A Friend

I have made a friend in the past six weeks, one that I probably wouldn't have made had it not been for politics. Steve Carriker is making big strides in the race for the State Representative post of the newly created 78th district. He's run a whale-of-a-race, brought to light some important points and in his attempt to convince people he's the "right candidate for the job" has won my personal vote. We're Carriker's home county and home newspaper and for that reason we're throwing out the "measuring stick of fairness" and giving Carriker the opportunity to answer some questions concerning his candidacy in "my corner of the paper".

For those who are "keeping score", remember that the Walter Grubbs news release was on the front page last week.

Carriker Answers

Steven A. Carriker, the 31 year old farmer from Roby, and candidate for the newly created 78th district legislative seat, answered the following questions for the readers of the Rotan Advance-Roby Star Record.

Q. Why are you running for the 78th district seat in the Texas House of Representatives?

Carriker: "I feel very strongly that every district in the State of Texas should be represented by someone who knows and cares about the problems of his district and has a direct stake in the future of the part of the state that he is to represent. Many people expressed to me their dissatisfaction with the performance of the man who moved into our district to run, and they shared the common feeling that small town and rural representation would suffer if someone with genuine roots in the district didn't get into the race. So here I am."

Q. What qualifications do you feel you have to fill this office?

Carriker: "First, and most important, I believe in small town and rural Texas. I believe in its farmers and ranchers, its small businessmen, its young people, and its pioneer senior citizens."

"As far as education and experience, I'm a graduate of the University of Texas with a degree in government. As a college student, I worked as a Sergeant-at-Arms in the Texas House, and also worked for the Texas Department of Agriculture. I've served on the county board for the Farmers Home Administration and I've served on the board of directors of the Senior Texans Employment Program and on the advisory committee for Green Thumb."

"My experience in business (outside of my farming operation) includes service on the boards of three cooperatives, two of them regionals."

"Politically, I've served as a precinct Democratic Chairman and election judge, am a sustaining member of the Texas Democratic Party, and have testified before both the Texas Legislature and the U.S. Congress on matters ranging from land ownership to credit and interest rates."

"And if I can brag for a moment, I had a very good teacher in politics. My father, the late Max D. Carriker, began service in the legislature when I was eight years old, and I grew up watching a very fine man serve the interests of the people."

Q. What do you promise to do if elected to the legislature?
Carriker: "I can't promise to do anything. I can only

tell you what my intentions are and what I'll work toward.

Q. Then tell us what kinds of things you want to work for.

Carriker: "First, economic equality for our small cities and rural areas. By this I mean economic opportunity through investment, enterprise, and jobs for our people; our fair share of the services and benefits provided to Texans by our state government; and an easing of the tax burden placed on rural areas and small towns and cities through the inequitable property tax system."

"Second, education. I've said and I'll say again that education is the most important function of the state and local governments in a free and democratic society, and an educated and skilled populace is the backbone of a healthy economy. I believe that teachers are still underpaid, and that eventually, if this is not corrected, that education will suffer and our children will be the losers."

"Third, the needs of our senior citizens. The 78th district has among the highest percentages of people over the age of 65 in the state. They have special needs, and they should have both the right and the opportunity to lead a secure and unworried lifestyle in their retirement years. A very nice lady asked me the other day why a relatively young man like me cared about senior citizens and my reply was that it was my goal to become one, eventually. I certainly hope that I make it and that it's something to look forward to and not to dread."

Q. Who's financing your campaign and who will you be indebted to when you are elected?

Carriker: "I'll be indebted to the voters of the 78th district, but not because they gave money but because they gave me their votes. They are the ones, however, who've financed my campaign. The overwhelming majority of my funds have come from just plain, ordinary people, many of whom I'd never met before announcing my candidacy. They hear about me from a friend or a neighbor and then they just walk up and hand me a check, usually for a modest amount, but it adds up, and we've been able to run a very good campaign on it."

Q. Do you have any final word for the voters before the election on Saturday?
Carriker: "I only wish to thank them for the warm reception they've given me and for the kind attention that they've given this race. I hope that I can have the privilege of serving them for the next two years."

Election Coverage

We don't intend for the "Newspaper Office" election night tally board to rival the Roby Lion's Election Day Evening "Fish Fry" for attendance, however-we feel there will be sufficient interest in Fisher County to support both.

The Newspaper Office, as in the past, will have election results posted in front of the office beginning at approximately 7:30 p.m. Saturday night. We will also maintain open telephone lines for those people in Fisher County unable to attend the Roby Lion's Fish Fry or The Newspaper Office Tally Board. We ask that you don't start calling in for results until after 9:00 p.m. Saturday night.

The Roby Lions Club will begin serving fish at 5:30 and will serve until 7:00 p.m. The affair is "all you can eat" and tickets are \$4.50 each. Advance tickets can be purchased from any Roby Lions Club member.

The Newspaper Office will begin posting election results as soon as they are available, precinct by precinct, for all state and Fisher County races. "We invite you to stop by the office, wait for the results, visit with friends and stay as long as you'd like," said Kim Pease.

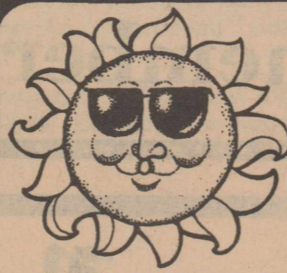

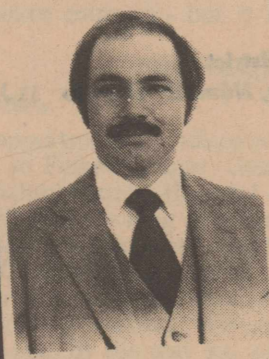

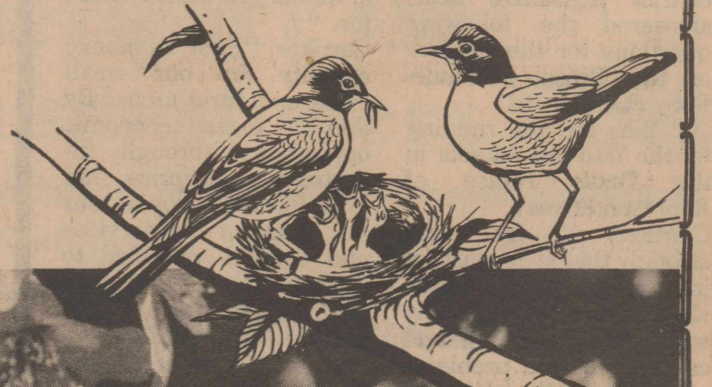

The Recipe Box

Favorite Recipes From Fisher County Folks

This week's recipes all come from a PTA Cookbook dated 1942. We say thank you again to Miss Delila Baird for giving us a copy of this wonderful old cookbook. Mrs. A.V. Allen of Roby is the author of our first recipe. Mrs. Allen is the mother of Cotton Allen of Roby.

Chess Pie

4 egg yolks
1 whole egg, whip good
1 cup sugar
1 or 1/2 cup butter, cream good
Mix good for a filling. Pour in a greased baking dish and bake. Whip 4 egg whites with sugar. Pour on top and brown.

1/2 cup sweet milk
2 Tbsp. corn starch
1 tsp. baking powder
A pinch of salt

Our second recipe comes from Mrs. Jewel Malouf. Mrs. Malouf lives in Rotan.

Quick Butterscotch Frosting

1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup milk
1 1/2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
Combine brown sugar, shortening, butter and salt in saucepan and bring to boil, stirring constantly. Add milk and boil slowly 3 minutes. Cool. Add confectioner's sugar and beat until thick enough to spread.

1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
3 Tbsp. shortening
2 Tbsp. butter

The following recipe for Fudge Squares really sounds like something you might enjoy these warm summery days. This recipe comes from Mrs. Wayne Porter of Rotan.

Fudge Squares

1/2 pound creamery butter
1 1/2 cups sugar
Cream and add:
4 eggs, beaten in one at a time
Add:
1 cup flour
1/2 cup cocoa
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup pecans
Cook at 350 degrees in shallow pan until it turns loose at side of pan. Cut in squares while warm and place in refrigerator.

4,000 Foot County Wildcat Planned

Flowing 108 barrels of oil per day, along with 1,620,000 CFD casinghead gas, the No. 1 Roberta Ford "B" was completed successfully in the Northwest Noodle Field by Terrell Operating Company of Hamlin.

Drillsite is seven miles southeast of Sylvester. It was drilled to 4,400-ft. total depth and will produce from an interval 4,170 to 4,285 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on an open choke.

Over two hundred checks are hand written and signed each month by the County Treasurer. These disbursements and the revenues are hand posted. The payroll checks, social security, withholding and retirement are also posted by hand.

Knowledge of and ability to use adding machines, calculators and typewriters is also essential in an accurate operation of the office.

I feel that my accounting experience with the records and fee reports to the County Treasurer qualifies me to perform the duties of this office. I seek the office of Fisher County Treasurer in order to serve you in a broader capacity. The Treasurer's office is important to the operation of the County and requires a lot of work and accuracy. Fisher County employs fifty-one fulltime and five part-time employees.

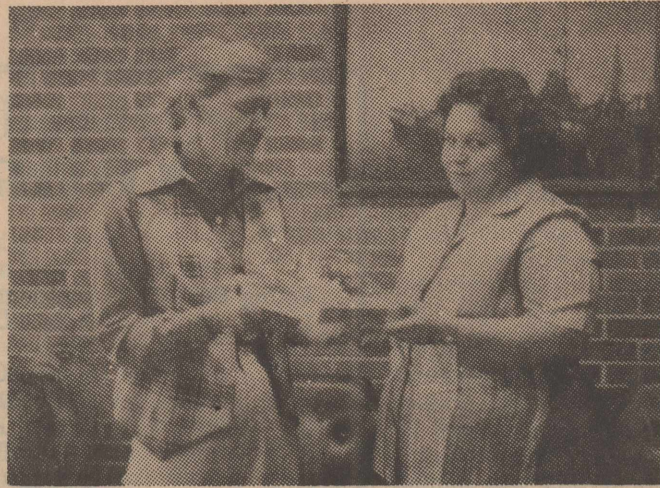
