Members of the Rotan Police Department have investigated two burglaries in Rotan in recent weeks according to Rotan Police Chief Gene Pack.

The first burglary took place on May 27th at the Hatahoe Drive In and supposedly took place in the early morning hours. Pack indicated that the

burglars entered through an open window and removed an undetermined amount of change from the

cigarette and juke box machines.

The second incident reported by Pack involved an

attempted burglary at the Rotan Flower Shop. This incident took place between the hours of 12:20 a.m. and 12:35 a.m. on the morning of May 29th. Pack indicated that police officers in their routine check of businesses passed and checked the Flower Shop

at 12:20 a.m. and on another check at 12:35 a.m., discovered the north door to the Flower Shop open. It was determined that nothing was missing from the shop, however an attempt to open the cash register was made.

In the opening game, the Rebels defeated the Vets by the score of 21-6. The Rebels had 21 runs on 10 hits, made 9 errors, and left 4 players on base. Felix Yanez was the winning pitcher. Yanez was 3-4 at the plate, scored 4 runs while teammate Steve McClain was 3-4, had an inside the park home run, and 5 RBI's. Jay Helms for the Vets was 2-4 at the plate with both hits being triples.

The Rebels scored 12 runs on 8 hits, had 3 errors and left 4 men on base. The game was called after 5 innings because of the 90 minute rule.

In the second game last Monday, the Vets defeated the Pirates 21-1 with the game called after 4 innings. Kenneth Warren was the winning pitcher. He was 2-4 at the plate and had an inside the park home run.

On Friday, June 11th the Rebels play the Pirates at 6:00; with the Vets and Yankees set to play at 8:00 p.m.

On Monday, June 14th the Yankees open with the Pirates with the Vets to play the Rebels at 8:00 p.m.

The Farm Team Bears are in first place with a 2-0 record while the Eagles are 0-1 and the Hornets 0-1. On Thursday, June 10th, the Eagles play the Bears at 6:00 p.m. and on Tuesday, June 15th, the Hornets face the Bears at 6:00 p.m.

The Recipe Box

Favorite Recipes From Fisher County Folks

This week we are featuring some easy, do-ahead dishes just perfect for the hot weather we've been having.

Our first recipe this week comes from the Methodist Cookbook. It was submitted by Faye McSpadden of Rotan.

Sweet Salad

- 1 (12 oz.) carton Cool Whip
 - 1 small can coconut
 - 1 can cherry pie filling
 - 1/2 c. miniature marshmallows
 - 1 can Eagle Brand milk
 - 1 small, flat can crushed pineapples
 - 1/2 c. pecans
- Mix all together. Salad may be served frozen.

Rosemary Donham of Roby and also a member of our Newspaper Office staff, has shared her recipe for Yogurt Pie.

Yogurt Pie

- 1 Graham Cracker pie crust
- 1 container Strawberry Yogurt
- 1 large container Cool Whip

Mix Cool Whip and Yogurt together and put in pie shell. Add fresh strawberries for topping. Place in refrigerator for 2 to 3 hours and serve.

This is a low calorie, cool summer dessert. You can use any flavor yogurt with fresh fruit for topping.

The last recipe for this week is one of my own favorites. I hope you enjoy it too.

Ham-Macaroni Salad

- 2 cups elbow macaroni
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise or creamy salad dressing
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 2 to 3 Tbsp. vinegar
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 lb. cooked ham, cubed
- 1/2 lb. Swiss cheese, cubed
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- Lettuce leaves

DO AHEAD: Cook macaroni, following package directions; drain; set aside. In large bowl mix well mayonnaise, sour cream, vinegar and salt. Stir in ham, cheese, macaroni, onion and celery until well coated. Cover; refrigerate up to 7 days. Serves 4.

JUST BEFORE SERVING: Stir and arrange salad on lettuce-lined platter.

I found this article in the Reporter-News the other day. Thought that ya'll might be interested in reading it. It is by Sylvia Porter, who does 'Your Money's Worth'. Most people have trouble balancing their check book with the cancelled checks. What will they do without them?

This country's banks are quietly preparing to do away with the canceled checks you use to prove that you paid a bill or to review your bank statements. Instead, you will have to analyze the statement for any mistakes. If you need a canceled check, you will have to ask for it, pay an additional fee and wait to get it. You probably won't get it from your bank, but from a canceled check depository that will keep the checks by agreement with various banks. Thus, if the depository makes an error, your bank even could disclaim responsibility.

The reason: The paperwork to process the billions of checks handled by our banking system is becoming ever more costly.

The up side: Some savings may be passed on to you in one form or another as this relief is felt in the banks' bottom line.

The down side: One more step will be taken toward concentration of information that affects you in computers managed by other people. Without paper records, you have less means to challenge computer errors or changes in the programming that can take money from you. Some banks, in fact, ask you to sign agreements that they can make future changes in handling your account without your consent.

The down side becomes a grim reality if you find that \$1,000 was charged to your account by an unexplained check you don't recall writing. You may need that money this month to pay your rent and your landlord may not be willing to wait until the canceled check depository sends you the check (assuming it can be found) so the error can be corrected; the bank has conveniently forwarded all the papers to the depository.

The sinister part is not the practical problems alone, but the fact that this dramatic change is being planned so quietly that there is no public knowledge or discussion of it. Regulatory bodies know of it, but they feel no need to warn the public. Indeed, they often feel their duty is to promote the industries with which they deal, and the relationships are daily becoming more chummy. The spirit of anti-business crusading that led to blatant overkill and overregulation is being replaced by a pendulum swing at all levels of government toward a business-government coziness unheard of since the Era of Normalcy in the Roaring '20s.

The depository plan would actually make it easier for government agencies, including the Internal Revenue Service, to investigate citizens. Instead of trying to find your bank, the agencies could go directly to a single

source of confidential information on millions of American citizens conveniently centralized. Whatever financial privacy still exists would become a will-o'-the-wisp as a practical proposition.

Moreover, depriving you of canceled checks would make many aspects of electronic banking obligatory rather than voluntary, pushing more people into the category of programmable "computer faces." Lack of paper records to prove you are right in any dispute is one of the hallmarks of the fate of the consumer in the electronic society.

Your vulnerability to computer crime will increase. Your rights to protest will reduce because you have no records.

This part of the electronic revolution is pushing us centuries backward—not forward. "Electronic money" could mean that the flick of a control dial could transfer, create or destroy assets you thought you had.

It won't happen if you continue to show strong sales resistance to instant electronic banking. Banks that eliminate canceled checks may lose you as a customer to banks that continue to supply you with them. And if you and I, the customers, fail to notify our banks of errors (because we have no proof), banks may think twice about saving money with this technique. Now that you know what's being planned, make your feelings unmistakably known. This is not progress!

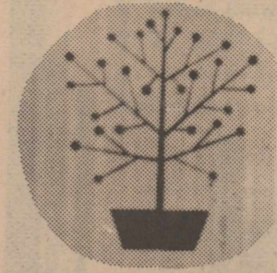

County Agent Discusses Ticks

Tick populations increase dramatically with warmer weather, causing inconvenience and health hazards for homeowners and pets.

Ticks are biting, blood-sucking parasites, and their bites may become inflamed and infected due to toxic secretions. Tick paralysis, tularemia and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever may be transmitted through tick bites.

Brown dog, American dog and Lone Star ticks are

the most common in Texas home landscapes. Brown dog ticks are reddish-brown while American dog ticks are yellowish-brown when unfed and slate gray when engorged. The brown dog tick rarely occurs in rural areas; instead, it hides in crevices around buildings. American dog ticks are most often found along roads and trails. The Lone

Star tick has a characteristic white spot on its back and commonly referred to as a spot backed tick.

A female tick may lay several thousand eggs, beginning a two-to four-month life cycle. Remaining stages—six legged larva (seed tick) and eight legged nymph and adult—generally develop on separate host animals. After each feeding the tick drops

off the host and temporarily hides until the next developmental stage.

Regardless of the species, control is basically the same for all ticks. Heavy infestations in the home may require treatment by professionals. Household sprays containing diazinon, Dursban, Baygon, resmethrin or Vapona will provide excellent control of light infestations.

Outside the home where vegetation is thin, use 5 percent carbaryl (Sevin) dust at 20-25 pounds per acre. Increase the rate as vegetation thickens. If using a spray, mix five tablespoons of 25 percent diazinon emulsifiable concentrate (EC) in one gallon of water. Apply one gallon of spray per 1,000 square feet.
