Fisher County Hospital Board members reviewed the 1981 audit report with Jerry Crisp, a representative of Condley & Company, Abilene CPA's, at their regular monthly board meeting last Monday night.

In his report to the board Crisp indicated that the Fisher County Hospital had total assets at the end of 1981 amounting to \$3,220,610.00 and total liabilities of the same amount. These figures were an increase of approximately \$100,000.00

over closing amounts in the 1980 audit report.

Crisp pointed out that the Fisher County Hospital showed a 1981 loss from operations of \$221,171.00 which was approximately \$10,000.00 higher than the 1980 loss from operations of \$211,052.00.

In 1981, the hospital district had \$178,464.00 in excess revenues over expenses. This figure, according to Crisp, is the bottom line, whenever the \$450,000.00 in tax revenues collected is taken

into consideration and applied to the loss from operations.

The same figure for 1980 (excess revenues over expenses) was \$148,424.

Administrator Jerry Weatherly, commenting on the report given by Crisp, said, "It's a lot better than last year, it's not good, but we're getting some liabilities taken care of and we're increasing capital."

Weatherly indicated that bond payments on building and equipment for

1982 will be approximately \$250,000.00 and for 1983 will amount to \$264,000.00.

"After 1983, our payments start decreasing in size until they are all made in 1996," said Weatherly.

In other action last Monday, Albert Maberry was re-elected President of the Fisher County Hospital Board. Glen Copeland was named vice-president and Raford Hargrove was elected secretary.

New board members Dave Williams, Frank

Mitchell and Raford Hargrove were sworn in as board members and took the oath of office.

The board members discussed the financial statement submitted by Jerry Weatherly. Weatherly in-

formed the board that he was in the process of implementing a new in-hospital charge system that he hoped would eliminate lost charges. He also informed the board that the Fisher County

Hospital had become a member of Hospital Affiliated Services, Inc. (HASI) for group purchasing and that he had not hired a laboratory technician but was still taking applica-

tions. The board members approved a Blue Cross Blue Shield hospital insurance program change for hospital employees and voted to study the utility bill charges at their May meeting.

Grubbs Takes Issue At Carriker Statement

After four years in the Texas House and 22 years of working for Congressman Omar Bureson and Congressman George Mahon, I think my record of support for this agricultural area is well substantiated. I have supported all legislation designed to be in the best interest of rural life—farmers and ranchers, and community services for our smaller towns. My opponent in the Democratic Primary is alleging otherwise, which is totally and absolutely untrue. Either he doesn't know or is engaging in a bit of mud-slinging in the closing days of this campaign. I would prefer it be the former, but likely there will be more distortions and further misrepresentations before the election on May 1st.

The opposition to my candidacy for re-election is evidently rooted in anti-business attitude, whether it be in farming, ranching or business. The philosophy represented by my opposition, disguised in a pro-rural life cloak, would advocate such measures as repealing the right-to-work law, the right to strike for public school teachers, public employees and migrant farm workers. This is not the philosophy of the 78th Legislative District. I believe that we in our area want a representative who stands for fiscal responsi-

bility and solvency in our state and national government, who will defend our free enterprise system—the best form of government ever devised by man.

My record in the Legislature during the past four years is public and open to examination. It will show that I was able to prevent the closing of the local health unit in Sweetwater when the State Department of Health wanted to move it. As a member of the House Appropriations Committee, I was successful in getting appropriations approved to expand on the programs of vocational and technical education at Texas State Technical Institute's campus at Sweetwater to the tune of \$2 million. I have sought to be of assistance in every way possible to the people of Roscoe and Hamlin during their problems with flooding. I voted consistently against the Tax Reform Act (the Peveto Bill) and its amendments, which is causing a shift of the ad valorem tax burden to homeowners all over Texas. I voted for passage of the gasohol bill, contrary to statements of my opponent. I voted consistently for pay raises for public school teachers, state employees and increased benefits for retired teachers. I voted to

Congressman Charles Stenholm sent out a news release last week indicating that he will forego a provision passed by Congress in late 1981, that gives Congressmen and Senators an increased 1981 income tax exemption.

Stenholm said passage of the tax break, attached to the Black Lung Benefits Revenue Act of 1981 and giving legislators a \$75.00 per day exemption from living expenses incurred while Congress is in session, did not "meet the minimum standards of equity and fairness that the public has a right to expect from its elected officials."

Stenholm said, "We had managed to fight off repeated attempts to pass an outright salary increase, but this legislation was slipped through when our guard was down during the final hours of the first half of the session."

It must be pointed out that Congressman Stenholm was one of 47 Congressmen voting against the provision.

I think we can all applaud Stenholm's actions but I think he's falling a bit short of solving the problem. He and the other 47 Congressmen should take some affirmative action to see that this type of "dilly-dallying" by their colleagues comes to a screeching halt. I don't pretend to know all there is to know about the inner workings of government, but what in the heck is a provision concerning increased tax breaks for Congressmen doing "floating along" with the passage of a bill concerning "Black Lung Benefits Revenue Act"?


Jamie Clayton, a Fisher County [Hobbs] native, daughter of Sue Houghton of Roby, and Press Secretary to Congressman Stenholm in Washington, when contacted last week said the tax benefit plan went through on a voice vote in the waning hours of the first half of the session.

Our system of government is in the mess it's in now - because elected officials from the Courthouse to Washington are afraid to stand up and vote their convictions. They're afraid the people back home won't understand or accept their method of voting. They're wrong. The American people aren't stupid. We may not understand the book they are using on parliamentary procedure that allows an amendment calling for a tax relief plan for congressmen to be attached to a bill concerning Black Lung Benefits Revenue Act - but we're not stupid.

Black is black - white is white, and when you get to calling either one "gray" you begin getting in trouble. Call the shots like they are - vote your convictions and if the people don't like what you did they'll replace you - but don't pull the wool over our eyes. We may look a bit stupid - but we're not, because we're the same people that put the County Judges, Commissioners, State Senators, U.S. Congressmen and Senators in office. I'm proud of the stand Congressman Stenholm and the other 46 Congressmen took on the exemption issue but as for the remainder of the distinguished list of Congressman, I can't say the same.

All former aerobic dancers or even those with no aerobic dancing experience are invited to attend

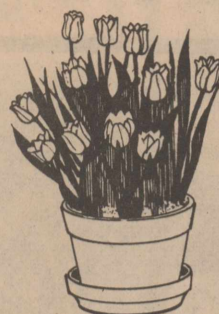
as either participants or spectators.

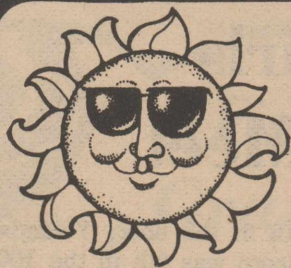

See what the full-length mirror reflects, not what you want to see. Does the garment or accessory fit? Is the color good for you? Is the item fashionable? Is the image reflected in the mirror, as you wear this item, a pleasing one? Do you feel good in it? Does the garment suit your lifestyle? As you try on each item, place the wearables that pass the test back into your clean closet. Place the failures in the unwearable stack. Now what do we do with the unwearables? The first consideration is to recycle what you can. If the garments are in good

shape but just not right for you, give them to a family member or a friend. Another alternative is selling at a garage sale, or give your clothing to a charitable organization such as Goodwill, Children's Homes, State Hospitals, etc.

exempt livestock and poultry from taxation and in fact, co-sponsored the legislation. I voted to exempt farm implements and equipment from taxation. I voted to appraise agricultural land based on its production instead of 100% market value.

There has been no legislation passed in the Texas Legislature during my four years of service to raise interest rates as my opponent alleges. Interest rates are dictated by our national economy and the Federal Reserve System, not the Texas Legislature. The usury ceiling was raised by the Legislature to allow people to buy or build new homes. Otherwise, all home building would have come to an abrupt halt which would have been devastating to our statewide economy. The same type ceiling was raised to allow the smaller cash loan companies to make loans to the less fortunate people who cannot go to the bank or a savings and loan institution to borrow money. These measures were directly beneficial to consumers in all segments of our society. They did not raise interest rates, but served only to remove unrealistic ceilings in our inflationary economy.

I strongly supported the largest increase in history for our junior colleges in Texas, including Western Texas College in Snyder. Western Texas and TSTI are very important to this West Texas area to allow our young people to get an education closer to their homes.

It is less than truthful for my opposition to suggest my service to this rural West Texas district does not conform to the interests of the people.

Political rhetoric is cheap. It is my strong belief that when a candidate attempts to discredit his opponent in a desperation crash campaign by using untruths, distortions and misrepresentations, the people of this area will react accordingly. My voting record is open for anyone to check.

I had hoped this campaign would be kept on a higher level, free of mudslinging type tactics. For these reasons, I urge you to ask me about any actions I have taken during my service in the Texas House, and vote for a record—not a lot of easily made political promises, in the Democratic Primary on Saturday, May the First.

County Oil Report

Pumping 42 barrels of oil per day, along with 27,000 CFD casingheadgas, the No. 2 Plemons was completed successfully in the Royston Field by Crown Exploration Company of Abilene.

Drillsite is five miles west of Hamlin.

It was drilled to 3,102-ft. total depth and will produce from an interval 3,100 to 3,102 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on a 22/64 choke. The location is in a 160-acre lease in Fisher County's BBB&C Survey.

At a location five miles northwest of Hamlin, C.E. Exploration of Hamlin has finaled a new oil producer in Fisher county's Pardue Field.

The well is designated as the No. 3 W.B. Wade, pumping oil at the rate of 48 barrels per day. The well also showed potential for a small amount of casinghead gas per day.

Location is in a 100-acre lease in the BBB&C Survey. Bottomed at 3,825 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,124 to 3,129 feet into the hole.

An 850-ft wildcat is planned by J.A. Wilburn of Sweetwater at a drillsite 12 miles southwest of Roby, Fisher County. The location is in an 80-acre lease in the H&TC Survey. Well's designation is the No. 5 J.A. Wilburn "B".

Barbee Inc. of Abilene

has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Bennett Field. The No. 1 Weathersbee 51 showed potential to make 35 barrels of oil and a small amount of casinghead gas per day on a 2-inch choke. The operator has 210 acres leased, with drillsite in Fisher County's H&TC RR Survey, four miles southwest of Rotan.

The well will produce from an interval 5,562 to 6,575 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 6,720 feet.

A Midland-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 J.P. Maberry 58, a wildcat to be located two miles southeast of Sylvester. With projected total depth of 6,200 feet, the well is in a 131-acre lease in Fisher County's Bastrop County School Land Survey. The operator is K&S Land Company Inc.

At a location six miles northeast of Noodle, Bentley & Laing of Wichita Falls has finaled a new oil producer in Jones County's Huddleston Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Raymond Wilder, pumping oil at the

rate of 32 barrels per day on a 2-inch choke. The well also showed potential for 30,000 cubic feet of casinghead per day.

It is a developmental well in the JMM Field, 17 miles southwest of Maryneal. Drillsite is in a 318-acre lease in Nolan County's H&TC Survey.

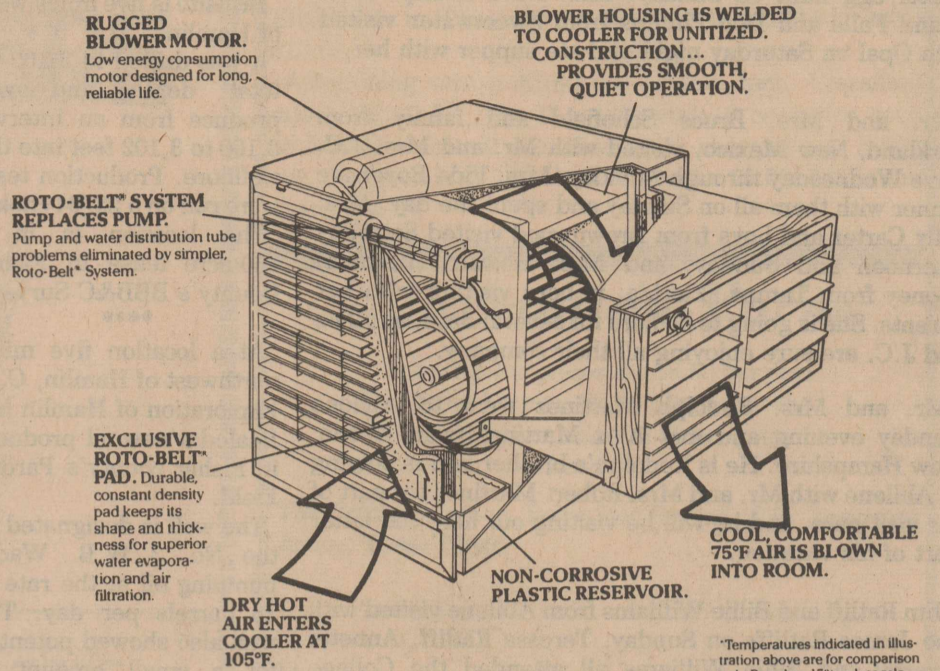

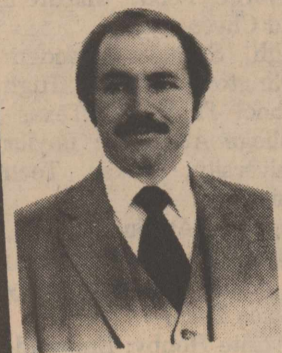

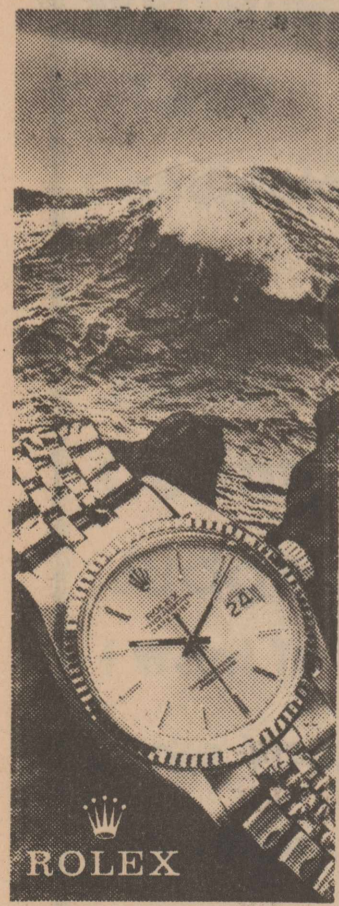

Favorite Recipes From Fisher County Folks

This recipe is from Mrs. Cleo Dickson of Roby. Mrs. Dickson is the mother of Rotan Advance-Roby Star Record staff member, Rosemary Donham.

German Sweet Chocolate Cake

1 cup butter (2 sticks)
2 cups sugar, creamed together.
4 eggs, separated and whites beaten stiff
To 1/2 cup boiling water add 1 package German Sweet Chocolate. Stir until chocolate melts. Add to butter mixture. Stir well. Add 3/4 cup buttermilk with sifted dry ingredients:
2 1/2 cups sifted flour 1 teaspoon salt
Add 1 teaspoon soda to 1/4 cup buttermilk and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add to other mixture. Add beaten egg whites, folding in slowly.
Bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees in 28-inch square pan or 3 9-inch layer pans for 30 minutes.
Filling
2 eggs 1 cup sugar
1 cup evaporated milk 1 box coconut
1 cup pecans
Cook all together until thick. Spread between layers and on top. Ice sides with any creamy icing.

Our next recipe was taken from one of our old cookbooks mentioned last week. It was submitted by Mrs. Ruth Witherspoon. Mrs. Witherspoon is a second grade teacher in Rotan Schools.

Corned Beef Mold

1 package lemon jello 1 cup boiling water
1 1/2 cup tomato juice 1 can corned beef (9 or 12 oz.)
1/2 teaspoon salt 3 hardboiled eggs, chopped
1 1/2 cup chopped celery 1 Tablespoon chopped onion
1 Tablespoon horseradish mustard 1 cup mayonnaise

Prepare jello using tomato juice as part of the liquid. Let set in the refrigerator until thick and syrupy.
Fold in mayonnaise. Add corned beef which has been separated into small bits, the chopped ingredients, salt and mustard.
Congeal in mold. Serve on lettuce cups. Use a 1 quart mold. Makes ten servings.

We need to make a correction in the icing recipe we printed last week. The recipe (corrected) is reprinted below.

Icing

1 stick oleo 2 cups sugar
3/4 cup cream
Boil for 4 minutes and add:
1/2 cup chocolate chips 1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup pecans (optional)
Beat until thick and pour over cake.

These monies are already set aside to pay the principal and interest. The two motor graders are being paid out on a 3 year payout, these monies are being budgeted for the precincts involved.

I consider myself to be a conservative and will continue to do the best job for the county at the lowest cost possible to the taxpayer.

By no means do I know all things about county government. In looking back over the short period of time I have had the privilege of being your county judge, I realize that I have learned something new every day. Some things I would have liked to see accomplished were not possible, and some things I might even have done differently. I feel as though I am qualified for the job and can do an even better job if given the opportunity for a second term.
