There is something special about a cloudless blue day-especially when there are so few of them. It seems lately instead of clear days we have been seeing clouds forming overhead. How does one tell if those clouds mean rain? Here are some facts and some folklore from WABC Radio Radar Weather's Rasa Kaye. FACT: See how high the clouds are. High clouds are distant ice crystals that won't drip no matter how threatening they look. It's the lower clouds that rain. See if there is dew or frost on the grass at night or early in the morning and remember this little rhyme. "When grass is dry at morning light/Look for rain before the night." Most flowers remain open on the night before a storm and petals close tightly during the day to foretell evening showers. Most birds fly lower before a rain. (Naturalists say this is because insects fly lower when atmospheric pressure drops and the birds sweep lower to catch them.) FOLKLORE: A cat's sneeze is supposed to indicate rain, although vets have never figured out the logic of this. If there is a ring around the moon, it will rain the same number of days as there are stars in the ring. "If a fly lands on your nose, swat it till it goes/if it then lands again, it will bring heavy rain." If smoke settles on the ground instead of rising, it will rain soon. We join the vast number of citizens in voicing protest to the verdict of 'not guilty by reason of insanity' for John Hinckley, Jr. for the attempt to kill the President which left the Press Secretary James Brady permanently disabled and seriously injured a District of Columbia policeman and Secret Service Agent. This is a national

While we are blaming the jury for this verdict, do not lose sight of the fact that Hinckley's wealthy parents spared no expense to employing an array of psychiatrists to explain what we consider a spoiled brat's mixed emotions. They clouded the issues and the staff of expensive lawyers did the remainder of making possible that under current law, if John Hinckley is found not to be a danger to himself or to society, even in the immediate future, he must be set free within 90 days, and conceivably could then appear on talk shows or write a book on his violent attempt on the three victims.

The power of wealth using the present insanity plea law is what kept Hinckley out of prison and we truly hope that such miscarriage of justice will spur legislative efforts to repeal the use of the insanity defense for violent crimes. but at the same time protect the truly insane persons.

Since the verdict of Not Guilty, there has been a major outcry by the public over the trial of John Hinckley, attempted assassin of President Reagan. The jurors found that Hinckley was "insane" at the time the act was committed. It only took a few days to reach the verdict so there must have been overwhelming evidence that he (Hinckley) was not in his right mind.

Under the law, the jury did the right thing. John Hinckley is a schizoid, a psychotic illness that one has that one suffers from delusions, hallucinations, and a loss of reality. The press has come out and said that Hinckley could be released in 50 days. But no psychiatrist in his right mind is goingto release Hinckley. Schizophrenia is severe, as in Hinckley's case, and a person in that condition will be committed to a mental institution, probably for the rest of his life.

Most people think that if one is committed that he is on "vacation". This is wrong. In my opinion being instutionalized would be worse than being sent to prison. Being in prison one could get paroled. Sirhan Sirhan, the killer of Robert Kennedy, was up for parole last month but he was turned down. The treatment for schizophrenia is chemotherapy, but it usually does not work very well on the severe cases. Prison or mental institution, either way life for John Hinckley will not be a bed of roses.

budget, Stenholm told the Fisher County group, deficit budget was the best we could do this year." He knew that there must be a reduction of growth of federal spending. Stenholm indicated that in his opinion, "We're doing this thing backwards. Volker has his foot on the brake and Congress has its foot on the accelerator."

Stenholm said he thought the budget (through misinformation by the press) was causing misconceptions in the minds of the American people. With regard to education, Stenholm said that the budget is 1% greater in 1983 than in 1982. Addressing the nutrition aspect, Stenholm said, "We're not going to deprive food from the mouths of starving children." In fact, the budget calls for 46 billion over the next 3 years which represents only an 8 billion dollar cut from growth. Stenholm said he felt the nutrition programs needed to be prioritized with those that needed it the most getting the assistance.

Finally, Stenholm said that Medicare has caused confusion. The budget calls for a 9 billion dollar reduction over the next 3

Stenholm said he felt there was a good possibility (50-50 chance) that some form of disaster program would be reinstated if certain conditions were met. One criteria was the financial impact to the community in farm areas. He said farmers have "cried wolf" in the past, it was too hot or too cold, or dry or wet, etc., but now the farmer's cry is real. Stenholm spent a lot of time addressing the high interest question and said that interest must start down in the next 30 days and continue going down to get the country back on its feet.

jars during processing? Loss of liquid is due to packing jars too tight with food or adding too much

liquid. Too high pressure variation or sudden lowering of perssure in using a pressure canner will also cause loss of liquid. Let pressure return to zero before opening the canner. The loss of liquid will not cause spoilage.

2) When fruit is packed cold, is it necessary to heat the syrup before it is poured over the fruit in the

Boiling syrup is preferable as it speeds up the heating of the food. 3) What causes corn to turn brown during pro-

cessing? This most often occurs when too high a tempera-

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temperature causes a caramelization of the sugar in the corn. It may also be caused by some mineral, such as iron in the water used in canning. Some varities turn brown more readily than others.

ture is used. The high 4) How much juice should be made into jelly at one

Not more than 6 to 8 cups. If a larger quantity of juice is used it will be necessary to boil it longer, causing loss of flavor and darkening the jelly.

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

Pretzel-Jello Salad

21/2 cups pretzels, coarsely crushed

½ cup margarine 3 Tbsp. sugar

Melt oleo and add to sugar. Place crushed pretzels in bottom of 9 x 13-inch pan. Pour oleo and sugar mixture over pretzels and mix well. Bake 10 minutes at 50 degrees. Cool completely.
