting was Frank Naylor, Jr., under secretary for Small Communities and Rural Development,

United States Department of Agriculture, who said that people working in agriculture are paying

more than their fair share for an economy and high-cost programs that are running out of control.

Fisher County Oil News

At a location four miles northwest of Hamlin, Walsh & Watts Inc. of Wichita Falls has finished a new oil producer in Fisher County's Judy Gail Field.

The well is designed as the No. 9 Boyd "D", pumping oil at the rate of 44 barrels per day. The well also showed potential for 27,000 cubic feet of casinghead gas per day.

Location is in a 220-acre lease in the BBB&CRR Survey. Bottomed at 4,752 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,456 to 4,548 feet into the hole.

Fairchild Petroleum Corp. of Midland has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Sylvester Field. The No. 1 J.P. Turner showed potential to make 35 barrels of oil and 42,000 CF casinghead gas per day.

Legal Notice

Homeowners who are 65 years of age or older and failed to receive their school district homestead exemptions in 1979 have until April 1 of this year to do so. In this way, elderly homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 homestead exemption, said Billie L. Holcomb, chief appraiser for the Fisher County Appraisal District.

According to a law passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, over-65 homeowners who qualified for the school homestead "tax freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the home is located.

Application must be made with the Appraisal Office at the Courthouse in Roby (776-2733) before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1, 1979, a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

- Be 65 years or older
- Own his home
- Use that home as his principal residence

The chief appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the chief appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 over-65 homestead exemption. No refunds of taxes paid will be given for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayers' amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.

If your school tax receipt for 1981 shows that you received the homestead exemption for the over-65, your homestead will already be signaled for the frozen tax amount. If your school tax receipts for 1981 does NOT show that you received the homestead exemption for the over-65 and you qualified, you may call our office at 776-2733 or come by for an application for the exemption. 6-2tc

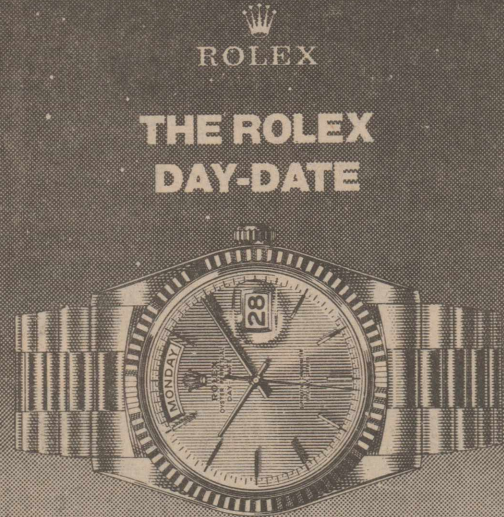

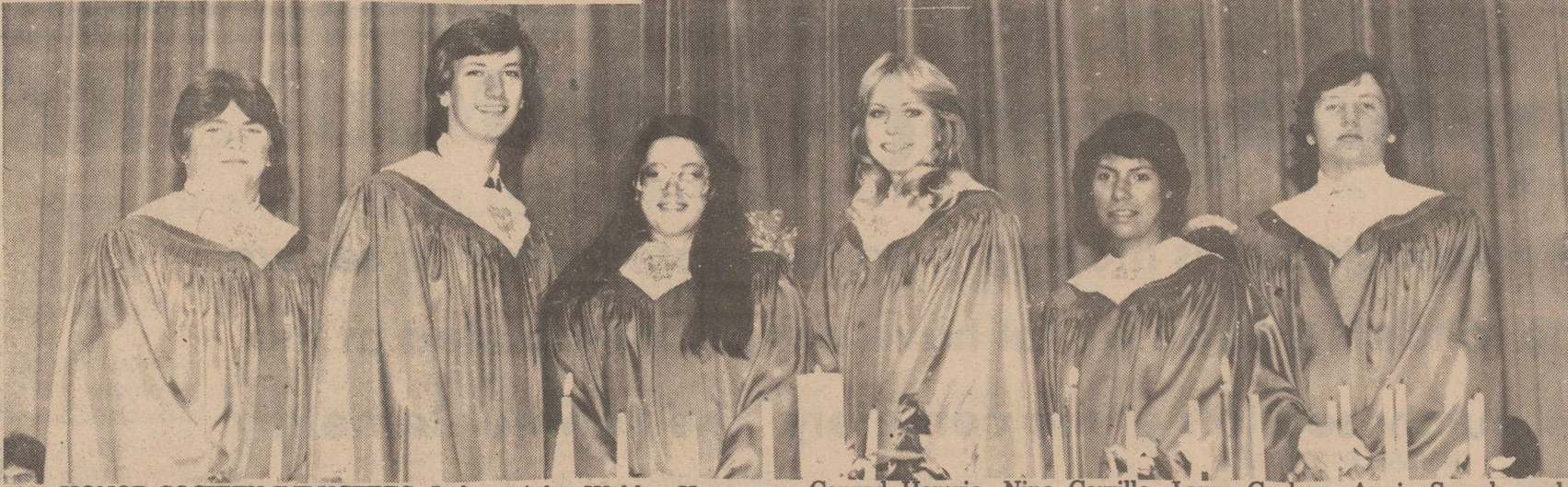

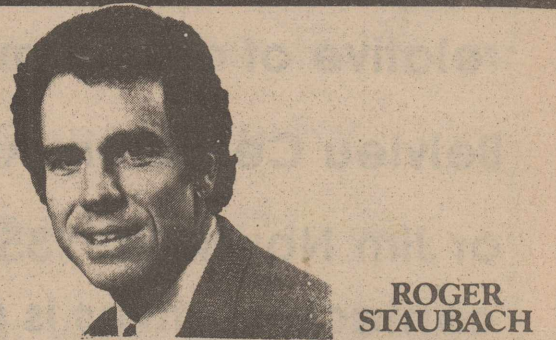
