### Roby Board Hires New Band Director, Girls Coach Monday

The members of the Roby School Board met in session last Monday night and hired a new band teacher and girl's basketball coach, according to Superintendent Jimmie Laurie.

The board hired Steve Ratliff as the new band director. He is originally from Sweetwater and currently teaching band at Imperial High School in Buna Vista, Texas. He has been at Imperial High School for the past two years. Prior to that he was band director at Aspermont High School. He was

hired by the board at \$1,000.00 above state base.

The board hired Pam Patton as the new girls' basketball and track coach. She is currently attending Hardin Simmons University and will graduate this spring. She is a native of Clyde and is doing her student teaching at Eula. She is a member of Beta-Beta, a national scholastic honor society and is a biology major. She was hired at a salary of \$2,500.00 above state base for coaching and \$400.00 above state for teaching duties.

In other action the board accepted the resignation of Jan Kincaid. She will be moving to Sonora after a summer wedding.

The board hired Byron Shelley of McCaulley to act as a drivers education instructor.

In re-organizing the board, Gayle Morgeson was re-elected as Board President) Judge Mauldin re-elected as vice president and June Wright elected as board Secretary replacing Roy Herron.

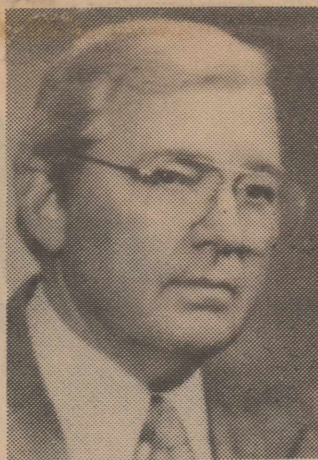
### Rotan First Baptist 75th Anniversary

### Carriker Blasts The Grubbs Voting Record

In an afternoon news conference at the Nolan County Courthouse in Sweetwater, Steven A. Carriker of Roby blasted his opponent's voting record for the last two sessions of the legislature as "anti-farmer, anti-education, and anti-rural." Carriker's opponent is Walter Grubbs, formerly of Abilene, who moved his legal residence last fall to be able to run in the newly created 78th district.

Carriker listed several specific votes by Grubbs to demonstrate what he called his opponent's lack of sympathy for rural areas. Grubbs, said Carriker, voted every chance he had against legislation to enable the production of gasohol in Texas. Grubbs also voted against an amendment to lower local school taxes and voted to increase the local funds assignment by 165 million dollars, causing a huge increase in local property

taxes. Grubbs was one of only 25 out of 150 representatives to vote against a modest increase for teacher salaries in 1979.

But worst of all, Carriker said, was Grubbs' total devotion to higher interest rates. "He voted for every bill and every amendment to increase interest rates in both 1979 and 1981. He even voted to raise interest to 30% and then said after it was all over that 'Nobody's forced to borrow money'. I'd like to see him say that to our farmers and businessmen now."

Carriker, who is a farmer himself, said that the rural 78th district needs its own representative "who really understands what's going on out here".

### Parkers Are Injured In Local Wreck

Mr. and Mrs. A.B. Parker of Rotan were injured in a two vehicle accident approximately 4.5 miles north of Rotan last Monday afternoon when their 1971 Chevrolet was involved in an accident with a Chevrolet pickup being driven by James Clark, Jr., of Aspermont.

According to Department of Public Safety Patrolman Alan Arnwine, Parker attempted to make a "U" turn north of the river bridge and was hit on the drivers side by the pickup.

No citations were issued at press time. A.B. Parker was taken to Fisher County Hospital with head injuries, chest injuries and a possible broken jaw in two places. He was later transported to Abilene where it was reported Tuesday morning that he was in stable condition.

Mrs. Parker was kept at Fisher County Hospital with possible broken ribs and other minor cuts and contusions.

### United Cable Begins Rotan Rebuilding

United Cable Television of Rotan is planning on a \$120,000.00 remodeling program involving rebuilding the entire cable system, according to Wayne Jamar, Rotan Manager.

Jamar indicated that work on the new line rebuilding will begin this week, however he doubted that there would be an inconvenience to present subscribers. "We're going to completely rebuild all cable lines on the system. We'll have 3 or 4 trucks in here for about 3 weeks doing the work," said Jamar.

By installing the new cable lines in Rotan Jamar felt, "The newly rebuilt system would provide better service for Rotan subscribers and have fewer service problems."

Approximately 5 new services would be offered

when the system is installed. The new services will include (1) USA Network-an all sports channel (2) ESPAN-Congress in action (3) Cinemax-a 24 hour movie channel (4) Nickelodean-children's education and entertainment programming and (5) Music Television-a featured rock band video concert channel.

### Conservation Cost Share Funds Here

There is approximately \$50,000.00 available for cost share for applying conservation practices on local farms in Fisher County. These funds are available through the Agricultural Conservation Program administered by the ASCS office at Roby. Practices that are eligible for cost share are terraces, diversion terraces, farm ponds, grassed waterways and brush control by mechanical or aerial application and grass establishment.

The procedure for applying for these funds is to make application at the ASCS office at Roby. After approval these applications are sent to the Soil Conservation Service who has the technical responsibility for getting the conservation practices installed.

## The Recipe Box

Favorite Recipes From Fisher County Folks

Are you interested in new recipes? Beginning this week we will have a weekly feature of 2 or 3 recipes from Fisher County kitchens.

Starting off the new column is a Chocolate Cake recipe from June Wright of Roby. June is married to Commissioner Jimmy Wright and is the mother of four daughters.

### Sheath Cake (Chocolate)

Sift together and set aside:  
2 cups flour  
2 cups sugar

Bring to a boil and pour over flour and sugar:

1 stick oleo  
1 cup water  
½ cup of shortening  
4 T. cocoa

Mix well with flour and sugar and add:  
½ cup buttermilk 1 tsp. vanilla 2 eggs, slightly beaten  
1 tsp. soda 1 tsp. cinnamon  
Bake for 25 to 30 minutes in 350 degree oven, preheated. Grease and flour pan (loaf or layer).

### Icing

1 stick oleo 2 cups sugar  
Boil for 4 minutes and add:  
½ cup chocolate chips 1 tsp. vanilla  
1 cup pecans (optional)  
Beat until thick and pour over cake.

### ORANGE-GLAZED CARROTS

3 Cups Carrots, sliced into 1-inch pieces (about 1 pound)  
1 Tablespoon Sugar  
¼ teaspoon Salt  
1 teaspoon Cornstarch  
¼ teaspoon Ground Ginger  
½ Cup Orange Juice  
1 tablespoon Margarine  
Cook carrots, covered in 1 inch of boiling, salted water, just till tender, about 15 minutes. Drain. Add orange juice. Cook and stir 1 minute. Stir in margarine. Pour over carrots, stir lightly to coat. Serves 6.

Miss Delila Baird of Rotan was nice enough to share with us a couple of old cook books printed in this area. Her Banana-Oatmeal Cookie recipe listed below sounds so good you'll want to get started on them right away!

### Banana-Oatmeal Cookies

To 1 cup sugar add:  
¾ heavy cream, beat until fluffy;  
Add:  
1 slightly beaten egg; blending well.  
Stir in:  
1 cup mashed bananas  
1½ cup instant oats  
½ cup raisins  
Sift together:  
½ teaspoon baking soda  
1½ cup flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
Add to cream mixture. Beat well. Drop by teaspoonfuls on ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 400 degrees about 12 minutes. Remove immediately from baking sheets. Makes 4 to 5 dozen cookies.

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# Rotan School Board Re-Elects Houston Leader

The members of the Rotan School Board met in regular session last Monday night with board

members Leo Long and Pete Fowler taking the oath of office as recently elected members.

After the new board members were sworn in, officers were elected. Alan Houston was re-elected as board President; Leo Long as Vice-President; Roger Blackwelder as Secretary and Wayne Harris as Assistant Secretary.

Board members discussed the majorette and cheerleading programs and voted to pay the cost of sending high school majorettes and drum majors to band camps and voted to pay the cost of sending high school cheer-

leaders to cheerleading camp. The cost to the school will be the actual cost of "summer camp tuition" at the individual camps.

In other action the board accepted a text book committee report approving a bi-lingual kindergarten program for book purchases. Rotan does not have a bi-lingual program in kindergarten, but if one is established, they will have access to books through the funded state program.

The board voted to participate in Region 14, Title 1 Co-op and agreed to use Region 14 media program for films at a cost of \$2.00 per student.

In final action the board authorized Superintendent Jerry Dickson to advertise for bids on replacing the tile floor in the junior high building.

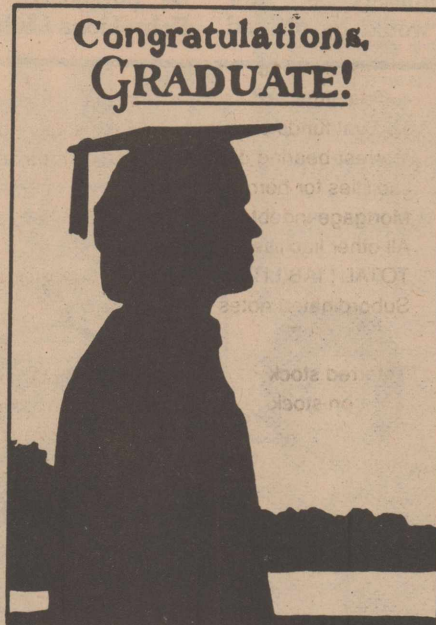
All 36 girls selling cookies received a certificate of appreciation from the West Texas Girl Scout Council, a participating agency of the United Way.

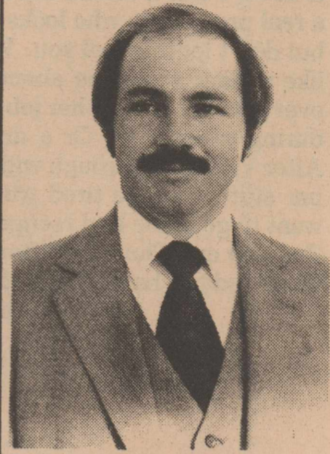

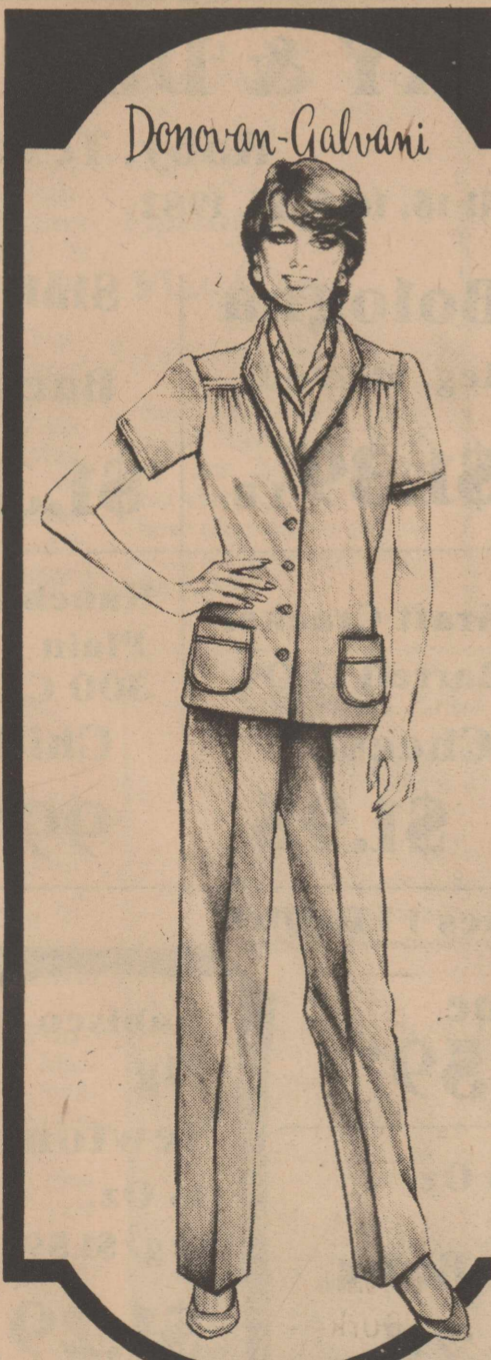

Coronado's Children; and Pioneer Women in Texas.

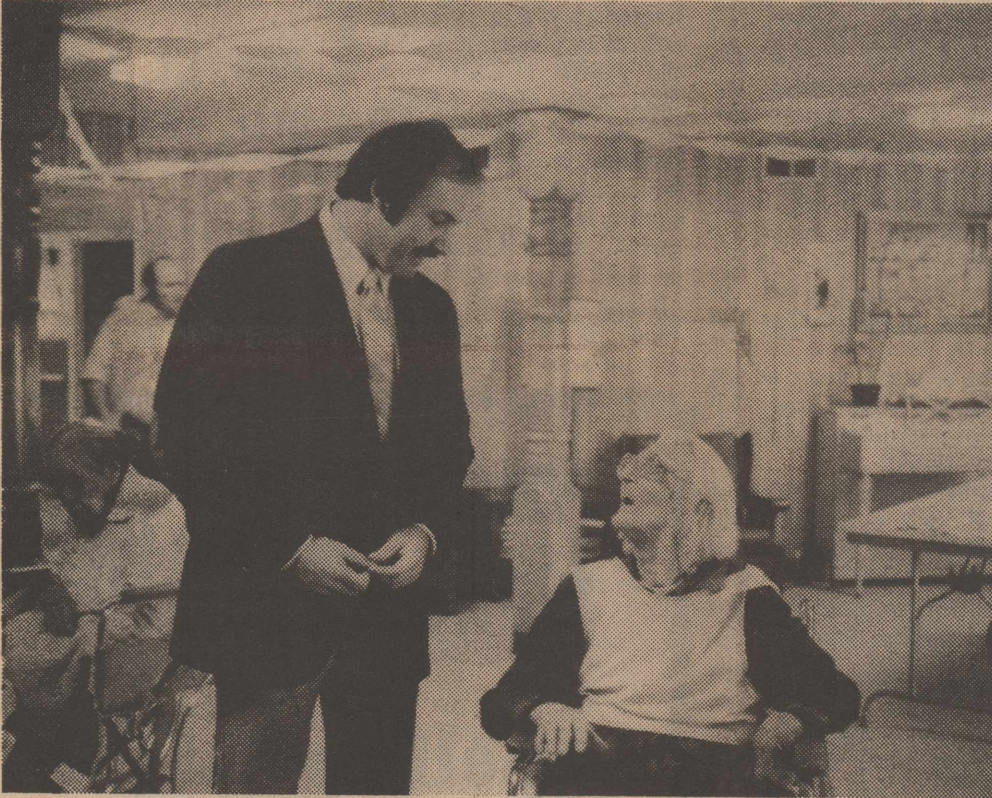

Presenters are being asked to limit their remarks to recruitment, employment and retention of teachers and other certified school personnel. A complete list of the hearings inquiries and schedules is enclosed. The Lubbock public hearing is the first of four being held throughout the state this spring. The Select Committee on Public Education is made up of state senators, members of the House of Representatives, members of the State Board of Education, and the Governor's Education Advisory Committee. It is charged with studying issues and concerns which will affect the Texas public school system over the next decade.

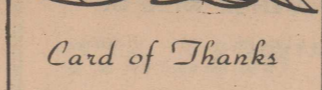

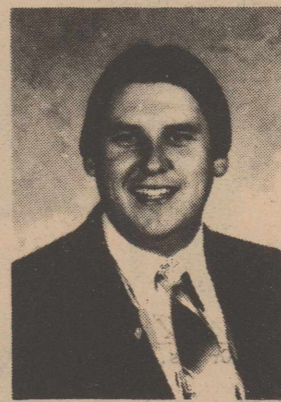

### Social Sec. Information Released

It is true that you may apply for and be eligible to receive some social security retirement benefits even though you continue to work. If you are age 72 or older, you may receive full social security benefits even though you continue to work.

In 1982, social security beneficiaries under age 65 will be allowed to earn \$4,440 (\$370 a month) and still receive full social security benefits. Beneficiaries who are over age 65, up to age 72 will be allowed to earn \$6,000 (\$500 a month) and still receive full social security benefits. Beneficiaries who are age 72 and older may earn any amount of money and receive full social security benefits.

The 1978 Amendments to the Social Security Act contained a provision whereby, beginning with 1982, beneficiaries age 70 and older would be allowed to earn any amount of money and receive full social security benefits. However, the 1981 Amendments to the Social Security Act have delayed the effective date of this provision for one year. Therefore, for 1982, we will continue, under the old law, to pay full social security benefits to beneficiaries age 72 and older regardless of the amount of their earnings.

### All Risk Insurance Questions

F.W. Crouch, Jr., Field Operations Office Director for Federal Crop Insurance Corporation announced that farmers in the State of Texas who have already reported their acreage of All-Risk Crop insured barley, oats and wheat for the 1982 Crop Year can adjust that report if they participate in the ASCS Acreage Reduction Program.

"Producers who have questions concerning that program should contact their ASCS office," continued Crouch. "Insured producers who choose to participate in the Acreage Reduction Program through ASCS can reduce their crop insurance premium liability by reporting the acreage reduction to their All-Risk Crop Insurance agent no later than April 16, 1982. Producers who do not have their acreage reports revised will be obligated for the premium established by their original acreage report."
