

# Bingo Referendum Passes, New Hospital Board Named

### UIL Victories

We have two school superintendents in Fisher County that are as proud as new born peacocks about their students and teachers for their accomplishments in U.I.L. Literary Events last week.

I think it is only fitting to give as much recognition as possible to those students who were winners in literary events. Often times the news media gives school attention to sports and literary takes a second seat.

I think we are sometimes as guilty as any newspaper of playing up the football quarterback or end that catches a last minute touchdown pass or the basketball player that scored 28 points in a game or the pole vaulter that wins his event on the track field. This week we have pictures of about 60 Fisher County students who excelled in local and district competition through classroom literary events.

Last weekend some 32 students from Rotan and Roby qualified for regional competition.

Superintendent Jerry Dickson indicated that his 17 students "are the most I'm aware of in the last 5 or 6 years that have won literary trips to regional competition." He was riding on "cloud nine" and asked that we give recognition not only to the students for their hard work but also to the U.I.L. coaches and coordinators for the work they put in preparing the students for competition. At Rotan, Linda Dickson, debate team coordinator, is sending six students to regional competition. Her teams finished 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in the competition last Saturday. Linda's husband, Joe, an employee of Glen's Thriftway, said Linda was "so excited when she returned home last Saturday afternoon that she was bouncing off the wall". The debate team's hard work was typical of all the work put in by U.I.L. students and coordinators. They cut lunch periods short in order to practice, attended U.I.L. workshops, began preliminary work on topics, etc., as far back as September and put in countless hours on their own practicing for the competition. Other co-ordinators sending students to regional are Barbara McCain, Pat Hamrick, Kay Kennedy, Betty Strayhorn, Kellye Starnes, Guy Nelson, and Robert Witherspoon. Rotan Principal David Hargrove said, "I appreciate the hard work of each student and teacher, they did a tremendous job."

Superintendent Jimmie Laurie at Roby was extremely proud of the 15 students from Roby High School who qualified for regional U.I.L. competition. "I want to express my appreciation and the appreciation of the Roby School Board members for the tremendous job that the students did last weekend and the appreciation from everyone to the U.I.L. coaches for their work with the students. We are proud of the students and we look forward to following them to regional on April 16th at South Plains College in Levelland," said Superintendent Laurie.



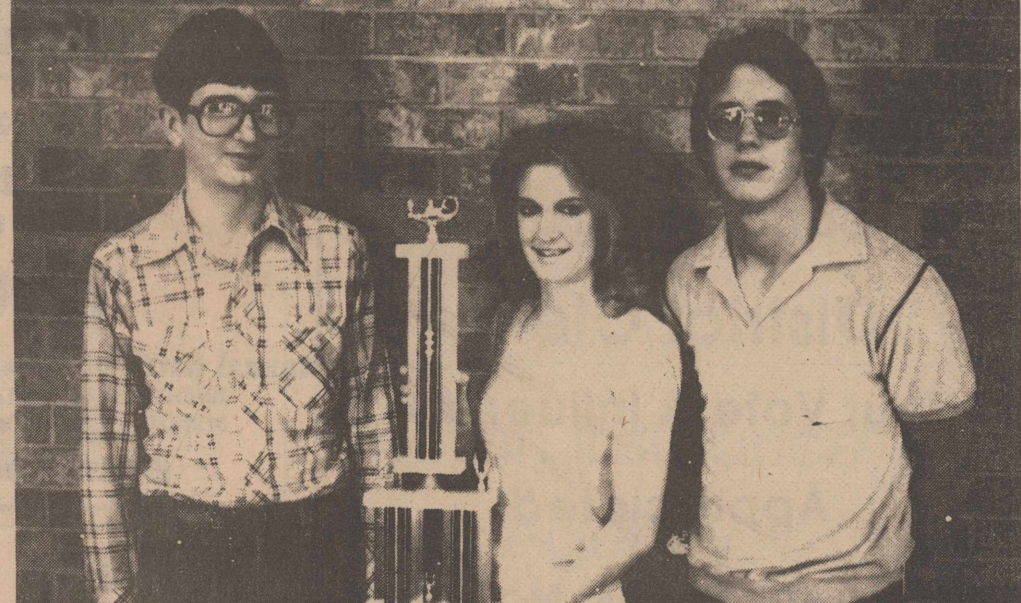
Rotan Scout Drive Began On Tuesday

# Rudy Martinez Attends 13th Annual Associated Milk Producers Convention In Milwaukee, Wisc.

Rudy Martinez, Rotan, represented local dairymen at the 13th Annual Meeting of Associated Milk Producers, Inc. (AMPI) in Milwaukee this week, where 1,200 elected

officials of the nation's largest dairy cooperative are considering new "self-help" programs to market the growing supply of milk and dairy products in the U.S.

AMPI is made up of 33,000 dairy farm families in 20 states. Owned and operated by its members, the cooperative markets fluid milk to dairy processors and manufacturers from Canada to the Mexican border. The AMPI Annual Meeting began Thursday, March 26, with three Regional meetings and continued on Friday and Saturday, March 27 and 28, with the corporate delegate sessions. A total of 2,500 people, including officers, board representatives, delegates, members and guests attended.

One-third of AMPI's total production, or 5.2 billion pounds, was produced by the 5,000 dairymen in 11 South Central states that make up the cooperative's Southern Region. This is approximately four percent of the U.S. milk supply. AMPI/Southern

Region 1981 sales amounted to \$920 million. In his report to AMPI/Southern Region delegates, E.L. (Jiggs) Wise, Southern Region Manager, Arlington, Texas, reported that membership was up one percent in 1981, compared to 1980. Production was up 200 million pounds during the same period, a four percent increase. Eighty-one percent of this supply was sold to Grade A milk processors and the balance was processed into butter, dry milk powder and cheese, primarily in AMPI owned plants.

During 1981, AMPI/Southern Region members invested nearly five million dollars in an advertising and promotion program to expand the domestic market for milk and dairy products. This "self help" program included the introduction of "REAL" Seal, a registered trademark that assures consumers they are buying real dairy products. The Seal is a stylized drop of milk surrounding the word "REAL". It appears on cartons containing products that meet Federal standards of identity.

A survey conducted in November, 1981, indicated that 41 percent of the consumers in the Southern Region were familiar with the Seal nine months after it was introduced. "This is second only to California, where awareness was 49 percent," Wise noted. "The Seal was introduced there in 1976."

Retiring Southern Region Board President, D.C. Jones, Los Lunas, New Mexico, attributed the Southern Region's success to an operating philosophy that commands respect in the market place by servicing consumer needs. In addition, AMPI helps its members obtain the greatest return on their investment by operating on a zero net margin, returning income to members as it is earned, rather than accumulating net margin to be distributed at the end of the fiscal year.

"As less price stabilization is undertaken by the Federal government, all cooperatives will become more important to their members," Jones said. "It may be the only way to obtain a price for their product which will provide them with an adequate income," he said.

Lee Wolf, Gainesville, Texas, was elected to succeed Jones as Southern Region Board President. Wolf operates a 1500 acre dairy farm in Cooke

County and manages a 200 cow herd. He has served on the AMPI Southern Region Board for several years and is a member of the organization's corporate board.

The new Southern Region Board elected to serve with Wolf are: Bill Thornton, Carlisle, Arkansas; First Vice President; Martin Theford, Tyler, Texas, Second Vice President; Norman Barker, Pratt, Kansas, Secretary; Louis Hinders, Canyon, Texas, Treasurer; and members, Lyndon Wahl, President of the Oklahoma Division and T.C. Mauney, President of the Mid-South Division.

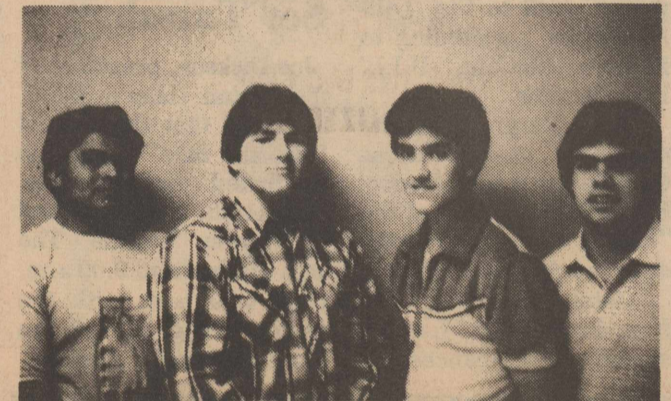

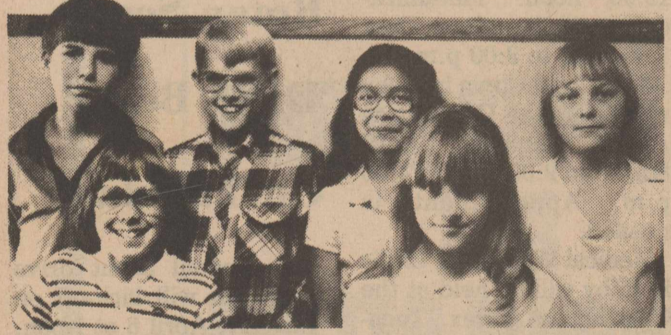

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## King without pyramid

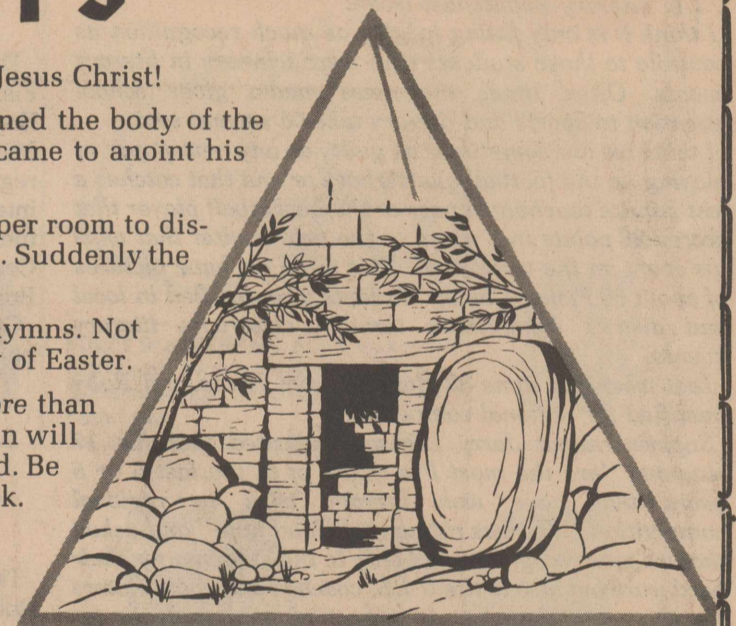
Nowhere in this world is there a tomb of Jesus Christ!

## County Agent Report

Bayleton-R is a new systemic fungicide from Mobay. It has excellent activity against rust and powdery mildew fungi. Bayleton was used on more than 100,000 acres of wheat in the Pacific Northwest last year. Yield increases of 20%, or in this case, 20 bushels per acre were common.

The material was applied under an emergency exemption which does not apply to our area. Mobay has, however, an Experimental Use Permit for our area and they hope for full registration by next growing season. Wheat growers in this could have really made good use of the material last fall.

Proposed changes in the official U.S. standards for grades of carcass beef and for slaughter cattle are getting a lot of attention from both consumers and cattlemen.

Changes as proposed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture are as follows: -That minimum marbling requirements for Prime, Choice and Good grades in A maturity (cattle up to about 30 months of age) would be reduced to "minimum moderate," "typical slight" and "minimum traces," respectively.

-That all young beef not meeting minimum marbling requirements for the Good grade would be graded Utility.

-That the Standard grade would be eliminated.

-That the rate of increase in marbling requirements in B maturity (cattle from about 30 to 42 months of age) would be doubled and that the marbling to

maturity relationship be increased from 1:1 to 2:1. -That quality grade requirements for bullock beef also would be changed so they would still be the same as those for steer, heifer and cow beef in A maturity; bullock beef would still be identified for class.

-That related standards for grades of slaughter cattle would be changed to

reflect changes made for grades of carcass beef.

-That no changes would be made in yield grade standards.

The marbling referred to in the standards is the amount of fat dispersed through a piece of meat and is one of the factors considered to contribute to the tenderness, juiciness and flavor of beef.

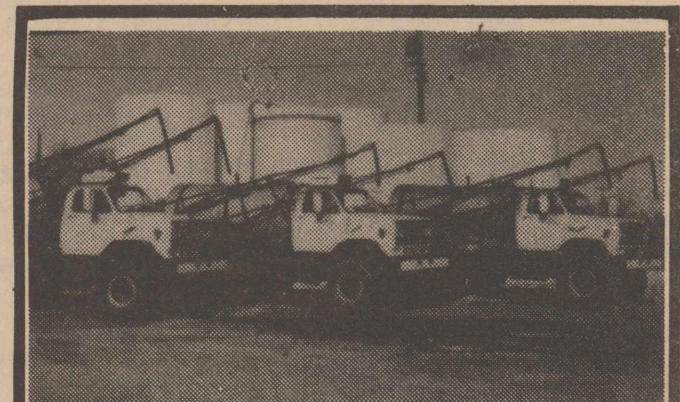
## Bettis Rites Are Held

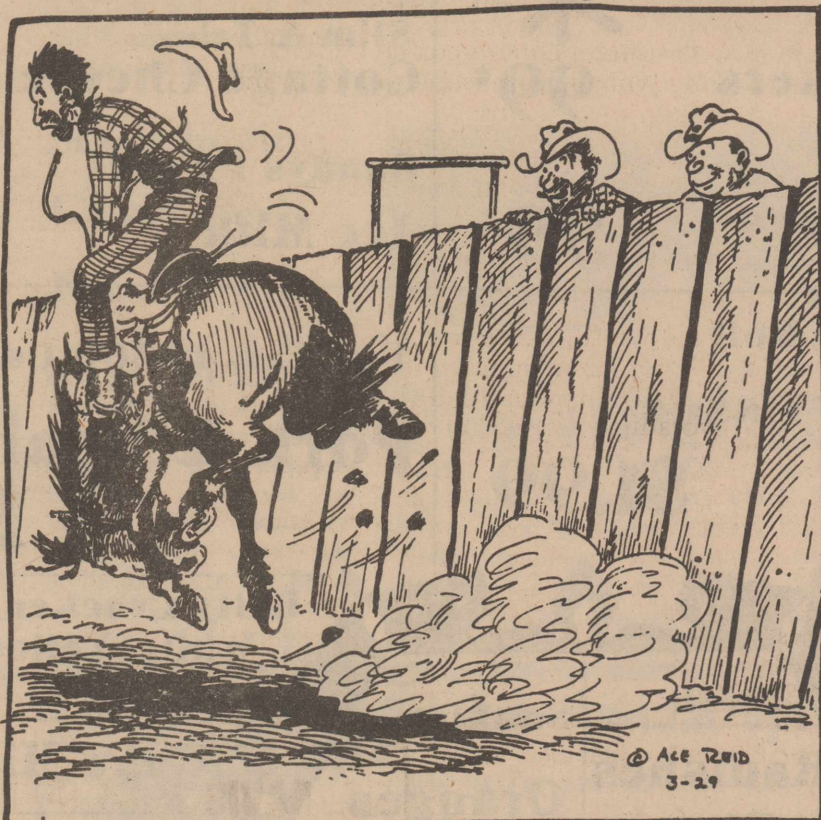

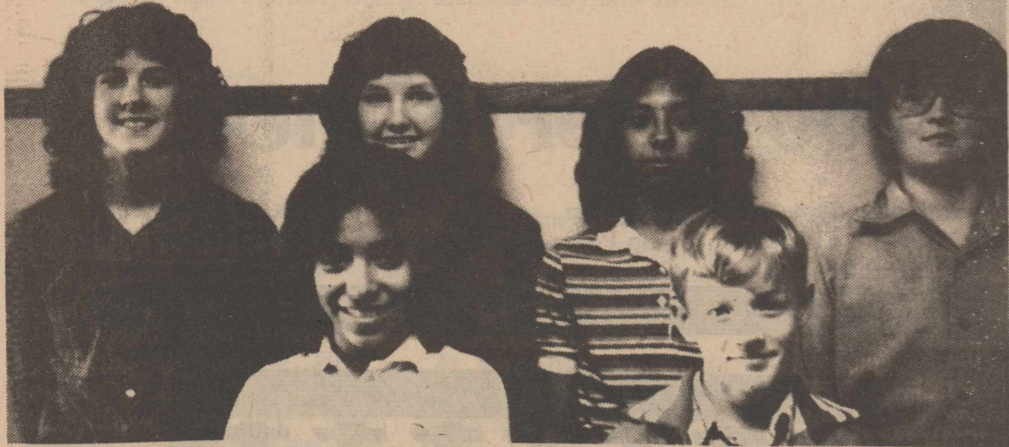

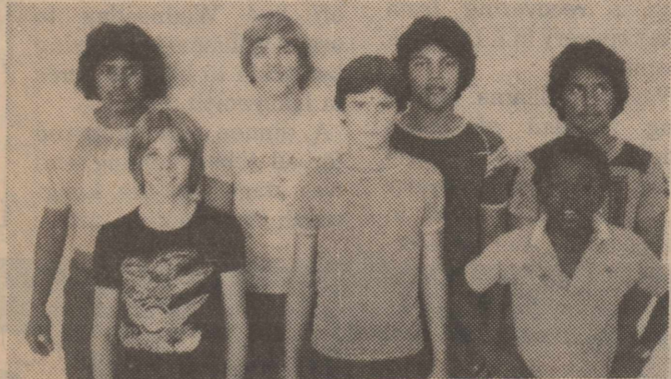

I have been secretary and bookkeeper for this business the past 19 years and have also, at one time or another, filled every conceivable position that a crop dusting service requires, except pilot. In order to have a better understanding of every aspect of the business I have recently attended an Executive Ground School and passed the F.A.A. private pilot written test.

My family and I are members of the First Baptist Church in Roby. During the past 23 years I have taught Sunday School in each department beginner through youth and have been department director in the primary and youth departments. I have been a Vacation Bible School teacher in every department and have been department director in the youth department. Two years I was association V.B.S. clinic teacher.

In 1970 I served on the Fisher County Welfare Board.

The past two months that I have been campaigning have really been a wonderful time for me. Every day that I have been out meeting the people of Fisher County I have met at least one outstanding and memorable person. I have visited with people that I have known all of my life and met many people for the first time.

We hear people brag about Texas having a little bit of everything and after traveling the back roads of Fisher County I believe we can also make this claim. You may have to consider salt seepage as swamp and mesquite pasture as forest, but after driving through White Canyon, Rough Creek and the Gannon Community, the area close to Roscoe sure looks like the high plains. The Escota area has some of the most beautiful valleys you could ask for, and the great East Texas oil fields begin between Royston and Hamlin. Between Hobbs and Highway 70 you will find the most people that still live on the farm. In the Claytonville and Capitola area you find rolling hills, mountains, and wide open spaces. Every area of our county is different and special in its own way.

We also have some very talented people in our county, they do almost every type of handwork and craft you can think of, even one man on a road that leads to Palava makes violins. If you don't really know your county I challenge you to get out and discover it, you will love it.

If elected Fisher County Judge, I will consider the position a full time job and will be available to the citizens of Fisher County.

This question really surprised me because, a few years ago before the County building was built and the Senior Citizens program was in the beginning state, Bob and I furnished a building for the Senior Citizens to meet in, supplied all necessary equipment, and even paid the utilities for several months.

Finally the question most frequently asked of me personally. Question - Do you really want this job? Yes, I do. I realize the job of County Judge will not be an easy one. I feel that I will be quite capable of handling any situation that may arise. I have a reputation for being able to keep a clear mind and a cool head under any circumstances. I am a good listener and am quite capable of sorting out both sides of a problem or discussion.

I would appreciate your vote on May 1. I do want to serve you as Fisher County Judge and I feel that I will be the type of Judge you will be proud to say you helped to put into office.

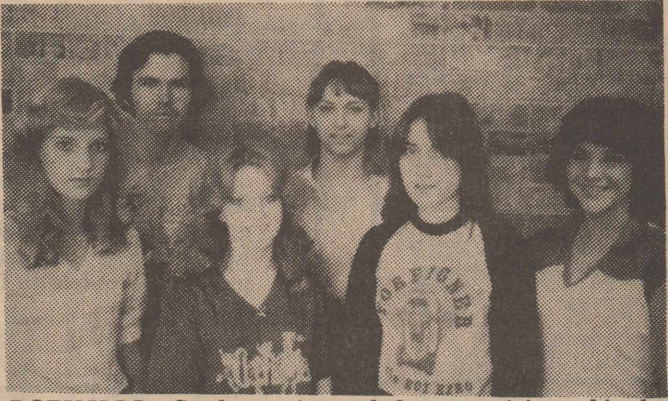
According to Transportation Department Chairman Leroy Davis, the new buses will begin running Thursday, March 25.

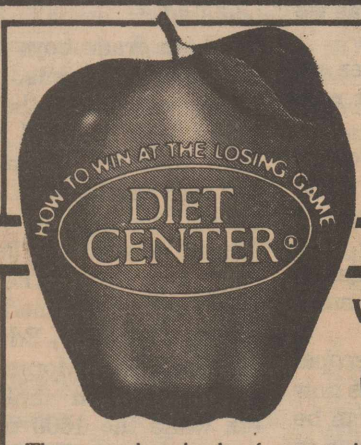

The No. 7-19 W.B. Trammell "4" was finalized by W.B. Trammell. It is a developmental well in the East Judy Gail Field, four miles northwest of Hamlin. Drillsite is in a 298-acre lease in Fisher County's W.E. Kaye Survey, A-4.

Daily potential of 55 barrels and a small amount of casinghead gas was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 4,612-ft.

bottom. Production will be from perforations 4,560 to 4,566 feet into the wellbore.

At a location 30 miles northwest of Abilene, Southland Royalty Co. of Midland has finalized a new oil producer in Fisher County's South Sylvester Field.

APPLY FOR  
TAX EXEMPTIONS.

If you pay property tax in the State of Texas, there is one important date to remember. April 30 is the last day to file applications for exemptions and to render your property. Several types of tax relief measures are available to Texas taxpayers, but they do not go into effect automatically. Applications must be made to your new county appraisal district, or to local tax offices in appraisal districts which have postponed implementation. Check with the appraisal district or local tax office to find out where to file renditions and applications for tax relief.

School districts offer a residence homestead exemption to all homeowners and additional exemptions to persons who are 65 or over or disabled.

Counties offer homestead exemptions on their farm-to-market road or flood control tax rate, and may offer optional exemptions to the disabled and elderly.

Cities and other jurisdictions may offer optional exemptions for the disabled and elderly.

All jurisdictions offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property. All may offer an additional exemption of a percentage of the value of your homestead. Productivity valuation is available in all jurisdictions to qualified farmers and ranchers.

Remember, exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically. Applications must be filed this year by April 30. While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in some instances, the burden and expense of proving a good reason for filing late rest on the taxpayer. You can avoid any inconvenience and fully protect your rights as a taxpayer by rendering your property and applying by the April 30 deadline.

Contact your appraisal district or local city, county or school tax office for more information on available exemptions. Further details about the property tax system in Texas and how it works for you are contained in a pamphlet by the State Property Tax Board called *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities!* Get a free copy at your appraisal district or local tax office, or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.
