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Here is some new information on those fat-forming nuisances-calories. Everyone knows you must "burn" or use up more calories than you take in. This is a certainty that defies all challenges. To lose weight, gain weight, or stay the same, you need to know how many calories will accomplish your objective.

Dr. Robert L. Kaman, PhD, of the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine in Fort Worth has come up with a formula:

Multiply your weight by 11.43. Then multiply the answer by 1.3 if you get no exercise, by 1.4 if you get moderate exercise, and by 1.5 if you get vigorous exercise. The final answer is the number of calories you need to maintain your present weight. To lose, you simply take in fewer than that number. To gain, to take in more.

Fruits and vegetables are ready for harvesting and preservation. Many of you are already canning, freezing, preserving, pickling and perhaps even drying these fruits and vegetables.

One rule to remember no matter how you choose to process your food is that the final product is only as good quality as what you started with and only if

you used proper procedures.

Pick and process vegetables and fruits when at their very best. Over mature or over-ripe does not make a good food for later. The quicker the food is processed after it is harvested, the better food you will have.

If you have a question about whether you should

process in the pressure canner or waterbath, don't hesitate to call my office. I'll be happy to discuss with you which process is best and why.

We also have bulletins on each of the above mentioned processes. If you need any of this information, call the office and request information, we'll be glad to mail it to you. Or come by for a visit. The office is in the Southwest wing of the Courthouse. Below are a few more canning tips:

1) Why is liquid lost from jars during processing? Loss of liquid is due to packing jars too tight with food or adding too much

liquid. Too high pressure variation or sudden lowering of pressure in using a pressure canner will also cause loss of liquid. Let pressure return to zero before opening the canner. The loss of liquid will not cause spoilage.

2) When fruit is packed cold, is it necessary to heat the syrup before it is poured over the fruit in the jar?

Boiling syrup is preferable as it speeds up the heating of the food.

3) What causes corn to turn brown during processing?

This most often occurs when too high a tempera-

ture is used. The high temperature causes a caramelization of the sugar in the corn. It may also be caused by some mineral, such as iron in the water used in canning. Some varieties turn brown more readily than others.

4) How much juice should be made into jelly at one time?

Not more than 6 to 8 cups. If a larger quantity of juice is used it will be necessary to boil it longer, causing loss of flavor and darkening the jelly.

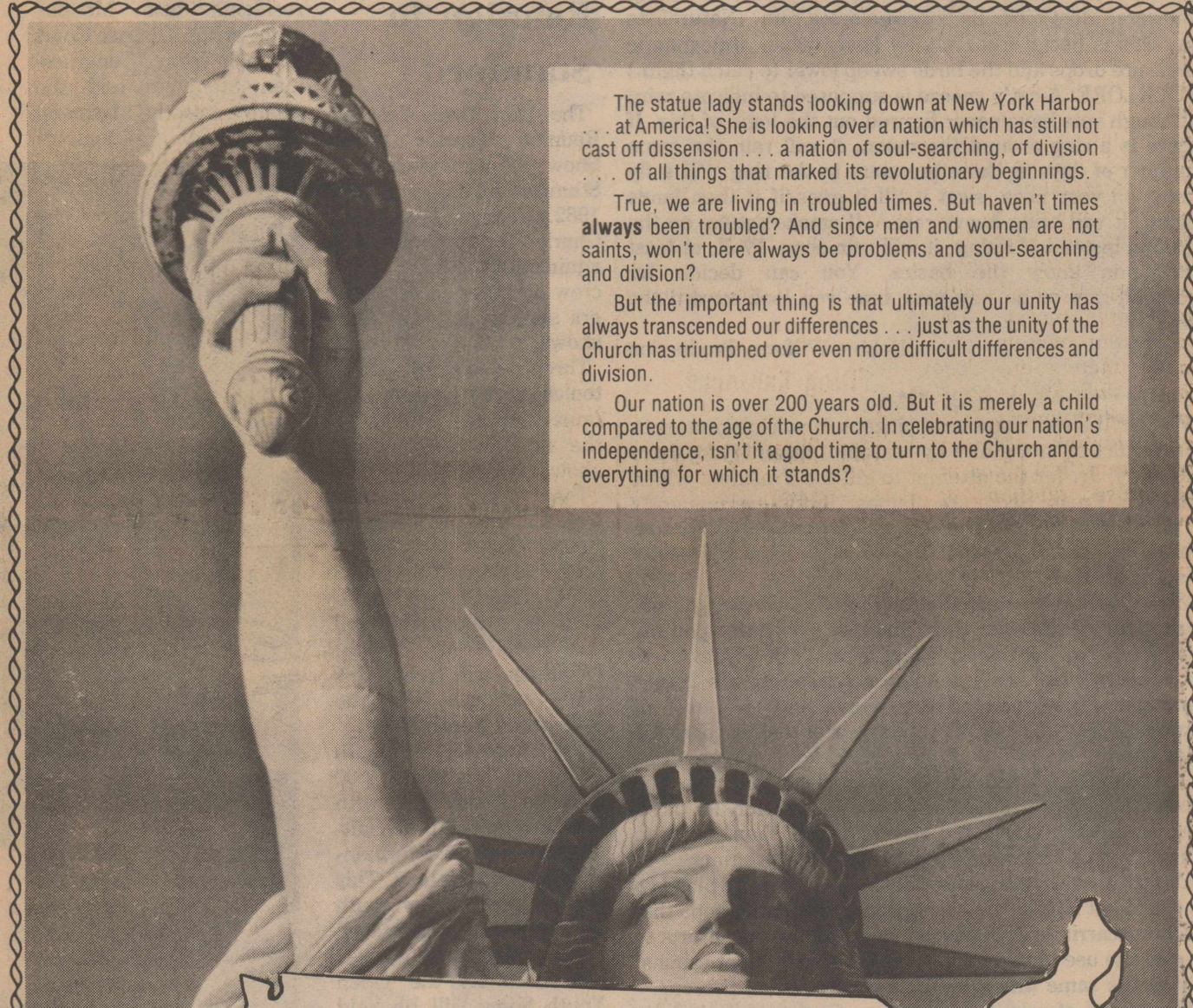

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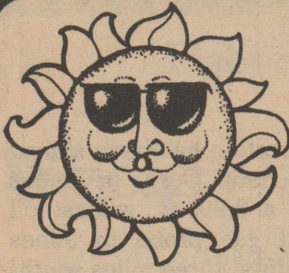

After a wedding trip, they will be at home at 503 E. Meade St., Rotan.

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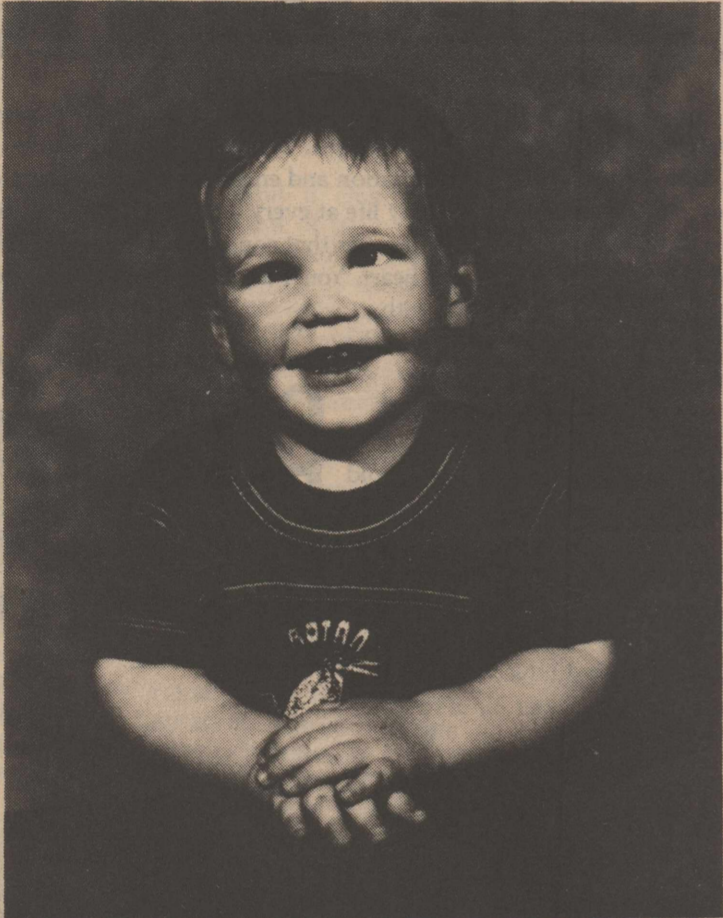

## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective July 27, 1982, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

It is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 13.4 percent increase in the company's intrastate revenues.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

### Notice to El Paso Area Customers

Effective January 1, 1982, Southwestern Bell adopted the Mountain States tariffs in effect for El Paso County. Southwestern Bell proposes to merge the separate El Paso tariffs with its tariffs applicable to the rest of Texas. The resulting new rate schedule is on file with the PUC and the El Paso area municipalities served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection at our El Paso business office.

### Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

The filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for interexchange private line and foreign exchange (FX) service. Changes in such rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies because such companies provide interexchange private line and foreign exchange service in accordance with rates specified in Southwestern Bell's tariffs. While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in long distance rates, any change in those rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies.

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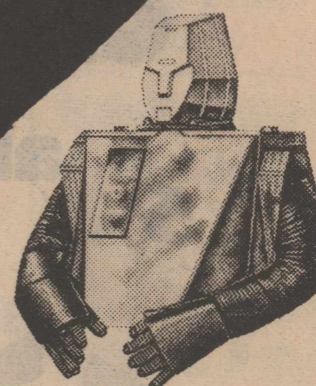
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
