TEXAS VOTE COUNTING--Ever since the fabled but mysterious Box 13 in Alice that sent Lyndon B. Johnson to the United States Senate in 1948, Texas election practices have enjoyed a prominent place in national election lore.

Box 13, we remember, held the votes that kept growing for Lyndon Johnson over the period of a week adding just enough to the total to keep Johnson ahead of the votes that kept turning up for Coke R. Stevenson in East Texas. Johnson had an 87 vote margin and a U.S. Senate seat. Texas Ranger investigation of the Box 13 voting list showed most of the names were taken from cemetery tombstones in Alice cemetery. Coke Stevenson was carrying his fraud case to U.S. Supreme Court. Here Chief Justice Hugo Black halted the inquiry. Stevenson gave up his fight with this. History has revealed that the Supreme Court of this period made a number of rulings that proved to be unfair and unjust. In interviewing Coke Stevenson in 1975, for the biography we published in 1976, Stevenson was convinced that George Parr (Duke of Duval who killed himself a few days before he was to begin serving time for income tax evasion) delivered the 87 votes to Lyndon Johnson.

Johnson would never have been President without the questionable election to the U.S. Senate.

A special panel has been created to try and end all that. An election bureau will be created in the office of the Secretary of State in time for the November elections, replacing the Texas Election Bureau, which for many years has unofficially kept track of Texas votes.

Secretary of State David Dean said the official election bureau will "eliminate the confusion and possible suspicion that results from the considerable delay in the public disclosure of election results...and it should also minimize the opportunity for post-election fraud."

Well, we'll see. But the idea is a good one who's time has come. The official election bureau is one vote away from becoming a reality and we believe it should be supported.

Few of us are able to suppress an occasional secret envy at a friend's good fortune. But when someone is truly suffering from envy, it is more than just a momentary discomfort: in severe cases envy is able to restrict, distort and blacken all that a person does or feels. It has been said that envy is the one Deadly Sin to which no one readily confesses. It seems to be the nastiest and the most useless. Envy is not simply grieving over some talent, benefit or object that another person possesses. That's another vice, called covetousness. Nor should it be confused with jealousy which is the fear of being replaced in someone's affections. Feeling envious is also not the same as becoming competitive and redoubling our own efforts because we are shamed or made insecure by a rival's achievement. With envy, many never have to face the shame, though, because they never perceive their own envy. They convince themselves that if they had only a little of the other person's money, glamour or recognition, everything would be wonderful. You can learn to recognize envy by paying attention to those situations in which you develop an excessively hostile and negative attitude, and to those times when you find yourself repeatedly putting down someone else. Try to think about what you are doing. Is that person really so bad in your view, or are you criticizing him because he makes you feel small or uncomfortable? Are you trying to get even? It's important to remember that no one is completely free of envy, and you shouldn't worry about an occasional pang or two. But when you reach the point that you can't bear other people's successes especially the good fortune of people you should be pleased for, then you are in trouble. But we needn't be that way. Overcoming envy is largely a matter of knowing yourself and your abilities, coming to terms with the world and your place in it. Nothing can liberate the envious person until he sees that he is the source of his own painful situation. It seems that, finally, perhaps the only thing truly worth envying is peace of mind--and freedom from envy itself.

Our government has started registering eighteen-year-olds for the Draft for the Armed Forces. They (the U.S. Government) said that registering would not necessarily mean that they would start the draft again, but in a national emergency it could save four to six weeks in a conventional war. In case of a nuclear war registering won't matter because there will not be much time. The volunteer army is under-manned but it is picking up due to the high unemployment in the country. Five men have been indicted for not registering. They are only five of the 700,000 that did not register. This is about 7% of that age group that did not obey the law. If found guilty, the maximum sentence is 5 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

I do not understand how the government is going to prosecute 700,000 men? To register is the law and they should obey. But these guys do not want to be drafted for another South Korea or Vietnam. If the country was in danger of being invaded most of the 700,000 would fight.

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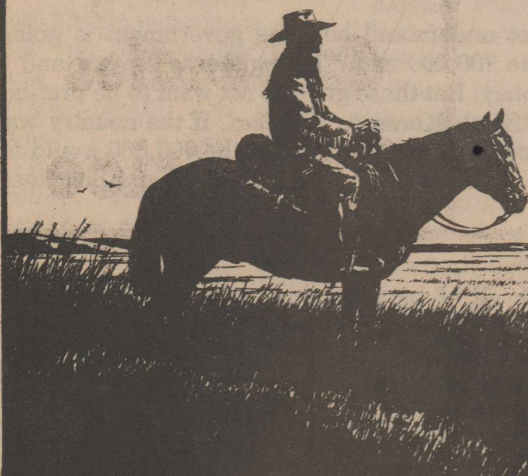

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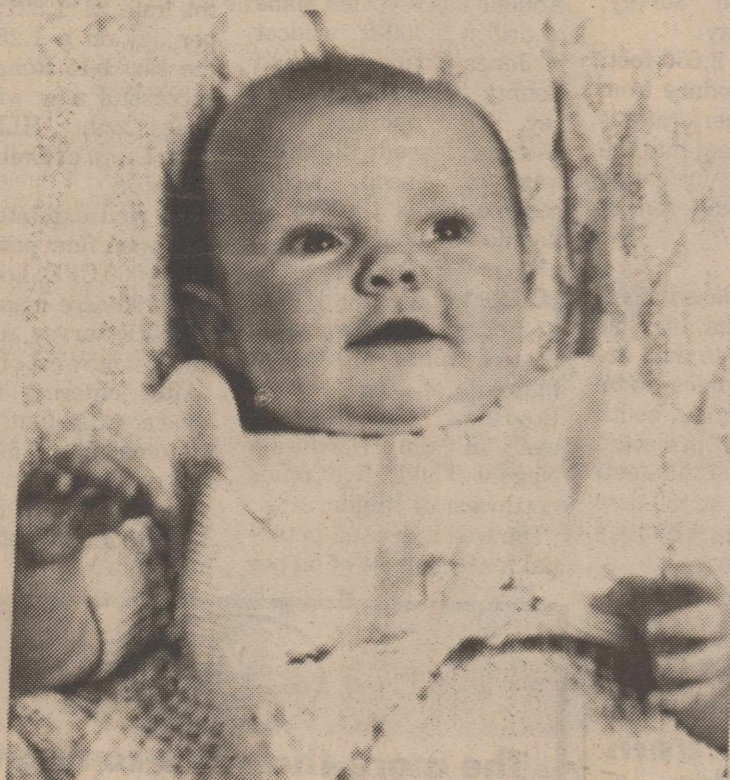

ATTENTION: Overwintering Boll Weevils Found In Cotton!

On July 13 we found six boll weevils on 50 plants in the Kidd Place field in the Lawlis Flats. The weevils were found concentrated in 4 to 6 rows of cotton that apparently was more mature than the rest of the field.

The cotton in these four rows was producing just less than 1/3 grown squares and the boll weevils seemed to be concentrated in this cotton. A 1/3 grown square is diameter of a pencil eraser or about 1/4 inch.

Another field just east of Foy Mitchells sorghum field south of Highway 180 had a similar problem. A difference in maturity occurred with 1/3 grown squares found only on larger cotton in the southeast corner of the field. If 1/3 grown squares

will be given by our County Home Extension Agent, Alice Ballenger.

and boll weevil adults are found in only part of a field the rest of the field which is less mature is safe. That means boll weevils can't lay their eggs and have them survive, in cotton with smaller than 1/3 grown squares. It may be possible to treat only the cotton with 1/3 grown squares found in part of a field and leave the rest. This will take careful scouting to determine if this route is possible. If in doubt, spray the whole field if boll weevil adults are found at 1/3 grown square. A second application of insecticide may be needed 3 to 5 days after the first if boll weevils are still found in part or all of the field.

The field at the Kidd Place in the Lawlis Flats was planted on June 9 & 10. If your field is near boll weevil overwintering habitat and was planted on or before this date, it probably has 1/3 grown squares and should be carefully checked for adult boll weevils. One application at 1/3 grown squares is usually all that is needed to stop the boll weevil before they start reproducing in your field.

If you are unsure on how to check for boll weevils, feel free to contact me at anytime. And note that we have a very good scouting program through the Fisher-Jones Pest Management Association.

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County Agent Report

By watering, fertilizing and mowing your lawn properly, you can reduce your water bill as much as 40 percent during the summer months.

Conservation by the homeowner provides the only solution to high water bills and excessive water demands during our hot and usually dry Texas summers.

In small cities where industrial demand for water is low, lawn watering may account for as much as half of all the water used during summer months. Even in larger cities, lawns get 30 to 40 percent of all the water supplied by municipalities.

Most Texas lawns need about 2 inches of water per week during the summer and most of this usually comes from irrigation.

Exactly what can a homeowner do to reduce his summer water bill? The first thing is to water in the late afternoon and footprints remain after walking across the lawn, then water within 24 hours.

Once you've decided that your lawn needs watering, do it right. Most homeowners don't water their lawns properly. They either water too often, causing grass to develop shallow roots and making it a prime target for insects, diseases and temperature extremes, or they water too infrequently and apply too much water at one time, resulting in a lot of runoff.

When watering, soak the soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches.

Cuttin back on lawn fertilization can also reduce watering. Applying fertilizer in the spring and fall will generally keep your lawn healthy. Fertilizing during the summer, especially with nitrogen fertilizer, will green up your lawn but it will also make it grow faster and use more water.

Mowing less often and cutting your grass at taller heights also will help keep your lawn in better shape during hot, dry weather. St. Augustine grass does well when mowed at a 3-inch height, and bermuda grass can be cut at a 2-inch height.

Grapes have been swarmed recently with insects called grape leaf hoppers. If your grapes appear to be dying; check the leaves for tiny insects. The grape leafhopper can be controlled with sevin. Get the 50 or 80 per cent sevin for spraying. It will probably take 2 to 3 applications at 7 day intervals.

San Jose scale seems to be more prominent in shrubs and hedges this year. Scale can be recognized by white and black particles on leaves with the leaves turning yellow and then dying if not

controlled. Scale insects can be controlled with a summer oil and diazinon. summer oil can be obtained by mixing water and dormant oil-spray in equal proportions.

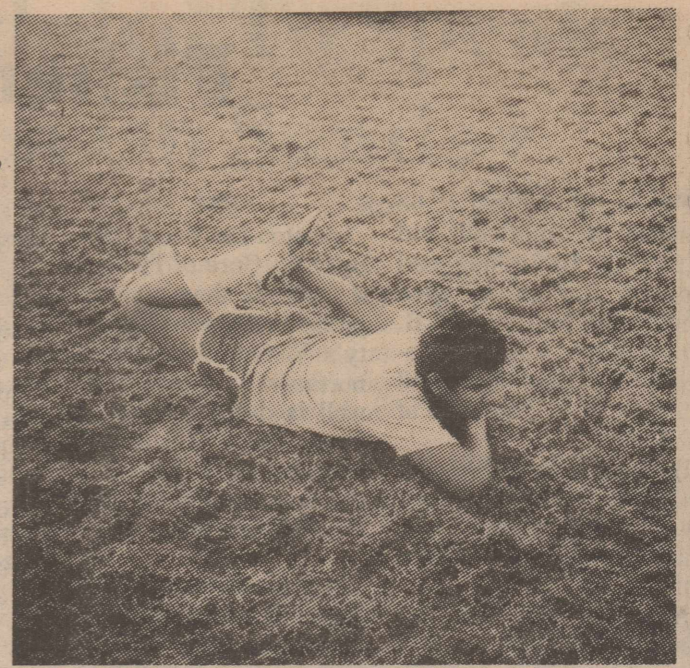

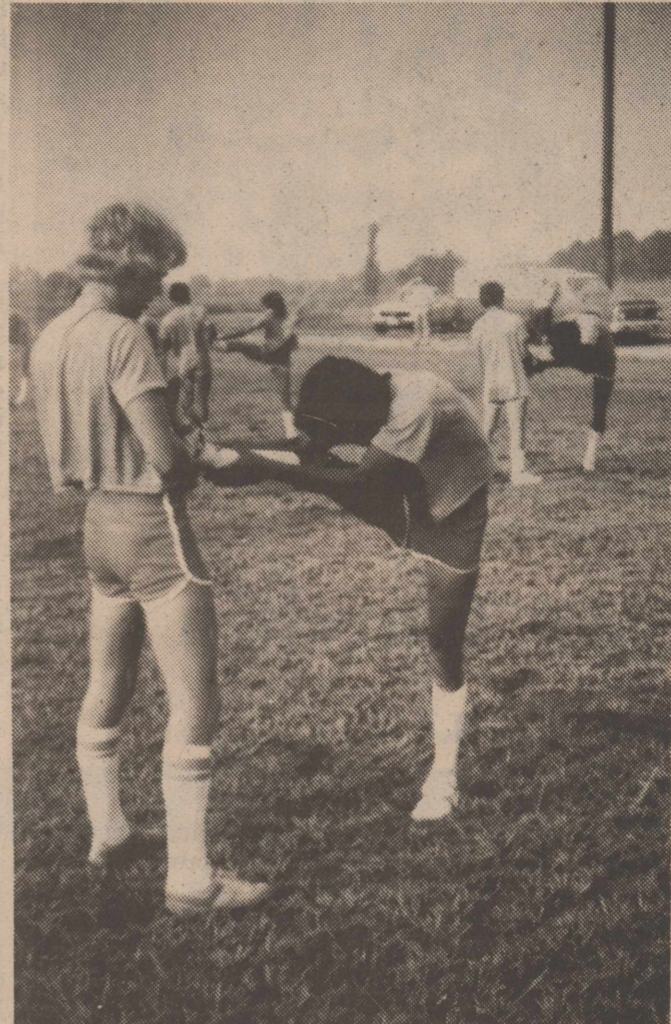
Rotan Library Reading Program Going

Robert Gray Conquers Flying Lessons

So you want to talk about how bad the young people are today?

I'd rather talk about Robert Gray.

Robert Gray is an impressive young man. He has lived all 18 years of his life in Rotan. Last fall when Robert was beginning his senior year at Rotan High School, he had a little talk with his dad. He decided it was time to start thinking seriously about what he wanted to do with the rest of his life-especially his working career.

Robert has been around flying all of his life. His dad is a pilot-in fact, he may have one of the youngest ever to earn his wings at the old Whitefield Airport that used to be south of Rotan. He was a 17-year-old football player who never missed a chance to hitch a ride with a bunch of "flying farmers" who hung out at the Whitefield strip.

But somehow the flying bug had never bitten Robert and his dad had wisely never pushed it. Still, Robert knew there was to be a flight training program offered at Texas State Technical Institute over at Sweetwater-just a prop, skim and bump from Fisher County Airport, which serves the busy flying community in the Roby/Rotan area. He could head for Sweetwater after school and take his flying lessons.

It seemed like the ideal thing to do.

So you want to tell me how undependable young people are today?

I'd rather tell you about Robert Gray.

Nine months after Robert enrolled in the TSTI program, he was licensed pilot with nearly 300 hours of flying time to his credit. He was also a rated commercial pilot and a rated instrument pilot-he passed both checkrides on the same day! Because of his senior-year schedule, Robert never got to take a formal ground-school course-he cracked all the books for his studies on his own.

So you want to tell me young people today are quitters?

I'd rather tell you about Robert Gray.

He's busy pursuing his flight instructor's rating so he can go on and teach other young people how to fly. It may take him just a bit longer to accomplish this one, though. He'll be busy attending McMurry College, thanks to a scholarship he earned at Rotan High for his musical talents as a drummer.

"There's a lot of rhythm and timing flying instruments just like there is playing a drum in a band," he explains. "Maybe that's why I enjoy doing both."

So you want to tell me how lazy today's young people are.

I'd rather tell you how busy Robert Gray is.

He's driving a truck for Gray Fuel & Chemical in Rotan this summer to help earn the money it takes to keep the 1968 Cardinal flying. He'd like to get a part-time job working as a flagman for a crop duster-maybe even get to do some aerial applicating himself just for the experience.

So you want to tell me how obsessed today's young people are with sex?

I'd rather tell you about Robert Gray's idea of having a good time. It's taking girls and their parents up for an airplane ride together.

So you want to tell me how bad the economy is and how tough it's going to be for a young person to

make it in today's world? I'd rather tell you about Robert Gray's attitude.

"I know I've got to work at flying to be good-you can't get cocky about it. But there is a place somewhere for me in the flying business of the future," he said. "I may not always be interested in instructing or being a corporate pilot or ever becoming an airline pilot. But just getting to fly in the clouds is enough to make it worthwhile for me to want to stick with an aviation career."

So you want to tell me how ungrateful and uncaring today's young people are?

I'd rather tell you about a phone call I received from Robert Gray. It was the day after he had taken me flying so I could do this interview.

"Miss Robinson, would you please be sure to put something in your story about how much I appreciate all my folks and my flight instructor have done for me to encourage me and help me get this far? My flight instructor, Virgil

Crestman, has moved to Dallas now that TSTI has discontinued their aviation training program. I sure hated to see them have to cut it out-it hurt to lose my instructor.

"But my dad has gone back and renewed his instructor's license, so I'll be lucky enough to have him keep teaching me. He's the greatest-the best friend I have."

So you want to tell me how bad today's young people are?

I'd rather tell you about Robert Gray.

If I were just 15 years younger...

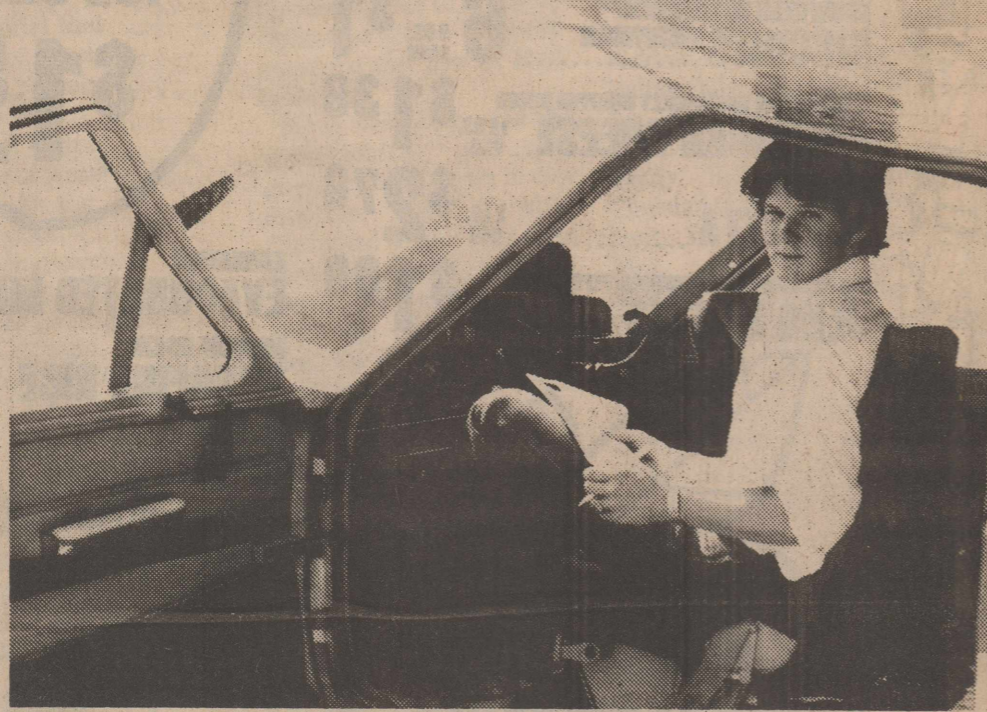
The purpose of the Democratic Freshman Caucus, according to Carriker, is first to help Democratic candidates win in the November 2nd general election, and then to offer information and assistance to the incoming freshman class in January.

With 52 new Democratic nominees, this year's freshman class is expected to be the largest in a decade.

"These new Democratic nominees seem more than usually enthusiastic about serving in the legislature," Carriker said, "and are already working to see that they go in prepared to do the job. The Freshman Democratic Caucus is being organized as a self-help group to insure that our districts are effectively represented."

Carriker went on to point out that although the caucus is limited to Democrats, that it is a diverse group which espouses no particular political philosophy. "We're just concerned with being able to do the best job possible."

Besides Carriker, other members of the steering committee are Walter Martinez (San Antonio), Charles Cryan (Denton), Jesse Oliver (Dallas), Sue Hamilton (Dallas), Billy Clemons (Pollock), and Bob Barton (Buda).
