Rotan City To Spend \$49,500 On Street Repair

The City of Rotan, at the City Council meeting last week, voted to put out for bid approximately 90,000 square yards (80 blocks)

for street seal coating. It is estimated that the street resurfacing project will cost \$49,500.00. It is expected that the seal

coating will be done in late August or early September. In other action the Council reviewed a pro-

posed 19% rate increase by Lone Star Gas Company and an increase request by Southwestern Bell Telephone company. Both rate

requests were to be reviewed by the Texas Utility Commission.

The Council members heard a presentation con-

cerning the 75th Anniversary Celebration; discussed a police report with Chief Gene Pack and discussed a proposal by the Fisher County Appraisal District to furnish tax statements for 20 cents per customer.

Council members discussed with City Secretary Vann the prospects of keeping the Rotan Pool open after school starts. Vann is to monitor the pool financial reports and attempt to keep the pool open as long as there is sufficient interest.

The council members agreed to underwrite, by unanimous approval, any deficit left after contributions were received on the library roofing fund.

Fourteen Iowa 4-Hers Due In F.C.

A total of fourteen 4-H kids and three adult leaders will be coming to Fisher County from Iowa on Thursday, July 29th to spend a week with local 4-H families as part of the first leg of a state exchange program. Next year Fisher County 4-Hers will be travelling to Iowa for a week.

I thought this would be very informative because sometimes I forget how dangerous lightning can be in some situations.

Lightning is nature's most awesome multimedia show. While it is spectacular to watch lightning from a safe place, taking unnecessary risks in thunderstorms can be dangerous or even deadly.

Lightning kills about 125 people a year in the U.S. and injures nearly 500. Fortunately, two-thirds of those injured make full recoveries.

When a thunderstorm hits, heeding these few tips will dramatically reduce the chances of being hit by lightning:

*Keep from being the tallest point in the area. Stay away from the tallest trees, telephone poles, and other natural lightning rods.

*If caught in the woods, take shelter under a thick growth of short trees. Don't hide in small, isolated shrubs or sheds.

*If swimming or boating, get out of the water. If a boat is your only recourse, stay in the cabin or crouch low in the boat.

*Get away from tractors and other metal farm equipment.

*If golfing, take off your cleated shoes, and don't go near your clubs, your golf cart, or the metal flagsticks.

*Stay away from motorcycles, ski lifts, and bicycles.

*Avoid wire fences, clothes lines, metal pipes, railroad tracks, and any other metal which could carry a remote charge to you.

*If possible, get inside a large building or an all-metal (not convertible) vehicle. While inside the building, do not take a shower or bath, unplug major appliances like your television set, and use the telephone only in emergencies.

*If you find yourself in an open field or prairie and feel your hair stand on end, lightning may be about to strike you. Immediately drop to your knees, bend forward, and put your hands on your knees. That small change in your altitude may be just enough to ward off the potential lightning strike.

*Don't lie in a ditch or hollow, since surface water could conduct a nearby strike right to you.

*If you are in a large group, spread out and remain several yards apart. If lightning does strike, the smallest number of persons will be affected.

Many people struck by lightning can be revived by cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) even though they appear to be dead. Check those who only appear to be stunned for burns on fingers, toes, or near jewelry. Don't be afraid to touch victims; they carry no electrical charge.

Rotan School Board Accepts Resignation, Hires Two, Reviews Budget Presentation

Rotan School Board members met last Monday night and accepted the resignation of Dr. George Schroyer, Rotan Elementary Principal. Dr. Schroyer resigned to accept the position of Superintendent of the Lueders-Avoca School System. Rotan Superintendent Jerry Dickson indicated last Tuesday that the Rotan Board will be accepting applications for the position of Elementary Principal for two or three weeks in hopes of naming a

replacement for Dr. Schroyer by the latter part of August.

The board also employed two teachers last Monday. They hired Peggy Williams, former English teacher at McCaulley, to teach English at Rotan High School and hired Sue Branch as an elementary teacher.

In other action the board amended the 1981-82 adopted budget by lowering it \$84,979.00. "We just don't anticipate spending as much as we

budgeted," said Superintendent Jerry Dickson.

The board adopted changes in the student handbook; discussed a teacher handbook and

adopted an evaluation report concerning the 5 year accreditation program at the Rotan School at the meeting last Monday.

Board members accepted the milk bid of Gandy's Dairies.

The only other bidder was Borden's. Gandy's bid for a 1/2 pint of homogenized was .163 cents; 1/2 pint of chocolate was .174; low fat .140; and 1/2 pint of low fat chocolate was .155.

The board agreed to accept bids on the health insurance program for the Rotan School after Blue Cross/Blue Shield rates were increased 50%

Board members were given a copy (for study only) of the proposed 1982-83 budget which was \$1,304,797.00. Several changes required by the state change budget reporting procedures, but Dickson estimated that the current budget is approximately \$40,000.00 to \$50,000.00 over last year's and will be adopted without an increase in taxes.

Coach Jon Curry Injured In Construction Mishap

Assistant Rotan Football Coach Jon Curry was seriously injured in a construction accident in Dumas last Friday morning and is currently in the intensive care unit of Dumas Memorial Hospital.

Curry was doing summer employment with the Lipham Construction Company out of Aspermont, Texas, working on re-surfacing 12 miles of road north of Dumas. According to a spokesman for Lipham Construction Company, the accident took place at approximately 8:00 a.m. Friday morning, July 16th, when Curry was pinned between two large road rolling pieces of equipment.

He was taken to the Dumas Memorial Hospital where he was operated on for broken ribs, a punc-

tured lung and internal bleeding. On Sunday, July 18th, he was operated on for a bleeding spleen. Doctors removed his spleen during the operation.

Dan Burk Hired As Assistant At Clyde

Dan Burk, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Dale Burk of Rotan, has accepted a position as first assistant football coach and defensive coordinator at Clyde High School, it was announced this week.

Burk is a 1976 graduate of Rotan High School, graduated from Texas Tech with a bachelor of science degree in physical education and biology in December of 1980 and was

He was reported in stable condition last Monday morning but is expected to be monitored by medical personnel at the Dumas Hospital for at least two weeks.

a member of the coaching staff at Uvalde High School.

At Uvalde he was a member of a 9 coach staff with responsibilities in freshman football and basketball and varsity track. While at Texas Tech, Burk was a student assistant coach and "strength coach" for 1 1/2 years.

At Clyde, Burk will be under head coach Ron Taylor. Rotan plays Clyde in a pre-district game on September 24th at Clyde.

Burk and his wife, Dana, originally from Panhandle, Texas, will be moving to Clyde to assume coaching responsibilities this week.

Jello Cookies

4 cups sifted flour
1 tsp. baking powder
2 cups sugar
1 (3 oz.) pkg. jello (any flavor)

1 egg
1/2 cup butter
1 tsp. vanilla

Mix flour, baking powder, 1 cup sugar and jello. Set aside. Cream 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, butter and vanilla. Mix in dry ingredients. Drop by teaspoonful on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 400 degrees for 13 or 14 minutes.

From Jerilyn Marshall, a student at Rotan High School, comes our final recipe.

Butter Cookies

1 cup sugar
1 c. oleo or butter (soft)
1 egg or 3 egg yolks
1 tsp. almond extract or vanilla

2 1/2 c. flour, sifted
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/8 tsp. salt

Cream oleo; add sugar gradually. Add egg, then dry ingredients (sifted). Mix well. Put dough in cookie press and put on ungreased, cool cookie sheet. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes.

Let cool on waxed paper before stacking to keep shapes pretty. Add color to dough, if desired. You can't add nuts in the cookie press, but you can add to cookies before baking.

Stenholm Releases Disaster Loan Listing

Congressman Charles Stenholm said recently that some federal disaster payments to West Texas farmers would be made as soon as the U.S. Department of Agriculture verifies the damage their crops have suffered.

Stenholm, Democratic representative from Stamford, said some of the payments would come in the fairly near future, although there may be some delays because of the number of farms whose losses USDA will have to check.

"I was extremely pleased that USDA recognized the tremendous extent of the disaster and the unique circumstances under which it occurred," Stenholm said. "I had, of course, urged that this step be taken, and I believe it was the only reasonable course."

"If ever there was a situation that fit the provisions for reinstating the disaster program, this was it," he added.

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service personnel will begin processing disaster claims soon, Stenholm said. USDA told him, however, that the heavy workload this will impose on county offices may lead to some delays.

Emergency Farmers Home Administration disaster loans will be made after harvest, Stenholm said. The loans, at below-market rates, will be available in counties that meet the normal criteria for such aid.

If a farmer had a total loss, Stenholm said, and either did not replant or planted a different crop, the disaster payment

would come fairly soon. Farmers who have replanted cotton will have their disaster claims on replanted acreage settled at harvest-time.

It is still important for farmers to maintain 15 percent of their acreage in approved conservation uses, in order to remain

eligible for payments.

Under the disaster program, cotton farmers in eligible counties will receive 20.5 cents per pound on up to 75 percent of their established yield times the number of acres lost, and the deficiency payment on the remainder. For wheat, the payment is \$1.75 per bushel on up to 60 percent of the yield. Feed grain payments are 15 cents per bushel for corn, 18 cents per bushel for grain sorghum, and 15 cents per bushel for barley for any losses up to 60 percent of the yield.

Counties in the 17th District eligible for disaster payments include Baylor, Borden, Crosby, Dawson, Fisher, Floyd, Garza, Haskell, Howard, Jones, Kent, Knox, Lynn, Martin, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor, Throckmorton, and Young.

Disaster assistance will be made available in addition to insured benefits which farmers may be entitled to under federal crop insurance policies. Stenholm said the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation plans to hire additional adjusters to handle insurance claims.

One of the most interesting features by Fisher County High School students for "Big Country, People, Events and Places" was by Eddie Sam Thompson and Joe Sam Helms.

Their story was titled "Joseph Frank Clegg of Longhorn Valley". Mr. Clegg was one of our favorite pioneers. He would always take time to tell youngsters of the early days when he came to Fisher County. He had one of the best early-day pecan orchards in the area.

To quote the two students: "Joseph Frank Clegg was born Feb. 12, 1873 in Temple, Texas. He died July 18, 1956 in Rotan and was buried in Cottonwood Cemetery. He came to Fisher County with his father, mother and two sisters in 1881, moving from Hobbs to Longhorn Valley in 1884. He was married to Paralee Floyd Berry in Sentinel, Oklahoma, December 31, 1899. They had nine children and she died in 1922.

On January 30, 1927 he married Narcissa Lementine Potet, a young lady who was not as old as his oldest son. They reared four children.

J.F. Clegg was a religious man and he lived his belief every day. He worked hard and believed all things should bear fruit. The Cleggs lived solely from income from their farm. When horses and mules were turned out, replaced by tractors, Mr. Clegg vowed he would plow no more—a vow which he kept.

The Clegg land is still owned by descendants and he is survived by thirteen children, thirty-seven grandchildren and sixty-five great grandchildren, and many, many great, great grandchildren who will want to hear more about their ancestor who settled in Longhorn Valley so long ago.
