

Song Birds also are not as prolific in this area as in years gone by but we do have featherd neighbors-Mourning Doves. Until the last few years very few Doves remained here during the summer.

Fisher County was about the middle of the flyway, with Doves migrating during early fall on their way south for the winter. Then back in the spring and moving north for the summer. A few birds would stay around and nest, but mostly just remained a few weeks.

They are sturdy game birds and hunters would visit their favorite waterholes and tanks in September each year, then about October 1st a flight of the large Northern Doves would come in and stay a few weeks. In past years when Milo prices justified farmers in planting considerable amounts, Doves would remain longer for the food. Very little Milo is now planted in the area.

Carrots In Mustard Sauce

12 whole young carrots 1 Tbsp. butter 1 Tbsp. flour 1/2 tsp. salt 1/8 tsp. pepper 1 cup milk or half & half

1 tsp. prepared mustard

1 Tbsp. chopped chives or green onion tops

Wash and scrape carrots. Cook in salted water until tender. Drain, leave whole or slice. Melt butter, add flour, salt, and pepper and cook until bubbly. Add milk and mustard and cook smooth. Toss in carrots and heat until good and hot. Sprinkle with chives or onion tops. Note: Slipping the least expensive vegetables into the menu is a feat worth trying.

(Prickly Pear)

1 gallon ripe cactus "tunas"
